



PRoducers who desire to participate will submit bids to the government indicating what they're willing to take to get out of dairy farming for five years, based on one year's produc-

For example, if a dairyman has 100 cows producing an average of 15,000 pounds per year, his annual total would be 1.5 million pounds. He might make a bid of \$10 per hundred pounds (cwt.), for a total of \$150,000 in all, to be paid over the five

FISH NET TRIAL CONTINUES

Bay Port Fish Company's co-owner Forrest Williams plans to renew his experiments with portable nets in Lake Huron this spring, as soon as he can get his boats out of the harbor. Bay Port Fish Co. was granted a three-year permit last fall from the state Department of Natural Resources to use the moveable purse seines to catch whitefish and other non-sport

fish from Bay Port east around the Thumb to Harbor Beach. Some sport fishing groups have complained that fixed nets used by other commercial fishermen are more dangerous and harm sport fish. State officials hope the portable nets, which are difficult to use, will allow peaceful coexistence between commercial and sport fishermen on Lake Huron.

Williams told reporters he's enthusiastic about this spring's start, since the short trial in December failed to yield any fish. This was due mostly to a green crew, he said. If Bay Port Fish Co. can use the purse seines without conflicting with sport fishermen, DNR officials say other Great Lakes companies may be allowed to use these nets commer-

Fish are taken unharmed out of the purse seine nets while the nets are drawn into the boat. This allows commercial crews to put sport fish, such as trout and salmon, back into the water when they get scooped up with the whitefish. Most the Jack Schubach farm west of Elkton. At stake are daily meals served at various locations and delivered to shut-ins, transportation to grocery stores and doctor's offices, blood pressure clinics, medical referrals, income tax aid, legal aid and other programs.

If Sanilac pulls out, Tuscola and Huron may align with Saginaw or other counties to continue sharing administrative expenses. Huron County plans to spend \$24,900 from federal revenue sharing monies for senior support this year.

DNR FLOOD CONTROL FUNDS?

Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron shoreline homeowners may qualify for a state DNR loan program to move existing houses back from the ever-nearing water's edge, thanks to continuing high water conditions

Akron and Wisner Townships in Tuscola County are among local places where such low-interest loans may be offered, the DNR says. The townships themselves may qualify for state matching grants totaling \$30,000 each, to prevent damage to public property.
