### Tuscola road vote today

Tuscola County voters will decide today (Tuesday, Aug. 2) on a millage renewal proposal to fund primary roads and local street repairs.

The county is requesting passage of .9741 of a mill for two years to keep the road millage rate at one mill.

The county has levied one mill for road work for the past four years. But due to the Headlee Amendment, the county has to seek voter approval to levy the full millage rate, due to a rollback of .0259 mill.

If approved, it would generate about \$720,000 for road work with the county receiving about \$540,000 and the rest going to villages and cities for street and road work, said James Miklovic, secretary/manager for the county's road commission.

Miklovic could not estimate now many miles of roads the money would fund because costs vary greatly depending on the type of road work done.

There are about 349 miles of primary roads in the county.

### USA votes again Aug. 15

Voters in the USA School District will go to the polls again Monday, Aug. 15, to decide on a request for enhancement millage.

The district is again requesting passage of 2 additional mills for three years to eliminate a projected shortfall of up to \$150,000.

A similar request was defeated 379 to 344 during the annual school elections June 6.

According to new regulations under Proposal A, school districts can levy a maximum of 3 additional enhancement mills for up to three years with voter approval on homestead property.

If approved, the millage would generate about \$226,760 the first year, and cost a property owner of a \$60,000 home \$60 a year.

### Ambulance at full staff

Sebewaing Township Ambulance is again at full complement, with the return of eight members who took a 30-day voluntary leave of absence a month ago, according to Township Clerk Sheila Fiebig.

When the leave began, Township officials brought in newly-qualified members and fire department qualified members—and they notified residents that full service was available at all times during the 30-day period.

In the meantime, the Township Board, with the assistance of an ambulance department committee, developed a written "protocol" and listing of job descriptions.

The Township Board, as the elected governing body of the township, prepared and studied the protocol, then approved it at a special meeting Wednesday night.

# 4-county transpo plan gets final approval; starts Oct. 1

The last step needed to create the state's sixth largest transportation system is in place.

During a special meeting Thursday night, Tuscola County Commissioners approved participating in a regional bus system that would link the Thumb's four counties and provide service to surrounding cities.

The regional bus system will connect Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac and Lapeer Counties — plus provide transportation to Saginaw, Bay City, Port Huron and Flint.

Currently, each county's bus service provides coverage only within each county, and no inter-county service is provided.

To make the new system efficient, creation of transfer stations at county lines is necessary for passengers to transfer from one bus system to another.

"Huron, Sanilac and Lapeer pick up riders in respective counties and bring them to the first transfer station located at the intersection of M-53 and M-81. Huron Transit System will then transport all Bay City/Saginaw riders to the Caro transfer station," said Mary Ann Vandemark, executive director of the Human Development Commission which coordinates operation of the Thumb-

body Express bus system. "Return trips will operate the same way with Huron Transit picking up Saginaw/Bay City riders from Caro."

"If Tuscola County riders must go to Flint or Port Huron or a destination in Huron, Sanilac or Lapeer Counties, they will ride the Huron Transit Bus from the Caro transfer station to the M-53 and M-81 transfer station and switch to the appropriate county's bus or if the final destination is Flint or Port Huron, individuals will switch to a Lapeer Transit system bus."

Main thrust of the regional bus system is to provide a way for Thumb Area residents to receive medical services — including dialysis and chemotherapy treatments — which aren't available locally.

"Efforts will be made to schedule medical appointments in blocks in an effort to minimize the waiting time

for riders and efficiency," said Jennifer Leitzel, manager of Tuscola County's Thumbbody Express.

Huron, Sanilac and Lapeer officials had already approved the plan. Getting Tuscola leaders to agree to participate was the last step needed.

The new system is expected to begin Oct. 1, with twice-weekly service planned at first.

In the four counties, between 23% and 42% of residents are transportation disadvantaged — elderly, poor, autoless and mobility-limited persons, says Jon Burkhart of Ecosometrics, Inc., of Maryland, which conducted feasibility studies on an inter-county system.

