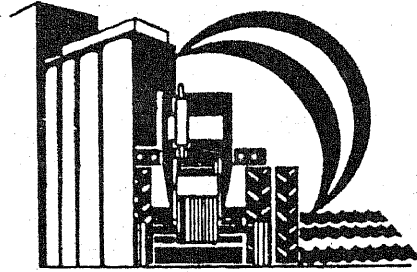

SANILAC VOTES NOV. 7

Sanilac County residents will decide Nov. 7 if they are willing to pay higher taxes to restore the sheriff's road patrol. The County Board of Commissioners will put the issue on the General Election ballot after a citizens' group presented petitions signed with more than 2000 names calling for the election.

Voters will be asked to increase taxes by 3/4-mill for four years, to raise about \$368,000 each year. The money will restore the Sheriff's Department road patrol, which was disbanded earlier this month as county government leaders slashed more than \$250,000 in budget cuts. Ten workers in the Sheriff's Department were laid off, and state money for two more sheriff's workers was lost. Another 12 county employees were also laid off.

REP. ALLEN ON STUDY GROUP

State Rep. Dick Allen (R-Caro) has been named to a special House Republican Task Force to review Michigan's natural resource management.

The study group will review management of the state's fish, wildlife, forestry and mineral resources to help ensure their role in the state's economy. It will also attempt to restore a higher priority to natural resources, which has been diminished by environmental issues such as groundwater contamination and solid waste disposal.

The Natural Resources Management Task Force will conduct public hearings throughout the state this fall for public ideas on the subject.

Participants must attend all six classes and pass a written and demonstration test afterwards in order to receive certification.

According to Johnson, teens from age 12 to 16 must have completed a Hunter Safety course in order to obtain their first hunting license. He adds that the class is open to those over age 16, noting that Canada and many other states require a Hunter Safety course before hunters may obtain a license.

NORTH HURON VOTES NOV. 14

Voters in the North Huron School District go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 14 to decide whether to approve a 3.5-mill tax hike for five years. The proposal lost by four votes last week, 645-641. A separate 14.25-mill renewal was approved by NH voters by a wide margin.

The 3.5-mill increase would generate about \$355,000 each year, providing funds to remove asbestos from buildings, add a new roof at the elementary school, a new school boiler plus maintain existing programs, school officials say.

TRASH DISPOSAL SOLUTION?

Solid waste disposal plans for the Upper Thumb could be resolved through 1997, if an expansion plan for a private landfill in Lapeer County is approved.

John Sexton Corporation plans to use the final 25 acres of its Burnside Township site to receive trash from Lapeer, Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac Counties. The company expects the additional acreage will be able to handle landfill needs until 1997.

Lapeer County officials are working out last stages of the expansion agreement, which would okay the dumping of up to 1400 cubic yards of waste per day.

MEANWHILE, two other developments in local landfills are observed. Sanilac County officials are working out a similar arrangement with the owners of Tri-City Landfill in Bridgehampton Township, near Sandusky. It would provide trash disposal for at least five years.

And, Huron County's last licensed landfill is no more. Robert Cove of Cove Sanitation said this week he will not relicense his existing Uby area disposal site, due to expenses and state requirements. His disposal company will use licensed landfills elsewhere, he said, and customers will not notice a difference in daily operations.

BIGGEST LAKE HURON CROPS?

