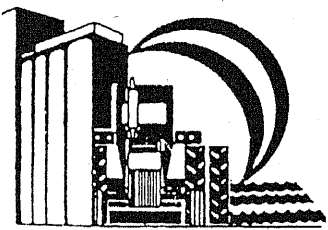

12 volunteers become EMTs

Scheurer Ambulance at full-staff

The Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Service is making headlines again.

This time, it's all good news as 12 new ambulance workers have been added to the roster, giving much-needed relief to the 10 ambulance workers presently providing service 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

These 12 new ambulance workers have just completed intensive Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training and are ready to take their state licensing test.

Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Service Captain Beth Swartzendruber, who has held the coordinator's job since January, is optimistic that most, if not all, of the 12 will pass the test to become fully-certified EMTs.

The ones who do not pass, she says, are able to re-take the test in the near future, and can serve as "first responders" to an emergency situation.

"Technically, 'first responders' have the same training as EMTs and are able to do all the procedures that EMTs do, but they need to perform under the supervision of an EMT," explains Swartzendruber.

The Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Service had been in danger of closing last winter, unless a new crop of EMTs would be found.

"Out of a roster of 10 ambulance workers, we had only five or six who were available to be on call all year long," says Swartzendruber. "That put a terrific strain on a very small crew. At that time, the EMTs were on call for seven straight 24-hour days at least every other week."

But Swartzendruber is quick to praise the dedication of that crew, saying proudly that the Scheurer Hospital Ambulance was only "out of service" three or four times for just a few hours at a time since last winter.

"Out of service" means that the ambulance does not run and is replaced by another ambulance service, usually because of a conflict of scheduling workers.

Now that the Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Service appears to be on more stable ground, Swartzendruber is eager to thank the EMTs who

helped work through the "crisis."

Presently on the ambulance crew are: Marty Thiel, Glen Richmond, Bill Esch, Karen Anklam, Jim Hartman, Beth Swartzendruber, Wayne Swartzendruber, Deirdra Pittman, Art Priebe and Ben Willenburg.

Swartzendruber also thanks Elkton Ambulance worker Bill Bittner, who "enabled us to keep our service going this winter and spring when we were so short-handed."

The EMT classes began in February and were just completed in mid-July. Teach-

ing the class was Sylvia Levitt, a paramedic for Bay Medical Center.

Providing assistance to the class were Ellen Engler, Huron County Emergency Services coordinator; Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Captain Beth Swartzendruber and Huron County Sheriff Mike Gage.

"We are thrilled that the people of the Western Thumb responded so generously with their time when we made a desperate call for EMTs. I really feel our ambulance service is on a strong footing once again."

Dale Schuette had a cattleman's worst nightmare come true last Thursday morning, when 61 animals broke through a gate and escaped from his Berne Road farm northwest of Elkton. With the help of dozens of fellow farmers, friends, horsemen and even aircraft, 55 cattle were rounded up as of Monday morning. Some had traveled six miles, and — as this photo shows — sometimes a cornfield-by-cornfield search was necessary.

"We try to 'spook 'em' back to the road," Schuette said. "It's hard to believe all the help you get. Everybody's pitching in." He gave special thanks to the Iseler horse team, plus the Sheriff's Department Posse.

One of the black beef animals died, and they were difficult to see in the deep corn — even from the air.

2 weeks 'til AutumnFest!

There are only two weeks left before the summer's last big festival -- the Elktion AutumnFest -- and organizers are finalizing plans for the annual celebration Aug. 30 through Sept. 2.

Several new events are on the schedule this year, including a quilt and craft show at the Youth Center, a muzzle-loading shoot and encampment, Pee Wee soccer, pedal tractor pull, bingo games sponsored by the Elktion Lions club, and a Saturday night stage show featuring the Christian singing group One Accord.

One event not on the schedule this year is the popular fireworks on Saturday night, according to Pest co-chairman Walt Forster.

Allied Industrial Workers Local 628 sponsored the fireworks in previous years, but a lockout at Active Industries earlier this year depleted the union's treasury.

"We'd like to have fireworks since it draws so many people into town," Forster said.

The AutumnFest Teen Queen will be crowned on Friday night at Elktion Elementary School, along with the Senior King and Queen. And the Sally Doerr Dancers will perform at the school, followed by a Teen Dance at the tennis courts in Ackerman Park.

Saturday's events include a flea market, old engine and tractor display by the Thumb

Area Old Engine & Tractor Association and the Thumb Two-Cylinder Club, a toy tractor display, the Parade, quilt and craft show, a chicken barbecue by the Elktion-Oliver Firemen and the Elktion Chamber of Commerce, free taxi rides through town, the kids' pedal tractor pull, horseshoe tournament, Pee Wee soccer, radio-controlled airplanes, bingo, the stage show and a family dance.

Then on Sunday, the ever-popular Auto Show gets underway at the Park. There's

also the community worship service, the old engine and tractor displays, an exhibition of dog obedience and police work, a chain saw contest, pony pull, mud volleyball and lawnmower races.

