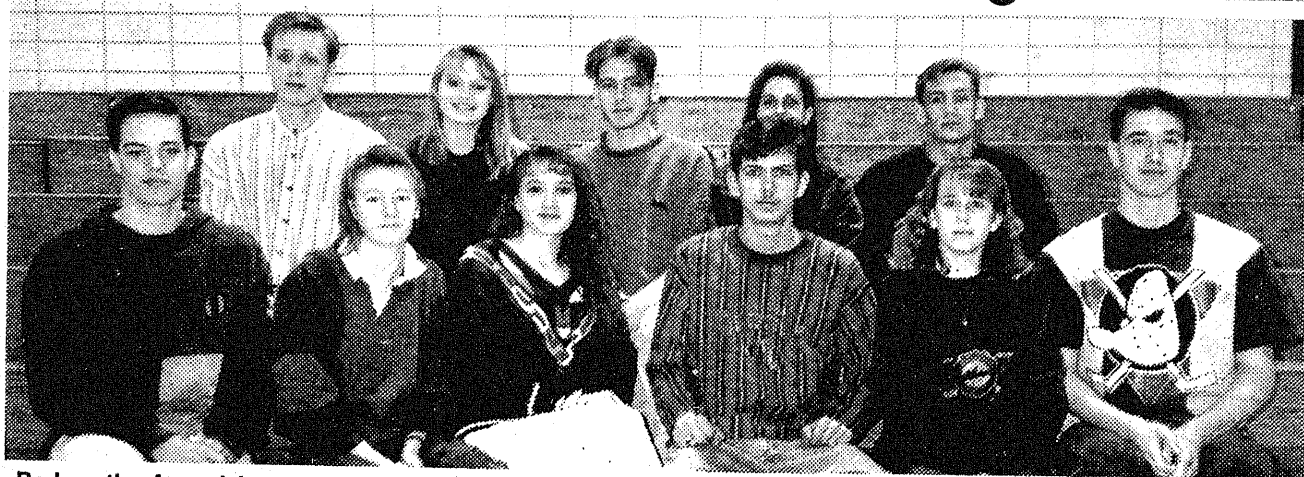

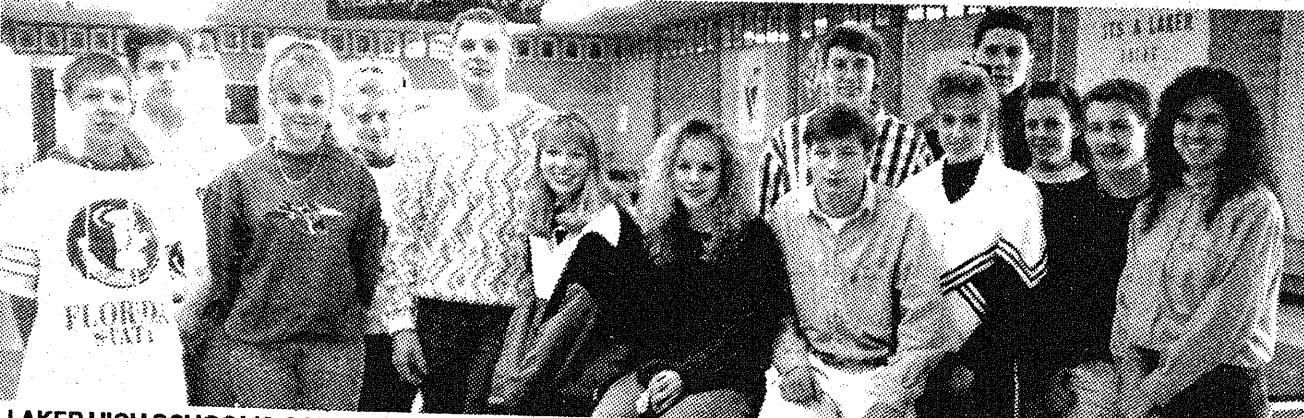

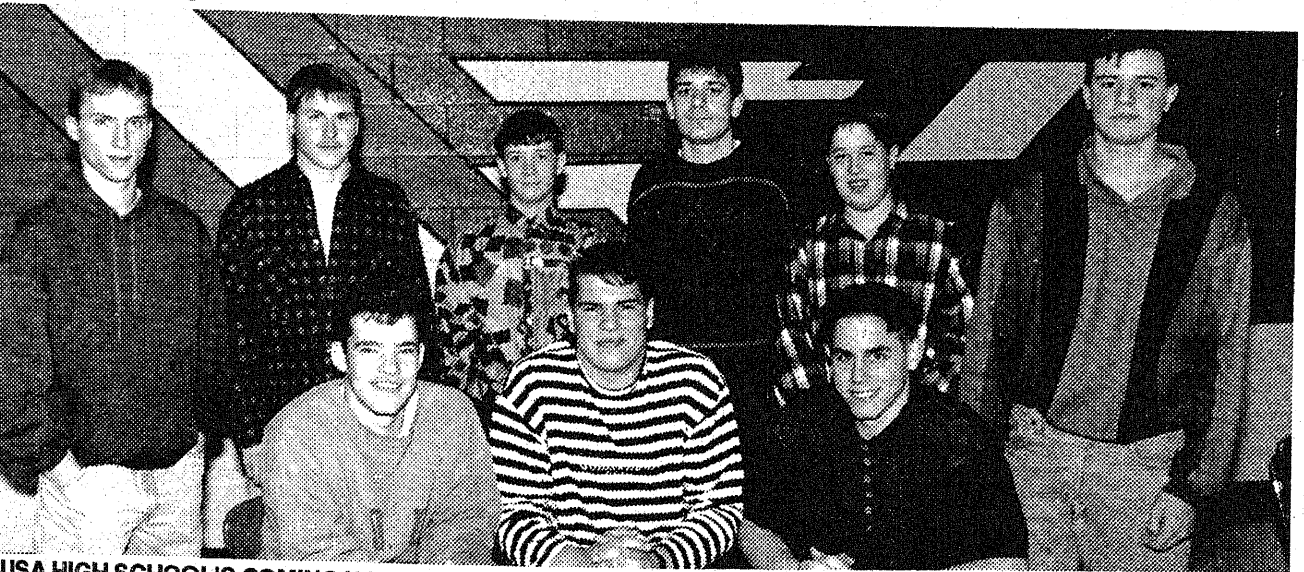

Sorry kids: USA is on Feb. 21

The Unionville-Sebewaing Education Association and USA Schools' Board of Education have agreed to make-up the Jan. 27 "Act of God" snow day on Monday, Feb. 21.

9-1-1 changes are coming

County commissioners in the Thumb Area are expected to make amendments to their tri-county 9-1-1 today, to establish themselves as separate districts in the three-county plan.

Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac Counties formed a tri-county plan over three years ago and the plan has allowed them to secure grant money and receive lower bids because of the multi-county area covered — but now it is necessary to designate each as separate districts to levy surcharges for funding their 9-1-1 emergency telephone system.

Telephone companies and current legislation dictates all plans have a uniform levy, and all three counties have a 4% surcharge on each telephone customer.

However, each county wants to implement an additional surcharge, but each wants to do the surcharge in a different manner.

Sanilac approved a one-half millage on property tax over a

The job changed to full-time in 1964, and in 1975 his job moved to UnionvilleElementary

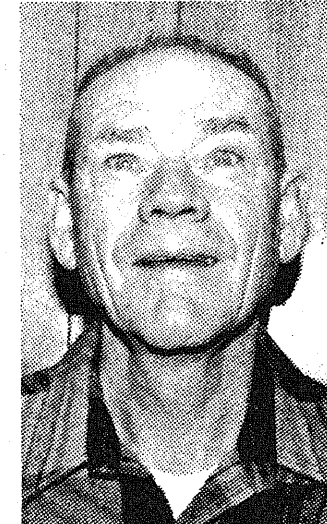
School to take over for the retiring Don Strieter.