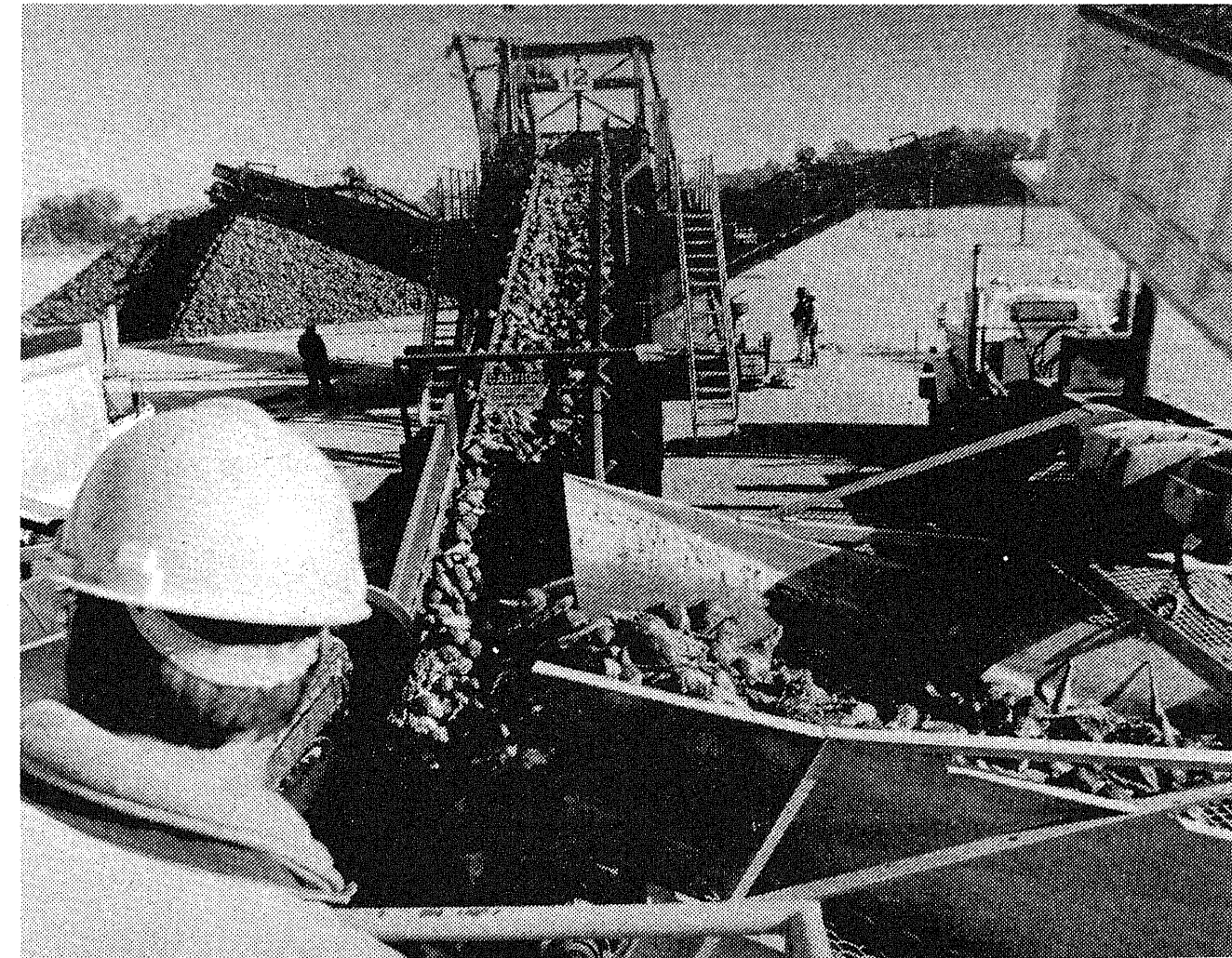
Whitefish are still the biggest "crop" of fish caught in Lake Huron each year, according to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. In 1988, commercial fishermen hauled in 2.91 million pounds of whitefish.

Second-biggest catch was carp, at 667,149 pounds caught by state-licensed fisheries. Next is catfish at 511,046, then salmon (by Indian treaty-licenssees only) at 447,776 pounds. Commercial and treaty fishermen caught 97,406 pounds of Perch and treaty fishermen caught 6,688 pounds of walleye, according to the DNR figures.

BEET CAMPAIGN BEGINS: The 1989-90 Sugar Beet drive started early Monday morning, and more than 20,000 tons of beets had been delivered to the Sebewaing Plant of Michigan Sugar Company by day's end. Ag Manager Dick Jacoby said those loads provided enough beets for five factory work days, so deliveries have been stopped.

Excellent crop yields being harvested in Thumb & statewide

Nearly ideal growing conditions during August maintained or improved production prospects for field crops in most areas of the state.

Moderate temperatures and fairly widespread, timely rains improved chances for record or near record yields for some crops, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Statistics Service.

The August rainfall extended to parts of northern Michigan, where dry conditions have reduced yield prospects. Cool temperatures, especially during the last half of August, have slowed maturity of late developing crops. Despite the excellent yield prospects, farmers are concerned about the late maturity of this year's crops.

Yield and production prospects in this report are based on conditions as of September 1 and assume weather conditions favorable for normal maturity and harvest.

Michigan CORN yields are forecast at 105 bushels per acre, unchanged from last month and 2 bushels short of the record 1982 yield.

The expected SOYBEAN yield, a record 36 bushels per acre, is up 2 bushels from the August 1 forecast. The previous record soybean yield of 35 bushels was set in 1987.

DRY BEAN production, at 4.6 million hundredweight (cwt.), is more than double last year's small crop. Yields are forecast at a near record 1,400 pounds per acre. Crop maturity remains well behind normal and most of the

acreage will not be harvested until October.

SUGARBEET yields are expected to average 20 tons per acre.

SUMMER POTATO output is forecast at 2.1 million cwt., up 29% from last year.

Nationally, CORN production is forecast at 7.32 billion bushels, down slightly from last month's forecast, but 49% above 1988. Yield is forecast at 112.4 bushels per acre.

SOYBEAN production is forecast at 1.89 billion bushels, 1% below August 1, but 23% above 1988.

The U.S. production of DRY BEANS is forecast at 25.2 million cwt., up 31% from last year.

