## LOOKING BACK at the Year 1991

### January, 1991

The Village of Caseville received a \$213,304 grant from the state Department of Commerce Communities in Transition program. The money will be used to develop a parking lot plan for the village, including analysis of traffic and pedestrian flows. The rest of the grant monies will be used to possible purchase of land, signs, and construction.

**JEREMY SIEWERT** is the first baby born at Schuerer Hospital. He's the son of James and Tammy Siewert of Pigeon, and he made his entrance into the world on Jan. 2.

Bay Port dairy farmer **BRUCE BAUR** was named the top producer for the Huron County Dairy Herd Improvement Association, for producing the highest dollar earned per cow. In 1990, his farm operation produced 23,382 lbs. of milk per cow for a dollar value of \$3,486 per cow.

The Pigeon Chamber of Commerce welcomed new board members at a meeting at Greenfields. **PAUL HEINRICH**, **SUE MEYERSIECK**, and **TY HENDERSON** are the new members, replacing **LINDA GARDY** and **BILL ESCH**.

More than 700 workers at Active Industries, Inc., in Elkton, were idled by a lockout at the auto stamping plant after workers rejected a proposed new contract.

Huron Casting, Inc. has announced plans for a \$1.1 million expansion program which will expand the foundry's capacity by 50% and could bring up to 25 more jobs to the Pigeon plant.

Yellow ribbons are going up all over the Thumb, and the nation, as soldiers are sent to Saudi Arabia for Operation Desert Shield.

**STEVE KAUFFMAN** and **RON BECKETT** have been selected to participate in the 1991 Michigan Lions All-State Band. Beckett and Kauffman are members of the Laker High School band program under the direction of William Denbrock.

A crash investigation team from Selfridge Air National Guard Base is sifting through the rubble of an F-16A Air National Guard Falcon fighter to find out why it crashed near Sebawaing. The jet, piloted by Brig. Gen. Errol Stump of Lansing, the Commander of the Michigan Air National Guard, crashed in snow-covered fields owned by Kendall Stoeckle of Bay Port, about four miles north of Sebawaing on Haiat Road in Fair Haven Township. Stump parachuted to safety and walked to a nearby house, then he was taken to Schuerer Hospital in Pigeon with minor injuries, then transported to Wurtsmith Air Force Base in Oscoda.

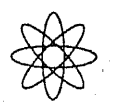

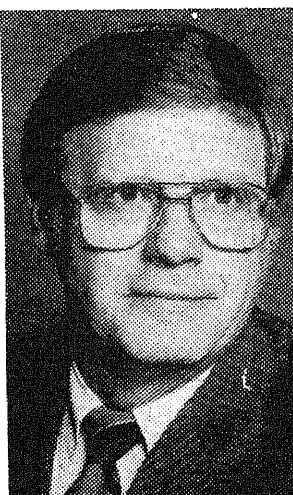
## Harold Robinson joins Bay Port State Bank

**DESK-CLEARING:** ■ A very good story in a recent "Crain's Detroit Business" said Christmas tree farmers can make about \$1.50 per tree... but it's a long, slow process. Starting with seedlings (12 cents for Scotch Pine to 60 cents for Douglas fir) at the rate of 1200 seedlings per acre, it takes six to 10 years until trees are in the 8- to 9-foot range. Retail prices of \$13 to \$55 (with most averaging \$20 to \$40) sound like a lot of money, but the annual pruning and maintenance means that profit of \$1.50 per tree is about average.

Michigan has 1500 Christmas tree farms, a leader among the 42 states that grow the holiday trees. Our state harvested 6.5 million trees this year — and 80% are exported to other states or countries...

■ **TOP THREE TV SHOWS** last week: "Roseanne," "60 Minutes," and "NFL Monday Night Football."

■ Last week's **BOTTOM THREE SHOWS:** "Eerie, Ind.," "The Torkelsons" and "Fox Night at the Movies" ...

### CASEVILLE NOMINATIONS SOUGHT

Nominating petitions are now available for five elected positions in Caseville Village Government, as the charter village plans its March 9 General Election.