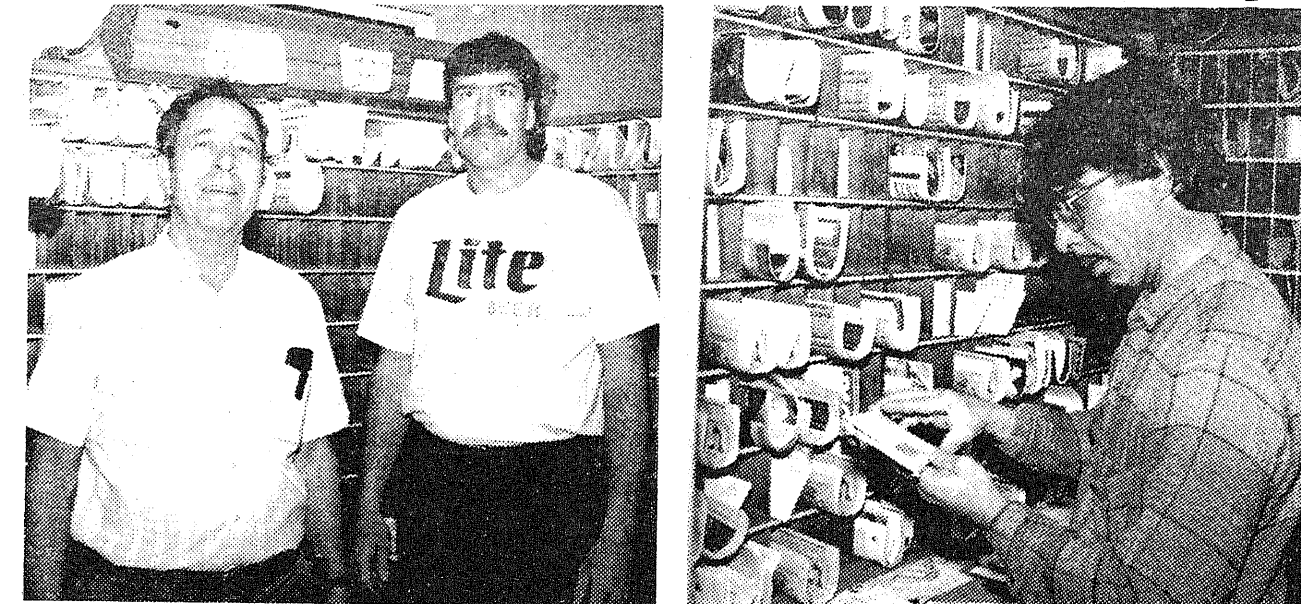

New Unionville mail carrier line-up

By MARY DRIER The recent retirement of a Unionville Postal Service mail carrier has resulted in several changes.

Rural Route carrier Raymond Baur has changed to

Route #2 from Route #3. He has been employed with the Postal Service for 34 years. Baur replaces Robert Adlam, 62 of Unionville, who retired at the end of 1993.

Keith Strieter is now Rural

Route #3 carrier, which covers west and north part of Unionville, taking over Baur's service area.

Strieter has worked at the Post Office as a substitute carrier for about seven years.

Dick Neuman of Sebewaing remains the substitute on Route #2 and Dan Bach of Sebewaing was hired as substitute for Route #3. Due to reorganization in past years, there is no Route #1.

Regional buses won't roll 'til July

Efforts to create the state's sixth-largest transportation system in the Thumb this spring are running into some delays—and service should begin in July instead of April. "We've had to push everything back for a couple of months on the starting date," said Jennifer Leitzel, manager of Tuscola County's Thumb-body Express.

"In the time frame we originally projected, we don't have enough time to pull everything together."

The proposed plan is to connect the four bus services operating in Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac and Lapeer Counties, as well as providing bus service to Saginaw, Bay City, Flint and Port Huron. Officials had hoped to begin the five-year plan in April,

but now they are looking for a start the first week of July.

The four county transportation managers involved met last Wednesday to fine-tune plans. Routes have been planned and other details are being worked out.

They will meet again Feb. 22 to work on the project. "We (the system managers) are all working on our annual applications to fund (our) systems," said Leitzel. "Part of the holdup is we need funding and the other holdup is that the time frame we had planned to start is too soon to get the necessary groundwork in place."

when we are extremely busy."