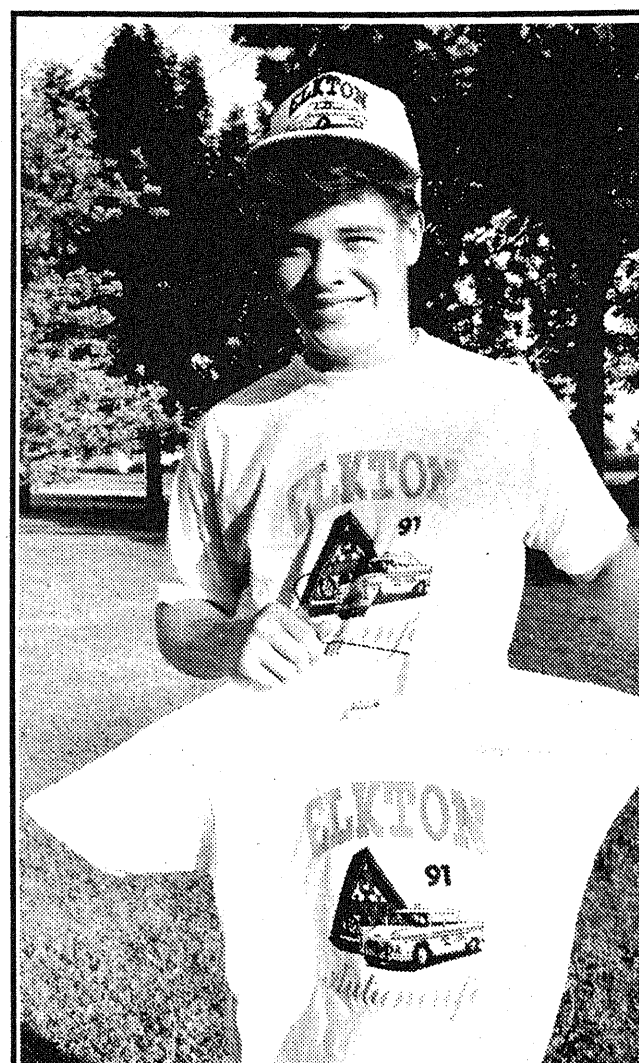

Huron redistricting begins

Shifting population in the Thumb has Huron County -- and others -- restructuring roles for their commissioners.

The Huron County Redistricting Committee is con-

sidering the change to a seven member Huron County Board of Commissioners from its current six member board.

"A goal of seven commissioner districts was set," according to county Clerk

Helen Lemanski. "This goal is to be achieved without splitting existing townships and with a divergence not to exceed 11.9% between commissioner districts."

Redistricting is done every 10 years and during the past decade the population in Huron County has dropped from 36,459 to 34,951.

Before the redistricting a decade ago, Huron County had a seven member board of commissioners.

The current even number of six commissioners has created several problems with tied votes on important issues.

The Redistricting Committee consists of County Clerk Helen Lamanski, County Treasurer Roberta Moettell, Prosecuting Attorney Leslie A. Hagen, Huron County Democratic Committee Chairman Roy Reynolds and Huron County Republican Committee Chairman Warren Krohn.

Redistricting began July 31 and the committee has 60 days to complete the project and present their results to Lansing.

The committee is studying maps and current census figures to guide them in their efforts at redistricting.

The next three meetings of the committee are scheduled for 4 p.m. on Wednesday, August 21, Tuesday, Sept. 3 and Friday, Sept. 6.

Currently, the Western Thumb's county commission districts include:

District 1, served by Bruce Kuhl, covers Sebawaing, Brookfield, Fair Haven and McKinley Townships;

District 2 served by R. Dale Wertz includes Chandler, Winsor, Oliver, Grant and Sheridan Townships;

District 3 served by Martha Thummel and covers Lake, Caseville, Hume, Meade and Pt. Aux Barques Townships.

Red Hacker Tourney nets success!

What event brought almost 900 players and 4,000 spectators to the Village of Pigeon for a weekend of fun?

It was the 1991 Red Hacker Tourney, and Bluewater Youth for Christ organizers are calling the popular three-on-three basketball tourney held during the Pigeon Farmers' Festival a "huge success."

