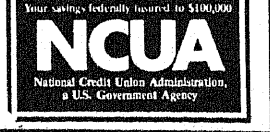

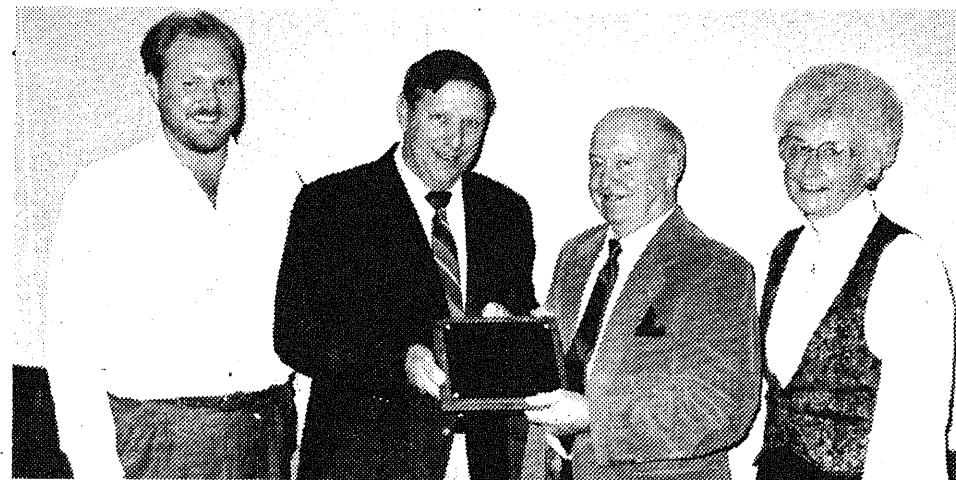

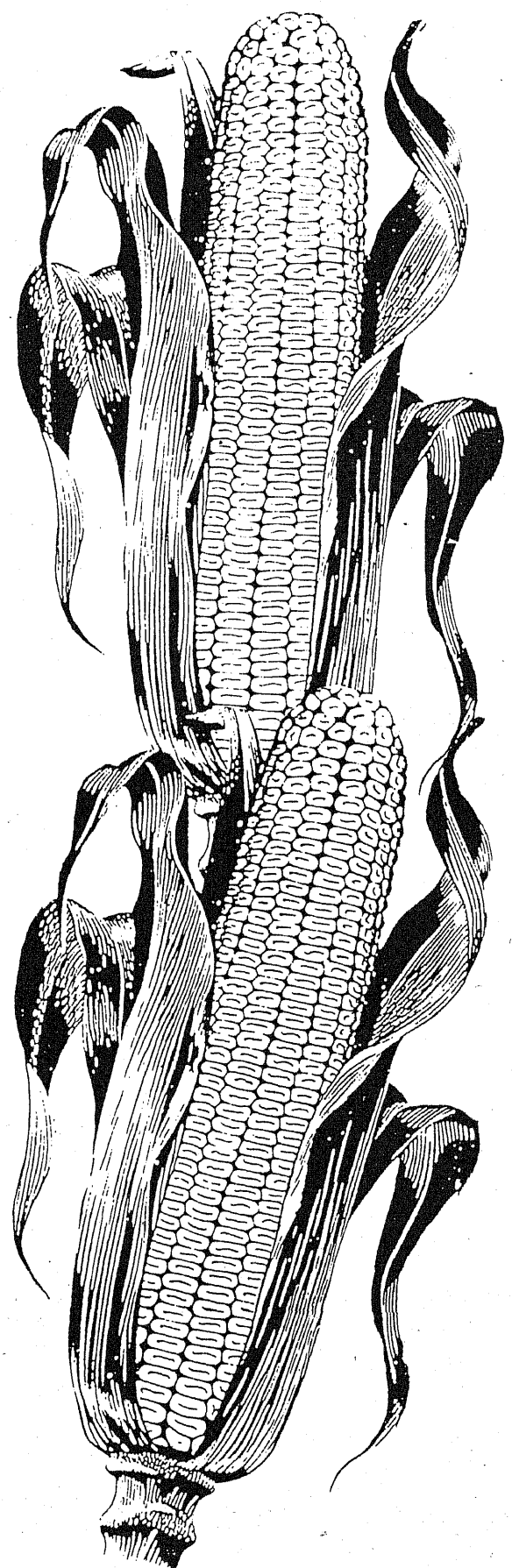

Shooting clays

The small, black disk spun lazily towards the horizon, hovering near the end of its flight like a miniature UFO. I held my breath, pointed the shotgun a few feet in front of its prospective flight path, closed my eyes and jerked the trigger. At the gun's loud report I opened my eyes hoping, no, praying, that a jumble of powdered clay would be floating downward, but alas, as the black, spinning orb was still airborne.

