## Linda Hughes' Foods Of Michigan

# Michigan Maple Syrup Magic



Maple syrup has been produced in Michigan for well over a century. It's one of the few agricultural crops which is economically sound right now.

George Fogle, owner of Fogle Farm and Sugar Bush Supply Company in Mason, isn't sure how long syrup has been produced on his farm — but the evaporator house is so old it was built with square nails!

Fogle said a careful observer can go into almost any stand of maple trees in the state and find evidence of long-ago syrup production. He and his son have found old brick sled tracks and ash piles from evaporation fires.

The Fogle's operation combines the old with the new. They use the old sugar house and the old methods of evaporating the sap by wood fires, but they have updated the equipment and have a sophisticated system of tubing and pumps which deliver most of the sap to the evaporator.

Plastic tubing runs from the trees and is sucked by vacuum to a pumping station downhill. From there, the sap is pumped uphill in 2 main lines to the evaporator house. The sap from one small woodlot is still collected by the bucket method and hauled by tractor.

The Fogle's use the latest gadgetry to test and finish the syrup. Of 4 methods, the hygrometer is the quickest and surest. For this, a float is used to measure the density.

Most sugar bushers use that approach, but some use the temperature method. The syrup is ready when it reaches a temperature 7° above the boiling point of water. Some use a refractometer to measure how much light shines through a small amount of syrup. The last, least effective way is to eyeball — to simply observe the consistency of syrup as it drops from a spoon.

The Fogle's not only work the maple trees, they also sell equipment and supplies for making and selling syrup. They are the largest dealer in the state, and they sell to clients in many other states.

Sugar Bush Supply stocks a vast array of items for maple syrup producers — from hobbyists to large operators. That includes drills, taps, buckets, plastic tubing and fittings, many sizes of evaporators, chimney pipes, storage tanks, testing equipment, candy forms and containers.

The Fogle's have been busy getting ready for the season, which generally begins in late February. It can last anywhere from 3 to 6 weeks, depending on the weather.

Alternate thawing and freezing causes the sap

to flow as the tree prepares for spring. Once the temperature stays above freezing at night, the trees' physiology changes, preparing to start leaf production. At that point, the sap turns bitter and can't be used for syrup.

Maple syrup is a true regional treat. It's only produced in certain eastern and midwest states and in eastern Canada.

Here are some recipes for maple syrup.

### MAPLE BAKED BEANS

- 1 quart parboiled beans
- 1 cup maple syrup
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. dry mustard
- 1/4 pound salt pork
- 1 small onion, diced

Place half of the partially cooked beans in a beanpot or heavy oven dish. Score the salt pork and place on beans; cover with remaining beans.

Combine 1/2 cup maple syrup with remaining ingredients and pour over beans. Add boiling water to cover. Cover dish and bake at 300° for 4 hours. Remove cover, add remainder of maple syrup, and bake for an additional 30 to 60 minutes, adding water as needed. Served 8 to 10.

### MAPLE BREAD PUDDING

- 1 cup maple syrup
- 8 slices bread
- 3 Tbsps. butter
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- Few grains of salt

Boil syrup 5 minutes. Butter one side of each slice of bread. Dip whole slices in syrup and arrange 2 slices, butter side up, in the bottom of a buttered loaf pan. Place remaining syrup-soaked slices in layers in loaf pan.

Make a custard mix by combining the eggs, any remaining syrup, milk and salt. Pour over top of bread. Bake at 325° until custard is set and top is golden brown, about 50 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### MAPLE APPLE PIE

- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 3 medium-large apples, sliced

- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 cup maple syrup
- Pastry for 9-inch pie

Place sliced apples in 9-inch pastry-lined pie plate. Mix together melted butter, maple syrup, salt and beaten egg. Pour this mixture over apples.

Bake 10 minutes at 425°. Reduce heat to 350° and bake for 25 minutes. Serve hot or cold with whipped cream or ice cream. Makes 1 pie.

### MAPLE TARTS

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup cornstarch (or 6 Tbsps. flour)
- 1 1/2 cups maple syrup
- 1/2 cup hot water
- Baked tart shells (24)

Melt butter and blend in cornstarch or flour over low heat. Remove from heat and stir in maple syrup and hot water. Bring mixture to a boil, stirring constantly until it thickens. Continue cooking for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and cool at least 15 minutes. Then spoon into tart shells. Serve plain or with whipped cream or nuts. Makes 24 small tarts.

### MAPLE APPLE PUDDING

- 1/2 cup butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 2 tsps. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cups chopped walnuts
- 3 cups chopped apples

**Topping:**  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup maple syrup  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cup half-and-half cream  
1/4 cup rum

Cream 1/2 cup butter and 2 cups sugar. Add eggs and sifted dry ingredients. Fold in nuts and apples. Bake at 325° for 45 minutes in a greased 9 x 13 inch glass baking dish.

Cook together the remaining sugar, maple syrup, butter and cream 5 to 7 minutes. Add rum; pour over hot cake when removed from oven. Let stand at room temperature several hours before serving.

