## Pigeon to shut off unpaid water users

Nearly one-tenth of Pigeon village residents or business owners have past-due water bills -- and that's going to change, the Village Council decided Monday night.

Council approved shutting off water service to any and all delinquent addresses when property owners make no effort to pay outstanding bills, which total more than \$10,500 at this time.

"We have a problem with past due water bills," Village President Dave Geiger said. Now, letters will be sent notifying owners of delinquency, with 10 days to respond.

Trespond. If no response is given, a certified letter will be sent with 10 more days to comply—then water service will be shut off, Council agreed. Some bills go back more than three years, but partial payments can continue water service. "We just want to know that people plan to pay the bill, and that they start," Geiger said after the meeting.

NO BURNING BAN: After hearing statements from 12 residents, Council took no action to eliminate outside burning of trash or other items, currently allowed from 4 p.m. to dusk each day.







### SUPERINTENDENT'S The anonymous 🏻 caller

Perhaps one of the most disturbing things we face in working with the public is when we receive an unsigned letter or the anonymous phone call from the "concerned taxpayer." Such was the case recently, on Friday, July 18 at about 8:30

The call came in with this person refusing to give his name. He asked if I knew that a Laker drivers' training car with three women in it was observed driving all around the streets in Bay City. The fact that he mentioned three women threw

Upon checking into the situation, I learned it was indeed our driver education car -- giving three of our high school students proper instructions and experience of driving in city traffic. While in Bay City, these young students will also practice proper entry and exit on the freeways. Sounds like this is a waste of the caller's tax money?

Anyone with a lick of sense would say, "Good job, Lakers! Prior to hanging up on me, he let me know that it is no wonder our millage gets defeated, having a car running all around

For that guy and all others who haven't the courtesy of giving their names regarding their complaints, I feel you are to

By the tone of your voice, you have indicated that your mind is narrowed to the point that regardless of how much good our students do, the anti-school attitude prevails. Residents of our school district receive more in tax rebates than any school district in Michigan. Despite our low millage, tax breaks and a school system that produces achievers, an

element of negativism runs through our district. Why? I wish I could pinpoint the problem or problems Here is a classic illustration of a community's support for their schools. In June of 1985, resident voters in Vassar ap-

Guess what? These same Vassar resident voters passed three additional new mills this past June. That is eight additional mills in a one-year period. Those eight additional mills are going to be a direct cost to the resident taxpayers of

That community has lost its industrial tax base. Eaton Manufacturing employed 900 people and ran three shifts. Today they have 90 employes. Another large employer, Super Foods, which supplies all of the Fame products, transferred its entire warehouse apprentian from Versen to Pridesport its entire warehouse operation from Vassar to Bridgeport. Vassar's downtown does not show any of the signs of prospering such as we see in the Villages of Elkton and Pigeon.

They do, however, believe in supporting their school. Otherwise, they never would have passed an eight-mill increase in a one-year time period. This past June, our school district was clobbered for a halfmill increase. This coming Sept. 12, this same issue is to be

If we didn't need the increase, we surely wouldn't be placing it on the ballot.

As we have stated in previous articles, we are extremely thankful that a positive attitude prevails amongst our students, teachers and support personnel. If they ever develop negative attitudes, then the anti-school person will really have something to complain about.

It is a matter of pride when you support your schools. We ask that you take a good look at our total Laker program. You will find that it is really quite good.