This suggests that many people would utilize such services, if they were available, Burkhart says.

Start-up cost for each county is about \$5,000, which may be waived by the state.

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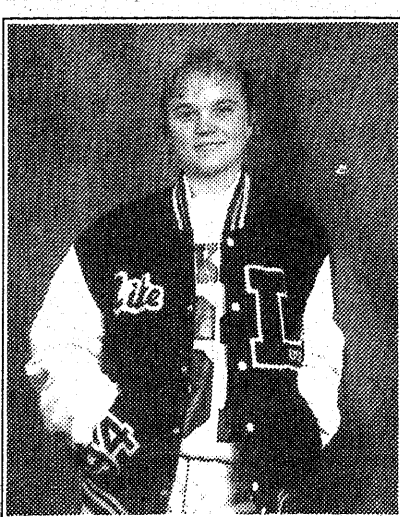

The Sebewaing Little League Picnic and All Star Games will be Tuesday and Wednesday Aug. 16 and 17 in the Main Park.

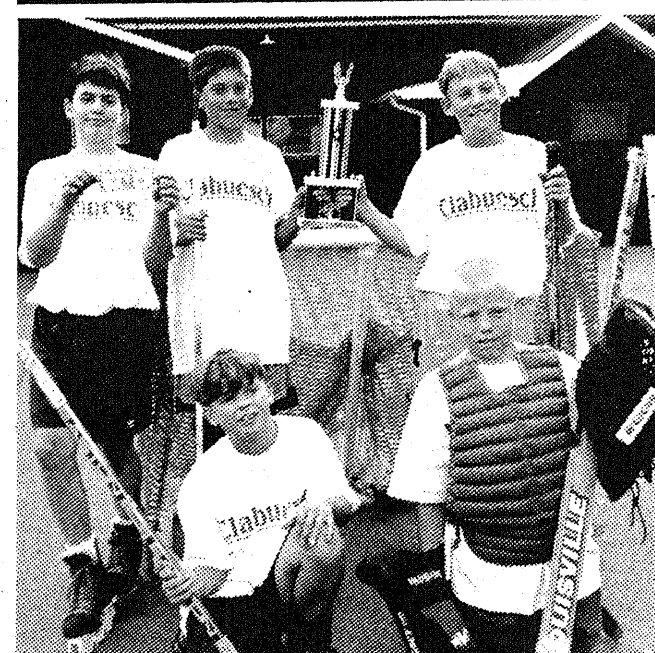
At 5 p.m. on Tuesday, the Pigeon All Stars will play followed by the Pony League All Stars.

# Caseville Twp. road work

Caseville Township Board approved the sale of bonds to begin road improvements in two private subdivisions, at last week's meeting.

Two bids were received for the purchase for 1994 Road Improvement Special Assessment (Limited Tax) Bonds which total \$140,000.

Board members approved accepting the bid of Bay Port State Bank, Bay Port, with a 5.75% interest over the First of America Bank's interest rate of 5.9%.

Also, approval was given to replace volunteer fire fighter Robert Peter, who moved from the community, with Ben Willenberg.

To improve traffic flow, the Caseville Board is considering several road improvements.

Board members approved having John Martin of the Huron County Road Commission survey Sand Road regarding opening it from Crescent Beach Road to Dunn Road. Surveying cost is not to exceed \$1,000.

# Winsor seeks plan help

Because of increasing standards for building inspectors and a decrease in the number of people willing to do the job, the Winsor Township Board is turning to the county.

Board members rescinded the Winsor Township Building Code Ordinance and requested the Huron County Building & Zoning Office to assume the responsibility of providing the building code inspection/permit program for the township, at last week's meeting.

The county currently provides such service for all electrical, plumbing, mechanical and soil erosion permits in the township, and has agreed to expand its service to also include building code administration.

In other concerns, the Winsor Board will hold a "Truth in Taxation Hearing" during the 7 p.m. Monday, Sept. 6, regular meeting to set the 1994 township tax rate. Meeting is at the Township Village Hall in Pigeon.