Nominating petitions may be picked up at the Village Hall by residents interested in submitting their names for the posts. Petitions must be filed at the office of Village Controller/Deputy Clerk Pamela Stahl before 4 p.m. on Jan. 20. The Village Hall is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

### WATER LEVELS ARE FALLING

The water level of Lake Huron is down .05 feet for the week ending Dec. 27, compared with the previous height, and now stands at 578.03 feet, according to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The 30-day forecast indicates the Lake Huron level will fall one inch, the Corps says.

Record high for the end-of-year report was 581.26 feet, as measured in 1986, while the record low was 575.26 feet, as measured in 1964, the Corps says.

### BRITS: COME TO GREAT LAKES

Planetoads and busloads of British tourists will come to the Great Lakes' states this year, if the dreams and plans of the region's governors come true. A U.S. tourism promotion began airing on British TV this month, as President Bush invites royal subjects to the scenic wonders of America.

The campaign portrays the lakes as "North America's Fresh Coast," and more than 1200 tour groups from the United Kingdom visited Michigan last year. That's part of 2.2 million overall British people who visited the U.S. last year.

If a typical British family stays here for 10 days and spends an average of \$300 per day, the "Fresh Coast" program brought nearly \$40 million to the Midwest last year and \$3.6 million to Michigan in 1991. About \$1.6 million is being spent on the overall promotional campaign to buy TV time in Britain, observers say.

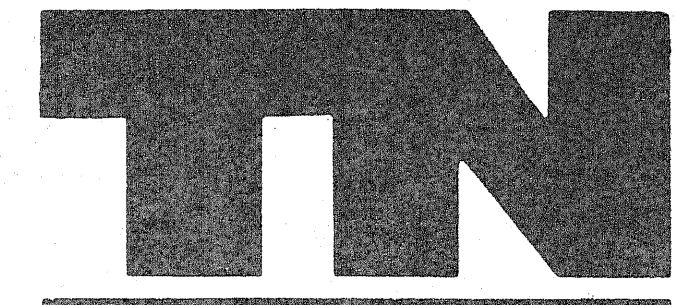
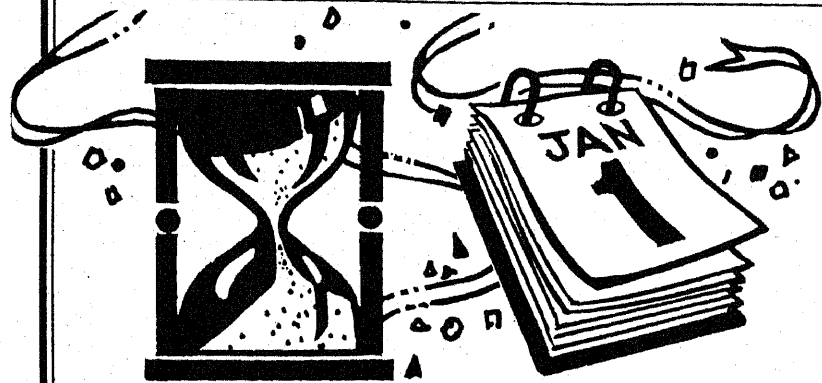

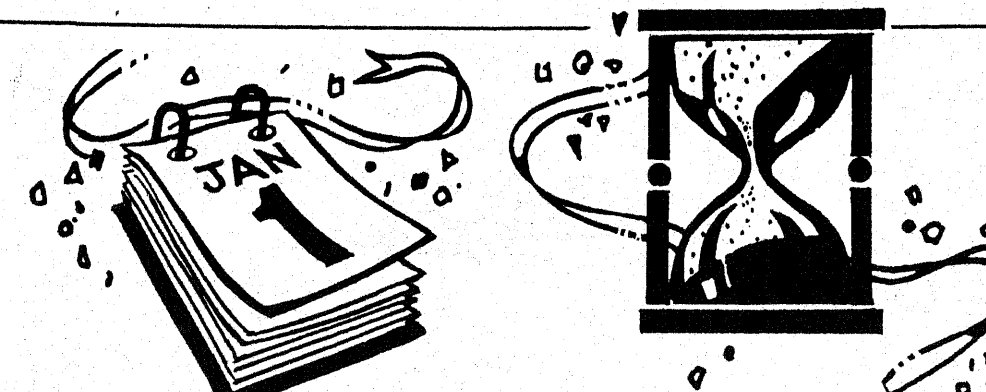