Leipprandt re-elected to state board

Elktion-Pigeon-Bay Port Schools Board trustee Virginia Leipprandt has been re-elected to a 3-year term on the board of directors of the Michigan Association of School Boards.

Mrs. Leipprandt has served as secretary, treasurer and vice-president during her 14 years on the Lakers' school board. Half of that time, she has been active in MASA, a non-profit organization that provides leadership training and support services to the state's 4,200 locally-elected school board members. She will chair MASA's Education and Curriculum Innovation Committee.

New rules for hunters . . .

A bonus license permitting firearm deer hunters to take only an antlerless deer, which replaces the hunter's choice permit of past years, is one of the major changes in deer hunting regulations for the 1989 season.

The regular firearm deer license allows a hunter to take a buck, explains Michigan State University Extension wildlife specialist Glenn Dudderar. The \$3 bonus license permits the taking of an antlerless deer in all Lower Peninsula counties except parts of Crawford, Roscommon, Otsego, Antrim, Kalkaska, Oscoda, Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw, Lenawee, Monroe, Wayne, Oakland and Macomb. Most of the Upper Peninsula is bucks only, except for most of Iron, Dickinson, Delta and Menominee counties and part of Marquette County, which are bonus areas. An additional license to take another buck may also be purchased in any part of the state.

"If you send in your application and your fee by the September 24 deadline, chances are very good to excellent that you'll receive the bonus license," Dudderar says.

The reason for the regulations changes this year is the unacceptably high numbers of deer in many areas and the threat from the herd to

agriculture, motorists and itself.

"The DNR wants to reduce the deer herd in many areas so that deer numbers and distribution are more compatible with human endeavors and the ability of the habitat to support them," Dudderar explains.

In 20 counties where agricultural damage has been particularly severe and the deer herd is excessively large, the DNR is also giving block bonus licenses for antlerless deer to land owners who apply for them. The landowners can then pass them along to hunters of their choice. The only requirements are that the landowner must have a history of deer damage that the DNR is aware of or that the landowner can document, and that the landowner may not sell the permits or deer taken with them. The landowner can, however, charge an access fee or lease fee.

The 20 counties are: (in DNR district 2) Iron, Dickinson, Menominee; (district 9) Oceana, Newaygo, Mecosta, Montcalm, Ionia, Kent, Muskegon, Ottawa; and (district 13) Calhoun, Jackson, Washtenaw, Lenawee, Hillsdale, Branch, Eaton, Ingham and Livingston. Land owners need to contact their district DNR biologist to request block permits. They are Jim Ham-

mell, Crystal Falls, (906) 875-6622 in district 2; Becky Humphries, Grand Rapids, (616) 456-5071 in district 9; and Ralph Anderson, Jackson, (517) 784-3188 in district 13.

Dudderar encourages deer hunters to contact landowners now to arrange for permission to hunt antlerless deer on their land so they can apply for their bonus permits before the September 24 deadline. He urges farmers who have suffered deer damage to apply for the block bonus permits in counties where they are available. In counties where individual bonus permits are available, Dudderar encourages farmers to urge their relatives, friends and neighbors to apply for bonus licenses, and to consider allowing other responsible hunters to hunt for antlerless deer on their property.

Dudderar notes that antlerless deer taken under a block bonus license can be taken in addition to any taken under the individual bonus licenses, though a hunter can still take only one deer per day.

Though these rules apply to firearm deer hunters, bowhunters have their chance at an extra deer or two, also. In the Upper Peninsula, bowhunters can take a deer of either sex on their regular license and an antlerless deer on their bonus license during the Decem-

ber season. In the Lower Peninsula, bowhunters may take a deer of either sex on their regular license, an antlerless deer on their bonus license during December and a buck on a second buck license.

Through these new regulations, the DNR hopes to increase the total deer kill from 380,000 in 1988 to more than 450,000 in 1989.

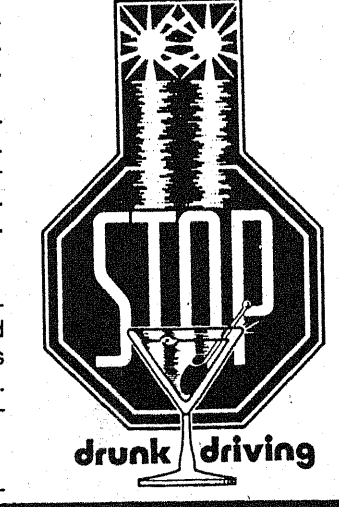

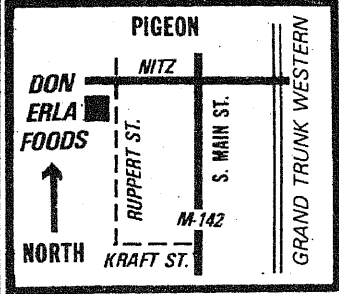
