New state classes for '90 football playoffs

Michigan high schools have twice as good a chance of getting into post-season football playoffs, in the new schedule recently announced by the Michigan High School Athletic Association.

Eight classes of football play will be used for the 1990 playoffs, up from four classes in past years. The classes are based on 1989-90 enrollment, and mean that four of every 22 schools will qualify for the playoffs in the six largest classes. In Class DD and D, 32 of 99 schools — nearly one-third — will qualify for playoffs.

High school enrollments for the eight classes this fall are:

- Class AA 3,142-1,400; Class C 1,391-964;
- Class BB 961-683; Class B 681-504;
- Class CC 503-362; Class C 361-256, and

■ Class DD 254-193 and Class D 192-71.

There are between 88 and 85 schools statewide in each of the six largest classes, but just 49 schools in Class DD and 50 in Class D.

The playoff structure means double the number of teams will qualify for post-season play, which greatly increases the chances for schools to win state titles. The new structure has evolved from several years of scrutiny of the existing system, observers say.

Some local school classifications are:

- Class B: Caro, Essexville Garber, Vassar;
- Class CC: Bad Axe, Cass City, Elkton - Pigeon - Bay Port, Reese, Unionville-Sebewaing;
- Class DD: Akron-Fairgrove, North Huron, and
- Class D: Caseville, Owen-Gage.

Park drinking policy starts

A long, hot summer is on tap for designated areas of Huron County Parks as county board of commissioners approved creation of drinking and non-drinking sections in county parks effective Friday.

The creation of drinking and non-drinking areas is an attempt to curb the increasing numbers of summer drinking parties in Huron's nine county parks.

"For years, we have been talking about ways to handle the drinking problem on the beaches and we decided to act," said John T. Martin secretary-manager of the Huron County Road Com-

mission. "We could see excessive drinking and some situations developing that could cause problems."

In an effort to eliminate beer keg parties, officials tried to limit the size of alcoholic beverage containers to 12 ounces last year, but the prosecutor's office ruled the restriction as unenforceable because it included beaches, camping and picnic areas.

According to Martin, the first park to implement drinking and non-drinking areas is the county park in Caseville because it has the highest number of beachgoers during the summer.

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
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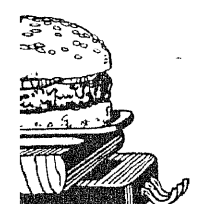

(EDITOR'S NOTE: We've gotten away from running markets since the Co-op Elevator put them on a phone answering machine for 24-hour use.)

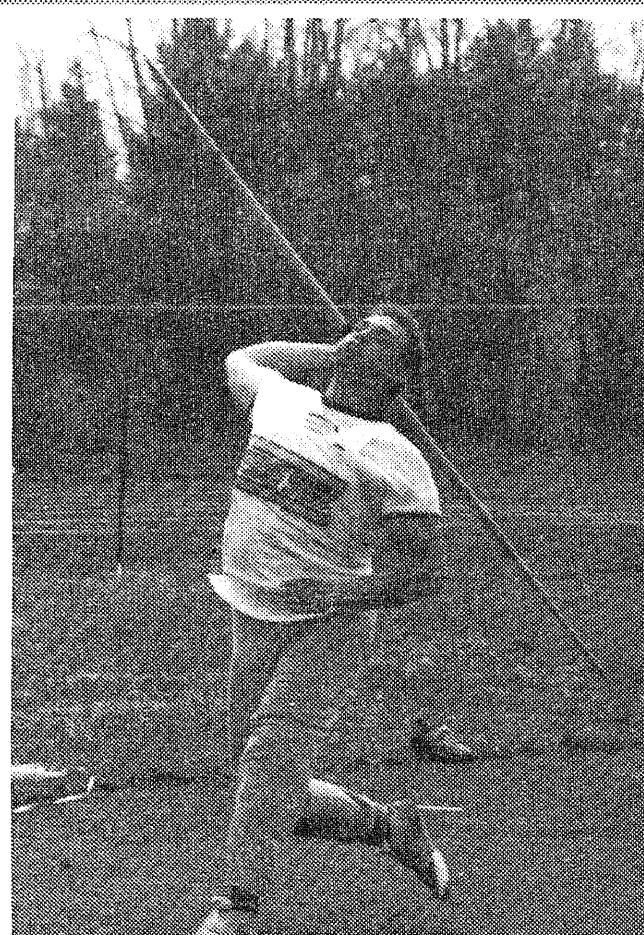
ACHIEVEMENTS

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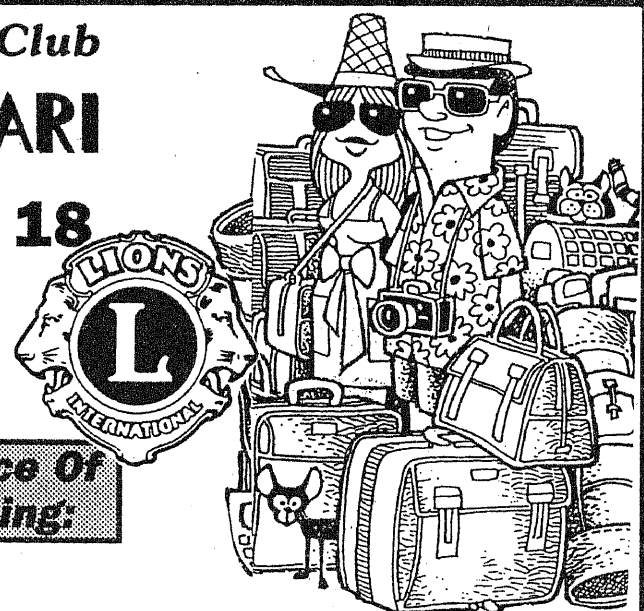

