6 steps to greater wealth...

Recently, a national publication carried a listing of "Six key steps to greater wealth." Sponsored by an investor advising firm called Integrated Resources, Inc., the special pages showed some simple -- yet valuably important -- concepts and approaches to better preserve what we all have, and to increase that bounty, too.

Today's volatile economy makes reliable financial growth more important than ever, the feature pointed out. Costs of living, education and retirement are steadily rising.

Yet the yields of many investments are declining, the experts point out. And as tax laws constantly change, so changes how much we keep of what we earn. Hence, people need financial planning.

Here are the six tips as recommended in that USA TODAY article:

FIRST, have a plan. You've got to determine your present position to best prepare your financial plan. Add up all your assets and subtract your liabilities, to determine your net worth. Then, follow expenses and set up a budget to live by.

You'll have to set financial goals (kids' college, buy new house, etc.) and -- allowing for inflation -- estimate how much money you'll need to reach them.

SECOND, secure your safety net. Make sure you have a secure foundation that includes "liquid" cash for emergencies and enough insurance to protect you against risks.

You need cash in reserve (usually equal to three months' of income) in case crises strike. In any given year, your chances of being in an injury-causing car accident are one in 70. The probability that your home could be damaged by fire is about one in 88. Your chance of becoming disabled is about one in eight.

Insurance is a must, these experts say THIRD, reduce your current taxes. We all should be "tax-wise," which is best done with professional advice. As people get into higher tax brackets, deferring some taxes or sheltering some income leaves more to invest -- and to

use in increasing your "nest egg." FOURTH, pick investments that fit your needs. When (and if) you've fastened your "safety net" and have reduced current taxes, you've got to put the small monetary pot where

it will do you the most good. Certain investments are better for steady income, although returns are smaller than others. Some offer better tax reduction, while still others are more profitable -- but more hazardous. Again, professional advice is often the best solution.





Houghton Lake is like our school district, calling for 1080 instruction hours, in excess of 180 hours.

With their contract talks at a standstill, the calculation of lost state aid, and the excess of required clock hours, the Houghton Lake Board of Education and the Teacher Association challenged the '85-86 ruling, basing the challenge on current school law and its taking precedence over this year's state aid ruling.

Another factor they considered is the cost for those additional days in wages for cooks, bus drivers, aides, etc. The Houghton Lake Board felt that if the state mandates this ruling, then they should come up with adequate funding.

After all considerations, their final step was to consult with attorneys and see if they had a case. As it appears, they are going into court contesting the 85-86 State Aid Act.

Their action is not intended to violate the law. What they are doing is simply letting our state legislators know the effects of taking on negotiations being stalled on a regulation without making a thorough investigation of all of its ramifications.



IRRADIATE? The U.S. Food & Drug Administration has authorized a New Jersey company to begin irradiaparasite which can cause trichinosis, an intestinal and muscular disease.

This is the first time the government has allowed the food industry to irradiate food, to control insects and retard spoilage. Pork will be exposed to 100,000 rads of what the FDA calls "low level radiation' which leaves no residue in food.

There is some speculation the FDA will soon approve such irradiation in fruits and vegetables, which it has long opposed. Later, some spices may be okayed for irradia-

SUPER COWS? The FDA is being asked to disapprove a synthetic hormone to create "super cows" which would greatly increase milk production -- at a time the government is spending \$1.8 billion to reduce milk surpluses by buying and killing cows in the Dairy Herd Termination Program. 



It was catch 22. As I inched slowly forward, the river threatened to spill into my waders. Turning around was out of the question. I had tried that earlier and the force of the current was so great I was almost swept from my precarious footing. So here I was, unable to go forward, and unable to go backward.

It had seemed so easy the night before. In the comfort and safety of the inn's dining room, my host had carefully mapped out the proposed route for crossing the

"It really is very easy," he had said confidently. "Just walk down to the end of the island and then sight in on the large flat rock about 50 yards down the opposite shore. If you walk a straight line, you will have no problem. But, vary from side to side, and you will be able to drink standing

That piece of advice was of little comfort now. Turning my head, I rechecked my direction line and found it to be perfectly lined with the flat rock on the now distant shore. Why was I having so much trouble?

It came to me in a flash. My host had given me perfect instructions for a wading fisherman who was 6'4" like himself, but he had failed to calculate the problems of a 5'8" shrimp who now was about to take a soaking.

In a moment of panic I lurched forward and felt the shock of icy river water coming in contact with my warm flesh. To make matters worse, at that very moment I chose to step into the slight depression made by a spawning salmon. The results were inevitable. I tottered slowly and then with a crashing crescendo, slipped over on

The wild thrashing that took place may have been comical to anyone witnessing the incident, but it was deadly serious to me. The air temperature was hovering around 38 degrees, and although I had not placed a thermometer in the water that morning, I'm sure it would have been little warmer. And to make matters worse. I was a good 2 miles from my truck and

another 2 miles from the nearest house. My arm was the first part under the water, as anyone's normal reaction is to stop themselves from falling. I managed to hit something with my hand and stopped myself from falling before my head went

under. Three or 4 hurried steps brought me to a shallower part of the river and I managed to struggle ashore.

My first_thoughts were to strip off the wet clothing and build a fire. I always carry a butane lighter in my fishing vest and, as I glanced around, saw plenty of firewood and some dry leaves for a starter. I pulled off my vest and unzipped the wool sweater I always wear during spring fishing trips. It was soggy and, including the water it had soaked up, weighed a ton.
My chamois cloth shirt was next, but didn't appear to be nearly as wet. Then came my polypropolene underwear which was hardly damp at all. I gave it a couple of twists to rid it of loose water and pulled it back on.

My next task was to deal with the waders. I had been wearing a new pair of neopreme waders that I had won at a Ducks Unlimited banquet a few months before. They were unlined, and resembled a skin diving suit. In the instructions, it had said they would cling to your body and make it difficult for water to enter if you should happen to dunk. But, I was not prepared for what I saw.

When I pulled down the waders, my long

underwear bottoms were perfectly dry. The water that had slipped over the top managed to wet my sweater and shirt, but they must have acted as a seal, for not a drop penetrated below my chest line.

I jerked the waders back up, grabbed for the rain jacket I carry in the back of my fishing vest, and stripped it over my underwear top. I had become a little chilly in the clothes-changing process, but I certainly wasn't in any danger of hypo-

I built a small fire on the sandy bank of the shore, and rigged a makeshift rack to dry my shirt and sweater. Rather than sit around and shiver, I thought I would be better off back in the river fishing, so I grabbed my rod and scrambled down the

I have fallen in the water a couple times since then. Any river fisherman will tell you it is practically impossible to avoid. But, each time, my neopreme waders have made the situation more comical than