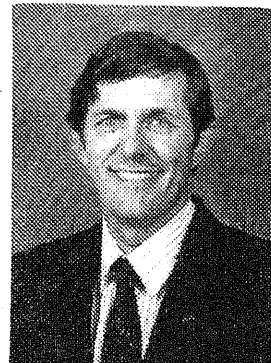

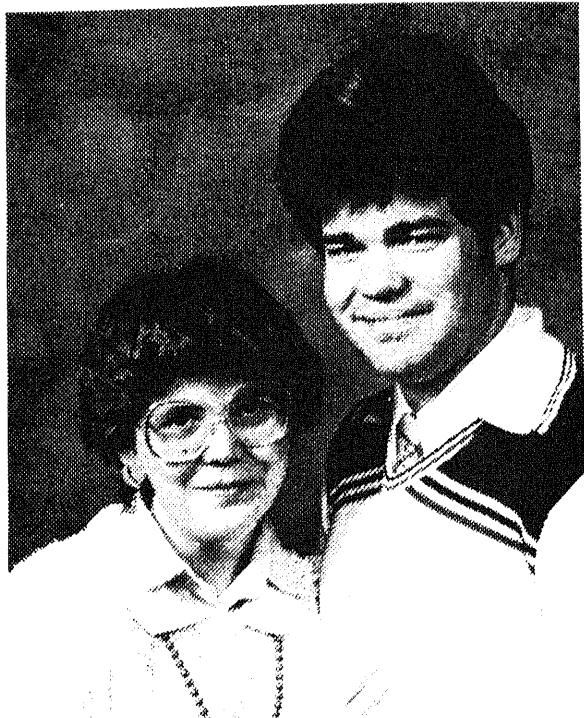

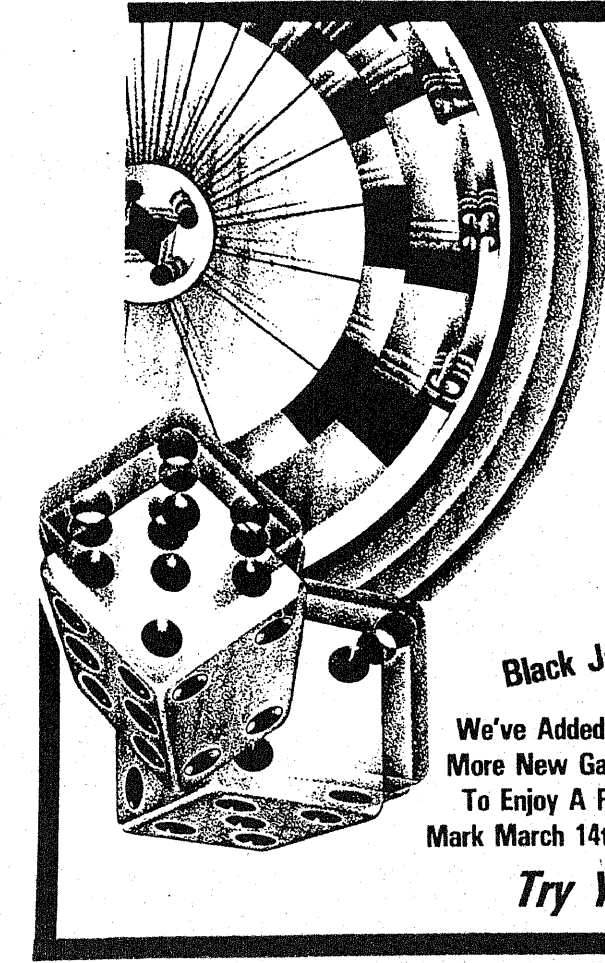

# New channel brings public TV to more homes

Delta College's WUCX Channel 35 was dedicated to Thumb area residents Friday afternoon in festivities celebrated at Colony House, near Cass City. About 100 persons, including Thumb residents, government officials and other friends of the New Public Television signal, took part.

Adding a new dimension to the celebration was Sue Ellen, 450-pound lion, owned by Marv Winter, who is also owner of the Colony House. The 7½-year-old animal is named "Sue Ellen" after the "Dallas" television show character.

Seventy-thousand Thumb area households will now be able to see public television, many for the first time, thanks to a \$500,000, 489 foot high, 85 kilowatt transmitter and facility owned and operated by Delta in Ubyly. The facility, which has the call letters WUCX Channel 35, repeats the Delta WUCM Channel 19 main signal from the college's University Center campus, said Dr. Presley D. Holmes, director of broadcasting and general manager.

Construction of the facility was funded through a \$375,000 federal grant and \$125,000 raised locally from Channel 19 auction equipment funds. FCC licensed Delta to construct the facility in 1986. It began operations in January, 1987.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held at the transmitter facility itself, where participants included Mrs. Evelyn Allen, owner of the property where the transmitter was constructed, Delta President Donald J. Carlyon, Holmes, college officials and employees, members of Mrs. Allen's family and Thumb government officials.

Bad Axe Mayor Thomas W. Dibble said, "For the majority of people in the Thumb area, I think it (WUCX) will offer them an alternative (in television viewing) and will give them the ability to see some cultural programming."

Huron County Commissioner Albert J. Thoms of Port Hope, District 5, noted, "I never could watch public television before, but now it's the best station we've got. We're really thrilled."

His wife, Dorothy, who was able to watch public television while living in Sebawaing, but not in Port Hope, concurred that PBS programming offered a welcome change for viewers. "We're not soap opera fans around here," she laughed.

Bad Axe City Councilman William N. Stocker said the advent of Channel 35 in the area "opens up the east side of the county where you couldn't get Channel 19 before, unless you had cable."


