





FOOD VALUE OF MILK. Prof. J. B. Lindsey Makes Strong Ar-

The food value of milk is brought out forcibly in a recent pamphlet written by Prof. J. B. Lindsey of the Massachusetts College of Agriculture and published by the state board of

Milk of average quality at market prices furnishes more food for the money than do more expensive kinds of meat, such as beef, mutton and pork, and is much cheaper than such special foods as eggs or oysters, or most vegetables and fruits. Only breakfast foods, etc., are cheaper sources of energy than milk A glance at Prof. Lindsey's table shows that milk at six cents a quart furnishes pe same amount of protein as round eef at 16 cents; or roast pork at 12 cents. That is to say a dollar's worth of either of these foods contains an equal amount of protein. Even where milk is sold as high as ten cents per quart, a dollar will buy as much protein when spent for milk as if spent for lamb chops at 25 cents per pound, sirioin beef at 30 cents or eggs at
