

Those words spoken by Laker Superintendent Harry Brunet sum up the relief of Elkton - Pigeon - Bay Port administrators, teachers, students and parents following approval of a one-year, 7.5 mill increase in a special

ing approval of a one-year, 7.5 mill increase in a special election last Thursday. While Brunet was very happy the millage increase was approved, he was very surprised at the final vote count that showed 1,723 yes votes and 1,016 no votes, with three

spoiled ballots.

"This is probably the most shocking result I've seen in all my years as superintendent. I'm still trying to figure out such a large margin," Brunet says. He admits he expected the proposal to receive approval, but had predicted the increase would pass by about 185 votes rather than the 700 plus actual margin. Brunet also notes the 2,742 people who voted in the special election represent about 53% of the registered voters in the district. That represents the biggest percentage turnout Brunet witnessed in 15 years.

"I can remember elections 12-14 years ago when there were only 400 votes in the whole district," recalls the Laker Superintendent.

PARENT VICTORY: Although many factors such as a lower millage rate, plans to eliminate bus transportation, close Bay Port Elementary School and initiate a "pay to play"

sports" program influenced voter approval of the millage increase, Brunet credits parents with passing the proposal. With the millage approval, Bay Port Elementary is reopened, bus transportation restored and extra-curricular activities again fiananced by the school

school.

"There was some changeover, but we got the parents
out. It definitely was a
parents' victory," he
declares.

**SMOOTH OPERATION:** The change from three voting precincts to one cental location in this election operated very well, according to most voter comments.



The beginning of the 21st Century might seem a long way off to most people, but for children beginning kindergarten this week at Pigeon Elementary school, the year 2000 will mark their graduation from high school.

Issues of the Pigeon Progress published during 1900 reported 8,000 cars in America when a high school graduation class last turned a new century. President McKinley was renominated for a second term, along with Governor Theodore Roosevelt on the ticket as vice president.

The Second Annual Commencement of Pigeon High was conducted at the Presbyterian Church with the motto "We finish to begin."

The class of 2000 will have to function in a world very different from that of 100 years ago. One of the biggest factors in that change was the invention and continual improvement of the computer. In 1900, an aluminum blotter holder for the hand was invented to enable bookkeepers to write and blot with the same hand which was designed to speed up recordkeeping. In the year 2000, bookkeepers will probably skip the ink and paper as they on computer records to accomplish the same task more quickly and accurateLOOKING BACK: Many people in the Pigeon area remember Muriel Morrison and also Karl and Wilma Emerson as teachers who contributed a great deal to educational background.

Miss Morrison, who just celebrated her 77th birthday last Saturday, taught at all grade levels after graduating from Alma College in 1932. She remembers that a college degree was required of secondary teachers at that time, but says some elementary teachers conducted classes after a year or two of training at the "County Normal" school graduation.

Miss Morrision was hired for Pigeon High School when Supt. Tyndal Best traveled to Croswell where she was teaching at the time to offer her a job. She says she worked for two summers on a Masters Degree, but then shifted her focus from the secondary to elementary level in mid-career and never resumed her Masters work.

Discipline in the classroom varied from teacher to teacher and usually was firm but not harsh.

#### **EPBP** sets hours, bus stops

Laker School hours when doors open on Tuesday, Sept. 8 will be: 8:20 a.m. - 2:45 p.m. at Laker Junior and Senior High and 9:20 a.m. - 3:45 p.m. at each elementary center.

Bus town stops and locations will remain the same as last year in Pigeon and Bay Port. A change, however is slated for Elkton.

A stop at the Elkton United Methodist Church is slated for students who live south of M-142 and east of Elkton Road. A stop at Elkton IGA is for students south of M-142 and west of Elkton Road. A stop at the Fire Hall is intended for students who live north of M-142 and west of Elkton Road.

A new stop is added at the downtown Village Park for students who live north of M-142 and east of Elkton Road.

