Washtenaw county proposes to raise its quota of Liberty bonds without soliciting a single dollar.

The County War Board is confident that it can be done, and has devised a plan by which every person in the county will know what his fair share is. This is all he is asked to subscribe, and if the board's figures are correct the quota will be raised the opening week of the campaign without solicitation. In the preceding loans a great deal of argument was necessary to convince some people that the bonds were a splendid investment, but such is not the case this time. Everybody knows by this time, that U. S. Liberty bonds are the best and safest investment in the world, and everybody who has money to invest will be anxious to secure some of the fourth loan. However there are not enough people of means in this country to absorb such a large loan, so it becomes necessary for every man, woman and child who can do so to purchase bonds, and to purchase them to the limit of their ability if the loan is to be a success.
