

\$6.7 MM Tuscola budget

Tuscola County Commissioners are expected to adopt a budget later in the month that is about \$436,000 more than last year's budget. The proposed 1994 budget is \$6.72 million. Commissioners expect to hold a public hearing during and adopt the budget at their Tuesday, Dec. 14 meeting.

A significant portion of additional costs is because of increases in providing medical coverage to county employes. "Blue Cross/Blue Shield expenses are up by about \$140,000

from last year's \$450,000," said Tuscola County Commission Chairman Norma Bates. "Also, we are putting \$120,000 more in equipment and capital improvements because of adding additional computers an other related office upgrades.'

Elected officials and department heads will have a chance to took over the budget and make recommendations before it is finalized.

Also in December, commissioners will begin interviewing companies for a technical consultant to help coordinate the county's capital improvements in technology to make sure all of the systems are compatible and do the work expected.

SMOKE IN YOUR EYES: About 29% of Michigan adults smoke cigarettes, says the state Department of Public Health, as of 1992 figures. That's down from 32.5% in 1982, but the 29% figure been holding steady since 1987. Only Kentucky and Tennessee (tobacco-growing states) have higher percentages of smokers in the entire country.

Average retail price for a pack of cigarettes is \$1.89, which includes 56 cents in state and federal taxes. That's lower than Ontario's price of \$4.35, which includes \$3.02 in taxes.

The Huron Intermediate School District Board has approved allowing the four children of Lee Ann Ruth to continue attending the Caseville School District rather than the Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port School District.

"The children have attended Caseville Schools for about 10 years. It was a mix-up because everyone though they belonged in Caseville rather than to Lakers," said HISD Supt. William Mayes. "It was just recently discovered that they were attending the wrong district."

Also, it was announced that Carol Hart, Child and Adult Care Services instructor with the Huron Area Skill Center, received the state award as "Teacher of the Year." Hart, of Bad Axe, was selected for the honor by the Michigan Life Management Educators Association She has been with the skill center since it opened in 1986.

Commissioners have applied for \$4,000 from the state DNR to create nature trails at Vanderbilt Park, on Saginaw Bay. The 18-acre, rustic park has 20 campsites with electric hook-


