### Laker Board oks fund rules

In order to receive its full allotment of state funds, the Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port School District's Board of Education adopted a set of requirements that will ensure those funds keep

The Michigan Department of Education requires in-formula school districts to adopt the rules in order to receive their perpupil state monies. But because the EPBP District is out-offormula and receives little state aid, school officials had to adopt the requirements or lose 5% of the funds the district does receive.

Those requirements include graduation incentives such as attendance requirements and a minimum number of years of instruction in various subjects: elementary class size restrictions; preparing annual reports and work on accreditation and core curriculum; and a foreign language offered in elementary or junior high schools.

"The Laker District complies with all the requirements." Supt. Robert Drury said.

The Laker Board also approved four school improvement plans that will be submitted to the state this week. State guidelines call for each building in a district, plus the district as a whole, to update its long-term plan and to detail progress made to current plans.

In other business, the Board accepted a low bid of 2.71% interest from Thumb National Bank in Pigeon for the sale of \$1.65 million in tax anticipation notes. Proceeds from the sale of the notes will provide funds until taxes are collected in 1994. The money will be paid back on March 25, 1994, Drury --- By AMY HEIDEN

# Tuscola budget rises 6%

Preliminary figures indicate next year's Tuscola County budget will increase about 6% over the current \$6.9 million budget. A major factor in the increase is increased operating costs and planned expenses for technology, officials say.

"The cost for providing Blue Cross insurance has gone up about 30% and will cost us about \$140,000 more," said Norma Bates, Tuscola Commissioner chairman. "Also, we have negotiations coming up with almost all of the unions.

"Plus, we are thinking about putting out about \$100,000 more for computers and technology.

In other to increase the county budget, commissioners will have to dip into their delinquent tax fund reserves for about \$500,000. Bates cautioned the budget is only in the draft stage with fine tuning needed and won't become final until Jan. 1.

Summary — AN ORDINANCE TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY AND GEN-ERAL WELFARE BY ESTABLISHING REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE OPERATION, CONTROL, AND MANAGEMENT OF CEMETERIES OWNED BY THE TOWNSHIP OF WINSOR, HURON COUNTY, MICHIGAN; TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF SAID ORDINANCE; AND TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH

TOWNSHIP OF WINSOR, COUNTY OF HURON, MICHIGAN ORDAINS: This Ordinance shall be known and cited as the Winsor Township Cemetery

Ordinance, Number 93-1. Section 2: DEFINITIONS OF CEMETERY LOTS AND BURIAL SPACES A. A cemetery lot shall consist of burial spaces sufficient to accommodate from

B. A burial space shall consist of a land area four (4) feet wide and ten (10) feet n length. Section 3: SALE OF BURIAL SPACES

A. Hereafter, burial spaces shall be sold only to residents or taxpayers of Winsor ownship or contiguous townships for the purpose of the burial of such purchaser or his or her heirs at law or next of kin. Section 4: PURCHASE PRICE AND TRANSFER FEES

A. Each burial space shall cost the sum of two hundred dollars. B. Any transfer of one or more burial spaces from an original purchaser to a qualified assignee shall cost fifty dollars.

Section 5: GRAVE OPENING CHARGES

A. The opening and closing of any burial space...shall be at a cost to be determined from time to time by resolution of the township board...

A. Opening and Closing: All graves shall be opened and closed by a...contractor approved by the cemetery...
D. Occupancy: The interment of two adult remains is permitted in a single space... The interment of three cremains or two cremains and a traditional burial on

Section 7: DISINTERMENTS A. Private disinterments may be made on request of the proper relatives upon receipt of a disinterment permit obtained from the county health department... Section 8: GRAVE IDENTIFICATION

A. MATERIALS: Marker and memorials must be made of granite or marble and/ B. PLACEMENT: Markers and memorials shall be in placed...as designated by

C. INSTALLATION: All markers and monuments...must be set on a foundation... D. FLUSH MARKERS: ...Only markers flush with the ground shall be allowed. Section 9: FORFEITURE OF VACANT CEMETERY LOTS OR BURIAL SPACES Cemetery lots or burial spaces sold after the effective date of the Ordinance and remaining vacant 40 years from the date of their sale shall automatically revert to

the township upon occurrence of the following events:

A. Notice shall be sent...to the last known address of the last owner of record... B. No written response to said notice... within 60 days from the date of said notice A. Coping, fences, curbs, benches, steps, and/or structures of wood, iron or other

equally perishable material are prohibited. These structures or enclosures established on any lot previous to the adoption of these regulations which have, in the judgment of the cemetery management, become unsightly by reason of neglect or age shall be removed. B. No elevated mounds shall be built over graves and no grave shall be filled

C. Graves will be covered with grass or sod only. Stone and other material not nowable is prohibited. D. Permanent receptacles for cut flowers will be permitted if installed flush with

above the grade established by the cemetery.

