

Caseville Airport hearing July 27

Nearly \$1.1 million in federal and local funding is expected in fiscal year 1984, as Caseville' General Aviation Airport moves closer to reality.

Purchase of 385 acres for the air field, land clearing and preparation, construction of the 3800-foot paved runway and other basic plans should be completed by 1984, according to Caseville Township Aeronautical Board Chairman Lowell Kraft. The money is earmarked at \$945,000 in federal funding, \$52,500 in state and \$87,500 in local funding — all of which are thus far committed, according to Kraft.

A public hearing on the proposed airport development is scheduled for Wednesday, July 27 at 7:30 p.m. at Caseville Public School gymnasium. It is being conducted to consider economic, social and environmental effects of the airport location and its consistency with the goals and objectives of such urban planning as has been planned for the area, Kraft

UNUSED, WOODED AREA: The airport will be built in the two-square-mile area bounded by Caseville Road on the east, Crescent Beach Road on the north, M-25 highway on the west and Dunn Road on the south, in sections nine and ten of Caseville Township. Options have been taken on most of the land, and little opposition has been experienced, Kraft says. Many of the trees in the vicinity will be maintained for site control since it is nearly totally-wooded, sandy land.

The Aeronautical Board will summarize its views about the airport plan and will invite other persons to give written or oral views on the subject at the hearing. Environmental impact statements are available for review by interested persons at the Caseville Township Hall, Caseville Branch of Community Bank and Real Estate One — Power Associates

offices, during normal business hours.

Besides the paved runway, a crosswind runway, clear zones, taxiways, future extensions, aprons, hangar areas and access roads will be built at the site, Kraft says. Plans have been approved by federal and state agencies to get the project rolling in 1984, and the July 27 hearing will primarily discuss 1985 fiscal year plans.

FUNDING OKAYED: Kraft says \$50,000 in local donations and pledges have already been received for the airport, showing "the strong interest local people have in this project." Huron County has committed \$30,000 in financing—which together provide nearly all the \$87,500 local match needed in 1984. State and federal funding is already assured,

he said.

Kraft says 1985 projects will total \$223,000 including more work on the 75-foot wide runway, a beacon and tower, wind cone, fuel tanks and radar location devices. Federal funding would pay \$171,000 of the total, while state funding would be \$9500 and local funding \$42,500 in all.

The 1984 and '85 outlines are part of a five-year master plan which includes additional hangar space, building and more safety features. Kraft says the Michigan Aeronautical Commission has accelerated its timetable for pre-applications for funding, moving it ahead four months. "But that should mean they'll get the funds out faster to us," he added.

NEEDED SINCE 1970s: The future demand for such an airport in northwestern Huron County was seen in the 1970s. Original work on the old State Highway Department's Airport System Plan said such a general aviation (nonscheduled airline) airport should be in operation by 1982.

At present, "Farver's Airstrip" at Caseville is home for 13 planes -- "And others have shown their interest. It's very surprising how many planes want to use this facility," Kraft says.

The economic impact is staggering for the entire area, he adds, since more money would be spent by vacationers and business people alike who will use the airport.



A great Lady needs our help

he's quite a bit older now, but she's still noble and regal. She stands tall and proud, but there are aches and groans beneath her skin which could prove fatal if not

The Statue of Liberty in New York City's harbor is in need of special care now, in her 97th year. If she's not attended to, her 100th birthday celebration on Oct. 28, 1986 may come and go without the guest of honor herself.

Beneath the statue's hand-hammered copper skin, many of the 2000 iron armature support bars have deteriorated to less than half their original thickness. Pieces of the proud torch held high for generation after generation of immigrants have fallen into New York Harbor. The torch and portions of the upraised right arm may have to be completely replaced.

The statue's copper skin has been thinned by some of man's worst gifts since her creation -acid rain and air pollutants. In short, the 151-foot figure needs aid, possibly to the tune of several million dollars.

Whether or not you approve of President Reagan's policies, he's exactly correct in his thoughts about how America's best-known Lady should be treated. Just as in 1886, our present leader believes all costs should be paid through small gifts from citizens at large. Yes, the government could appropriate millions and millions to the project, but that's not the best possible way.

President Reagan believes America will respond to the appeal to restore the Lady to her original beauty and strength - through voluntary contributions from the people. U.S. leaders Lee Iacocca, Bob Hope, Douglas Fraser and others are members of a 20-member commission charged with raising \$230 million to repair the Statue of Liberty and nearby Ellis Island, which has fallen into ruin since it was closed as an immigration center in 1954.

It's a project we should — and must — support and complete.

