Re-enactors perform in 'Gettysburg'

Nearly everyone dreams of being in the movies, even in a small part, but few of us realize that dream.

The dream came true for local Civil War buffs Jon Frazho and Will Eichler, who appear in the new movie "Gettysburg," produced by television mogul Ted Turner.

The movie is now showing in theaters throughout the country and critics have raved about it.

"Gettysburg" depicts the epoch battle between Union and Confederate forces in 1863 in Gettysburg, Pa., one which proved to be a turning point in the only war fought on American soil. More than

53,000 casualties were reported from the battle, making it the costliest conflict ever inflicted in this coun-

Thousands of extras were needed to film the movie, and Bay Port resident Frazho and Pigeon resident Eichler were among the volunteers who answered the call to reenact Pickett's Charge.

Both have plenty of experience in re-enacting that period of American history, as they are members of the Cumberland Guard, based in Lansing.

But movie-making is a different process than they thought it would be, Eichler

During a week of filming in August 1992, the two endured long waits and sweltering heat in their wool uniforms. The movie took 10 weeks to film.

"They didn't understand how military re-enactors operate," Eichler said. "They gave us too much time.

'They'd come to get us for breakfast and we'd be dressed and have our food eaten in 15 minutes, and they gave us an hour and a half for that. We sat there and waited and waited.

More than 100 re-enactors from Michigan took part in the movie, joining hundreds of others from across the country in helping make the

movie as authentic as possible.

"I did it for the experience and the chance to be a part of something that is good history" Eichler said. Frazho said he thought the

experience would be fun, but "I wanted to do it not so much to see myself in a movie but so I could educate other people that don't know much about the Civil War."

Both have been dedicated Civil Warre-enactors for several years, taking part in encampments all over the state.

And over the years, they've collected an impressive array of equipment used to make the encampments as realistic as possible.

And because re-enactors want their equipment to be as close to the original as possible, Turner especially. wanted volunteers with their own equipment.

"They saved a lot of money on props because we brought our own, which was more authentic anyway," Eichler

The movie was originally titled "Killer Angels," Eichler said, but Turner changed it, not wanting moviegoers to believe the film was about the Hell's Angels bikers.

Thumb transpo study done

Findings of a regional transportation need's study of the Thumb are completed and public copies are now available. Ecosometrics of Maryland will present the Thumb Regional Transportation report this Wednesday, Nov. 3 in a 7 p.m. meeting at the Franklin Inn, Bad Axe.

The study examined the potential needs for transportation in Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac and Lapeer Counties, and the need to transport people to Bay City, Saginaw, Lapeer and Port Huron.

"State and federal officials are looking more and more to regional transportation systems," said Jennifer Leitzel, manager of Tuscola County's Thumbody Express. "Regional transportation is an important element in the future growth of the Thumb, and we need access to medical technology and employment opportunities available in surrounding

cities. We are so limited here in the Thumb. Huron, Sanilac and Lapeer Counties have county-wide service. Tuscola County offers bus service in the Caro Area.

"When area residents need medical services outside of the area all we can do is sympathize with them because our transit systems can't leave their designated areas," said Leitzel.

The year-long study was funded by a grant from the state Department of Transportation. - By MARY DRIER

Bomb suspects caught


Huron County police agencies have four suspects in several bomb threats phoned to area schools last week.

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Michigan Sugar's Flegenheimer to retire

Michigan Sugar Company's President and Chief Executive Officer Ernest Flegenheimer will retire his post at the end of the 1993, according to a company announcement Thursday.

He will continue in his position as director of Michigan Sugar Co. and its parent company, Savannah Foods & Industries, Inc., of Savannah, GA.

Flegenheimer is wellknown in the Thumb and throughout the company's four factory districts. He has regularly attended grower meetings and many events in the area that are connected with the beet growing and processing industries.

Flegenheimer was elected president of Michigan Sugar on Aug. 1, 1963, and CEO in 1970, when his father, Albert Flegenheimer, became honorary chairman. He served as company president for the past 30 years, longer than any predecessor in the

Michigan Sugar sales and production increased dramatically under the Flegenheimer leadership.

In his first year, the company produced 160 million pounds of sugar from about 50,000 acres of beets, and sales totaled \$21 million.

This year the company is expected to produce nearly 500 million pounds of sugar from 111,000 acres of beets. with sales of \$175 million. 

Michigan Sugar merged with Savannah Foods & Industries, Inc., in 1984, and Flegenheimer was elected senior vice-president and director of Savannah Foods. That company is the country's second largest sugar company with fiscal 1993 sales of more than \$1 billion.

Savannah Foods' chairman and CEO, W. W. Sprague, Jr., said, "We are losing one of the outstanding men in the sugar business, a man who is the outstanding leader in the beet sugar industry."

Before moving to Michigan, Flegenheimer was vicepresident of Menominee Sugar Company of Green Bay, WI. His career in the sugar industry began six decades ago in the importing and exporting of sugar byproducts, which was a fam-

Professionally, Flegenheimer is a trustee of the U.S. Beet Sugar Association and a director of The Sugar Association, both of Washington,

Farmers and Manufacturers Beet Sugar Association, Saginaw, from 1965-1973.

He is adirector of Second National Bank of Saginaw and its senior director in years of service, having first been elected in 1964. Flegenheimer also served on boards of American Mutual Insurance Companies of Wakefield, MA, Saginaw General Hospital, United

Way of Saginaw, the Saginaw Symphony and Junior Achievement. Michigan Sugar's board of directors is expected to elect a new president at its De-





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




Caseville School work starts

If anyone wants to know what kind of projects the Caseville Historical Society is becoming involved in, all they need to do is look at their newly-designed logo. Pictured on the logo is a sketch of the Crawford House, the first major project the local historians have become involved with since the group's beginning last

The historic house was facing an uncertain future until its owners, Caseville Resort, Inc. donated the building to the Caseville Historical Society by letter last week.

Because of the group's desire to save the house from demolition as Caseville Resort owners take on a new partner — Young's Environmental, Inc. of Flint — to develop a condominium resort project on the property where the house now stands, the Historical Society didn't have to look far to find a historic preservation project to tackle.

Now the Caseville Historical Society has to find a location for its "gift," hoping to get a "green light" from the Huron County Road Commission to place the house



It allows certain tests to be done at the Scheurer lab instead of sending samples to an outside facility.

One new analyzer runs PSA tests, which checks for prostatic cancer. The test has become routine for most men over age 50.

And the second new analyzer has the capability to run several tests, including checking on the level of therapeutic drugs in the bloodstream, hormone and thyroid levels. Pending Federal Drug Administration approval, the machine can also be used to test for the AIDS virus.

The new machines allow lab results to be reported to doctors a bit more quickly, but the big better communication with doctors, McFarland said. "If a test needs to be re-run, the doctor can call up and we
