## Gagetown hosts Barn Fest Saturday

Gagetown hosts a party with a purpose this Saturday, as the first Octagon Barn Festival recognizes the area's most-unique building.

Proceeds from the event will help save what is believed as the only octagon barn in the state.

The eight-sided barn was built by the late James Purdy about a mile east of Gagetown at 6948 Richie Road. It is better known locally as the "round barn," but ravages of age and neglect have taken a heavy toll on the 74-year-old octagon barn.

Saturday's Festival begins with a firemen's water battle at 9:30 a.m. followed by a Grand Parade at 10:30 a.m., a chicken barbecue by the Owendale Lions Club from noon to 2 p.m., and an ice cream social at the Gagetown United Methodist Church

Other activities throughout the day include: arts and crafts, town-wide garage sale, farmers' market, petting zoo, quilt show, bingo, mule team wagon rides sponsored by the Thumb Draft Horse Association, a clogging performance by The Heel Strutters, country-line dancing performances and "Save The Barn" souvenir sales.

Also, the Gagetown Post Office offers a special stamp cancellation from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. to commemorate the event.

"We hope to raise enough money from the festival to stabilize the barn so there is something to save," says Rose Putnam, tourism chairman for Tuscola 2001, Inc., one of the sponsors. "At least \$3,600 is needed to do minimal roof repairs on the octagon barn."

"The barn will not go through another winter with-

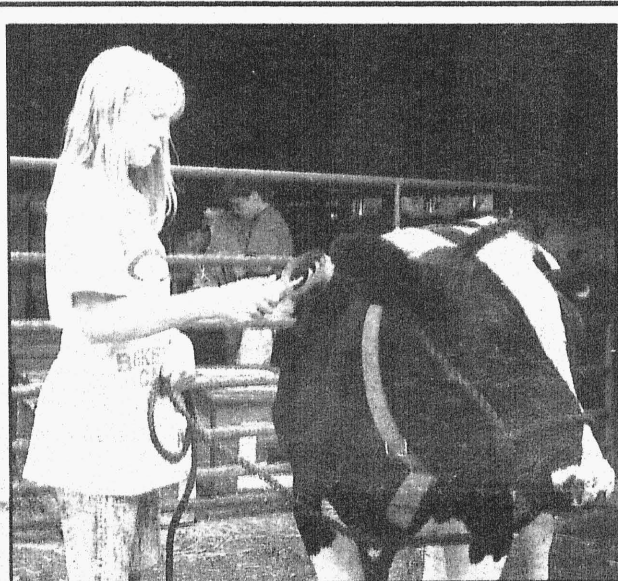
out having to have some repair work, so it won't deteriorate to a point where it can't be saved," she says.

The eight-sided barn has 12,000 square feet of storage, is four stories tall with about 300 windows, several gables and dormers—and is topped by a cupola.

### Gage starts 'pay to stay'

Huron County Sheriff Mike Gage has a way to make crime truly pay—with a new "pay to stay" program.

Starting this week, the county will charge inmates \$30 daily for each day they are in jail, if their expenses are not already paid by the state or other agencies.

However, the fee would drop to \$15 a day for those who pay up within 30 days of release.

One way to "get out of jail free" is to do community service work, Gage says. "We wouldn't make inmates who are willing to go out to do community service work pay the fee," says Gage. "This gives inmates an incentive to get out of bed in the morning and give something back to the community."

"If an inmate is willing to go out and donate seven to eight hours of his day, we will waive the fee. Hopefully, this will increase our community work program, so we can do more public service projects."

Gage isn't sure how much money the program will generate. "We feel any revenue we generate will be a help," says the sheriff. "It's a way to try to recoup part of the costs of lodging and meals, and a way to give incentive to help the community."

The program doesn't cover out-of-county inmates, because Huron County gets reimbursed from the inmate's home county for their expenses.

**THUMB'S EARLY YEARS:** The Thumb Area was part of the Northwest Territory in 1787, created primarily by Thomas Jefferson. When Ohio became a state in 1803, the Northwest Territory was dissolved... and the Thumb became part of Indiana Territory. Two years later, in 1805, the Michigan Territory was created, and Michigan became a state 32 years later, in 1837.

### A-F Schools in the black

Akron-Fairgrove Schools ended the 1993-94 school year in the black, according to an audit report by CPA John Walsh of Pigeon.

"This is the first time in seven years that we haven't had to spend out of the fund equity and have seen a plus balance," said Supt. Kenneth Tahfs. "The fund balance at the end of the year was \$53,732." Tahfs credits the district's financial stability with voters' passage of last year's 3-mill request for one year.