Seventeen million immigrants have streamed keep your mouth shut. past her to seek new lives in America since French sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi spent nine years of his life to create Lady

Liberty. Even the famous French engineer Alexandre Gustave Eiffel (of Paris tower fame, of course) worked on the project, designed as a gift of appreciation from the French to the United States.

A private group of French citizens known as the Franco-American Union dug into their pockets to raise the two million francs (then \$400,000) to pay for Lady Liberty. A similar fund drive was begun in the U.S., which raised more than \$100,000 (primarily in pennies) to pay for the pedestal. More than 80% of the U.S. gift came in amounts less than \$1.

Then, as now, newspapers urged citizens to each give \$1 or less, as they are able. If everyone in the U.S. did so, we'd easily surpass the \$230 million goal. You can be part of the 1986 celebration honoring our most-familiar landmark. Special observances featuring tall sailing ships reminiscent of 1976's Bicentennial celebration are planned July 4, 1986. Think how good you'll feel if a few cents of your money has helped make the celebration possible!

The great Lady has survived hurricanes, floods and explosions to remain the symbol that says "America" to the people of every continent. 

A short program will feeature presentation of the Outstanding Dairyman Award, Outstanding Dairy Supporter Award and the Outstanding Dairy Youth Award.

Tickets are available from Huron County Dairy Promotion Committee members or the Huron County Cooperative Extension Service office in Bad Axe at 269-9949, according to Extension Ag Agent Andy Sommers.

June 1 Grain Stocks in Michigan show continuing high stock levels for corn, soybeans and oats, compared with the same time last year. The Michigan Ag Reporting Service says corn stored in all positions totals 177 million bushels, up

34% from a year ago, MARS says. Sharp increases in stocks are seen in both on- and off-farm storage facilities, with 73% held in on-farm locations. Slow sales continue to be evident despite price increases during the past quarter.

Soybeans at over 9 million bushels reflect a 16% rise from last year, MARS says. Old crop oats in storage totaled about 7 million bushels, more than double last year's amount. Oat prices have remained in the \$1.60 per bushel range and have not prompted large scale sales.

Old crop winter wheat continues to be the only major Michigan crop showing lower stock levels. On June 1, holdings were under 7 million bushels, 26% below last year's

Nationally, according to MARS figures, corn stored in all positions totaled a record high 5.08 billion bushels, up 30% from last year. Soys were also at record highs, with 867 million bushels, up 33% from 1982. Old crop wheat was also a record, at 1.54 billion bushels, up 32%. Old crop oats were 229 million bushels in size, 51% up from 1982.

Milk production on Michigan farms during May was up 5% from the April 1983 figures. May's milk total was 477 million pounds, MARS says. Milk cow numbers increased to 404,000 head during May.

Milk per cow averaged 1180 pounds, up 50 pounds from May, 1981. May production put Michigan sixth nationally in both milk cow numbers and milk production.

Milk producers in the state received an average of \$13.40 per hundredweight (cwt.) for their milk in May, up 10 cents from a year earlier. This is attributed to seasonal factors, including higher butterfat tests for May, 1983. This year's fat test of 3.60% compares with 3.55% a year ago.

Milk prices generally have averaged below year-ago

levels, and slaughter cow prices averaged \$45.20 per cwt., up

2% from last May, MARS says.

Michigan dairy plants produced 5.8 million pounds of butter in April, down 6% from the previous month of March. American cheese production at 1.7 million pounds, was down 3% from the previous month. Ice cream output at 2.6 million gallons, was down 10% from March, 1983.

National milk production in May was 12.5 billion pounds, up 5% from the previous month. Production per cow averaged 1129 pounds during May, and milk cow numbers averaged 11.1 million head, MARS says.



The coop voted last week to abandon attempts begun in 1979 to save the Croswell plant, which was closed due for what the company called economic reasons. Members of the coop board hope to build a Sandusky plant by

Freedom on your back

Camping in America is fast becoming little more than the relocation of all our modern conveniences from our home to the chosen site of our vacation. A trip to any campground this summer will find miniature cities made up of a vast array of motor homes, fifth wheels and travel trailers that are equipped with refrigerators, gas ranges, hot water heaters, electric lights, bathrooms (with showers), microwaves, TVs, stereos and countless other comforts designed to insulate the camper from the very things that he goes on vacation to experience.