Laker Junior and Senior High students who live less than two-tenths of a mile from a corner will be asked to walk to the corner to meet the bus and eliminate costly turn-arounds, according to Transportatation Director Jim Ballard.

### Thumb Weekly News Round-Up

Saturday's calm, warm and sunny weather were perfect for the first Bay Harbor Classic power boat race, run on a 66-mile course from Bay City north and west to AuGres in

Saginaw Bay. Unlimited class hydrophane boats were featured, and a new offshore world speed record was set by the ACR Systems boat captained by Bob Kaiser of Detroit, at 108.043 mph. The Popeye's - diet Coke number 1 boat, driven by Al Copeland of

Louisiana, won the Superboat Class. The most pleasure boats ever gathered at one time on Saginaw Bay were drawn to the Bay City area, where officials said 200,000 persons on shore and in an estimated 1000 boats watched the day-long event.

Organizers at the Bay Harbor Marina, Bay City, hope to make the race -- and the resulting party atmosphere -- an annual event. The Bay City race, sanctioned by the American Power Boat Racing Association, is already being planned for 1988 -- to complement similar power boat races off Grand Haven in Lake Michigan and Port Huron in Lake Huron.

# When will 'lawsuit frenzy' end?


Even if you're only doing your job these days, more and more people are being threatened with a lawsuit, from disgruntled customers, workers, neighbors, bosses -- and family members. America is becoming the "land of litigation."

The most prominent case in point is an unfortunate one from Rhode Island. There, a high school senior flunked English class, due to

I probably wasn't the only one who cried when I heard that the Laker school millage passed last Thursday. I had voted absentee on Monday before leaving for a four-day national church rural legislative session in Columbus, Ohio, Thursday's agenda in Columbus was packed and I didn't phone home until almost midnight

"Seven hundred votes?" I queried Ed at the other end of the telephone line. The margin was so incredible that I misunderstood his first words so that he had to repeat the good news all over again. Then came the tears.

We'll be back at the voting booth within the year, no doubt, but it is clear that threat to transportation, extra-curriculars and one of our feeder elementary schools, Bay Port, along with the long-asked for 7.5 compromise finally became the formula that put this millage request into the "yes" column.

I'd been telling my family that no matter which way the vote went, we'd try to be flexible. School officials, faculty and employes felt under fire. Community feeings were running raw and we needed to stay open and caring and cooperative.

Like other parents, I wasn't looking forward to schools each day, and yet, I have heard the stories of rural Iowa and Kansas and know that we can't complain. The Heartland states have whole areas where two and three counties are being consolidated into one governmental body. These states have communities where only a church is left and maybe a gas station. Within a few years, these places have lost significant population and businesses. Banks, elevators and grocery stores are just plain gone.

When we in Michigan, and especially the Thumb, look at our rural neighbors in states to the West, we realize that while our troubles are like theirs, we are very fortunate indeed to face losses so small as transportation and limited extra-curriculars. And yet, we need to realize that every time a tax supported service is lost, be it in the schools, the libraries or county government, what we are indeed losing is the quality of life that we so treasure here in the rural

> So what did the student do, after getting an "F" in the class?

He followed the new "American way." He sued his school district and the English teacher for \$50,000, saying the failing grade he received -- which kept him from graduating -- caused him mental distress and anguish!

So, just for doing a normal job, the school district in general and an individual teacher in particular now have to defend themselves in court -- at their own expense!

In the newspaper business, liability insurance costs protecting against libel have soared in recent years. It's not that a great many more libel cases are being brought, but they MIGHT be. So, insurers have to protect themselves, and small business operators often must protect themselves as only their "big-city" cousins have done for many years.

Even locally, lawsuits were promised after the Laker School Board had announced cutbacks due to millage vote turn-downs. Former friends and neighbors -- who had shared seats at band concerts, parent-teacher meetings. sports contests and Laker graduations -- found themselves likely to next meet in court, at great personal monetary and mental expense!

Where, if ever, will it end?

That Rhode Island student should assume the majority of the responsibility (or blame) for failing the English course. If other students could do so within the time allowed, couldn't he somehow have done so? And if he couldn't, shouldn't his remedy (or punishment) be the failing grade?

