

Increase in fires sparks interest in insurance

of wood stoves.

SWARTZENDRUBER When tragedies occur, many people believe they happen in threes. If that is true, some unfortunate family in the Pigeon area will experience a house fire in the near future.

In the past three weeks Pigeon firemen were called to the scene of two seperate house fires in an eight-day

That fact has prompted or should prompt numerous homeowners and renters to review their fire insurance to make sure they are adequately insured.

Pigeon insurance agents Lynn Sturm and Dave Anderson both report an increase in interest in fire insurance at their agencies.

RATES VARY: Although most fire insurance premiums are minimal compared to the risk of financial loss in a fire, the rates vary considerably in different areas of the state — and even the Thumb Area.

Each location in the state is assigned a fire protection rating which reflects local units of governments' ability to protect your buildings from fire.

The rating lists communities on a scale of 1-10, with the lower end representing the best protection. Water pressure, availability and storage and fire department response time are some of the factors considered in the ratings.

THUMB RATINGS: In Huron County, all locations are rated no lower than seven with certain locations hitting the top of the scale at 10. Pigeon, Caseville and Bad Axe have all been assigned a seven rating, while Elkton, Owendale, Sebewaing, Gagetown and Port Austin are all rated eight, the figures show.

Fair Haven Township, including Bay Port with no village water supply, rated nine. A rating of 10 is assigned portions of Caseville Township on Sand Point which are located the greatest distance from a fire department.

Although fire insurance premiums differ from company to company, the jump from a rating of seven to 10 represents a sizable increase, experts say.



I-Dit-A-Rod

In the winter of 1925, Nome, Alaska was struck by a serious disease called diphtheria. At that time, the cure was to use a serum of liquid diphtheria antitoxin. The problem was Nome's supply of this serum was getting low. The only doctor in Nome knew how hard it would be to get a new supply of the life-saving medicine to this town on the far western coast of Alaska. The frozen Bering Sea would not let the ships get through, and the airplanes of the day were unsafe in such cold weather. The only hope was to ship the serum from Anchorage to Nenana by railroad and from there it would have to travel by relays of dog sleds across the 670 miles to Nome.

History records the 19 brave men who defied the elements to save the people of Nome. Traveling day and night at recordbreaking speeds, these courageous mushers and their teams of tough and intelligent Alaskan dogs delivered the life-saving serum to Nome in less than one week. Part of this life-saving highway was called the Iditarod Trail.

In 1967, during the Alaska Centennial, Musher Joe Redington Sr. of Knik, and Wasilla Historian Dorothy Page staged a 56-mile race to commemorate this historic trail. The race was met with such approval that in 1973, promoted the first official Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, now known worldwide as "The Iditarod, The Last Great

The race, which is held the first Saturday in March each year, is 1,049 miles long over some of the most desolate country in the world. Really the mushers and dogs travel a little more than 1200 miles, but the figure 1,049 is used for romantic reasons. (A 1,000 mile race in the 49th state).

During a fall fishing trip to Alaska last year, I was fortunate enough to be guided by Gordie Hubbard, one of the participants in the Iditarod. During the 14 days we spent together he spun many alluring tales about 'The Last Great Race

Gordie, a 25-year Kodiak Island resident, has spent most of his time in Alaska as a trapper, hunting guide, and fisherman. He began mushing dogs on his trapline about 13 years ago during the winters in the Alaskan Interior. Having guided with Joe Reddington, Sr., in the 60's, Gordie has always been interested in running the race, however, the cost kept him out of the competition.

The sport is expensive, and for most mushers, it is impossible to cover the costs involved themselves. On the average, \$15,000 to \$35,000 is needed to enable a competitive musher to place with the top runners. The money is spent on items like dogs, (most mushers lease special dogs bred for the race), vet care, equipment, dog food,

Arctic clothing, race entry fee, food drop transportation, and miscellaneous expenses. Besides this, the mushers devote their entire lives to training for the event for a good 6 months before the race.

Last year Gordie was fortunate, a group friends and businessmen from Kodiak spearheaded a drive to raise \$25,000 to enter nim in the race. When March 3 rolled around, Gordie was placed in position number 74, the last to start the race. When the race finished, he was in 34th place, but had been as high as 20th at one time. This year he is shooting for the top.

Rules of the race lay out certain regula tions by which each musher must abide. There are certain pieces of equipment each team must have — an Arctic parka, a heavy sleeping bag, an axe, snowshoes, musher food, dog food and boots for each dog's feet to protect against cutting ice and hardpacked snow injuries. There are 20 checkpoints that each musher must visit and sign Here, volunteer vets will check out each

dog to make sure none is abused. Once the race has started a musher may not add dogs to his team, but he may, and often does, drop tired or injured dogs along the way. There are 2 mandatory rest periods one of 24 hours that may be taken at any checkpoint, and another of 4 hours that must

be taken at the last checkpoint. The first race in 1973 was won by Dick Wilmarth in just over 20 days. Last year Susan Butcher set a new record by covering the 1,200 miles in 11 days, 15 hours, 6 minutes. As a matter of fact, the last 2 races

have been won by women.

In jest, I asked Gordie how it felt to be beaten by a woman.

"If a woman wins again this year," he chuckled softly, "the guys are thinking about having a men's division to give us a

A few months ago, I sent a couple bucks to Gordie to help him out. So when March 7 rolls around, a little part of me will be out on the Iditarod Trail, "The Last Great Race"


