





## JR. HIGH GETS MAIL FROM SAUDI ARABIA

Several weeks ago, students from Mr. Murphy's DEAR LAKER JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL social studies classes began correspondence with unknown armed services personnel serving our country in Saudi Arabia. The enthusiasm was contagious and as a result, many students sent cards and letters.

Last week, excitement reigned in the Jr. High social studies classroom once more. However, this time it wasn't because of letters sent, but of letters received. More than 25 letters from service men and women were delivered to the homes of the Jr. High students. Most of these letters were addressed to individual students, but one letter came addressed to the entire Jr. High School student body. Here is its content:

STUDENTS FROM MICHIGAN:

My unit, Third Marine Regiment from Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii, was thrilled to receive your letters today. The mail-camel was on time as usual, and Ali Baba, the mainman, had a whole stack of letters from well-wishers in the States. After we got up at the un-earthly hour of 0500 AM, most of us wandered down to our shower area for a drizzle provided by our Cenader. A Cenader is a 3,000 gallon water bag that has a motor attached that pumps water to shower outlets. A military water truck fills the bag every day and this is how we get

After shower and shave time, we all step over to the chow tent where a vehicle shows up at 0700 with our morning continental breakfast. After perusing the menu, which consists of scrambled eggs, gravy, bacon or spam, biscuits and warm milk, we order our meals. After the servers recover from their laughter due to the fact that theyknow we have only one choice on the menu, we form a line and get our

breakfast "buffet style." We usually have

and his family stop by and they really keep the place buzzing.

After breakfast, it's time for work in the desert. Some Marines do paperwork, planning and coordinating with other units in the shade of tents. Others get the prvilege of joining "working parties" who do outside chores such as digging holes in the sand and building sandbag fighting positions. Nobody complains about work. It is much better to be busy during the day doing something to make the time fly by, rather than sitting around or attempting the impossible — SLEEP. Have you ever tried to sleep when it is 105 degrees and your surroundings are getting sandblasted? We have a few interesting animals that Saudi Arabia. We have Omar the scorpion,

share our illustrious life in the sands of Ishmael the Black Beetle and Ahmed the Chihuawa dog look-alike prairie dog fox. Ahmed visits our guards at night and a few nights ago, he ran across the top of one of our tents. He has come close to a few of us, and likes our leftover food.

Our work is never really over, but most of us shut down at about 5:00 in the evening. It gets dark about about 5:30 in the evening and we cannot have any lights on after that. So some of us read undercover and others go to our command tent where there is a little light to use for different purposes. And that is a typical day in the

As you may have been told, letterreceiving time is our greatest moment of excitement during the day. "Will I get a letter today?" most of us wonder as the mail is issued out. Well, today no one had to worry about whether or not we were going to get a letter — there were letters for everyone! And you helped make this grand event happen. The Marines from Third Marine Regiment from Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii are glad you took the time to make our lives brighter today.

DEAR MR. MILLIONAIRE: I'm writing in behalf of my sister. Recently, her husband, who is a heavy drinker, deliberately set their house on fire. The house and all its contents, including her daughters' pet cats, were completely destroved.

Because it was arson, there will be no insurance money. Her husband was apprehended by the police, but he only works sporadically, so there will be no money coming from him.

My sister and her two daughters, ages 11 and 12, were at her son's house baby-sitting at the time of the fire. Thank God! Right now she and the girls are staying with her son. Eventually they will have to move to their own place, as the apartment is very small.

But for now, her immediate need is for bunk beds, bedding and towels. My sister does work as a data entry operator but doesn't make much money.

At the time of the fire, she had only \$22. The Red Cross gave her a \$200 clothing allowance, but as you can imagine, since they had only the clothes on their backs, that money was spent very quickly on bare necessities. My sister is a very gentle, kind, shy person and a good mother. I hope you can find it in your heart to help her get started on putting the lives of her little girls back together.-MRS. F.V., Phila-

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
