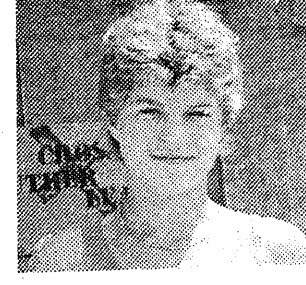

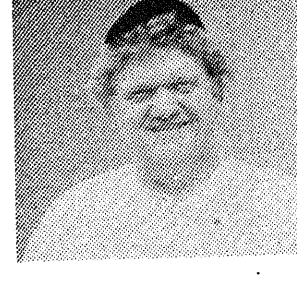

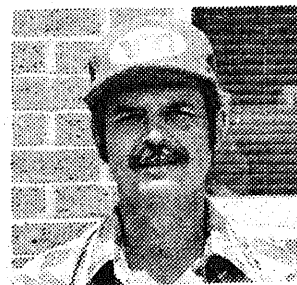

In response, the Governor will send a letter of invitation along with a special Michigan travel planning publication. Identical material will be sent to the person who made the request.

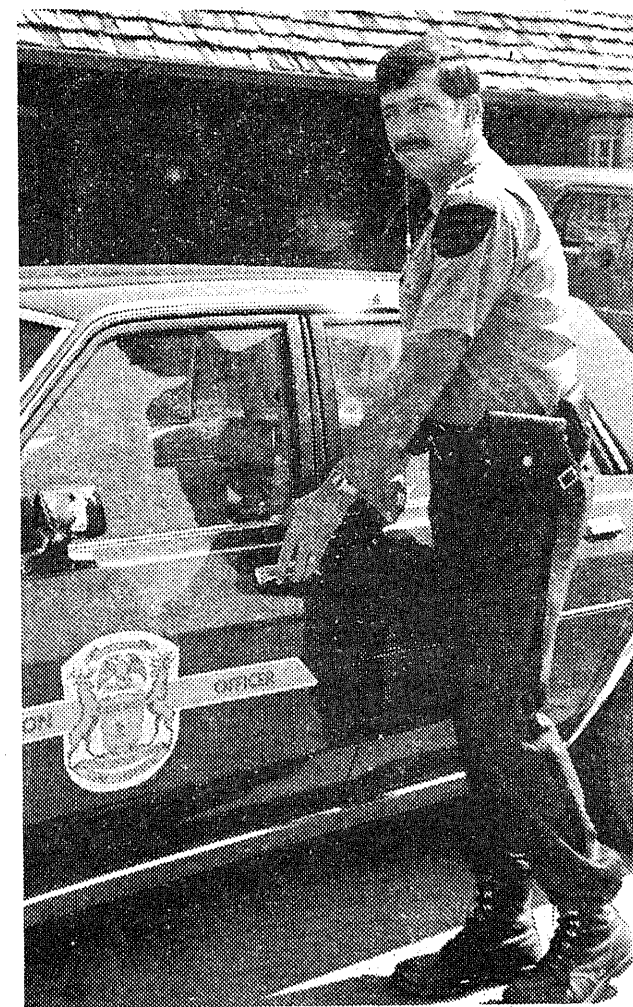

Raymond Boehringer, Huron County's newest DNR Conservation Officer, has taken residence in the Thumb and is now at work enforcing Michigan's fish and game laws from his Caseville headquarters. He replaces Sgt. Juris Didrichsons of Sebawaing, who was recently promoted to Environmental Conservation Officer, in charge of enforcing environmental laws in 14 counties.

Boehringer works with CO Al Kendall, and together they are responsible for all DNR fish and game conservation in Huron County.

The quickest way to contact a DNR officer in Huron County is through the Michigan State Police post in Bad Axe, 269-6441, Boehringer says.

Boehringer brings nearly a decade of law enforcement experience including six years as a CO in Menominee County, four years as Navy Master at Arms aboard the U.S.S. Forest Sherman and five months with City of Menominee Police Department. He also studied law enforcement in college.