"Where are you aiming?" The sharp question came from my older brother who was wielding the hand trap that sent the clay pigeons skyward.

"I think I'm leading it enough," I answered back, hoping I had given the correct answer.

"Don't lead it at all," was his terse response, "just cover the bird with the end of your barrel and keep swinging."

As always, my brother was right, and although he didn't know it at the time, that one small piece of advice put me well on my way

to become a respectable wing shot. Mind you, I didn't say good, I said respectable.

The rest of the morning I dusted those Blue Rock clay pigeons with the best of them, even the ones my brother sent skimming just above the ground, or turned over 90 to present the smallest, most difficult target of all. I had forgotten about aiming, the amount of lead and all the other drivel I had gleaned from outdoor magazines and let my natural instincts and hand to eye coordination take over. Even though I was only 12 years old, it was the start of many fun-filled days of shooting clays.

Many years later, when I spent 2 boring years in Germany with the US Army, it was a trap and skeet range, plus an unlimited amount of shotgun shells, that helped while away the hours. I and a couple of new-found friends spent endless hours dusting targets, and my wing-shooting skills began to improve.

Shooting clay pigeons is an old, old, pastime shared equally by the occasional shooter and the dedicated shotgunner. The shooting

gear may be the pump or automatic that accompanies you afield during the hunting seasons, or it may be a slick, high-priced trap or skeet gun that sets you back several house payments. The attire may be as simple as a pair of jeans and a camo sweatshirt, or it may be a shooting vest, complete with padded shoulder, oversized pockets, and 25-straight patches covering the back. Whatever the gun or the clothes, clay pigeon shooting is alive and well.

The name clay pigeons comes from the fact that in the beginning, English shooters entertained themselves by shooting real pigeons. As a matter of fact, certain pigeons were raised, because of qualities such as speed and maneuverability, solely to become targets for the fast-growing sport. The Blue Rock Lincolnshire was one of the old favorites and to this day the Blue Rock is a trade name on many clay pigeons.

are also sporting clays, a new sport which tries to emulate hunting conditions by having each station resemble some phase of shotgun hunting. For many of today's shooters the clays are tossed in back of the barn using a hand trap and someone with a strong arm.

Whatever the method, there is no denying the satisfaction that comes from seeing a puff of dust when you pull the trigger while shooting clays.

Outdoor Report

— October 23, 1989 —

While everyone seems to be thinking of hunting, several spots on the lakes are holding up very well for late season fishermen. Saginaw Bay has been yielding some nice catches of perch all along the Huron County shoreline. Some late salmon are still being picked up south of Harbor Beach and several good reports of steelheads have filtered in. Walleyes have been hitting crawler harnesses at the mouth of the Saginaw River in the evenings.

Duck and goose action on the Bay was at a standstill during most of the week due to the heavy winds and rough seas, however there were plenty of Canadas and mallards in picked corn during the same period. The water shooting picked up a little over the weekend, with several reports of good-sized flocks of both redheads and bluebills coming down ahead of the last front.

If you see some tiny Canadas mixed in with the lessers and greeters you may have spotted a Richardson or two. This race, along with the Lesser Canada and the Greater Canada, is a true Canada but is only the size of a mallard. It has a very short bill and his honk, if you call it that, sounds like it has a cold. They are usually found in the Central Flyway, but several sightings have been made this year.

for out-of-area promotion, Osentoski says, and would be applied to about 22 motels and hotels with more than 10 rooms each. The fee would not apply to bed-and-breakfast places or motels with less than 10 rooms.

Each eligible hotel owner must agree to charge the fee, which would become mandatory when approved, perhaps by early 1990.

\$69,000 GRANT FOR TOURISM

The East Michigan Tourist Association has received three grants worth \$69,000 to promote the state's Lake Huron Circle Tour, plus advertise other tourist programs.

In announcing the grants, State Sen. James Barcia (D-Bay City) said the funding means the Lake Huron Circle Tour "will receive the advertising necessary to make it a great success."

A \$20,000 grant will help publish 200,000 copies of a 32-page full color Circle Tour planner for distribution in Michigan and Canada. It will be distributed in March. Other grants include \$16,400 to help pay ad costs for spring promotions and \$33,000 to provide regional travel brochures.

The Lake Huron Circle Tour includes placing 24-inch by 24-inch signs every 10 miles along the 1450-mile tour, circling the lake through Michigan and Ontario. The Michigan portion starts at Port Huron and follows M-25 north through the Thumb, to Bay City, then along M-13 to Mackinaw City.

