



ed through experiments conducted by the M. A. C. and experience of Michigan's most successful swine breeders and feeders, the departy ment of animal husbandry is calling attention this spring to the usefulness of forage crops as money-savers in pork production.

Numerous tests here and in farm a feed lots have demonstrated that from one-half to one-third less grain is required to produce a given amount of pork on pasture than is necessary in a pen or dry lot.

It cannot be emphasized too strongly that some pasture crop or crops should be provided for hogs this season. There are many crops that may be used, but a plot or two of oats and peas, sown early, and orape sown somewhat later should prove an excellent combination. For summer feed these should not be depended on, as they will not again grow up after being eaten off, unless the season is very wet. These crops provide excellent forage during the early summer.

Rape is the best emergency pasture crop for hogs in Michigan, as well as one of the best regular pasture crops. It makes a rapid growth and furnishes at a low cost a large amount of succulent feed which remains fresh and green throughout the dry. summer months, supplying forage when most other pasture crops are shrivelling up. Rape is also relished very much by hogs and when supplemented by a medium amount of grain insures rapid gains. It gives best results if sown in early spring, as soon as the soil warms up nicely, up to June 1st, though it may be sown as late as July 1st or even later, depending upon weather conditions. Dwarf Essex is the best variety for our conditions. The seed of rape is very fine and requires a well fitted seed bed, containing considerable moisture if it is to germinate evenly and strongly. Usually it is sown broadcast at the rate of about five pounds per acre, but as the crop requires a great deal of moisture it may be advisable on light sandy soils to sow in drills about 28 inches apart and cultivate between the rows, using from three to three and a half pounds of seed per acre. The pigs should be turned in on the crop when it is eight or ten inches high. This is usually six weeks or so after it has been sown. If not pastured very closely and if the animals are removed to another lot for a short time occasionally new shoots will develop and keep the crop fresh and green throughout the season.

HOW TO SECURE FARM HELP.

HOW TO SECURE FARM HELP.

The U. S. Government recognizes the importance of farm labor and is urging every community to organize and care for its needs. "Loo's being a care for its needs." The County War Preparedness Board of Washtenaw county is taking the matter up and plans to cooperate with the County Farm Bureau in providing help during the crop season.

The important sources of help are the Boys' Working Reserve. These include boys from 16 to 21 years of age, who are enrolled from the different high schools of the county and state.

The U. S. Public Working Reserve includes men over 21 years of age who are any eligible for army service.

The U. S. Public Working Reserve includes men over 21 years of age who are not eligible for army service or are eligible but have not been called. Men willing to assist in farm labor during the coming season can register with any postmaster in the county or with the Courty Farm Bureau, Ann Arbor. Some help may be available during the harvest season from men of the city who have had farm experience.
Requests for help by the farmers should be made to the County Farm Bureau, Ann Arbor.

was then that I had my first real good opportunity to observe the wonderful spirit of the French soldiers. They remain quiet no matter how much pain they are in, and there is very lit-tle grumbling. Always you can find a smile. And they are going to win the war!"

It is difficult to realize that a tenderly reared American girl handled her-self with so much poise in a shell-shattered area. The group of girls she was addressing were preparing themselves to face the same dangers, and thousands of other American girls and women as nurses are more than doing