## Caseville club offers safe hunt course

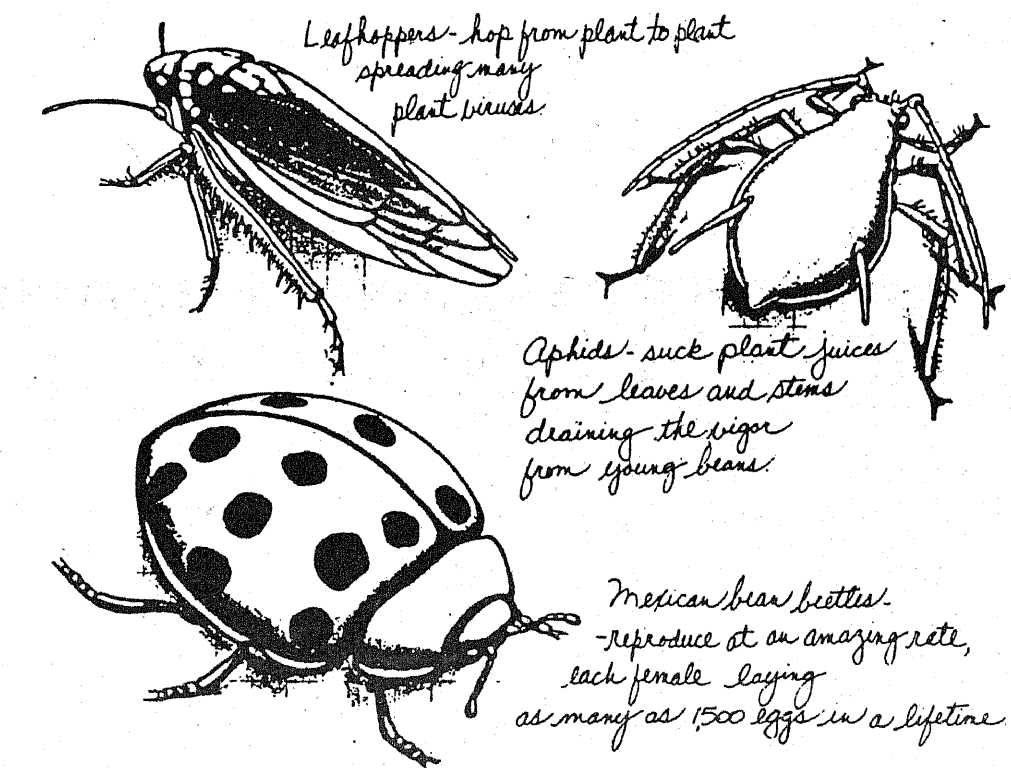
A "Hunter Safety" course is planned beginning Tuesday, Aug. 5, sponsored by members of the Caseville Rod and Gun Club as a community educational program.

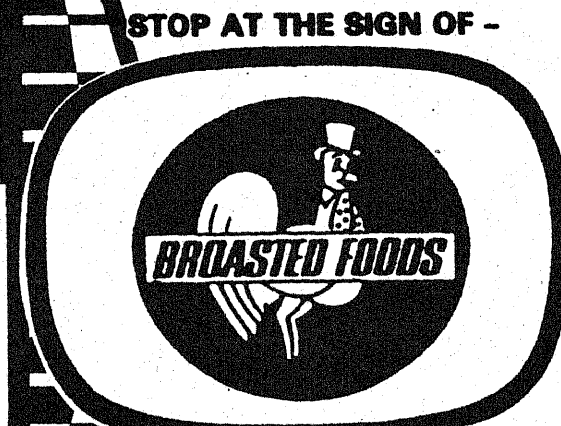

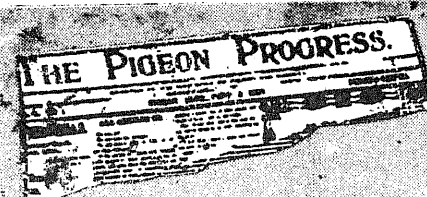

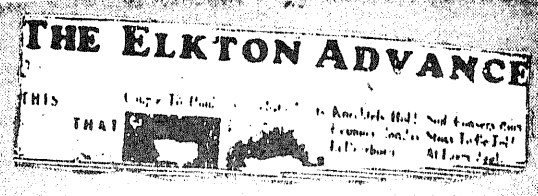

Red Cross Bloodmobiles are coming to Pigeon and Elkton next Monday and Wednesday, and donors are needed, according to sponsors.

