12 volunteers become EMTs

Scheurer Ambulance at full-staft

The Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Service is making headlines again.

This time, it's all good news as 12 new ambulance workers have been added to the roster, giving much-needed relief to the 10 ambulance workers presently providing service 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

These 12 new ambulance workers have just completed intensive Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training and are ready to take their state licensing test.

Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Service Captain Beth Swartzendruber, who has held the coordinator's job since January, is optimistic that most, if not all, of the 12 will pass the test to become fully-certified EMTs.

The ones who do not pass, she says, are able to re-take the test in the near future, and can serve as "first responders" to an emergency situation.

"Technically, 'first responders' have the same training as EMTs and are able to do all the procedures that EMTs do, but they need to perform under the supervision of an EMT," explains Swartzendruber.

The Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Service had been in danger of closing last winter, unless a new crop of EMTs would be found.

"Out of a roster of 10 ambulance workers, we had only five or six who were available to be on call all year long," says Swartzendruber. "That put a terrific strain on a very small crew. At that time, the EMTs were on call for seven straight 24-hour days at least every other week."

But Swartzendruber is quick to praise the dedication of that crew, saying proudly that the Scheurer Hospital Ambulance was only "out of service" three or four times for just a few hours at a time since last winter.

"Out of service" means that the ambulance does not run and is replaced by another ambulance service, usually because of a conflict of scheduling workers.

Now that the Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Service appears to be on more stable ground, Swartzendruber is eager to thank the EMTs who helped work through the "crisis."

Presently on the ambulance crew are: Marty Thiel, Glen Richmond, Bill Esch, Karen Anklam, Jim Hartman, Beth Swartzendruber, Wayne Swartzendruber, Deirdra Pittman, Art Priebe and Ben Willenburg.

Swartzendruber also thanks Elkton Ambulance worker Bill Bittner, who "enabled us to keep our service going this winter and spring when we were so shorthanded."

The EMT classes began in February and were just completed in mid-July. Teach-

ing the class was Sylvia Levitt, a paramedic for Bay Medical Center.

Providing assistance to the class were Ellen Engler, Huron County Emergency Services coordinator: Scheurer Hospital Ambulance Captain Beth Swartzendruber and Huron County Sheriff Mike Gage.

"We are thrilled that the people of the Western Thumb responded so generously with their time when we made a desperate call for EMTs. I really feel our ambulance service is on a strong footing once again."



The Gary Krug farm three miles south of Bad Axe on Bad Axe Road is the 3 p.m. destination, to see seven navy bean and three black bean varieties. Then, the Mike Hatlas corn plots on Canboro Road one mile west of M-53 may be inspected. Bruce and Curt Krohn's corn variety site west of Mad Axe on M-53 includes mid-season versions, ending the afternoon portion of the tour by 5 p.m.