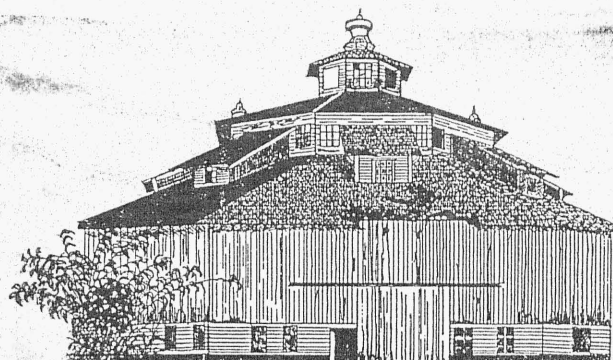
"That extra millage helped bail us out in more ways than one," Tahfs noted. "Under the new financing of schools, the financial aid we will be getting in the future is based on past revenues and that 3 mills they past last year will affect the amount of state aid we will get for years to come."

### Laker Board sets new policy

When the last month of school rolls around, school buses seem to be on the go constantly taking students on their yearly field trips. While those field trips are educational as well as fun, making up the schedules can play havoc with the school's transportation system.

To be more efficient in scheduling the numerous field trips, the Laker School Board of Education last week decided to ask teachers to coordinate their field trips. For example, the two

# Huron Bible Church to start in Thumb

A representative of Independent Bible Mission of Michigan (IBM) is working to start a non-denominational congregation called the Huron Bible Church within the next two years.

James Chastain and his family have moved to Pigeon and are pastoring through the Comstock Park-based IBM, to establish the church in Huron County, "to avail the resources of God's graces."

Chastain, 39, says God brought his family here in part because the perceived need for a new church here and because he has friends from the Thumb. The IBM group is affiliated with the Independent Fundamental Churches of America.

"We listened to God's call and came to the Thumb," Chastain says. "We saw the need here, after surveying possible sites for churches. Of 16 or so choices, Pigeon just kept coming up."

Chastain expects slow but steady growth for a local congregation. "I hope to have 100 people receiving from and giving to God in the next two years."

He says his group would be identified as:

1. a church that loves God;
2. a group that nurtures one another, and
3. a church to benefit the community.

A meeting location is being sought now, and he hopes to have a Sunday morning service schedule established soon. A mid-week Bible study session would follow.

In the five years following, Chastain hopes the Huron

Bible Church congregation would grow and establish a church building with full ministry — with special emphasis on young people and families.

"The ideal of a non-denominational church seems foreign to some," Chastain says. "It's hard for some to see this."

"But we build our church on what the scripture says. A church building isn't the answer: it's a personal relationship with Jesus Christ."

**Coming to the Thumb** Area is a major cultural change from Chastain's last church assignment.

His family spent the last 14 years ministering in Mexico, in the rural mountains of Cuetzalán, Puebla. The region is dominated by the Aztecs, with Spanish-speaking people and some Totonac tribes, working through Unevangelized Fields Mission International.

"Our activities included pioneer evangelism, church planting and leadership development of the regional pastors," Chastain says.

While there, he helped start three church congregations and trained locals to lead the churches — even though one was an 11-hour walk from the Chastain home. "Our goal is to train the locals in the national church. This helps

you learn things about yourself and God."

Two of his three children were born in Mexico — but all are bilingual, he notes.

**Huron Bible Church** is one of 20 such efforts underway by IBM at this time, he says. The nearest is a new congregation in Snover.

A native of Fairfield, Ala., Chastain graduated from Tennessee Temple University in 1977 with a theology degree and with a B.A. degree in religious education in 1979. He earned an M.A. degree in cross-cultural ministries from South Eastern Bible College in 1992.

## Input sought for Aug. 25 Sebawaing River meet

The Sebawaing River Watershed Management Planning process is in full swing and has identified several in-channel problem areas and upland sites, according to Vern Rounds, deputy Huron County drain commissioner and a member of the Sebawaing River drainage board.

Those problem areas have a potential impact on water quality, Rounds added.

The findings will be explained in a public meeting, scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 25, in USA Middle School, Sebawaing.

**He invites** interested individuals to attend, to hear of the findings and to gather further input from the community.

The planning process is funded by a \$70,000 Saginaw Bay Watershed Initiative Grant which is intended to take "a total watershed view" of the 65,000-acre Sebawaing River Watershed.

The project is sponsored by the Sebawaing River Inter-County Drainage Board, working in conjunction with the Huron and Tuscola Soil

Conservation Districts and a citizen advisory committee. Their aim is to develop a comprehensive watershed management plan which will deal with water quality issues as well as hydrologic concerns, Rounds says.

**The watershed** planning process is nearing the final stages of data collection and development of management practices to deal with soil erosion and water management.

Results of the planning, Rounds says, "will hopefully lead to funding to complete the practices to improve water quality within the watershed."

The Sebawaing River watershed study is a joint effort with the engineering companies of Williams Osminski & Associates Inc. of Bad Axe and Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr and Huber Inc. of Grand Rapids.

**The project** began April 15 and is expected to continue until October. The Bad Axe firm does field work and forwards it to the Grand Rapids firm for hydrological work.

## Mary K. Quinn won't return to school

Through the years, Mary K. Quinn has seen hundreds of students pass through her Caseville School classrooms, on their way to successful futures.