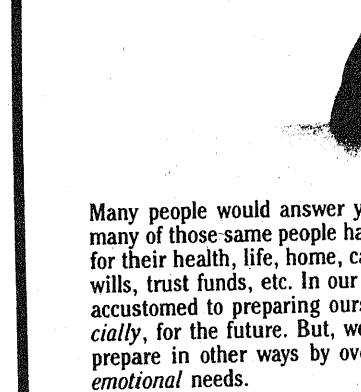

### LENGTH OF CONDOLENCE CALL

There is no strictly prescribed ritual for making a condolence call. It seems sensible, however, to plan on no longer a call than one plans on for a hospital visit -- that is, not more than fifteen minutes. That should be enough time to express condolences, to speak a few words of comfort and commendation of the decedent, to offer help, and to say goodbye.

If the mourner appears to wish a longer visit, and if it is possible for the caller to remain longer, that may be the kind thing to do. If the caller cannot remain longer, but a longer visit seems desired, it would be appropriate to give an assurance of a return call, and that call should be made.

At the same time, you should try to be flexible. One can often tell from the mourner's behavior whether or not there is a wish for a longer visit. Though it is sometimes hard to gauge the true feelings of the bereaved, the sensitive individual can usually do this.

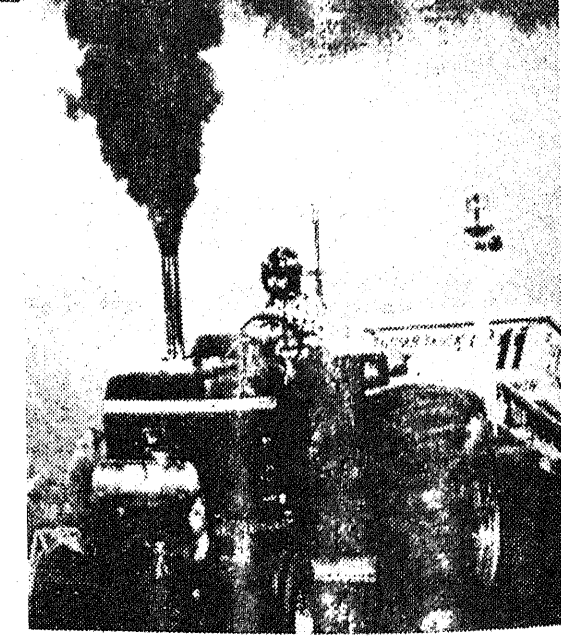

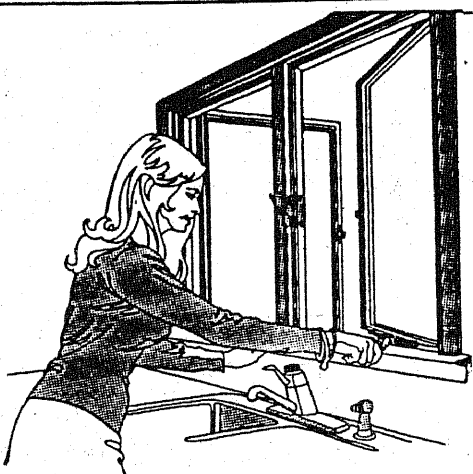

James Blanchard issued a proclamation declaring Aug. 2 and 3 as Bay Port Fish Sandwich Week.

