FURIOUS-FIVE LIVES WERE LOST.

SNATCHED FROM DEATH.

Wrecks and Stranded Vessels Result, But Loss of Life Was Remarkably Small For So Severe a Gale.

Storms on the lakes Saturday night and Sunday wrecked two boats, stranded several others and claimed six lives. The big ferry No. 2 of the Wis-consin & Michigan R. R. turned tartle after battling through the storm to the oreakwater at Chicago, and three men were drowned.

The old City of Concord sank in a terrific gale on Lake Erie Saturda, night; 15 miles off Sandusky, and three lives were lost. Nine of the crew, including a woman, escaped in the ship's yawl and after almost superhuman efforts managed to reach shore in an exhausted condition.

Those drowned from the car ferry were: O. C., Olson, captain; Gabriel Hanson, donkéy man; deckhand, name un known.

Those drowned in the City of Con cord were: Frank Peters, fireman, Muskegon, Mich.; John Wiser, watch-man, Milwaukee, Wis.; Roy Wakefield, Sanllac, Mich.

Wakefield is one of the men who became afraid that the Concord's yawi would sink with its load and stayed on the sinking boat. He was picked up when almost exhausted by one of the Concord's barges. Wakefield's home is in Port Huron.

His escape reduces the number of the Concord's dead to two.
Wakefield, who is a mere boy, was in the water a long time, and thought it was all off with him, but he was determined to battle, if -possible, the terrible sea. He swam about half a mile, when he called to the Donald-son, one of the Concord's consorts. As line was thrown out and he was pulled aboard. He became unconscious as he reached the deck, but

Support the Provisional Government Pending Adjustment of Affairs and Reinstatement of Cubans. Washington, Oct. 1.-American troops are moving toward Cuba. Mobilization of the force will be at New-

The first American troops will be landed at Havana next Saturday. Meantime, the marines and bluejackets from the American fleet in Cuban waters will protect American interests and support Secretary Taft, the provisional governor of Cuba, in the servation of order and the protec tion of life and property. Intervention Had to Come.

In official circles here American in-tervention was regarded as inevitable. How long it may continue, it is impossible to foretell. The nature of the intervention and the preparations for it indicate a supervision of Cuban affairs on the part of the American government for an indefinite period. Arrangements have been concluded not only for the first expeditionary force to Cuba of about 5,000 men, but for a second force of equal numbers. No orders for the mobilization of the second force, of course, have been issued, but if the men are needed all arrangements have been completed for harrying them to Cuba at the earliest possible moment. Whether more troops than are included in the first expedition will be sent to Cuba will depend upon the developments in the island during the next ten days or

two weeks. It is certain, however, that a sufdelent force of American troops will be maintained in Cuba to support the provisional government and to insure the establishment of a stable government by the Cubans.

Available Lending Force. Secretary Taft, as the head of the president's special mission to Cuba. has available nearly 5,000 marines and bluelackets who could be landed on Cuban soil in a few hours in case of emergency. Other marines are en route to Cuba and will be available for emergency service in two or three

WHEN CLEANING THE ORCHARD Work of Getting Brush out May Be Simplified.

Everybody knows what a tiresome and slow task it is to clean the brush out of an orchard with any kind of a conveyance. When it has to be picked up it is about the worst work on the farm. It is even worse than churn-ing with an old-fashioned dash churn. But one of our new men on the farm, says a correspondent of the Rural New Yorker, has made an implement with which two men and a team can get it out easily and ten times as fast as with any other contrivance I have ever seen. He went to the woods and cut a small tree with a crotch, as shown, of tough wood. The limbs he left six feet long and the body part 12 feet. It was about four inches in diameter at the crotch, and he hewed the straight part down, so it was about two and a half or three inches at the other end. He then cut the ends of the limbs a little slanting. on the under side, so as to run smooth ly along and not catch in the ground. Across the crotch he bolted a piece of plank 11/2 inches thick and six inches wide firmly to each limb, and far enough from the crotch so he could put a heavy clevis on it in the middle, to which he could fasten a long chain (the chain should be at. least 12 feet long). To the other ends of the chain he attached a long evener six or seven feet long, and a single whiffletree to this at each end, use it one man drives the team and

BLACK BASS IS A SAVAGE.

A Finny Butcher That Kills for the Pleasure of Slaughter.

The bass is like a roaring lion going about seeking whom he may de vour. I have seen a good-sized specimen get into a school of minnows and eat and stuff until he could not get any more into his capacious insides off by himself, throw up what he had eaten, and begin over again, after which he would keep on killing the poor innocent minnows, apparently for the mere pleasure of willing. Very young bass will attach minute water life which flourishes on water plants and get away with every one in sight, adopting the same method as their elders. To illustrate the extent of the cannibalism of the black bass here is the experience of a su perintendent of one of the fish hatcheries in Pennsylvania:

"The superintendent made an actual count of 20,000 young bass about an inch long and placed them in fry pond by themselves. He gave them food six times a day, and, according to his statement, each fish ate its own weight of the prepared food every 24 hours. They were placed in a pond of the 1st of July, and on October 1, when they were taken out, there were only 11,000, and the record showed that less than 200 died from sickness. It is reasonable to suppose, therefore, that in-addition to the food given them by the superintendent there were about 9,000 bass devoured by their stronger and more fortunate companions."—W. E. Meehan, in Field and Stream.
