

ITALY HAS NOTHING on Huron County when it comes to

towers—especially the leaning kind.
Pigeon farmer Bob Thiel, Sr. has his own leaning tower, except this one is a 70-ft. concrete silo full of corn silage

Built about 35 years ago, the silo started its dangerous leaning when Thiel filled it in October with silage. At first, it leaned only a few inches, but now it's about four feet off

"I think the foundation has deteriorated from all the corn acid," Thiel said. "Either that or the Chinese were drilling

Once the fall harvest is completed, Thiel plans to bring the silo down, and salvage the 600 tons of silage. He'll then enlarge his feed bunker for the extra silage but he says he