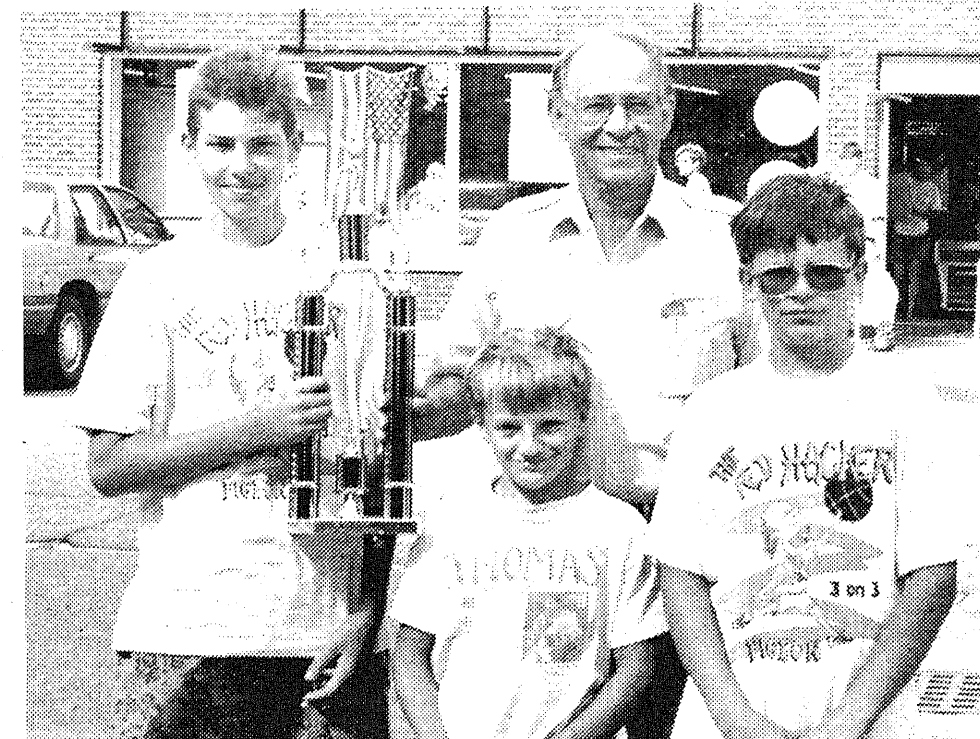
The tourney netted over \$10,000 for Youth for Christ funding and put Pigeon "on the map" of successful three-on-three tourneys, according to Redford Maust, one of the primary organizers.

"We are especially appreciative for the support of area businesses, for without them, the tournament could not have been a reality."

The Red Hacker Tourney grew from 25 teams playing the first year to over 100 teams playing last year. This year, 214 teams participated with 856 players.

Teams came from as far away as Traverse City, Harbor Springs, Grand Rapids, Indiana, Ohio and one player brought friends from Vermont and New York.

the Red Hacker is going to grow as it had developed a

reputation of being "a clean tournament," explains Maust.

"We aren't going to work hard at getting the word out next year as we feel the groundwork has already been laid these first few years."

Maust realizes, though, that tournament growth is inevitable, as three-on-three basketball has become such a popular sport.

"It has been a great situation in Pigeon, because a person will play and will bring his or her family to enjoy the community where the tournament is being played. Our spectators really

enjoyed all the Farmers' Festival activities."

He does say that tournament organizers may have to look at holding the tournament on a different weekend away from the Festival.

"Our 80-plus volunteers have a double-commitment between the Festival and the Tourney and it's hard. Plus it's difficult for the Festival and Tourney to work schedules around their respective events."

"One thing is for sure. The Red Hacker Tourney is growing in popularity and more and more people are hearing about Pigeon, Michigan!"

BAD AXE STORE TO CLOSE

Customers have been informed that the Bad Axe Polewacz Store will be closed, following upcoming sales of the entire stock and fixtures. Jim Polewacz gave no reason for the liquidation in a letter to preferred customers and friends, but clothing competition has been heating up since Wal Mart opened earlier this year and since K Mart is doubling its store size.

The Polewacz Department Store chain was established in Minden City in 1926 by the late W. R. Polewacz. Currently, stores are operated in Pigeon, Harbor Beach, Sandusky, Marlette and Richmond. Pigeon resident Meldrum Baerwolf has been president of the corporation since 1965.

CROP PLOT TOUR AUG. 21

Huron County Cooperative Extension Service begins its annual Crop Plot Tour on Wednesday, Aug. 21 with a 1:30 p.m. visit to the Ubyl FFA corn variety plot one-half mile south of Ubyl. Ten early varieties are being grown. At 2:15 p.m., the Mel Gringrich farm east of Bad Axe Road on Wadsworth Road is the next goal, to discuss the SP53 program being conducted with the Water Quality Project.

The Gary Krug farm three miles south of Bad Axe on Bad Axe Road is the 3 p.m. destination, to see seven navy bean and three black bean varieties. Then, the Mike Hatlas corn plots on Canboro Road one mile west of M-53 may be inspected. Bruce and Curt Krohn's corn variety site west of Mad Axe on M-53 includes mid-season varieties, ending the afternoon portion of the tour by 5 p.m.

The tour resumes at 7 p.m. at the Jim and Terry Krohn farm on M-142 west of Pinnebog Road, where Dry Bean Research Director Greg Varner will discuss dry bean varieties, bean diseases and other concerns. Extension Ag Agent Jim LeCureux has details, at 269-9918.
