PERSONAL EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY
The expression of sympathy is a highly individual matter. If the family of the deceased feels very strongly about a special charity, they may wish to have their departed member honored by the growth of that charity from donations made in the person's name. At the same time, if certain individuals wish to express sympathy but feel uncomfortable supporting a particular charity, whatever the reason, their wishes should be respected too.
One alternative is the PERSONAL EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY. This might take the form of a sincere letter to the family or the performance of some direct service to the family or the community in honor of the deceased. This requires a giving of self rather than money and is a truly meaningful form of sympathy. One might wish to plant a tree on school or hospital grounds (with permission of course), pay monthly calls on a friend of the deceased confined to a nursing home, or some other service in honor of the deceased.

Sixty-plus dollars is more than I can afford. He's been trying so hard to save up for one, but he's only saved \$5.08 in his piggy bank.

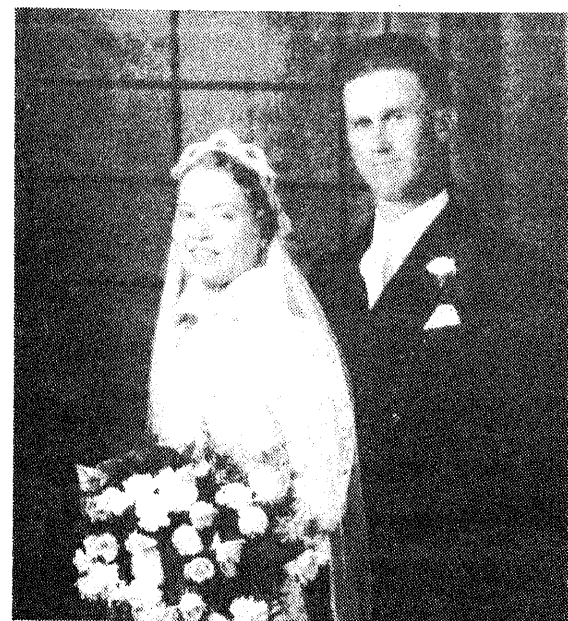
I know you love to give away bikes, so please be receptive to the need of my three year old. — Mrs. C.R., Denver, Colo.

on their wedding day, June 13, 1936

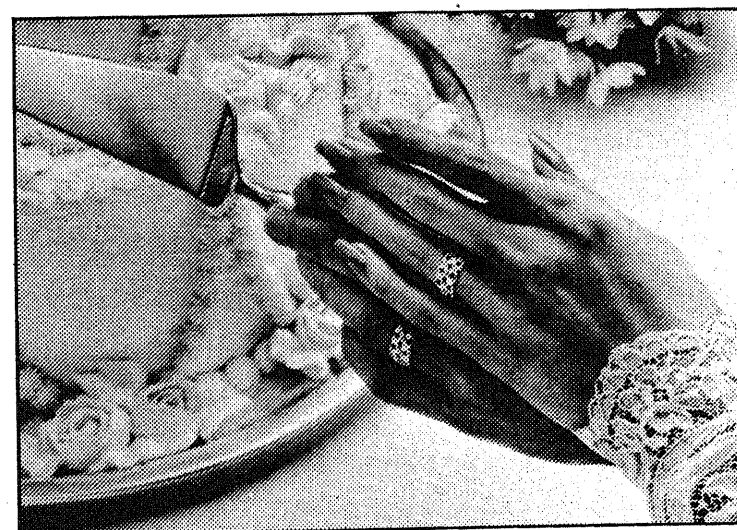
The family of Chris and Hilda Trost invites friends and relatives to share in the celebration of 50 years of their parents' marriage.