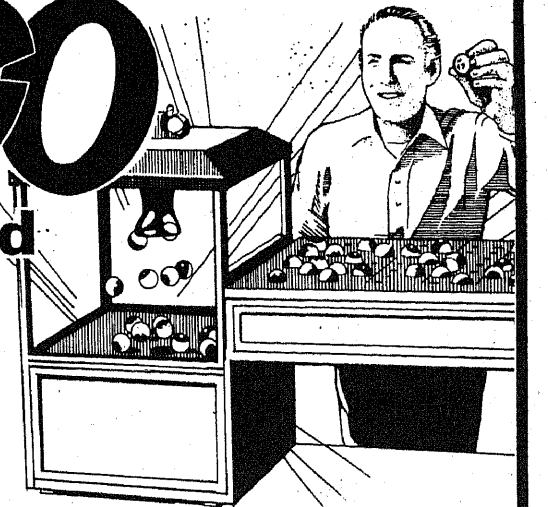

# Ag emphasis brings new events to Huron Fair

■ Senior Citizens are admitted to all harness races for one low price, sponsors say.

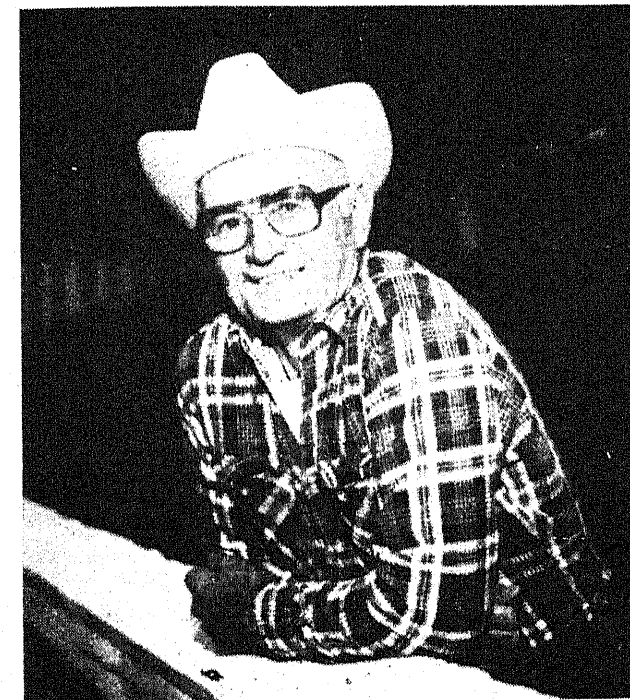

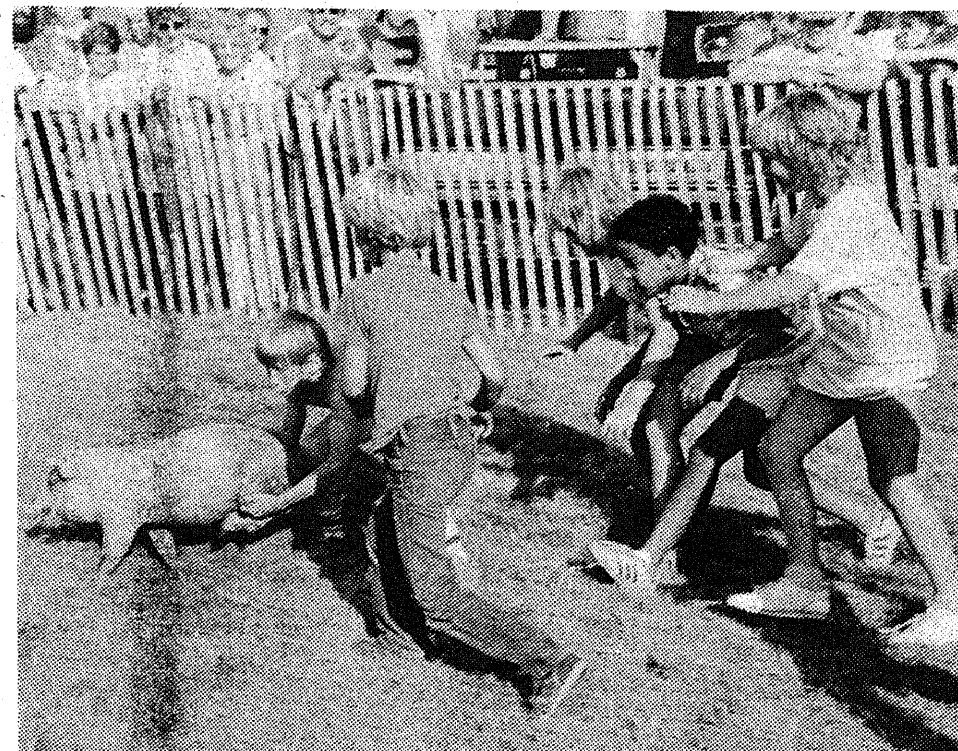

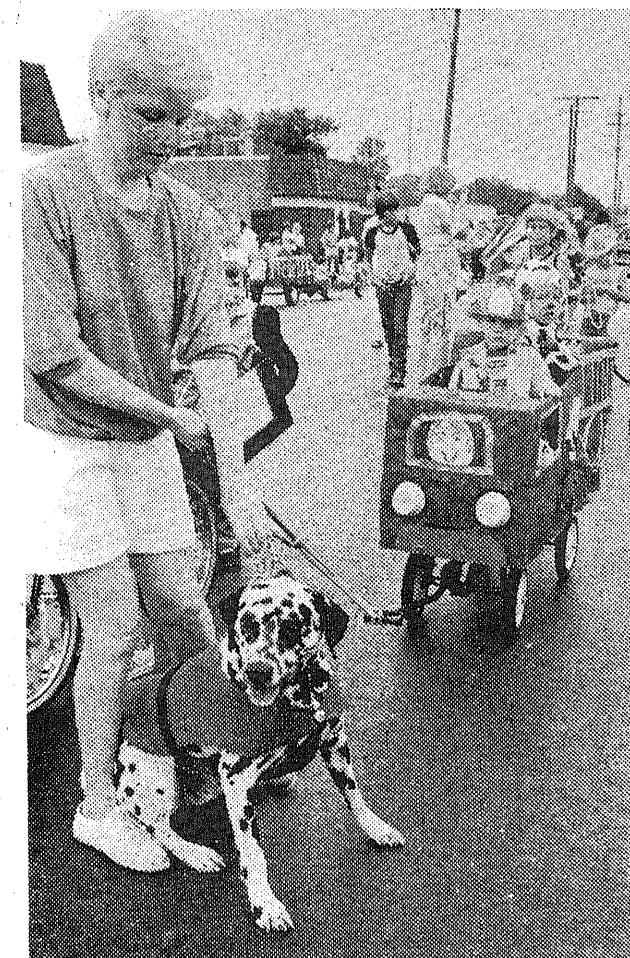

