





### From the Canal Zone.

Miss Hazel Burtless has handed us the following letter from her cousin, Clarence Burtless, who is one of the clerks in the chief sanitary office, U. S. depart ment of health, in the lethmian canal zone.—En.

PANAMA, Feb. 26, 1907.

I have not felt much like writing letlers lately, or doing anything else that I did not positively have to. Work has been pretty hard, and when through at night I generally feel pretty tired Guess I have had a pretty bad case of "Panama" fever, which is very prevalent in this country.

We are having pretty nice summer weather here. What the natives calltheir summer lasts from about the first of January to the first of April. During that time there is almost no rain and it is noticeably warmer than the other months of the year, but this year there has been a light shower every two or three days, just enough to keep the dust down. I think it has been about as agreeable as one could wish. The warmest day we had during January was 98 in the shade and the coldest temperature that was registered during the month was 66 degrees. It seemed to me that it was colder than that some nights up on Ancon hill, where I sleep. The employees of the Panama offices have recently been furnished new quarters, just outside the city on a hill two or three hundred feet high and I notice quite a change. difference between the atmosphere up there and here in the town. Some mornings it is so cool that one blanket is hardly enough to keep a person warm. Nev er have seen any snow up there yet,

We had a holiday the 22nd and I went on an excursion to Taboga island, which is situated in the Bay of Panama, about twelve miles south of the city. It is about six or seven miles in length and is noted for the production of pineapples more than anything else. There is s little village of five or six hundred prople on the side of the island which faces Passons and a very unique village it is Not only la there no railroad nor street car line, but not even a wagon or cart or any sort of vehicle. In fact I did not OF a stufe of any other kind of besst. There are a few donkeys scattered over the island, but most of the natives some to merkel op foot, carrying their produce on their backs. You can imagine what a quiet town it is, chester is not in it a minute for stillness It is a first rate place to rest and that is probably the reason the French thought it would be a good place to build a sanitarium. They put up a well arranged building which accommodates about a hundred people and the Americans have fixed it over and made a pretty nice place out of it. It is used for convalescent patients from the hospitals and for employees who are in need of recupera. Opened energe of the contract of the co

tion on account of over-work etc. I spent a week over there last July and en joved it very much. There were shout 150 people in our party the 22nd and all had a pretty jolly time of it except two or three who got seasick. . We had three boats, one of which was large enough to carry about eighty people

At noon we all crowded onto the large boat and disposed of the picuic dinner which the ladies had brought along. About that time a big wave came along and rocked the boat and several plates of chicken and other goodies slid overboard into the sea. I was on the committee to hand out the grub. I got so excited that I forgot to save out enough for my own use, but after the excitement was over I found two or three dishes of ice cream and six or eight pieces of cake, so I managed to keep from starving Oce thing that I should rot forget about the trip is the ocean bath which I had Intayed in so long that I got badly aunhurned and I have been so sore ever since that I could hardly keep my clothes on.

You seked me about the little coins in the bracelet; they are Panama five cent pieces, worth 21 cents in U.S money but they are all out of circulation now. The smallest coin in circulation here not is the Panama ten cent piece, worth five cents of our money. If you make a pur chase and have any change coming less than five cents, you have to take postage stamps or promises Sometimes they will offer you a plug of tobacco for