In America in general, isn't it the responsibility of the persons involved to get all the facts and to participate in the decisions being made, instead of coming in, often "after the" fact," and threatening legal action?

We're being stifled by the THREAT of legal action, even more so than the actual pains of it. Who hasn't yelled across a fence or out a car window that he or she will "sue you" if that dog bites your child or if that messy yard isn't cleaned up or other such unimportant matter?

Perhaps much of this would be settled if the person bringing the suit would be required to pay legal fees for BOTH parties, regardless of who wins such suits. That way, only persons who actually have good arguments would likely seek court action.

We're burning up too much energy, time and money with such threats, doing harm to all concerned. And the only remedy v for such a situation must come from small towns and individual people - it won't come from Washington or Lansing.

It must start with you or me...

ever produced since they were first grown here in 1902, according to Davis Sunderland, Michigan Sugar Company vicepresident for agriculture.

All company plants are geared and ready to receive and process the record crop, officials say.

In the four plant areas — Sebewaing, Caro, Croswell and Carrollton - more than 85,000 acres of beets were planted, which is a new record.

In the Sebewaing plant area there are 26,000 acres, also a record, which could become a 500,000-ton crop.

#### **NEW EQUIPMENT, LARGER PILING AREA**

To handle that many tons and process them into sugar, the company has installed a huge, brand new Ogden Super Piler, added more piling grounds, installed a new scale and built a new entry road at the north end.

That's in addition to continued enlarged mechanization of sugar processing and storage, Sunderland added. Last year the Sebewaing plant averaged 4,260 tons of beets processed daily, hitting 5,000 tons "several times."

Sebewaing plant's new piler has a daily capacity of 7,000 tons or about 350 acres of sugar beets. It has new swingout conveyors for easier handling of semi-trucks and better dirt conveying back into trucks.

The new piling grounds, located north and east of the present grounds, will handle an additional 100,000 tons of beets. The new Super Piler will utilize most of that area. Traffic coming from the north - along M-25 - will use a new entrance cutting off traffic close to the plant and weighing in on a new scale, just north of Cooperative Elevator. That will allow the new scale to serve incoming loaded trucks from the north and east, officials say.

Traffic from the south will continue to use the current weigh-in scale. All empty trucks will continue using the present weigh-out scale.

#### SUMMER RAIN WAS "EXCELLENT"

"While there was drought during the early part of the summer, those August rains were excellent," Sunderland stated. Rain fell in the whole sugar beet area, including Ohio, and there was no sudden downpour. It fell slowly enough to soak in without a lot of runoff, he added.

Beets went through a dry period, but they seldom looked wilted, Sunderland said. He explained that since they started growth in a dry time, they sent their taproots deep into the ground, which helped sustain them during later dry periods. Starting yesterday, factory agriculturists are taking beet samples to project the size and sugar content of the crop.

That sampling system requires harvesting of 10-foot long row sections, on the basis of one sample per 100-acres. Following a precise system of measuring and locating the sample site, beets are counted, weighed, sampled and sugar-


"Everything looks very good right now," Sunderland declared, but he recalls that it looked that way last year, too, in early September

Then the rains came and everything was delayed from three weeks to more than a month.

'Now all I'm asking for is two weeks of nice warm sunshine for the harvest season," Sunderland smiled, pointing out that the plant is capable of receiving 100,000 tons per day. 'If it needs to be, I'd even settle for 10 days if we can't have

two weeks," he added. When it's dry so the farmers can take the beets out without a lot of mud clinging to them, and when fields are firm enough so vehicles can turn and move, growers can make good headway with harvesting.

Then, when the dry, clean beets roll off the trucks easily, without leaving lots of mud, everybody smiles, he added. "If we can have that kind of weather for the harvest season, coupled with the quality of the beautiful crop that's in the fields, we're going to have a wonderful sugar beet year... the kind we always dream about," Sunderland concluded.