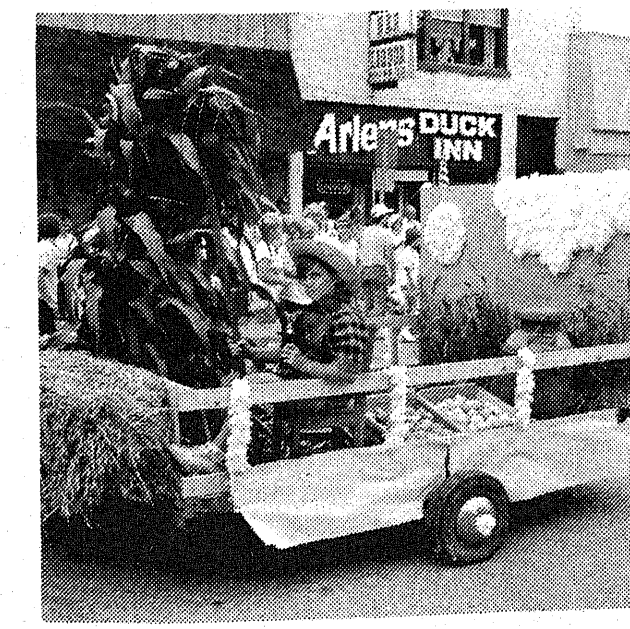

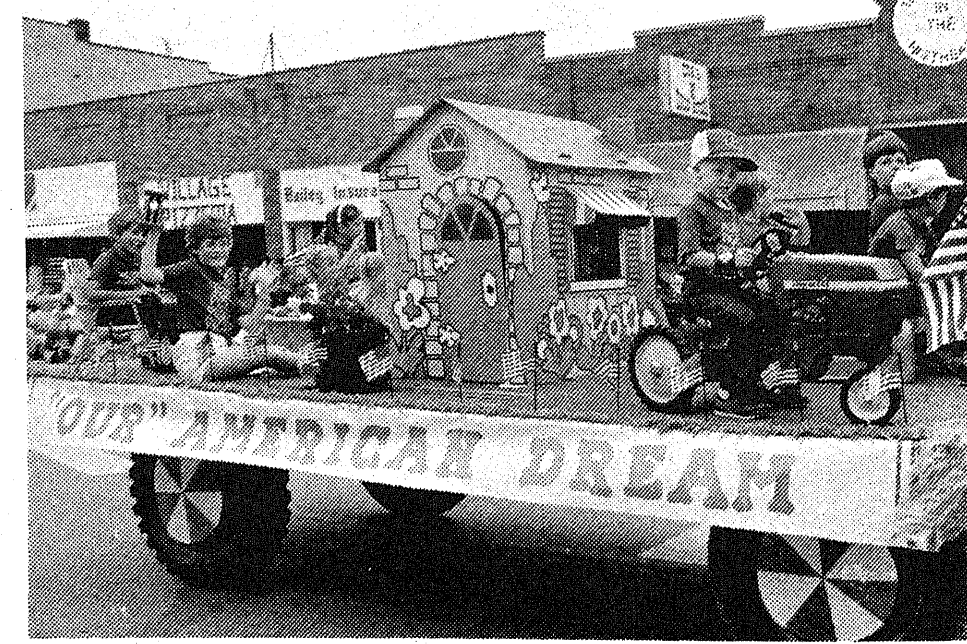
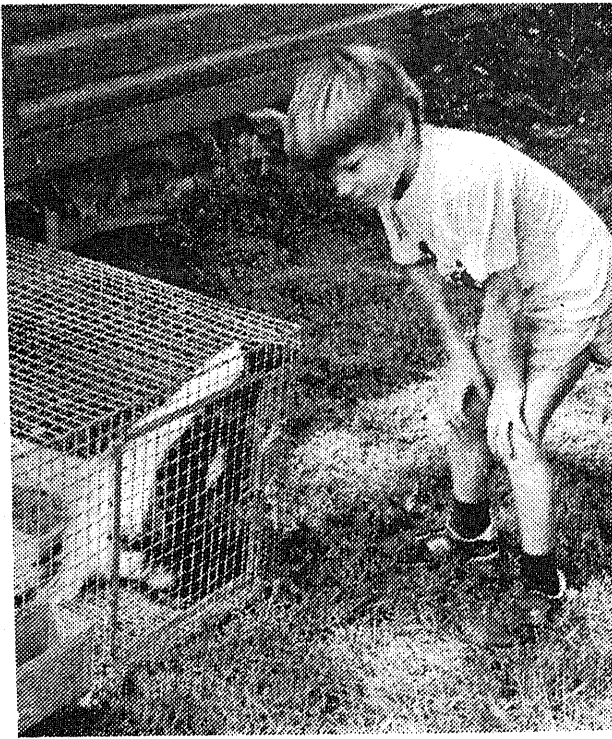