# Sebewaing River study starts

A comprehensive management study is underway in the Sebewaing River watershed area.

The watershed covers about 6,500 acres in southern Huron County and northern Tuscola County in the Townships of Sebewaing, Brookfield, Grant, Columbia, Elmwood, Almer and Ellington.

"We are doing a complete comprehensive study of the watershed," said Robert Tufts of engineering firm Williams, Osinski & Associates Inc. of Bad Axe.

"We hope to compile information of existing conditions, water-movement trends coupled with recommendations to correct and for remedial action on soil erosion control measures, sedimentation, preventative measures and improvement of agricultural farming practices to reduce sediment and pollution in the watershed area which in turns feeds into Saginaw Bay and the Great Lakes," Tufts says.

There are six monitoring stations in the area:

■ mouth of the Sebewaing River on the Saginaw Bay Shoreline in Sebewaing manned by Robert Fournier;

■ Gettel Road in Sebewaing Township manned by Stanley Gettel;

## Store's closing one big loss for area

Last week's closure of Don Erla Foods in Pigeon is sad for a number of reasons, as many people realize. Don and Mary Lou Erla have been hands-on owners of a traditional grocery store known for friendly service, homemade meat products and great produce. Groceries have been sold at that Ruppert Street location since the early 1950s, when it became Pigeon's first "supermarket" — and by the Erilas for the past 10 years.

But times are changing in small-town American retailing, and Don Erla Foods is the most-recent casualty of these changes. We're all poorer for it.

In the past, a family such as the Erilas were the American success story. They worked hard every day, they ran a good, clean operation, they treated customers well... and everything turned out fine. After World War II, as grocery stores such as this blossomed all over America, they became part of our landscape — part of that American dream we fought to preserve 50 years ago.

Folks would walk or drive to their neighborhood store, which was placed at locations such as the corner of Ruppert and Nitz Streets because a hundred or so homes within that area nearly guaranteed success.

But some chain stores started to change that equation in the 1970s and 1980s. Super-stores were built by companies such as Kmart, Meijer, Wal Mart and others. Even some of those giant businesses couldn't last as America got more competitive — we all remember Yankee Stores, Zody's, Giant Food Stores, Wrigley Supermarkets, Fisher's Big Wheel and others. They're only memories now.

Instead of building friendly neighborhood stores near customers, these big companies built faceless, far-away huge stores with 24-hour shopping, massive selections, extra services (including banking) — and urged people to come to them, rather than the other way around.

Owners of other grocery stores near the now-closed Don Erla Foods aren't gloating or happy right now either. They'd prefer having that store still operating, since folks who shop at home had one more choice, if a certain product wasn't available at another neighborhood store.

And, every small-town store is looking over its shoulder, hoping those giants aren't catching up.

Don Erla Foods needed people to buy all their groceries there, not just the advertised specials. When that didn't happen, the Erla Family couldn't continue doing business in Pigeon at a profit. That's a sad reflection on the times and on people's loyalty, or lack of loyalty.

If you value the local businesses still opening their doors every day in these Western Thumb small towns, you can help preserve them. Give them a chance to meet your needs FIRST. They deserve that chance...

**Coach of Sebawaing:** Please end the complaining about Pigtail umpires. As a Pigtail coach myself, I feel the umpiring was done very well (no one is perfect.) It was NOT as bad as you're making it sound. Why can't we have a year of fun playing ball — isn't that what it's all about?

You are only making it that much harder for our young people umpiring or interested in it next year to want to ump for us. I would like to see you come forward next year and head up a training session for our umpires. Then, you'll also see help doesn't come easily.

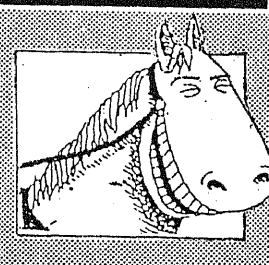

## Living large

It's been in the news lately. A couple of nice looking stewardesses were recently seen crying into the camera on a popular TV news program because they'd been determined "overweight" by the airline they work for, and were thus dismissed from their jobs.

