

If you are in doubt, check the last two issues.





USA plans Sept. 27 election for centralized campus

USA School District officials are waiting for legal counsel to approve ballot language for the district's Monday, Sept. 27, bond request election. The district's lawyers, Thurn, Ma-atsch and Nordberg of Lansing, must okay ballot language that, if approved, would make the three-campus district a dual-campus district.

The bond issue amount and number of years are not to be announced until the lawyers have looked everything over, said Board President Raymond Bauer.

After two years of the studying ways to streamline the district and cut expenses, a citizens' facility group approved placing a bond issue before voters that would add a middle school facility to the district's high school and pay for upgrades to other facilities.

Plans are to close the middle school in Sebewaing and add 11 classrooms, a multi-purpose room, media center, office and athletic facility at the high school complex. The proposal also provides upgrading the existing high school plus elementary school in Unionville.

In other concerns at the July meeting, the USA Board:

approved borrowing \$1. 35 million against anticipated taxes, to help with cash flow. The money is needed to meet payroll and expenses this fall until tax payments are received, said Supt. William Dodge, and is an annual proce-

The boy, who is in the process of being adopted by the Eichler Family, is suspected of using a propane torch to set the fire in the hallway of one of the 280-ft. coops, according to Huron County Sheriff's Deputy Elwood Smith. The fire caused more than \$500,000 in building and equipment losses alone, while the loss of the chickens and their production is expected to push that figure higher. A second coop was also destroyed, along with a shipping building and part


As you page through this week's issue of The News- starting 20 years ago. weekly, take a look at all the 20th Farmers' Festival. There is something going on every day now through Sunday.




Dedication Marks Farmers' Days Celebration

Schubach Ostrich Farm tours offered for Farmers' Festival

By AMY HEIDEN

Five years ago, Jack Schubach came home from a trip to Texas with five small young ostriches. Back then, Schubach was farming and working for a local contrac-

Those five young birds and their relatives have allowed Schubach to quit farming and devote all his time to raising ostriches.

He's become a full-time breeder, shipping young birds and eggs all over the

Right now, Schubach has about 70 birds of all ages, from days-old chicks to older breeding birds.

Elkton resident Schubach is one of a growing number of breeders of the giant birds who are trying to establish markets for the birds.

"The ostriches have meat that is low-fat, low-cholesterol, and high-protein, Schubach says.

"The meat is sweeter than beefand much more tender." The shells of unfertilized eggs, which are about 1/8 inch thick, are used to make jewelry, while the hides from the birds can be used to make

are used for dusters. "They're very easy to take care of," Schubach says. "They're remarkably disease-free and they adapt to the cold.

Of course, tall fencing is required, as the birds usually grow up to 8 1/2 feet. They're usually long-lived, sometimes living up to 70

But during that long life-time, the females produce an egg every other day or so. There's a ready market for both the eggs and the young

birds, Schubach says. Some of his birds and eggs are shipped out by truck,

while others go by plane.
Schubach's Tip-of-the-Thumb Ostrich Farm will be one of the farming operations featured during the

Machines boost Farm Crest production

Chickens produce eggs ev-

eryday, just like cows produce milk day in and day

eggs nearly half a million chickens can produce in a

To keep up with that neverending production, Farm Crest Foods, a division of Active Feed in Pigeon, has installed a new egg-grading cleaning, and grading 108,000 eggs per hour.

"The machine is more accurate than people," Plant Manager Scott Maust says. We installed it in an effort to increase our efficiency and out to our customers."

After the chickens lay the eggs, they roll down a long conveyor belt into the packaging room. As they enter the new ma-

chine, they're washed thoroughly, then rinsed with recirculated water and again with fresh water. Then they're visually inspected for blood spots and dirt. The eggs then pass over a

series of sensors that use sonar to check for minute cracks in their shells.


The machine grades the eggs for size and keeps track of which eggs should go into which carton. Jumbo eggs are sent to one packaging station, while larges, smalls, mediums and checks (eggs with small cracks) all travel by conveyor to their respecive stations for packaging.

Wind speed regulation standards now exist for military flight exercises - following the fatal Nov. 30, 1991, crash of an Air National Guard jet in eastern

On that date, a A-7D jet piloted by Lt. Michael W. Young, 29, of the 180th Tactical Fighter Group, Toledo Express Airport, out of Swanton Ohio, crashed near Hu-

Young and LTC Robert Buchwald were on a basic fighter maneuver mission in the Peck Military Operating Airspace (MOA) in the Thumb when Young died.

There was a low cloud deck that day and the pilots determined they would work at 6,000 feet, the official report

Shortly after they executed their first maneuver, Buchwald testified he realized something was wrong.

"I can't honestly say, the first time I looked at him (Young) whether his nose was swinging and pointing straight down, or if it was kind of a pull, where he had hard-pulled to the right and kind of come back left.