E. Urns for cut, silk or artificial flowers and growing plants is permitted if they are placed on a concrete slab (such as a patio block) large enough to permit mowing

side) of any marker or structure on the grave not in front or back of the marker or structure. Urns not used by July 1, will be considered abandoned and may be removed by the cemetery management.

F. All containers used for decorations must be of an unbreakable material. concrete, bronze, redwood, etc.: the use of glass containers is strictly prohibited.

G. Winter decorations may be installed and maintained on graves from November 1st until April 15th of the following year. If such decorations are not removed y April 15th, they will be considered abandoned and may be removed and

disposed of by the cemetery management.

H. Toys, trinkets and unsightly objects will not be permitted as grave decorations and, when used, will be removed without notice. I. Plantings of a permanent nature shall be permitted only by and under the

supervision of the cemetery, and after receiving written permission therefore. Such plantings placed on a grave without a permit will be removed without notice. J. The cemetery may remove any and all flowers, trees, shrubs, hedges or other plantings that have become unsightly or dangerous or encroach upon an adjoining

grave or walkway. K. No deciduous tree or conifer shall be removed except under the direct supervision of the cemetery.

L. When flowers, floral pieces, potted plants, flags, emblems and the like, used at funerals or placed on graves at other times, become faded and unsightly, the same will be removed by the cemetery which shall assume NO responsibility for their protection and the employees of the cemetery will decline to tend or look for

M. No other grave decoration of any description will be permitted.
Section 11: CONDUCT IN THE CEMETERY No person shall...pick or mutilate any flowers, either wild or domestic, or disturb

any tree, shrub or other plant material...
Section 12: FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY OF THE TOWNSHIP FOR PROP-ERTY DAMAGE The Township or the Township board shall not be responsible for any damage..

Section 13: TRAFFIC REGULATIONS A. All traffic laws of the State of Michigan that are applicable to the operation of vehicles in cemeteries shall be strictly observed.

Section 14: GENERAL A. ERRORS: The cemetery and/or sexton shall have the right to correct any errors that may be made..

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING AND ENACTING A NEW CODE FOR THE VILLAGE OF PIGEON PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF CERTAIN ORDI-NANCES NOT INCLUDED THEREIN; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER OF AMENDING SUCH CODE; AND PROVIDING WHEN SUCH CODE AND THIS ORDI

NANCE SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE.
THE Village of Pigeon ORDAINS:
Section 1. The Code entitled "Code of Ordinances, Village of Pigeon, Aichigan" published by Municipal Code Corporation consisting of Chapters 1 hrough 82, each inclusive, is adopted.

Section 2. All ordinances of a general and permanent nature enacted on or before February 8, 1993, and not included in the Code or recognized and

continued in force by reference therein, are repealed.

Section 3. The repeal provided for in section 2 hereof shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part thereof that has been repealed by a subsequent ordinance that is repealed by this ordinance.

Section 4. Unless another penalty is expressly provided, every person convicted of a violation of any provision of the Code or any ordinance, rule or regulation adopted or issued in pursuance thereof, shall be punished by a fine f not more than \$500 or imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or both. Each act of violation and each day upon which any such violation shall occur shall constitute a separate offense. The penalty provided by this section, unless another penalty is expressly provided shall apply to the amendment of any Code section whether or not such penalty is reenacted in the amendatory ordinance. In addition to the penalty prescribed above, the Village may pursue other remedies such as abatement of nuisances, injunctive relief, and revocation of

icenses or permits.

Section 5. Additions or amendments to the Code when passed in the form as to indicate the intention of the Village Council to make the same a part of the Code shall be deemed to be incorporated in the Code, so that reference to the Code includes the additions and amendments.

Section 6. Ordinances adopted after February 8, 1993 that amend or refer to ordinances that have been codified in the Code, shall be construed as if they amend or refer to like provisions of the Code.

Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective November 28, 1993.




# Where's Sebewaing's Oehmke?