It's called weight discrimination, and it's a rampant, unchecked prejudice in this country. It teeters dangerously around the edges of sexism too, since it's mostly women who are given these rigid weight restrictions...though not exclusively, I realize.

But that which makes it most tragic and unfair, I can tell you, is that it is the last acceptable form of discrimination being practiced in the United States. I'm not saying that certain people are still not prejudiced against various races, colors and creeds...but outspoken gay rights activists, black leaders, senior citizens groups, handicapped representatives and women's organizations have all been pretty effective in helping to squelch — if not eradicate — the open and public discrimination of these minorities.

**But you can still** shout an obscenity at a fat person and pretty much get away with it. You can still be a stand-up comic and do five minutes of fat-bashing on national TV and get lots of laughs. You can still look an outsized job applicant in the eye and say, "don't call us, we'll call you."

Of course, people believe there are valid reasons for this discrimination. After all, we chub-ettes get heart disease. We stroke out. It's all our own fault. And of course, as everyone knows, fat people are lazy and stupid, right?

Well, there was also a day when, as everyone knew, black people made the best slaves, women had no business voting, handicapped people could just stay home, and Jews had no right to continue living. Aren't I just glad those days are gone?

**I don't particularly care** for the endless comparisons of obesity to alcoholism and cigarette smoking, either. While these "bad habits" are finding themselves more and more regulated everyday, it is only fair to say that no one suffers from a second-hand fat, nor have I ever careened headlong into a busload of nuns because I enjoyed a few too many Twinkies.

No, obesity is not good or healthy or attractive (by today's standards) nor do I highly recommend it. But I read where recent studies show it may not necessarily be the death sentence it was previously thought to be either.

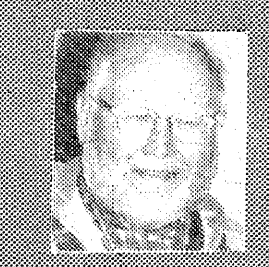
But all that aside...the issues of personal freedom of choice, prejudice and discrimination still rage unresolved.

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# Rain dilutes Sugar Fest profits, Sebewaing Chamber says

About 80 members and friends of Sebewaing Chamber of Commerce were told the rainstorms of late June, especially Friday, June 24, reduced Michigan Sugar Festival's profits by more than 50% — "somewhere between \$4-5,000."

The announcement was made last Thursday at the annual Chamber steak dinner in Sebewaing Village Park. Chamber President Steve Langford conducted the meeting.

Chamber Treasurer Denise Wineman said she had about \$5,000 remaining in the black column, but some bills were still expected. The highest profit in recent years was

around \$12,000, bringing the 1994 event's to under 50% of those better times.

She said it was the first time in many years, perhaps in all 30 Festivals, that rain had wiped out an entire day so there was "zero gate sale" for Friday.

**Reporting on the Sebewaing Marina.** Harbor Chairman Bill Kauffold said permits have been received from the state Department of Natural Resources and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

He said contracts are expected to be awarded in late winter or early spring for digging the marina basin and for managing the marina.

Earth moving can begin in early summer and Kauffold

expects the marina to be open for the full season in 1996.

**Reporting on Muellerweiss Park.** Village President Dave Wineman called it "the jewel for the center of town."

He praised the "spirit of Sebewaing," which he said is responsible for many progressive programs. He com-

mended the Chamber of Commerce, Village Council and Sebewaing Township Board for their cooperation and accomplishments.

He said the Council works hard, Department of Public Works also works hard and that parks, sidewalks, sewers and other public proper-

ties are well-maintained and worthy of pride. He thanked the various organizations for "maintaining what we have."

In the future, he said, he would like to see "another pavilion" in the park available to residents and visitors

during the busy summer season.

**Concerning the traffic light** at the M-25 and Bay Street/Sebewaing Road intersection, the village president said it is due to be installed "before school starts."

