





SENATE CANDIDATE REJECTED Thomas Braley of Bay City has been disqualified from seeking the Republican nominaton to the 34th State Senate District seat now held by James Barcia (D-Bay City). Election workers say Braley did not meet residency requirements, saying he was not a district resident when filing or when the canvassing board investigated him last week. Election laws require a candidate to be a district resident

at least 30 days prior to the primary election Aug. 5. Braley, formerly of Saginaw, said the vacant building he listed as his Bay City residence is being renovated, and he said has instead rented an apartment there. Some interpretations of the law involved say residency must be established 30 days prior to filing nominating petitions, while another says residency is required by the filing date. Braley met neither, elections officials say.

SANDUSKY MANAGER LEAVES

Sandusky City Superintendent Joseph Palm has accepted the Village Manager's position in Romeo, after serving in Sandusky since 1981. He was one of 47 candidates seeking the job, he said, at \$32,000 annually in a two-year contract.

HB MARINA IS DEDICATED About 500 persons -- including Michigan Governor James Blanchard -- attended dedication ceremonies June 29 for the

new Harbor Beach Marina just north of the city. Also in attendance were U.S. Congressman J. Bob Traxler, State Sen. James Barcia, State Rep. Dick Allen and other lawmakers. Public tours of the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Katmai Bay were offered, and a Coast Guard helicopter was on

The \$2.5 million Marina features 41 berthing slips with water and electrical connections, plus gasoline and pump-out facilities. An office, shower and restrooms and six boat launching ramps are included.

The project was begun in December, 1981 and construction began in February, 1983. State and federal funding paid most of the costs, plus the City of Harbor Beach contributed \$235,000. The new Coast Guard search and rescue station to be constructed this fall adjoins the Marina.
