

The Middle East countries have been hot news items lately with continuing confrontations not only in Kuwait, but in Israel.

As the conflict between the Israelis and Palestinians continues, tourism has fallen and hotels in Jerusulem are nearly empty.

But for seven weeks this fall, one hotel in the city was occupied by students from Eastern Mennonite College, and Pigeon native Kevin Maust was among them.

He was one of 39 EMC students on a cross-cultural tour of Egypt, Israel, Greece and other European countries. The cross-cultural program is a requirement for graduation at Eastern Mennonite, Maust says, with some students participating in a three week program in the summer, and other opting for the semester long program.

Maust says he chose the Middle East program because "it seemed like it was the most interesting. There's more happening there."

The first leg of his trip took him to Egypt, where he spent three weeks traveling through the country. While there, he visited the Great Pyramids and climbed Mount Sinai.

"The Pyramids were incredible," Maust says. "The stones they used were so huge, and just for a tomb for a king."

Maust's longest stay was in Israel, where he spent seven weeks taking part in tours and lectures, learning about the Arab-Israeli conflict.

Israel was once a hot tourist attraction, but since tensions have risen in recent months, hotels have stood empty. "We just about had the hotel to ourselves," Maust says.

On the second day of their stay in Jerusulem, Maust says they were startled by an explosion.

"People started running around, and we found that some Palestinians had thrown grenades at some soldiers," he says. But even

that experience didn't make him nervous, he says.

'We were never the targets. We were never really scared. And it seems so foreign, but after a while you get used to it," he says.

And before the students left the country, they were reminded of the tensions in the region as Israelis were handing out gas masks to residents. Even their hotel had a supply for their guests, he says.

One of the most memorable scenes was the Gaza Strip, which is home to thousands of Palestinians, Maust says. "It was pitiful. The people are just packed in there, with sewage running in the streets," he says.

By law, the Palestinians aren't allowed to build permanent homes there, so they live in shacks with no foundations, he explained.

It was hard to get used to seeing soldiers walking everywhere, Maust says.

'It's so much different from here," he said, and that was the whole point of the

trip, to expose the students to differing opinions and customs.

On their trips to the Wailing Wall, the students were required to wear varmulkes out of respect to the Jewish custom.

The students studied the wish and Moslem religions and customs, not only in the classroom, but also by getting to know local people and reading local newspapers that give different viewpoints of the conflicts.

"I got to know one Palestinian real well. He took us Temple Mount (where in August, Israeli soldiers shot and killed Palestinians who they said threw rocks down on praying Jews), and we collected spent rifle shells," Maust says.

"He told us that he was in a shop and heard what was going on and ran to help. He was in an ambulance helping to transport people, and they arrested him and he spent 17 days in jail. He said they searched the ambulance be-





Vera Irene Bowman, 86 of Pigeon, passed away Saturday, Dec. 22 at Scheurer Hospital, Pigeon.