I must be a wierdo, but when I chose to spend time in the out of doors, I like to leave as much of the plastic world as possible behind, and become more attuned with the natural environment. I'm not professing that we run around the woods naked, eating roots and berries, and sleeping in caves, but I am saying that it is hard to appreciate nature when you are munching a frozen TV dinner fresh from the microwave while 'Three's Company" is drowning out the sound of raindrops falling on your aluminum roof

If you would like to experience the natural out of doors at its finest, and do it inexpensively, think about backpacking. It is certainly nothing new, for if we return in history, the earliest people that roamed America were essentially backpackers. The Indians first, and the frontiersmen who followed, were at home, and very comfortable, with a few belongings rolled in some sort of convenient package and hoisted to their shoulders.

A popular misconception is that backpacking is only for the strong and hardy. Nothing could be further from the truth. Walking, the main form of transportation when backpacking, is something that is done by everybody, everyday. It takes no special training or lessons to walk, and doctors are beginning to realize that it is every bit as healthful as jogging. and you don't experience as many injuries

So, where do you begin? First, remember, you can backpack anywhere that you like. Throughout our beautiful state, you can find plenty of unspoiled and practically uninhabited land. With your pack, you can fish, hike, photograph, or anything else you like, for almost as long as you want, and have a glorious and totally different adventure you will never forget.

Some of the popular places are Isle Royal in the northwestern part of Lake Superior. The island, 45 miles long, and about 10 miles wide, is a mecca for the hiking fraternity. Reachable by boat or seaplane, it has hundreds of miles of trails for all types of backpackers, novice to advance.

The Porcupine Mountain State Park near Ontonagon in the western part of the UP, is another great area for the hiker. If the UP is too far for you to travel, you can find good wilderness trails in the Pigeon River State Forest near Vanderbilt. Many other areas, too numerous to mention exist for the adventuresome backpacker, and your choice is limited by your imag

How do you get started? Your first piece of equipment should be a pack. There are really only two satisfactory types. One, is the alpine type, which is a softpack that sometimes has an internal support frame of . aluminum or plastic. Smaller, this type hugs the back and makes steep climbing easier. Their downfall is their size that limits how much you can carry. The second type is the framed backpack. This model has an external frame of aluminum or magnesium tubing that is covered with nylon webbing to keep it away from your back. Attached to the frame is a carrying bag that is made up of a large pouch plus numerous small pockets that allow you to carry large heavy loads. Anyone who is planning on hiking some distance, or will stay away from civilization for more than a couple of days, would do well to have such a pack. You can pay anywhere from \$15 to \$150, but your best bet might be to rent one or borrow one from a friend until you are

sure you will like this type of camping. Once you have obtained a pack, the rest of your equipment is pretty much the same as used in any other camping situation. Although, serious backpackers are very conscious of weight, on a short trip you can

use the sleeping bag you already own, supplemented with a sleeping pad or air mattress. If you must go out and purchase one. look for down or Hollowfil as an insulating material. My personal choice is goose down, and a bag that I bought for +30, 15 years ago weighs just 16 ounces and has kept me warm

and dry in a variety of extreme conditions. If you are a squeamish individual, you may want to take a tent along to sleep in. They are good to keep out rain, insects and numerous creepy, crawly things that prowl around at night. If it is not raining, it's exciting to sleep out under the stars, and should some moisture fall, you can always carry a lightweight poncho that can be supported between a couple of trees to provide the necessary protection needed.

Many backpacking areas are beginning to frown on open fires. The constant quest for wood, plus the danger and unsightly remains of a campfire have a tendency to damage our fragile wilderness. Most dedicated backpackers carry their own fire in the form of backpacking stoves. Lightweight and inexpensive, these hot burning little dandies make out-door cooking a delight. Most boil a quart of water in five minutes and will burn hours on a pint of white gas. The best, and also the cheapest is the Peak I by Coleman. Even if you don't backpack, this is a handy little item to have in any camping situation.

Easily prepared an inexpensive food can be readily found in your local supermarket. No need to buy freeze-dried fare or other expensive substitutes. Just use your imagination and remember that you carry

everything that you eat. Normal camping clothes will do just fine. Take a sweater along for the chilly evenings, and don't forget some sort of rain gear. As far as footwear goes, stay away from the heavy expensive hiking boots. They will be a bugger to carry and their lug soles damage the trails. Instead, put on a pair of sneakers or tennis shoes used for other outdoor



STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on December 4, 1981, under the authority of Act 165 P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April

1, 1982, and ending March 31, 1984, no person shall take, or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon. Size limits shall be 8 inches on Lower Peninsula streams. 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on lakes. The daily POSSESSION-limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 3 lake trout or splake, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only and no more than 2 lake trout or splake may be taker from Lake Michigan or its tributary streams.