Also, since the original proposed starting of the system was announced, some additional issues have surfaced.

"We will have to go to cellular phones on the buses because along Lake Huron buses lose contact with their base," she said.

If Gov. John Engler gives final approval to the completed plan, the expanded system would greatly enhance bus travel in the Thumb.

The Thumb's current transportation systems only provide service within each county. There is no way for passengers to travel from one county to another or to surrounding cities.

year ago to fund their 9-1-1 system, and Huron County approved a 12% additional surcharge last May. "Huron County can't do that (a millage) because of the 50 mill limit on property tax," said Huron County Sheriff Mike Gage. "Because of Sanilac being one way and our being another, the only way is to change legislation and/or to split so each county is running their own 9-1-1 operations. "It is frustrating because we voted in the 12% additional and we didn't realize we would have this problem. It was discovered only after we voted."

Tuscola County hasn't decided yet which way it will go. A bill has been introduced in the state Legislature to have county commissioners control the destiny of their 9-1-1 systems.

"We came up with proposed Legislation of Senate Bill 849 to amend Senate bill 617 to permit board of commissioners to have final responsibility on how central dispatches are formed, funded and financed," said Tuscola County Undersheriff James Fyvie who serves as an alternate through the Michigan Sheriff's Association on the Emergency Telephone Service Committee. "When approved, the new law will create each county as an independent district by county boundaries and that will force phone companies to determine surcharges by county boundaries."

The bill passed the House last Tuesday and the Governor is expected to sign it in the next few weeks. In the meantime each county county will make amendments to their tri-county plan rather than wait for changes to the state law.

Tuscola County Commissioners were expected to address the issue at 9 a.m. and Huron County Commissioners are scheduled to address it at 2 p.m. today.

When Huron County is able to implement the 12% additional surcharge, it will generate about \$300,000 annually to help operate the county's 9-1-1 system and finance the re-vamping of communication systems.

The county has about 19,000 telephone subscribers who will pay \$1.38 more a month when the surcharge is added.

"Our communication system is 24 years old and in bad need of replacing and updating," said Gage. "The money will allow us not only to operate the center, but also update or replace communication systems in the central dispatch center and every ambulance, fire and police in the county."

Robert Peter's essay was given first place honors, while Levi Zagorski's placed second and Nicole Cieslinski's was third.

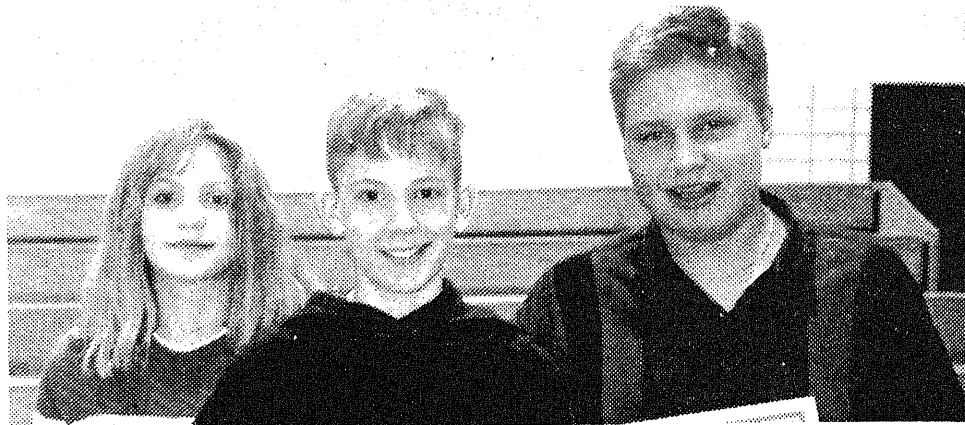
"My Roots in America and How I Can Nourish Them"

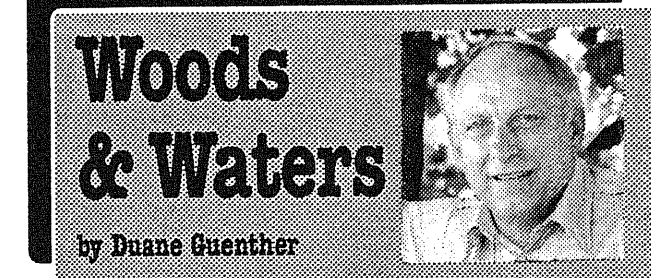

Today, as though it was an omen from the Madison Avenue gods, I received six catalogs in the mail.

