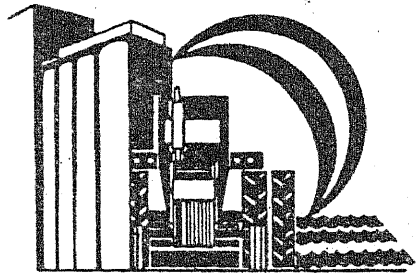

Caseville Harbor opens

Caseville Harbor's newly enlarged Municipal Dock and Harbor officially opens for business today (Wednesday), as the 68-slip facility has dedication ceremonies at 1 p.m.

Caseville Harbor Commission members invite the public to attend the brief dedication, to commemorate "the outstanding ad-

dition that it is to Huron County," according to Harbor Commission Chairman Bud Lankey.

The \$1.8 million project was funded through the Waterways Division, Michigan Department of Natural Resources Recreation Division and Michigan Land Grant Trust.

"This is the Thumb Area's most wind-secured facility, and offers seasonal and short-term dockage plus all the comforts of home," he adds.

The boat slips are available on a daily or seasonal basis, and dockside telephone and cable TV hookups are available.

Schneider is a piano instructor and the main accom-

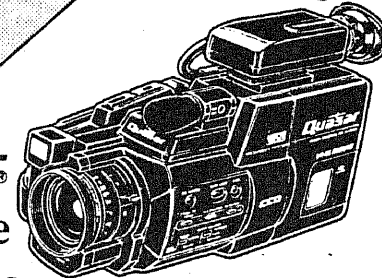
panist for the Michigan Opera Theater.

