While no figures can be given ed. out, it is asserted that unless there is an enormous shrinkage enough names have been filed to submit the question in every senatorial district in which campaign has been carried on and also in the seventh congressional dis-

CONVICTS_KILL A WARDEN

ATTEMPT TO ESCAPE FOILED AT DEER LODGE, MONT.

Penitentiary Is Scene of Effort to Break Jail-Head Keeper Dangerously Wounded.

Deer Lodge, Mont., Mar. 9.-Warden Frank Conley of the Montana state penitentiary was dangerously wounded Sunday and his first assistant warden, John Robinson, was killed when three life convicts, George Rock, W. H.

Haves and another whose name not given, made a dash for liberty Robinson's throat was cut from ear to ear and the jugular vein was severed. Conley's throat was gashed and he was stabbed several times in the shoulder and groin before he was able to draw his revolver. Convict: Hayes and Rock were both shot down by Conley after the latter had been wounded. It is believed that the war, den will recover.
