"As a citizen of the state I will welcome the advent of any strong and sincere man, who, with honest ambi-lions of his own, desires to become a candidate for the office of governor, and who will unhesistatingly and unequivocally pledge himself to oppose the organized crew of professional pol-iticians who make a living by serving

special interests and seturing special favors through their allies in office to the detriment of the people at large.

"I know how well this band of shrewd manipulators is intrenched. Men of great wealth who seek high political office sometimes supply the necessary funds without which these political merchants could not exist as an organization. Any man, especially any candidate, who is not openly and avowedly against them and their plans, in these days, is apt to be found working with them and certainly, at least, would be giving them his moral support. As long as I remain their only known opponent in the field as a candidate for governor, rest assured they will make it their business to or more candidates to oppose me and who they can back up and

MESSAGE IS WARM

President Flays Corporations That Defy Laws.

DENIES HE CAUSED PANIC

Attacks of Great Concerns on His Administration Are Vigorously Repelled-Employers' Liability and Abuses of Injunction Discussed.

Washington.—In a message dealing principally with the control of great corporations, transmitted to congress on Friday, the president flays what he terms the "law defying trusts" in no terms the "law detying trusts ancertain terms."
In the opening paragraphs of the measurement of the employers liability law, and for such legislation as will remedy the abuses of the fujunction. He then turns his attention to stock jobbing and other forms of high finance, and says:

"I do not know whether it is possible, be, but if possible, it is certainly desirable, but if possible, it is certainly desirable, that in connection with measures to restrain stock watering and overcapitalization there should be measures taken to prevent at least the grosser forms of gambling in making large sales of what men, do not possess and cornering the market.

It would seem that the federal government could at least act by forbidding the use of the mails, telegraph and telephone wires for mere gambling in stocks and futures, just as it does in lottery transactions."

"The attacks by these great corporations on the administration's actions have been given wide circulation throughout the country, in the newspaners and otherwise, by those witten and speakers, who, consciously or unconsciously, act as the representatives of predatory wealth—of the wealth accumulated on a giant scale by all forms of iniquity, ranging from the oppression of wageworkers to unfair and unwholesome methods of crushing out competition, and to defreucing the public by stock jobbing and the manipulation of securities—Certain wealthy men of this stamp, whose conduct should be abhorrent to every man of ordinarily decent conscience and who commit the hideous wrong of teaching our young men that phenomenal business success must ordinarily be based on dishonesty, have during the last few months made it apparent that they have banded together to work for a reaction.
