





Everybody's mother used to tell children to eat their green vegetables, slurp soup when they were sick and cut down on snacks and sweets... and mother was

Cooking Light magazine recently listed favorite foods which are popular now, and they represent a group of back-to-basics favorites, including salisbury steak, as mom used to make.

Other popular foods these days are soups and stews; cold-water fish such as trout, walleye, salmon; slaws; dried fruite; pizza; oatmeal; chutneys and relishes; puffed and crisped rice, and red, yellow and orange

peppers.
What isn't haute cuisine these days? You might expect most of these to be on the "out-of-favor" list, but maybe not all: Danish pastries, Buffalo chicken wings, mozzarella appetizers, gourmet ice cream, quiches, pates, fried zucchini and — you guessed it —

These findings represent continuation of the ongoing trend toward eating better and lighter. You'll find less butter or margarine, fewer fried goods and less fat in "popular" choices being made by more and more folks who eat.

At that rate, there should be less and less of those more and more folks...




It sounds interesting and, if true, shouldn't be allowed, But, IS it true? Who can give an answer?)

Delay park completion?

With the summer weeks passing rapidly, members of Sebewaing Village Council are considering a delay until next spring in the completion of downtown's Muellerweiss Park. Bids from three construction companies all came in above budget with Boesch Builders of Sebewaing being lowest, at \$149,806. Total funds available, through grants, total \$134,547. Three deductive alternates reduced the bid to \$145,601 but still left a shortfall of \$11,054, officials say.

Possible options include further reductions, or re-bidding at a slack time of season, as in midwinter, rather than to accept a bid in this busiest season, when labor costs are highest.

Signs for three areas of traffic control along W. Sebewaing St., adjoining Muellerweiss Park, were ordered. They will not be posted until park construction is finished. There will be signs and traffic pattern changes at the alley, to the west and at the Center Street intersection, where traffic will be limited to one-way, west-bound.

Various street and sidewalk repair and construction bids were accepted. Union Street paving by Midland Construction was scheduled to begin during the week of July 25, and the bid from PTI Construction of Caro was accepted to remove, grind

and put down a new new base and seal on Sharpsteen Street. **Construction bids** from Randy Terbush of Vassar for three sections of sidewalk were accepted. Sidewalk construction will be done along M-25 at Gettel Motors, on Ninth St. and E.

Sebewaing St. Larry Hahn reported on projects.

Tom McBrayer was considered qualified for the position of building inspector, provided he is accepted by the Michigan

State-designated agency.