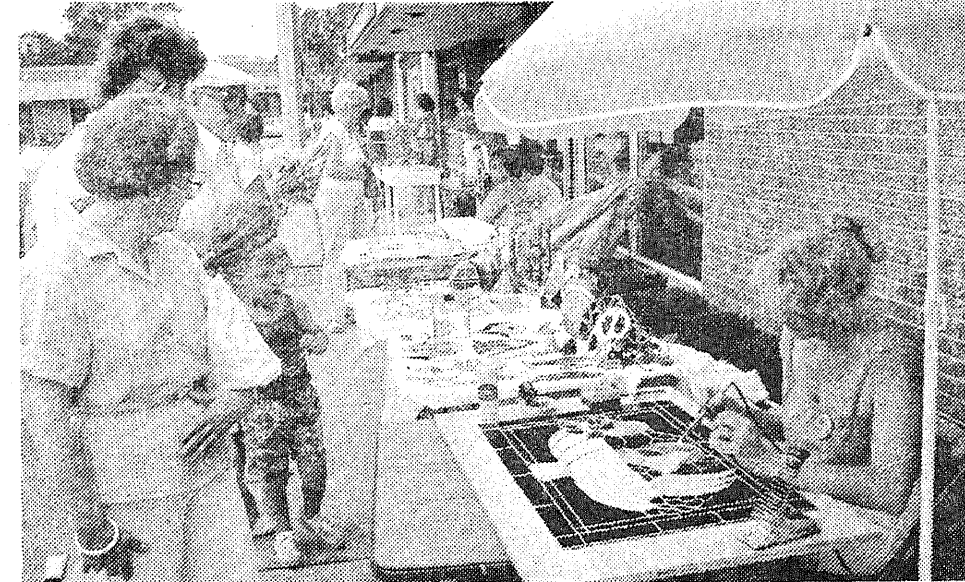

## Thumb area OUTDOORS

Near perfect weather conditions during the past weekend, along with lots of willing fish, made the Thumb area a virtual "Angler's Paradise". Lake Trout fishing was reported excellent at Grindstone City with 6-16 pounders hitting at the 100-foot depth. Lakers were also being taken in the Harbor Beach vicinity, but King Salmon seemed to be stealing their thunder. Kings up to 30 pounds were being boated straight out from the harbor.

Walleyes continued to be hot at Big Charity Island. The substructure northwest of the island produced some real big fish during the entire week. Hot n' Tots, and Erie Dearies are the choice baits, and rough water with cloudy skies are the best conditions. Some smaller fish are still hitting along the shoreline islands, but for the "big ones", you must head out to deeper water.

Bas fishing has picked up in the Grindstone City region. Smallmouths were hitting on crawlers and Mr. Twisters along the shore.

Some new laws are on the books for the upcoming snagging season this fall. Beginning September 1, the DNR will begin enforcing a new Act that has amended the Michigan Sport Fishing Law. It will now be illegal to possess or sell multipointed hooks used for snagging fish. Persons found guilty of selling or possessing may be imprisoned for up to 90 days and/or fined up to \$300. Multipointed hooks have always been illegal to use in Michigan, but their possession or sale was not controlled.

# WOODS and WATERS

## Preparation

Someone once said, "the least important thing about fishing, is fishing". I'm sure what they really meant was, the planning and preparation for a fishing trip can almost be as satisfying as the trip itself. I've come to realize this line of thinking while preparing for my August trip to Alaska.

The overwhelming responsibility of putting together the right gear for a 2-week fishing trip into the remote wilderness of our 49th state hit me about 10 minutes after I accepted the invitation to accompany 9 other fishermen on this "trip of a lifetime". My first thoughts were to round up as much literature as possible on fishing in Alaska.

I shot off about 2 dozen letters to different outfitters in hopes of receiving information that might prove helpful. The response was staggering. Letters, books, pamphlets, and even phone calls poured in, advising and instructing me in the proper equipment, lures, and clothes that should accompany any angler thinking about heading to this fishing paradise. After weeks of reading, and rereading, I had a better notion for going about the task.