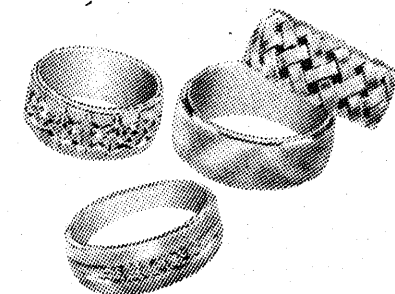

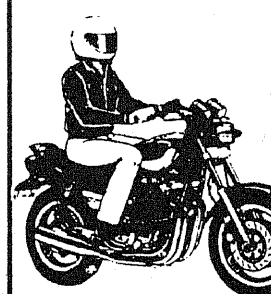
John McCain of Bay Port took home more than fish when he and his dad and uncle went on a June 13 fishing trip on Heisterman Island.

Sweet, succulent strawberries . . .

Michigan's summer season of sweet, locally grown berries opens in June, when the first strawberries are ripe and ready to be picked.

"Strawberries have a lot going for them besides their flavor," says Huron County Home Economist Barbara Neuman. "One cup of whole raw berries contains only 55 calories, yet supplies 88 milligrams of vitamin C, which is well over the recommended daily allowance of 60 milligram."

Consumers can rediscover the fun of picking home-grown Michigan strawberries this month. Berry harvest has started and should continue throughout most of June. The crop should be about equal to that of a normal year. Look for berries to be slightly smaller but even more flavorful this year.

When picking your own strawberries, pinch off the stem and leave the cap attached to the berry. This will seal in the juice and help re-

tain the berry's delicious flavor.

To preserve the berries, freeze them or make them into jam or jelly.

"All varieties of strawberries — except Robinsons, which lack the flavor and firmness desirable for frozen berries — freeze well," says Neuman. "The quality of canned strawberries is poor, so if you want to can them, make them into jam."

To freeze strawberries, select firm, red-ripe berries. They will have a better tex-

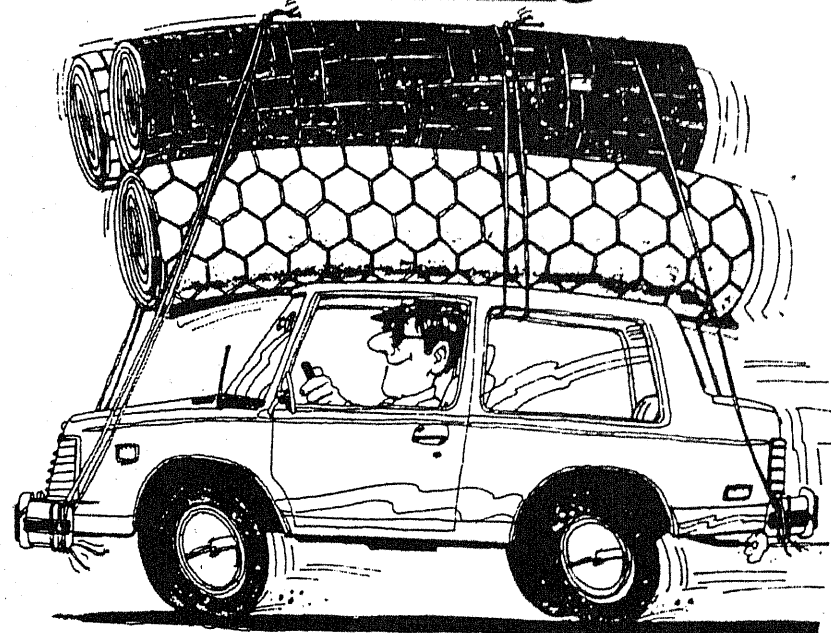
ture if you freeze them in sugar because the sugar moves into the flesh of the berry and makes it firmer. Strawberries frozen without sugar tend to be mushy or flabby.

Enjoy them ready-to-eat or frozen all-year long

Wash the berries in cold water and drain well. Remove the hulls. Leave the berries whole or slice or crush them, whichever you prefer. Sprinkle each quart of strawberries with 3/4 cup

of sugar. Mix thoroughly and pack into freezer containers, leaving some head space — the berries will expand during freezing. Then seal the packages, label and freeze.

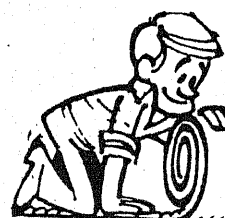