I didn't believe it either, until I counted them several times, and finally concluded there were indeed six.
REI, Campmor, Bass Pro Shop and Cabelas offered mostly outdoor equipment, while the ones from L.L. Bean and Orvis seemed to cater to the well-dressed woman. And although I scanned

them all, I didn't see one red and black plaid wool hunting jacket.
Dismayed by the proliferation of high-tech items (many of the clothes would look ridiculous if you wore them hiking through a cranberry marsh) and suffering from a mega-dose of cabin fever, I sought escape and solace in the dusty shelves of my meager library.
I poked for a moment or two and then my hand fell on the tattered binding of an old Outdoor Life Magazine.
I had found it several years ago in a bookstore up north and immediately bought it when I discovered that the publishing date was the same as my birthday — February, 1934.
Sixty years ago the magazine sold for 25 cents a copy, or \$2.50 for a year's subscription.
Today's magazine goes for \$2.50 an issue, a great bargain when you consider an average hourly wage in 1934 was about 30 cents an hour.

He is at the mercy of Mother Nature, should she decide to cast inclement weather his way — and looks as though he could tough out most any-

thing she had to offer.

It makes references to the bark of the Sharps, Spencer, Winchester Henry, Springfield, Evans and others whose roar is a defiant challenge to the dangers of the untamed West. (Their words, not mine).
There are department columns on conservation, angling, camping and woodcraft, motor boating, arms and ammunition and dog handling.
The experts of that time discuss the Oklahoma Conservation "mess," lures for ice fishing, preparing your iceboard motor for spring, making your own moccasins and guns for the lady.
There are ads for Kleanbore

ammunition, Lyman sights, Old Town Canoes (\$38 and up.) Marble's Outing Equipment and Montague split bamboo rods.
A "Where To Go" section promises excitement and hunting success in Alaska, Old Mexico, Africa, British Columbia, Kentucky and Michigan.
And the want ads offer dogs of every size and color.
I snuggled next to the woodstove and read the antique magazine from cover to cover. Everything was perfect — except the ending of the cover story. I quote: "We landed just at sunset and an hour later our tents were up, our campfires lighted and our diminutive cook was calling 'Come and get it!'"

3 Orr generations celebrate 75 Drug Store years

Although Fred Orr remembers holding "executive positions" in the family Drug Store in Pigeon while still a young boy — positions like sweeper, trash-remover and delivery boy — he really never thought about continuing in the family business as his career.

Throughout his boyhood, he heard the question, "Are you going to be a pharmacist, too, like your Dad and Granddad?" hundreds of times.

"Everyone seemed to ask me about it, and the more they asked, the more I decided I didn't care to be one," Fred remembers now.

So he attended Michigan State University, which has no pharmacy school. He took a general course for his first two years, and then came the time to declare his major.

Looking at his credits, Fred discovered that his two years fit very well for a pharmacy curriculum in a pharmacy school. So he transferred to Ferris State University, and graduated in June, 1975, with his pharmacy degree.

He began work in Orr Drug Store, then owned and operated by his father, John Orr. Fred liked the work, he knew

and liked Pigeon and the people, so the following year he began buying into ownership of the store.

Fred has been owning and managing the store for 18 years, and he's happy that his Dad still comes in to prepare prescriptions each Tuesday.

That's "break day" for Fred, and he appreciates the time off because he's found that satisfying as it is to own your own business, it's also very demanding.

Commenting on some of the things he remembers from many years ago, when his grandfather, Robert "Bob" Orr owned the store, Fred recalls the "delicious smell of hot roasted peanuts," floating from the store's peanut roasting machine.

He also remembers Grandpa Bob Orr and his ever-present pipe.