EATING LATE

I had arrived at the trail-head late in the afternoon and rather than camp at the convenient park just down the road had decided to shoulder my pack and strike out on the trail. My plan was to put several miles between me and civilization before dark, camp for the night and then spend the next few days hiking, fishing and just poking around.

The trail was familiar. I had been there several times before, so I traveled right through the supper hour and set my sights on the headwaters of a small stream which tumbled out of the escarpment walls that hemmed in this pristine spot of unspoiled wilderness located in the western portion of the Upper Peninsula.

I reached the tiny stream just as darkness was setting in and hurriedly dug into my backpack for the tiny, but friendly, candle lantern to shed some light while I set up camp. I picked a flat, grassy spot 25 yards from the stream's edge for a couple of reasons. One, was to keep my distance from the pesky insects that love to live near the water almost as much as humans do, and the other, to stay out of the path of the wandering black bear who use the stream banks as their own personal highway.

Camp was secure in a couple of minutes. The tiny, green mountain tent almost erected itself and with the ground pad and mummy bag snugly inside my sleeping quarters were ready for a

tired body.

The next order of business was supper, and in the dim glow of the sputtering candle I dug through my pack for my camp stove and food bag. I would be living on spartan fare this trip. Food that was high in calories and energy, but low in bulk and preparation time had filled my packing list.

On most of my backpacking trips I like to experiment with food. The real trick is to satisfy my prodigious appetite while maintaining a pack weight that doesn't buckle my knees when I hoist it on my back. I have spent a lot of time, and money with freeze-dried foods but have not found them to my liking.

The boastful directions which indicate that, with the

addition of some water, the 2 tablespoons of sawdust at the bottom of the plastic pouch will turn into a "serving of 4" somehow never measures up to my expectations. So, instead, I shop at the local grocery store and "make do" just fine.

I pulled the Coleman Peak backpack stove from its protective pouch, pumped up the pressure and touched a match to the single burner which soon danced with a light blue flame. A small aluminum pot, half filled with water from one of the 2 water bottles I carried, was set on top and within a few minutes, small bubbles appeared at the bottom. When the water began to boil I added a handful of dried, mixed vegetables and place a cover on top of the pot to conserve the precious heat.

When the vegetables were tender, I added a handful of instant rice and crumbled half of a Wilson Meat Bar. This is a highly processed meat product that looks like dog barf and eaten by itself tastes the same.

But added to rice, beans, or any other type of vegetables, this product produces a heavenly meaty taste that transposes a pot of goo into a delectable repast.

With the cover back on the pot and the heat turned down I pulled my ground pad and sleeping bag out of the tent and with my pack resting against a tree, rigged up a suitable chaise lounge.

Supper that night was rice stew. It could have been rice soup if I would have added a little more water, or rice meatloaf with a little less water. A touch of thyme and a leaf of tarragon crumbled over the pot's contents and a large dollop of margarine produces the finishing touch.

The meal was tasty, filling and frightfully easy to prepare. Topped off with a cup of heavily sugared tea, it made my tummy warm and eyelids droop prematurely.

I cleaned up, hung my food bag high in a tree and crawled sleepily into my tent. I wonder, I thought to myself, what will I have for breakfast?

Outdoor Report

Week of

On June 27-28 and July 2-3 the DNR will take public comment on a proposal to place signs on 1,200 miles of state forest roads for use by ORV's. Presently, ORV's may legally operate on all of the state forest roads and will try to control environmental damage caused by the misuse of off-street vehicles on public land. Anyone interested enough may view county maps of the proposed 1,200 miles of state forest roads and may also voice for or against such a proposal.

This year, farmers statewide may apply for crop depredation bonus deer hunting licenses. The landowners must prove a history of significant agricultural crop damage and this must be documented by the DNR. The licenses will only be valid during the regular bow and arrow, firearm, and muzzleloading deer seasons and only upon the farm where the permit is issued, or upon adjacent private property with permission of the landowner.

With the establishment of a very successful turkey transplant program in our state, DNR biologists are looking at the possibility of importing a new game bird from North Dakota. Within the next few weeks, 300 Hungarian partridge eggs will arrive for incubation and hatching at a proposed release site in Isabella County. The Hungarian partridge is native to northern Europe and about the size of a pigeon. This gamebird has thrived in farming areas and tends to covey up like quail.

Caseville School approves budget

By MARY DRIER
Caseville School District's projected 1990-91 general fund budget includes a \$20,191 shortfall, Board of Education members learned last week.