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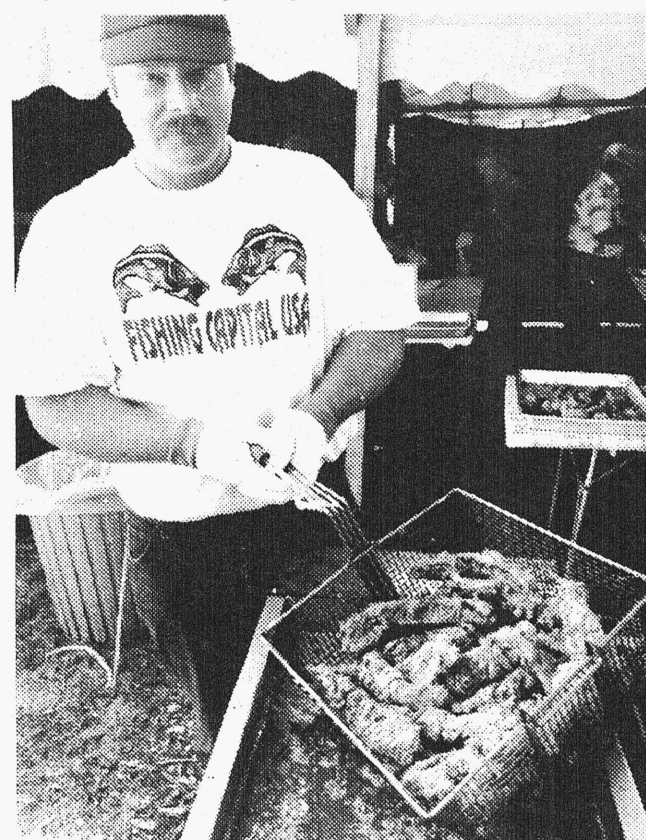

A Lip Sync performance is at 2 p.m. followed by some high-stepping by students of Sherry's Dance Studio at 3.