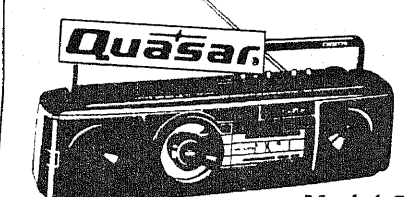

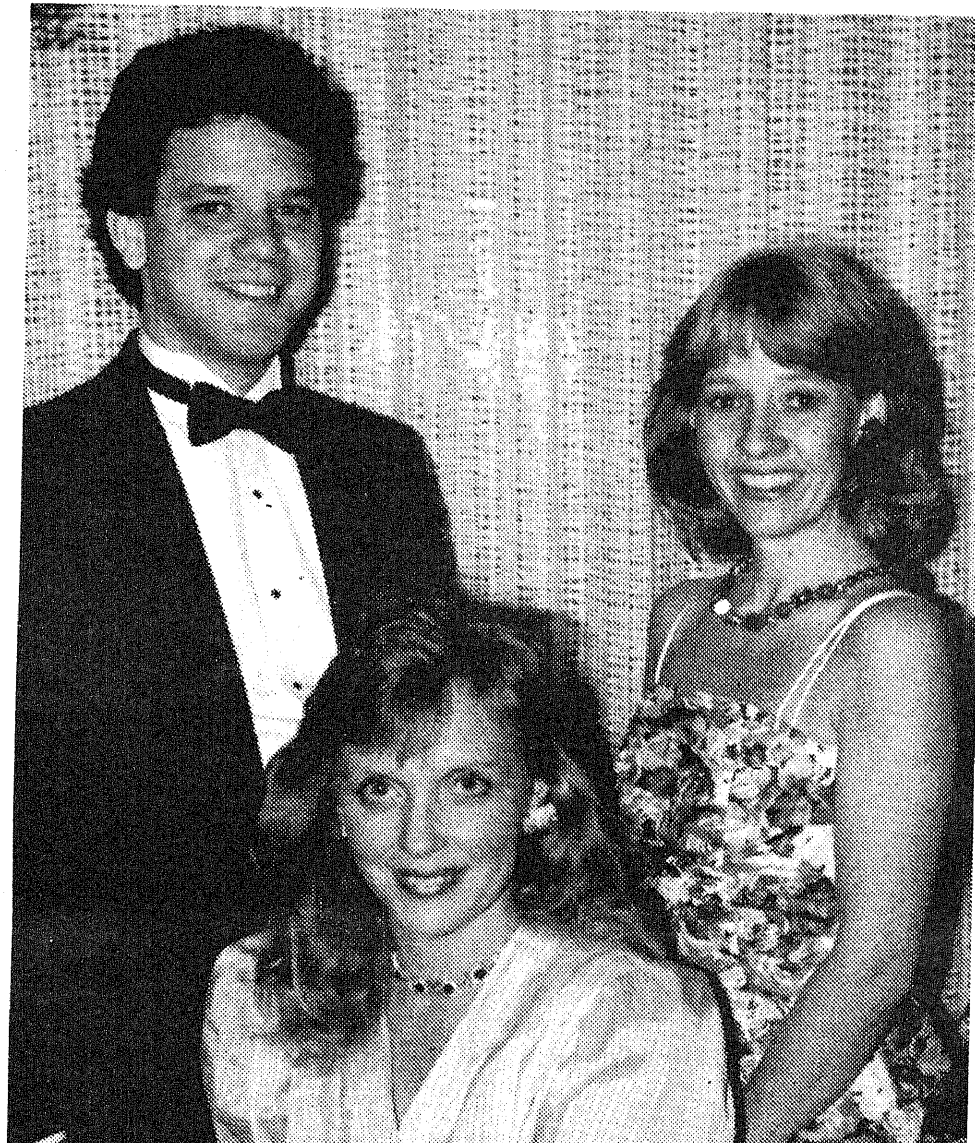

Pigeon Motors earns Service Professional designation

Caseville Council accepts gas bid

People's Oil and Gas of Pigeon was the successful bidder for supplying the Village of Caseville with fuel.

The village council accepted a bid of .800 a gallon for regular gasoline, .778 for unleaded, .650 for No. 2 diesel, and .710 for premium diesel, with those prices in effect on April 10. The contract with the village is subject to any increases or decreases in the price of fuel at the time of purchase, according to village controller Janice Prill.

Council also learned that there will be no increase in the village's millage rate, Prill said. The millage will remain at 12.7218 for the 1989-90 fiscal year.

DRUG HELP: The Thumb Area Narcotics Group (TANG) will be receiving a \$5,000 donation from the village after council approved the measure. TANG is a law enforcement agency aimed at fighting drugs in Huron, Tuscola, and Lapeer counties.

In other business, council: *Approved putting delinquent water and garbage charges through Sept. 30.

1988 on tax bills which will be due this summer.

*Learned that the property for the new lagoon was purchased for \$162,000. Village officials are not beginning to work on getting the necessary easements for the new sewer system.

*Approved the purchase of seven flags at \$65 each from Obie Graphics. The flags will sport Caseville's nautical theme and will be alternated with the American flag on Main Street.

*Approved the summer recreation program, which will run for three weeks, July 17-August 4. A recreation director is being sought, Prill said.

OBSERVATIONS BY CO-PUBLISHER MARK RUMMEL AND ANYBODY ELSE HE CAN GET TO WRITE 'EM!

PAPER NOTES: Thursday's Detroit News featured a full-color story titled "Village Voices — Small-town newspapers record life's rhythm away from the big city." While interesting to read (at least to us), the story made light-hearted fun of what makes news in small towns.

For instance, it talked about an Ingham County News story about a runaway steer, a Tuscola County dispute about Sheriff Tom Kern's clothing allowance in Caro's Advertiser, and even mentioned the unhappy story about a Pigeon resident recently imprisoned.

Two News reporters scanned 30 of Michigan's 235 weekly papers for the report. That's fine. Big city reporters often mock their small-town brothers and sisters, but many also dream of running their own paper when they "retire" from big papers.

And, to be honest, the growth and potential of newspapering is found in weeklies these days, much more than in dailies.

Reporters Julie Hinds and Anne Marie Biondo say, "Reading a small-town paper is like getting a letter from home. There's a sense that every person's accomplishment, however small, is worth trumpeting." And, they advise, "With some small-town papers, headlines don't tell the whole story. To be fully informed, readers shouldn't overlook the letters to the editor, the classified ads and... key advertisements."

We agree there, too! A recent study showed daily newspaper circulation continues its near-20-year decline, noting Sunday circulation should surpass daily distribution this year. But, weekly newspaper circulation is at an all-time high, since weekly papers summarize the past (and future) week, quickly, compactly and efficiently.

And, I regularly read five of the 30 papers they browsed (a hobby, I'd say) — and know what the News reporters were looking at every week.

CASEVILLE GETS STATE GRANT
Caseville village officials were notified Friday by State Senator James Barcia's office that a \$15,000 block grant from the Michigan Department of Commerce's Community Development Block Grant Program had been approved. The group viewed quilts, studied and purchased patterns and looked at materials for future projects. In addition, they enjoyed tours to a general store, a cheese factory, a giant flea market and an auction. They lived in a similar-style to their Amish counterparts while there, dining in Amish-style restaurants and sleeping in an inn.

According to Mrs. Ann Marie Clabuesch of Pigeon, who heads the quilting group

which took the first Shipshewana trip a year ago, the most interesting part of the trip was the contrast between the Amish way of life and the modern ways of American society.

"Just seeing the Amish horses and buggies lined up at the flea market next to all the four-wheel drives and expensive cars and trucks was an interesting study in contrasts," remembers Mrs. Clabuesch.

The visiting ladies were also pleased to view a quilt display offered by an Amish woman who showed over three dozen quilts made by local Amish women. She makes quilts to order in any color, crafted by the Amish.
