

Our harvest being gotten in, our Governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a more special manner rejoice together, after we had gathered the fruit of our labours. They four in one day killed as much fowl as, with a little help beside, served the Company almost a week.


At which time, amongst other recreations, we exercised our arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and amongst the rest their greatest king Massasoit, with some 90 men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted.

And they went out and killed five deer which they brought to the plantation and bestowed on our Governor and upon the Captain and others.

Those words written in December, 1621, told of the first Thanksgiving Day celebration here in America. The Pilgrims, by order of Gov. William Bradford, held a three-day festival to commemorate the autumn harvest that year. But, celebration of Thanksgiving Day didn't become a onal holiday for more than two centuries --- even though some Massachusetts towns began celebrating as early as 1630 and 1660.

It took a presidential decree by Abraham Lincoln in 1863 to formally establish this national holiday, although the tradition had been on-going since that first thankful occasion in 1621. And, fine traditions --such as turkey, pumpkin pie and plum pudding-were part of the day then and now.

In reality, we have so very much more bounty to be thankful for than did those Pilgrims. We take for granted simple things such as safety, heat, lights, ample food, education, mobility, health, moderate wealth and so much more -- things the Pilgrims could only dream of. Happy Thanksgiving indeed!

THANKSGIVING'S EARLY DATE is putting pressure on the turkey time thinking at our household. I've cooked one turkey in my life and only accomplished that, thanks to my wonderful mother-in-law who came to my rescue ("Wanda, it works better if you take the package of innards out of the

bird before putting the dressing in."). I do bake good cinnamon and dinner rolls, though, and make a decent green bean casserole, so that will be my contribution to Thanksgiving dinner at Grandma's house this Thursday.

Even more important than thoughts of food (and isn't it great to celebrate with food?!) are the thoughts of humble appreciation for all that the Creator gives to us.

That's best summed up in the words of Dag Hammersjkold: "For all that has been, thanks; for all that will be, praise." Happy Thanksgiving from Under the Willow that shades us

Of course there is no skirting around the fact that they are all mule-ishly stubborn and set in their ways - and it would be false to paint a picture of complete and unadulterated family harmony - but as adults our differences should no longer be an issue. Our family times together are always exceptionally enjoyable, with big eating and drinking and laughter, and there is always something to be learned by any number of them at any given moment. Back in 1920 you didn't see many men six feet tall and now you see a lot of six footers and the women are taller than they used to be. People dress a lot different than they did. The women used to wear a lot of furs. They had a fur muff and a fur color on their coat.

I once told a girl that those collars were made out of skunk skins and she said, "No woman would have a skunk skin around her neck." Well, I told her they often had a skunk head with eyes and noses on them and she got a little mad.

You don't have to be too old to remember how a lot of people raised silver foxes for

their furs and got good prices

There is a house on M-25 close to Bay Port that used to raise mink for their fur and I still have a sheep skin lined coat they used to wear.

I also have a horse bridle coat with wooden pegs for buttons. I remember very well when people had buffalo and horse hide robes to cover-up with when they rode in their cars or buggys, béfore the days of heaters.

If a young man thought he was well dressed, he had a silk scarf wrapped around his neck, even when he was in the house. In the winter, he'd wear spats. Some guys liked them a lot of them wore them because they were stylish. I remember once I was at a place where a lot of young people were together and there were two young men who had spats on. One young girl said it looked as if their underwear was sticking out.

A lot of men used to stand and jingle their change in their pockets and I could write a lot of things that both men and women used to do in the name of style.

In Prov. 13:11 it says, "Wealth gotten by vanity shall be diminished but he that gathereth by labor shall increase." So if a man goes around and brags about how he made his own money, he is poorer than the man who worked for his money and doesn't brag about how he got it!



"Usually, it took five or six year to get a visa to leave, persons who were arrested never got out. But because my father had collected enough favors, within two months from the day my mother was released from prison, we were leaving," Witczak says.

HE AND HIS MOTHER ARRIVED in New York at Christmas time with only 25 cents, he wearing clothes provided by his aunts and uncles.

"We borrowed money from all over for plane tickets. When we flew over New York from Quebec, I looked down and saw all the lights and I wanted to slap muself. I thought I was dead. I asked my mother, 'Is this really heaven?' I was just stunned. For a child, it was totally amazing to me."

"I remember there was a Christmas party going on for kids at the airport, and they had potato chips for 10 cents a bag. I begged mother for chips, but she said we only had 25 cents. But she went out and bought them. I started eating them, and had to throw them away because I was not used to eating salty food. I felt so guilty, and it hurts me to this day that I took the last money we had for a bag of potato chips," Witczak painfully re-

Once in Wyandotte with Natalia's brother, life was easier for the newly-arrived family. Natalia met her future husband, Henry Opitek, about a week before the family's sixmonth visa was to expire. They had already decided that the return to Poland would see Natalia in prison again, and so they planned to run to Canada. Her marriage to Opitek assured their permanent residence in Amer-