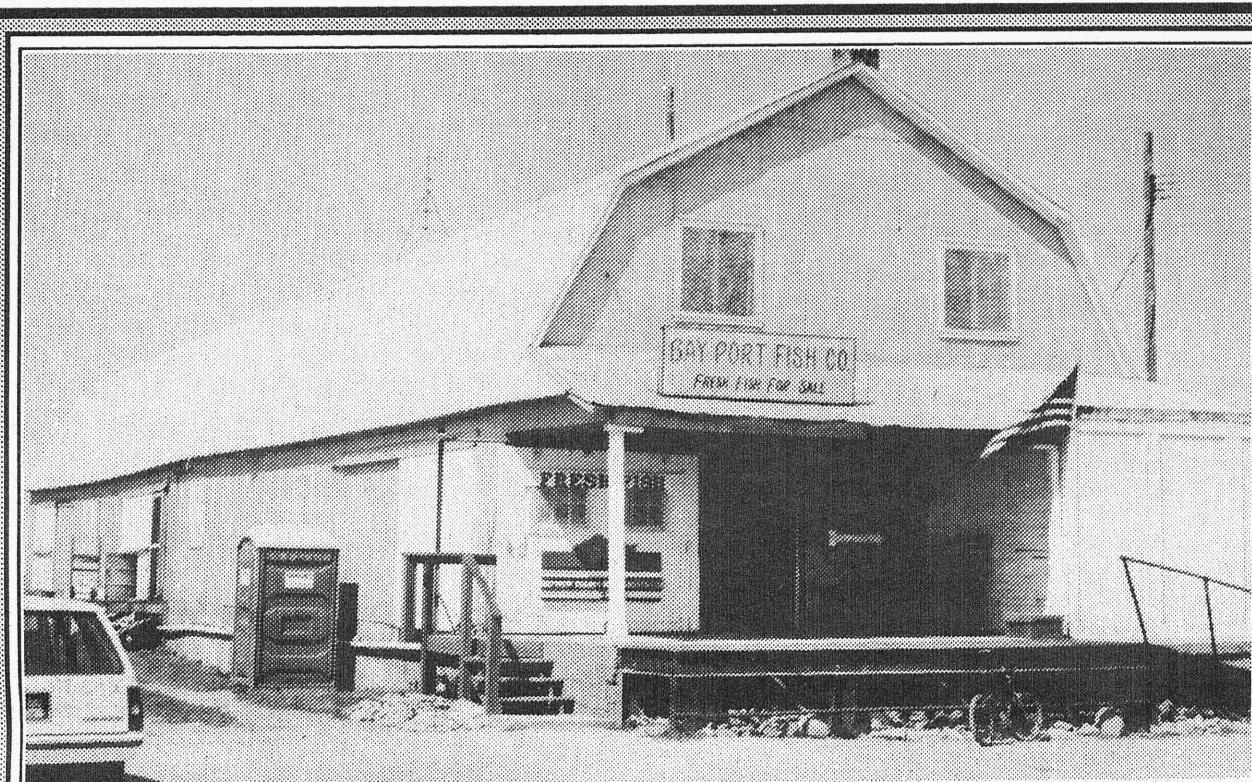

## August Co-op completion expected

A \$1.5 million construction project at the Akron Branch of the Cooperative Elevator Co. is nearing completion.

The company is adding 750,000 bushels of grain storage, a new grain dryer, another receiving pit, replacing its old scale and building a new office and warehouse.

Altogether the Akron plant will have 1.5-million-bushel storage capacity with four receiving pits and two dryers, says Co-op President and CEO John Kohr.

Completion of the project is expected in August, in time for harvest.

Last year, the company completed a \$1.6 million project of building four 112-foot high silos with a 225,000-bushel capacity at Akron.

"This project brings our total storage capacity in the Cooperative Elevator system to 12 million bushels, which is the largest in Michigan," said Kohr.

Co-op headquarters are in Pigeon with branches in Sebewaing, Elkton, Gagetown and Akron.

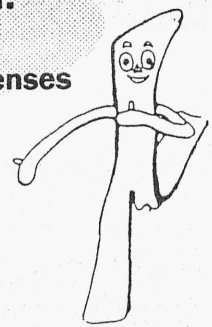

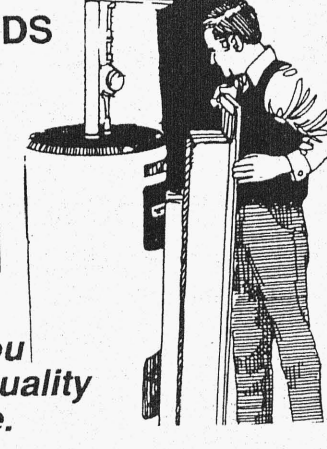

## The big step

The four-point materialized from the thick brush as if he were a ghost.

I had been watching the run-way intently for the past several hours and was sure I would spot the movement of any deer using this well beaten path long before they hit the opening which offered me a shot, but I had been wrong.

Now, I was locked in a face-to-face challenge, and as I was sitting on the ground with my recurve across my lap, the four-point had a definite advantage.

I had selected my blind carefully during the summer before bow season. It was a ground blind, built from surrounding brush and cedar branches, nestled in front of a small stand of cedars which were intended to break up my outline.

I had dug a small hole in which to place my feet, that gave me a comfortable sitting position at ground level.

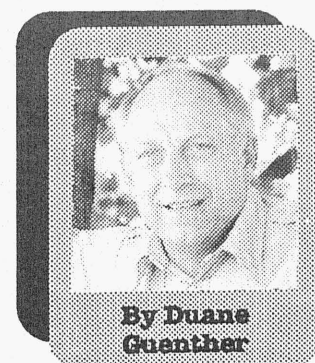
The blind was at the cross-roads of two, well-used runways.

In the morning, the deer moved from the surrounding farm fields to the security of the cedar swamp where they bedded down for the day. In the evening, they reversed their direction and moved from the swamp back to the farm fields.

Twice a day, there was activity at my blind and, if I was persistent, this fact put me in a good position to bag a deer.

During a few practice sessions in the blind, I had always imagined that there would be time to adjust my shooting position before any unsuspecting deer moved into range.