So, Orr Drug Store has been in the business section of Pigeon since 1919, when Bob purchased the business from William Sutton, who had left in 1917 to serve in World War I.

When Mr. Sutton decided to seek other goals after the war,

he sold the drug store to Robert Orr — and his son John Orr and grandson Fred Orr complete the third generation of Orrs operating the business.

The family store has been in its present location since 1955.

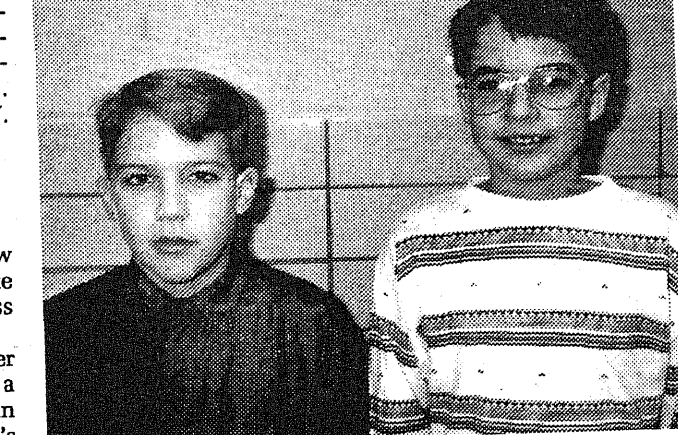

My mom and dad are both teachers in a Lutheran school. When I examine my roots, I am very proud of what my ancestors have accomplished and are continuing to accomplish.

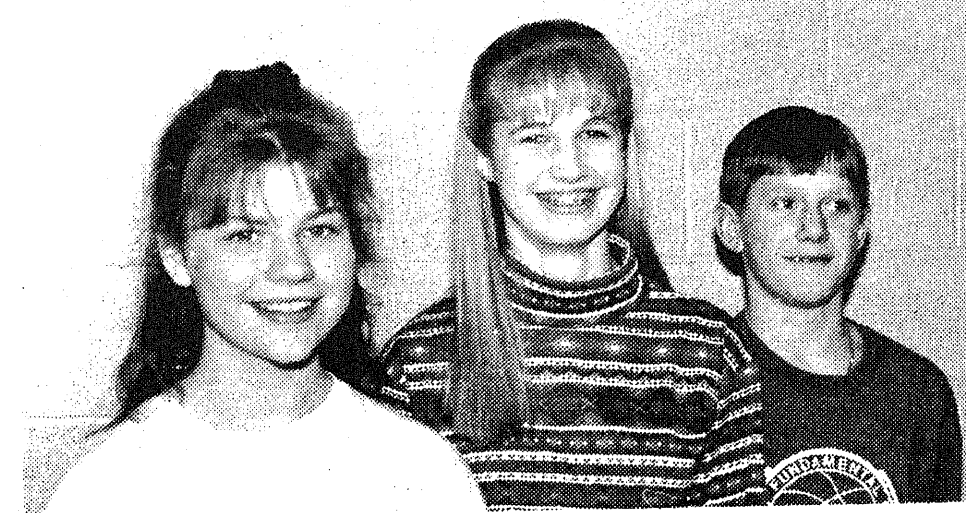
In this stage of my life, I am deciding on what occupation I would like to have in the future.

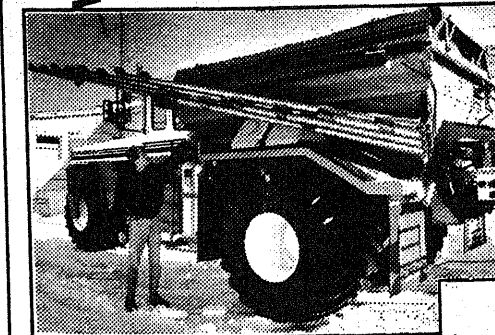

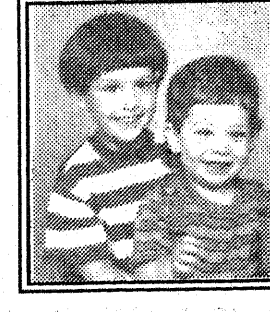
