

# Elkton domes to take shape

Three "dome" storage facilities are ready to take shape at the Co-Op Elevator's Elkton Plant -providing the Thumb Area's first example of the unique grain-storing system.

Co-Op General Manager Ted Leipprandt said footings were poured for the first dome, just east of the plant, last Monday, April 14. Footings were installed the 16th when the ring wall was poured.

A huge vinyl "bag" or "balloon" will be attachted to the steel footings, to be blown up with air, possibly this week. Then, two coatings of polyurethene will be sprayed on inside for strength and insulation -and about eight inches of concrete will be applied for more permanence.

When completed, each dome could hold 70,000 pounds of pressure at the top - and will hold 200,000 bushels of grain at a cost much lower than other storage systems, Leipprandt


When completed, as soon as July 15, the 600,000 bushel capacity added will bring the


large doors, they can be used for other kinds of storage, too, if needed in the future, Leipprandt says.

Huge vinyl "balloons" are inflated and covered with polyurethene insulation and steel to give the domes their unique shape.

Elevator officials hope construction will be complete in mid-July.