The selection of fishing tackle was my first concern. As a "dyed-in-the-wool" fly fisherman, there was really no decision on the style of rods, but rather on the types and numbers. The fish we expected to encounter ranged in size from tackle-busting Silver Salmon in the 15-18-pound class, to the delicate, dorsal-finned Grayling. I finally decided on 2 rods; an 8-foot, 5-weight for the smaller fish, and a 9-foot, 7-weight for the monstrous Silvers and Rainbows I hope to encounter. Reels for each rod would be loaded with a floating line, and a couple of spare spools would hold 2 types of sinking line for getting the flies down to the bottom fast.

Fly selection was a more difficult matter. Working after 5 or 6 different species of fish necessitated a large array of flies. Since I do most of my own tying, I found the easiest method was to buy a few of the right patterns, and then duplicate them in appropriate numbers. The table in the basement that holds my typing equipment soon became a myriad of brilliant colors, and sinister-looking insects. Exotic names like Zonkers, Alaskabous, Polar Shrimp,

Babine specials, and Mouserats became commonplace with Sweetwife, and in a moment of artistic creativity, I even fashioned a new creation, using a wool rope belonging to my daughter, and christened it the "Julie Special". Clothing for the trip proved to be another demanding item. Being subjected to a climate that ranges from 40 to 70°, punctuated by driving rainstorms, presents a monumental task in itself. But, add to this the fact that all travel is by light aircraft and therefore your luggage must be kept at a bare minimum, added another twist to an already-perplexing problem.

I opted for a medium-size duffel into which I will cram my neoprene waders, a lightweight jacket, a sweater, 3 pairs of pants, 6 shirts, a rainsuit, a pair of camp shoes, 2 pairs of polypropylene longjohns, and lots of socks and underwear. In a small carry-on bag I will load up my dopp kit, fishing reels, binoculars, and camera. My rods will travel in a special-designed carrying case, hopefully on the plane, rather than in the cargo bay.

A small daypack will be jammed full of flies and fly tying paraphernalia, leaders, clippers, hooks, and a hook hone, hemostats, mosquito repellent (lots), a small flashlight and some first aid items. When I get to the fishing area, the pack will become a vest to carry necessary items for a day or 2 afield.

I'm sure that I will never make the trip without forgetting some important item. But, one must remember, with 9 other fishermen tagging along, someone is sure to have what you need — if you can afford the price.

## Another time...

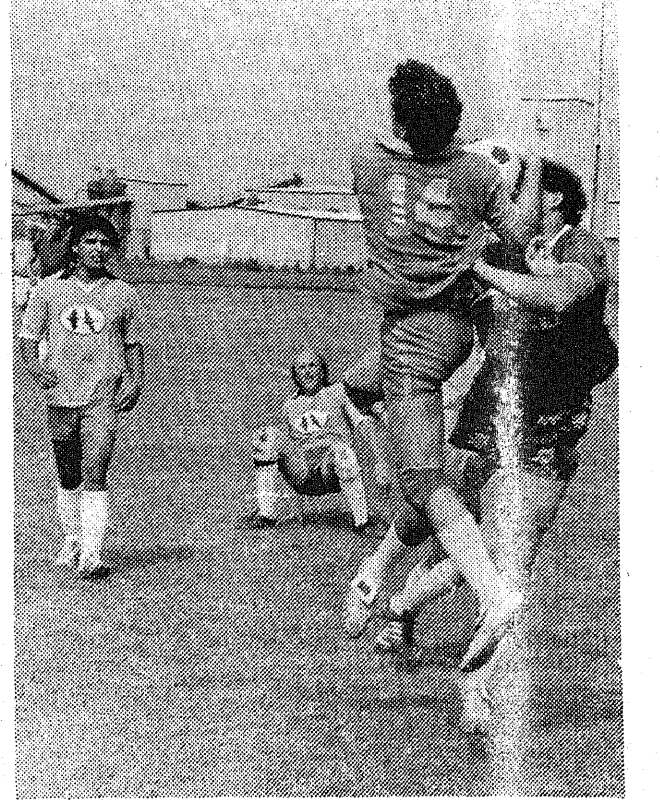
