

1440 It was on Christmas day, 1440, that Gilles de Retz, a French nobleman, was executed for his crimes.

1460 The terrible battle of Wakefield, in the Wars of the Roses, took place on Christmas day, 1460.

1492 Naviaga, Cuba, was discovered by Christopher Columbus on Christmas day, 1492.

1526 In 1526 was so called because, on account of the plague which was raging in England, Henry VIII ordered that the court should observe all Christmas mirth and joy out of sympathy for the suffering country.

1642 The most astonishing event of the century was the execution of Charles I. on January 30, 1649.

1688 James II, who had taken the crown, was obliged to flee to France for his life, and on Christmas day, 1688, landed at Blakeney, in Britain. The flight of James put an end to the struggle between the two houses of Stuart.

1776 Washington crossed the Delaware on Christmas day, 1776, as he expected them to catch the Hessians of their guard. His plans were entirely successful. The Hessians, making merry because of the holiday, were surprised and routed by the continentals.

1837 Zachary Taylor defeated the Indians in the battle of San Juan, on Christmas day, 1837.

1861 The cabinet meeting held on Christmas day in 1861 was a momentous one, for then it was decided by President Lincoln and his advisers that it would be wise to secede to Grant's demands that Mason and Seward be removed. Seven years later President Johnson made the day one of greater peace by issuing a proclamation granting full pardon to every one who had taken part in the rebellion.