The Board approved the coming year's general fund budget, with projected revenues of \$1.41 million and expenditures of \$1.43 million.

"The anticipated shortfall will be offset by a \$653,334 fund equity," said Supt. James Stahl, referring to Caseville's reserve budget.

In other business, a 6:45 p.m. Truth and Taxation hearing will precede the regular 7 p.m. board of education meeting next Monday, July 9.

According to Stahl, the district stands to lose about \$58,000 unless it holds a Truth and Taxation hearing. "There is a Headlee Amendment section and there is a Truth and Taxation section provisions for districts to receive all of the funding that voters had approved and which section comes into play is determined by the assessors of- fice," Stahl said.

Either a Headlee Amend- ment override approved by voter ballot is needed or a Truth and Taxation hearing is needed to secure funding from increased State Equal- ized Valuation that exceeds the Consumer Price Index.

"We've seen a 7.13% in- crease in our State Equal- ized Valuation and the infla- tion rate is 4.8," Stahl said. "Our current millage is 18.25 and the projected roll back without the hearing is 17.3."

Stahl credits the \$4.68 million State Equalized Val- uation increase in the

amount of building going on along the shoreline and with the price of shoreline prop- erty.

"The last I heard the shore property was selling for \$1,000 a foot," he said.

Also, Caseville's Board approved an agreement with the Huron County Human Development Commission to adopt a Student Assistance Program for students at risk.

"The program will provide a mechanism for addressing at risk youths whose behav- ior interferes with the acade- mic and/or social develop- ment," Stahl said. "It is

here to help with substance abuse, depression, incest, family or health related is- sues.

"Before, if a student needed any kind of help, they had to go through three to four different agencies to find the right program, and with this Student Assistance Pro- gram it will only take one call."

Stahl noted there aren't any serious problems at the school with students and that is just a new program that has become available re- cently to handle emergen- cies.

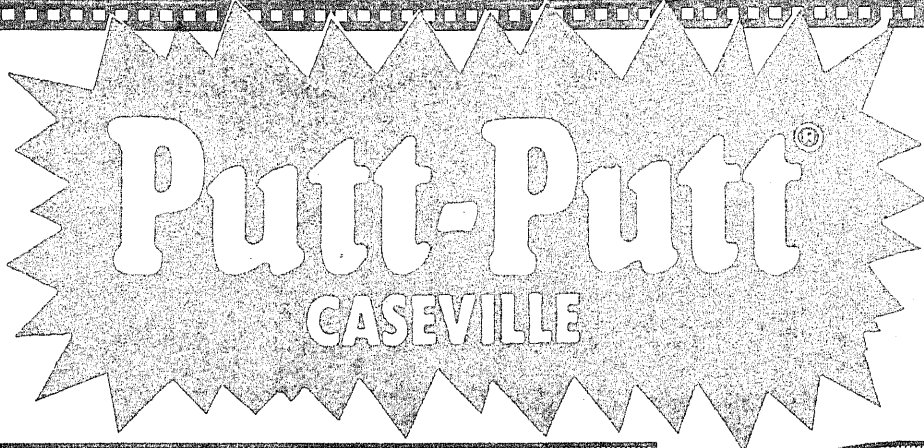

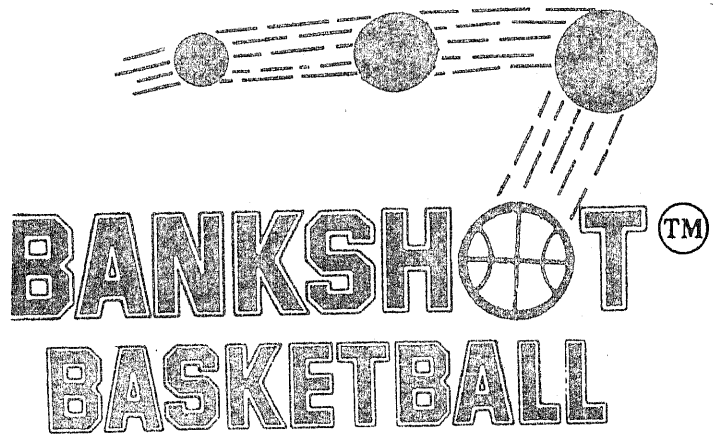

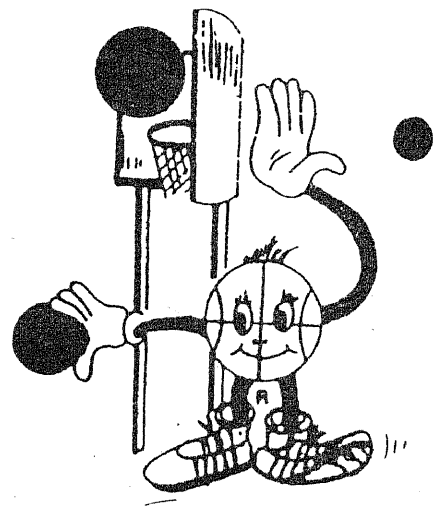