HISTORIC STEAMSHIP FOUND

The wreck of the steamship New York has been found in Lake Huron, off Port Sanilac, and is called a major historic find because the 133-year-old ship was powered by a rare, oscillating-type engine.

The ship was found last year, in more than 100 feet of water off Forester Township. But searchers will not announced its exact position until scientists can further study the boat. The Maritime History Division of the Smithsonian Institute of Washington, D.C., is leading the study.

It is considered a major historic find because of the unusual engine, rarely used on the Great Lakes and seldom on a propeller-driven ship. The steamer was carrying lumber from Georgian Bay to Buffalo, N.Y., when it sank in a gale just before noon on Oct. 14, 1876 — 113 years ago. Fifteen of the 16 persons on board were rescued.

The New York was found by four divers of the volunteer Great Lakes Shipwreck Exploration Group, who also found the nearby lumber barge Checotah, in May, 1988. The two relics are just a few hundred feet apart, Tim Juhl of the group says.

NO SANILAC VOTE — YET

Sanilac County residents will be deciding whether or not a new county jail should be built, but they won't be voting on the issue at the Nov. 7 General Election.

The petition with more than 3300 names filed by Citizens for Good Government to force a vote on the \$5 million jail project was submitted too late to be included in the Nov. 7 ballot. So, a special election must be scheduled, sometime during the next year, if the project is to proceed.

State Department of Corrections officials say Sanilac's 35-year-old jail fails to meet state standards, and an ongoing lawsuit by a former inmate may force closure of the present building.

ATHLETE-SCHOLAR NOMINEES

A Unionville - Sebawaing Area student has been nominated for one of eight finalist positions in the first Michigan High School Athletic Associations Scholar-Athlete Awards.

Scott Keiser of USA is the only Western Thumb Area athlete nominated by their schools for the first-year awards, offering six \$1000 scholarships for students who combine a minimum 3.5-grade point with academic achievement.

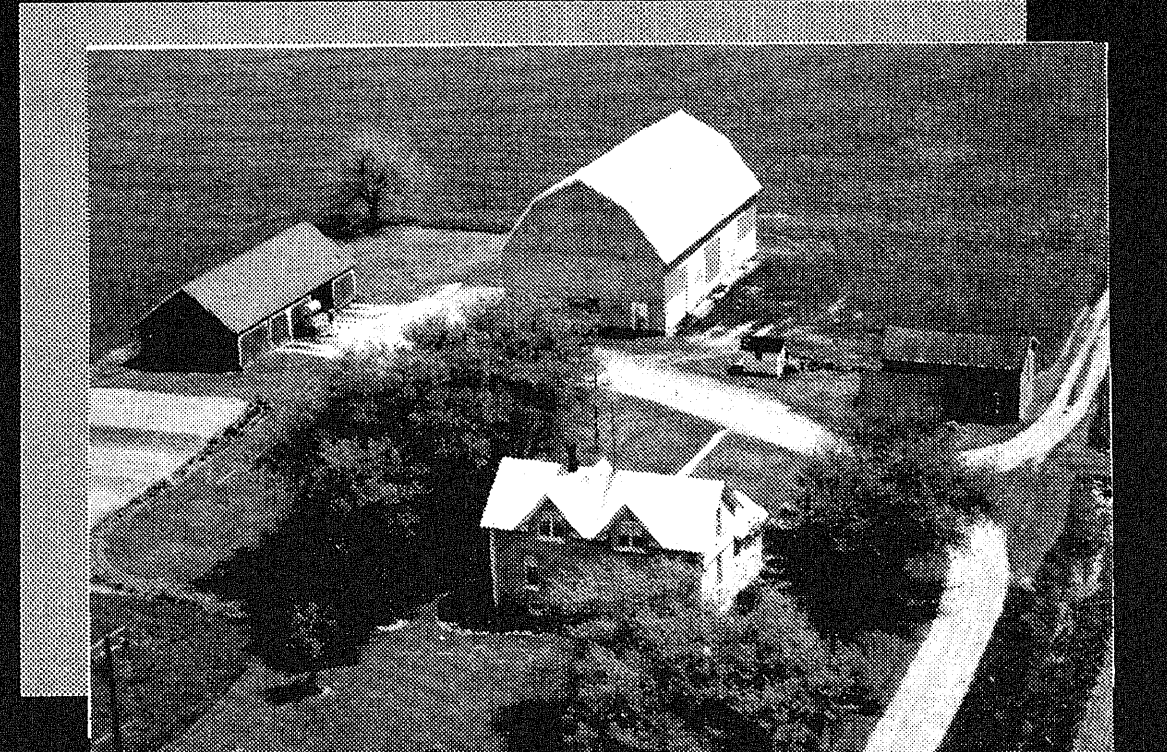
