# Barcia wants traditional Memorial Day

Citing a need to restore a proper tribute to Michigan veterans, State Senator James Barcia (D-Bay City) has reintroduced legislation that would return the Memorial Day observance to May 30 rather than the fourth Monday of May.

"Memorial Day was never intended to be a recreational holiday," Sen. Barcia says. "I am urging my Senate colleagues to return the practice of honoring the sacrifice of our veterans to 'their day' instead of any Monday that

creates a convenient long weekend for vacationers."

16 YEARS: In 1971, Michigan joined most states and the federal government in changing the observance of the Memorial Day holiday from a fixed date to the fourth Monday in May.

"Memorial Day was intended as a time to allow families to pay tribute to those loved ones and individuals who sacrificed their lives so that we could live in freedom. It was not designed to simply allow us to have a leisurely three-day

weekend," Sen. Barcia says.

TRY AGAIN: Barcia introduced the same bill during the 1986 legislative session. The proposal passed the Senate 33-2, but stalled in the House State Affairs Committee. The House of Representatives attempted to force the bill out of committee, which failed narrowly on a 49-49 vote

"Despite last year's setback, I remain optimistic that eventually this important legislation will be signed into law," Sen. Barcia

It will be the Upper Thumb's first countywide Sesqui-Centennial Event, marking the 150th anniversary of statehood for the Wolverine State. Starting off the event, an historical plaque will be

mounted on the side of Huron County Building, stating that President Richard Nixon visited there in 1974, the only time that a president in office came to the county. Jerry Roe of Lansing, vice-chairman and past chairman of the Michigan Historical Commission, will preside over unveiling the historical President Nixon plaque.

The giant parade will follow at 2 pm moving through downtown Bad Axe. It will be followed immediately by the giant reunion and picnic, at Huron Community Fair-

A Senior Citizens' King and Queen will be crowned during the June 14 event, to reign over the 150th anniversary birthday party. 





June will be the start of a growers. big fresh fruit and vegetable season here in Michigan.

For openers, the season is running about 10 days ahead of a normal year. Usually this results in some fruit crops getting zapped by a markets or farmers' spring frost or two. 
