All of the necessary food items have been bought for a proper breakfast in bed on my big day: eggs, English muffins, coffee, bacon, and Pop Tarts.



The main part of the breakfast was 12 glasses of water. Some of the water was to wash down what I ate. The other requests for water were to distract them while I hid what I



## 'Miss Cahill's quilt' is displayed again

Gilman was Zelda Cahill when she came to Sebewaing Public School from Indian River. Here she married Arthur Davis in 1936 and he passed away four months later of strep

In 1939 she took a teaching position in Petoskey and retired in 1972 after 41 years of teaching. She also lived in Midland, where she re-married. She and her husband traveled extensively, visiting Europe, countries and islands in the Pacific, and Canada and the

U.S.. Three years ago she was widowed again.
While teaching elementary school in Sebewaing, Gilman had her students make quilt blocks, with figures, animals or scenes and their own names sewn in. She kept that quilt top through the years, and sent it ahead when she arranged with Arts Council officials

to take part in the April embroidery and fine arts displays here. 