But, there was my first opportunity and the deer had me dead to rights.

I'm sure he did not see me, and the wind was such that my scent was carried over my shoulder and away from the deer, but some deep instinctual stirring told the deer to keep his eyes on the dark clump that was my blind—and he did.

He moved slowly forward, twitching nostrils testing the wind and cupped ears straining for the slightest sound.

I stayed frozen, hoping to move my bow into shooting position when he dropped his head, or looked the other way. Finally, he scanned the woods opposite from where I was sitting and I was able to bring my bow to bear.

Things which had worked so smoothly while I had practiced on imaginary deer, suddenly did not go so well.

The four-point had stopped in an awkward position. Perhaps not awkward for him, but for me. The bottom limb of my recurve was wedged into the ground and in order to come close to sighting I would have to tip my bow almost parallel to the ground.

I shifted my weight slightly in order to move the bow into a more comfortable position. Bam! His radar eyes picked up the movement and I became the focus of a riveting attention.

I felt my palms go sweaty, my heart began to beat and I

knew I had just entered the stare-down of my life. Luckily, it only lasted a few minutes, although it seemed like hours, and he soon turned his attention on another part of the woods. I used this moment to draw my bow and, with a loud twang, let the arrow fly.

The four-point, whose nerves were already on edge, crouched in anticipation of his getaway leap and the arrow passed harmlessly over his back.

Earlier this summer, as I was practicing with my recurve in my backyard, my thoughts returned to our up north deer camp and the strong debate which had ensued concerning the recurve vs. the compound bow for hunting purposes.

I had shot a compound several times during the conversation. True, it did shoot faster and flatter. Yet, I was able to shoot it vertically while sitting on the ground with legs crossed, Indian fashion.

Right, the wrist release my brother used allowed me to plow arrow after arrow into the center of the target with alarming regularity.

So, I should run right out and buy a compound? And miss all the fun I had on opening morning last year? I think not.....

Craft morning is finding busy hands creating Christmas ornaments to decorate the Christmas trees at the Village



While most of the stations consist of rain gauges, the station on Huron Line Road is a full monitoring center, to check rainfall, evaporation, snow melt conversion and wind.

"The phase we are in now is information gathering," said Tufts. "The next phase is a progress report on the project during a public hearing, which is tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 24, in the Sebewaing Area."

The project began April 15 and is expected to continue until October. It is funded by a \$77,000 grant from the Saginaw Bay Initiative, under the auspices of the state Department of Natural Resources.

It is a long-range study of watersheds to compile information for remedial action on sediment and pollution discharges from the contributing Saginaw Bay Watershed area into Saginaw Bay.

The study is a joint effort with the engineering companies of Williams, Osminski and the firm of Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr and Huber Inc. of Grand Rapids.

The Bad Axe firm is doing the field work and forwarding the data to the Grand Rapids firm to do the hydrological computer report of the watersheds characteristics. — By MARY DRIER

## Kidnapping guilty plea

A 24-year old Owendale man pled guilty last week to charges of soliciting a kidnapping and being a habitual offender.

James R. Haire faces a prison term of up to five years on the solicitation charge, and the penalty is doubled because he pled guilty to a habitual offender-third offense charge. And because Haire was on parole at the time of the offense, he must also serve a consecutive seven-year prison term for a parole violation, according to Huron Prosecutor Leslie Hagen.

Haire was jailed in the Huron County Jail awaiting trial on a charge of third-degree criminal sexual conduct, stemming from a March 5 assault on a 15-year old girl. He was arrested on that charge April 27 and was unable to post bond.

Hagen said jail officials were notified on July 23 by another inmate that Haire had offered the inmate \$5,000 to kidnap the girl until after his trial. Wearing a hidden transmitter, the inmate returned to Haire's cell and their conversation was taped. In that conversation, Haire made further plans to abduct the girl and he arranged to phone the inmate's friend, who was in fact an undercover officer, to arrange the kidnapping. Haire made that call late Saturday evening, Hagen said.

