Lakers drop Patriots, 43-16

The Lakers and the USA Patriots met for their first game of the season, with the Lakers coming out on top, 43-16 in non-league play Friday night at the Laker Field.

The Patriots threatened early in the first quarter, driving to the one yard line before being stopped by a tenacious Laker defense.

A possession later, the Lakers' Don Osentoski scampered in for the first score of the game, and then added the two point conversion.

But early in the second quarter, the Patriots' Jeff Ertman bullied his way in the end zone for their first TD. Tony Sokol made it into the corner of the end zone for the extra two points to tie the game at eight each.

Chris Schember later added six points on a sweeping run but the two point conversion attempt failed, and the half ended with the Lakers up 14-8.

Schember added another touchdown in the third quar-

ter, and then ran for the extra two points to make the score 22-8. His third touchdown came later in the quarter, but the conversion attempt failed. Eric Maust scored the Lakers' fourth touchdown early in the fourth quarter to put the game out of reach and the extra point kick by exchange student Raul Arbelo was good to make the score 35-8

The Patriots weren't done yet, though, as Ertman found his way into the end zone once again, then added the two point conversion.

Ben Krebs scored the last Laker touchdown and Chad Elenbaum added t he two points to give the Lakers a 43-16 victory.

The Lakers only score came on a fourth quarter touchdown by Tom Marks, following a Nate Gotts pass to Zac King for a 30-yd. gain to set up the play.

For the Patriots, Dave Scharich was the leading rusher with 89 yards, while Chad Mead had 70 yards and Paul Mitchell had 60 yards. Jason Martens had 11 tackles, while Greg Arebello had nine and Chad Mead had seven.

Eric Gardy was the leading rusher for the Lakers.

Critical talks in 3 schools...

Contract negotiations in 20 school districts statewide, including three in Tuscola County, are at a critical stage according to the Michigan Education Association.

The Tuscola Intermediate School District is the most recent addition to the critical list. TISD teachers have been without contract since Aug. 31, 1992.

The situation in the TISD has gone to a neutral, third-party fact finder who will gather information from both sides and render a non-binding opinion.

The TISD joins Mayville and Millington Districts on the MEA list, which says negotiations have reached a critical stage and that work stoppages are possible if the current bargaining climate continues.

Also, there are no teachers' contracts in the Owendale-Gagetown or Harbor Beach Districts in Huron County, but they have not been placed on the MEA's critical list.

The three Thumb districts join 176 teacher units and 169 support personnel units who were without a contract when the 1993-94 school year began last week.



MICHIGAN by the numbers

THAT'S A BIG LAKE: Our nearby Lake Huron, now at 71 degrees (likely its warmest water temperature of 1993,) is actually combined with Lake Michigan into one large lake, as they merge under the Mackinac Bridge at Mackinaw City.

Counties to lose \$3 million?

Michigan's sweeping change in financing schools as approved last month by Gov. John Engler and the Legislature also promises major impact in county government funding — with a possible \$3 million loss to the Thumb's four counties.

As part of property tax reform, Gov. Engler wants to cut \$600 million in funding for statutory revenue-sharing. That is state aid to local governments, which helps provide police and fire protection, road repairs and other such services.

"County governments are concerned with the ripple effects the Governor's decision will have on their revenue base in three areas," said Tuscola County Controller Michael Hoagland. "There will be a complete freeze on any new property tax revenue for the 1995 county budget year which estimates to about \$261,000 that the county would have gained that year, but won't."

According to Hoagland, the most significant financial impact is in revolving delinquent taxes, which are charges on collection of late taxes—an important revenue source for the county. Ultimately, the changes could mean a \$400,000 to \$500,000 revenue loss, said Hoagland, noting the matter is compounded with the expected loss of revenue sharing.

"The commissioners are sympathetic and no one is opposed to the reform that is going on," said Hoagland. "It's just that they have to protect the county's revenue base or ultimately county government won't be able to deliver the



Communities in Tuscola and Huron Counties view completion of M-24 as a route of opportunity economic and

A brain-storming meeting in Sebewaing last Monday addressed ways to show state officials the urgent need for the highway's completion.

The proposed extension of M-24 from Caro to meet M-138 near Akron and then join M-25 in Unionville has been on the books for over 30

The project's longevity is the problem — because forested wetlands along the originally route were not an environmental issue in the mid-1960s, but are today.

Construction work began five years ago on the north and south ends of the route, begun this fall.

However, the state Department of Natural Resources in June denied the state Department of Transportation's request to fill 6.6 acres of wetland in that middle section and do culvert and drain work for the roadway. The

A highway is more than the 8.3-mile cross-country

The wetlands in the middle of the project didn't come to light until recently.

Monday's meeting sought persons or businesses who would suffer an economic impact from the proposed change in route, its delay and possible demise.

"We are looking for hard economic facts, not emotional pleas, that would convince the DNR to reverse their stance during the reevaluation and go back to the original cross-county route," said Sebewaing Village Council member Rod-

ney Tietz. Staying with the Bieble Road corridor is the only hope of getting the road in the near future, said John Kelsch MDOT District Engineer, Saginaw.

The DNR Commission is holding public meetings this Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 8 and 9, at the Holiday Inn South, Lansing, and will take testimony on the project.

Eleven programmable telephones have been placed in different departments where the "old-style" tape physical therapists, social workers, radiologists - anyone having medical contact with a patient at Scheurer Hospital, Pigeon.

Now, instead of HIMS employes making twice-daily treks around the hospital to pick up recorder tapes before transcribing them, people using the new dictation system need only to pick up a phone, punch in the correct codes and the information is automatically recorded on a computer disk in the HIMS office.

Another interesting note, according to HIMS Director Suzanne LeMaire, is that any phone, anywhere, can be used for dictation - even a car phone, provided that the caller knows the correct codes to key into the dictation system. That means a physician can dictate medical information while traveling or away from a regular system

"A system like this one had never previously been available to us at an affordable price for a small hospital." says LeMaire. "With this system we can expand and grow as the hospital does. We're planning ahead for the fu-