During the phone call, Haire and the undercover officer made plans to kidnap the girl before the trial. After Haire returned to his cell, the inmate went back into Haire's cell again wearing the hidden transmitter. They discussed the kidnapping and Haire's possible plans to kill the girl once he was released from jail. Haire assumed he would be released from jail if the victim did not appear in court, Hagen said.

The investigation of the kidnapping plan was handled by the Huron County Sheriff Department, Bad Axe Police Department, the Sanilac County Sheriff Department and a member of the Sanilac County Drug Task Force.

## Sebewaing Marina bids now sought

The state Department of Natural Resources began accepting bids Monday for planning, constructing and operating the Sebewaing Marina facility on a 10-acre site near the mouth of the Sebewaing River.

The facility, to be constructed on village-owned property, will contain about 100 boat slips and ancillary facilities, as determined by the developer.

The lease term will be for 25 years with a five-year renewal option.

"This is a unique program which utilizes the private sector's ability to finance substantial investments on properties owned by the public without the need for property expenditures," said DNR Director Roland Harmes.

The DNR's Harbor Development Program represents a public/private partnership and an opportunity to expand facilities for recreational watercraft users where demands are not currently being met.

With more than 850,000 registered boats, Michigan ranks first in the nation for the number of registered watercraft.

Through the Harbor Development Act (P.A. 1988), the DNR can enter into a legally-binding lease agreement with private developers to provide start-up costs for harbor development projects.

A portion of the revenues received by the developer from the project is returned to the Harbor Development Fund.

A proposal packet with instructions and description of the proposed project is now available.

Bids will be accepted until 3 p.m. Jan. 18, 1995. A pre-bid conference is tentatively scheduled for 1 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 20, in Sebewaing Village Hall.

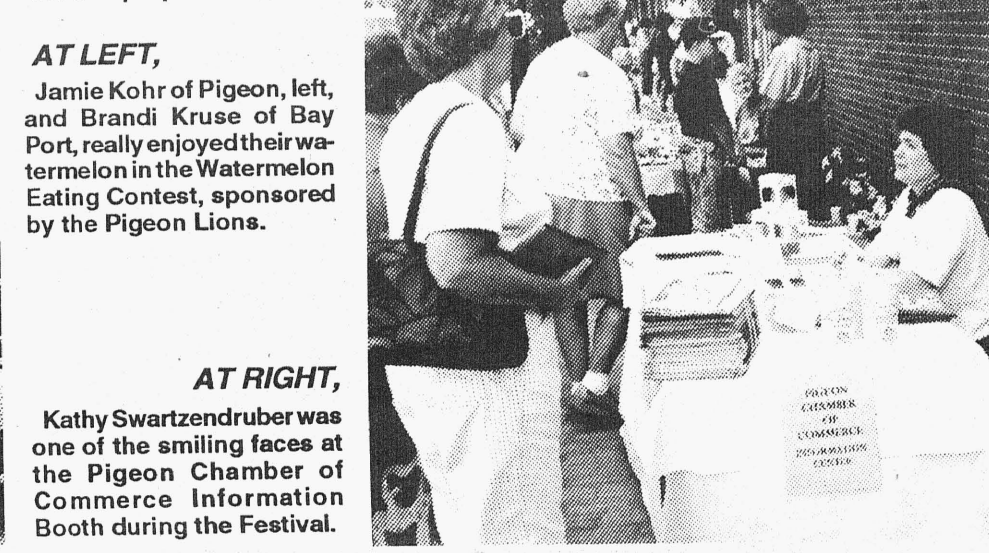

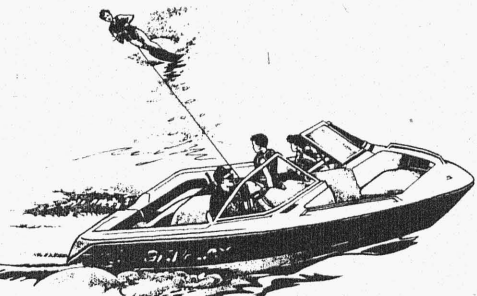