She's taught the children of earlier students, and now the third generation is starting school.

Those students make up a large extended family for Quinn, who retired recently after teaching nearly 34 years at Caseville Public School.

She began her career as a substitute teacher in 1959, and taught in Sebawaing for a semester during the 1961-62 school year.

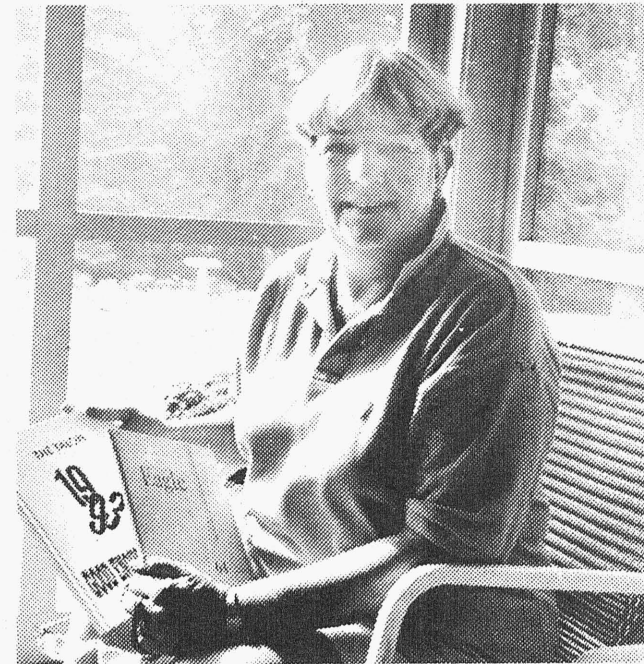
Then it was back to Caseville, where she taught physical education and coached the girls' basketball team. In 1968, she began teaching full-time after finishing her teaching degree.

**During her tenure**, she sponsored the school's Yearbook "The Talon" since 1963, served as the guiding light for the school's newspaper as the journalism and English teacher, directed the school plays, and introduced legions of students to the pleasures of reading Shakespeare.

And she admits she actually enjoyed being a class sponsor through the school year — a task many teachers are less than enthusiastic about.

But the most satisfying part of her long career, she says, was seeing "her" students succeed.

"Each year as they walked off that stage with their diploma, they became men and

women ready to succeed," Quinn says.

"The fun part of teaching was seeing each kid emerge

and find their area of expertise. It's been rewarding to help kids have good days because they can't believe their

high school years."

Quinn and her husband Bob, who retired five years ago from the Caseville Post Office, raised four children, all of whom she taught in school.

Son Dan is the Huron County Juvenile Officer, while Mark works for the FBI in Chicago.

Daughter Teri, whom Quinn also coached in basketball, lives in Kalamazoo and youngest son Tim lives in Joliet, Ill.

There are also eight grandchildren, and Quinn says she hopes she'll have more time to spend with them.

**Last year's** school play was the last to be presented in the old gym. A new auditorium and stage will be ready for use this fall, but Quinn most likely won't be directing.

But she'll probably be there as a volunteer, enjoying the conveniences of the new stage, not only with the Caseville School students, but also as a member of the Caseville Arts Council.

sections of Elkton fifth-graders may go to one attraction, while Pigeon and Bay Port fifth-graders may go to another. The Board wants all students in a particular grade to go on the same trip so that buses can move at full capacity.

"In no way will this detract from the field trip program," Supt. Robert Drury said. "This will just add some semblance of order and it will allow us to transport students more efficiently."

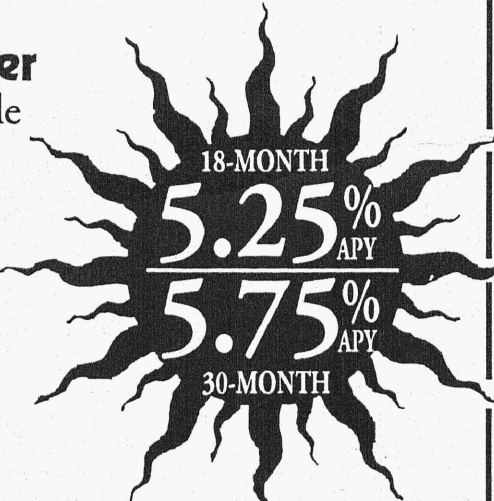
Completion of the Middle School is expected in February.

## Gambling to be as American as baseball?

There's a certain irony in the latest comparison of America's declining values: Forces are working to make gambling acceptable to more U.S. citizens by making it more available to average residents. That sounds as American as "baseball" — but of course THAT sport is presently being denied to true fans because of a labor walkout. Fans just can't win.

What IS this world coming to? For the first time ever, Detroit voters recently approved establishing casino gambling in their city. Already, two major plans are in the works, a floating casino on the Detroit River and an Indian-run site near Greentown.

Why are Detroiters willing to say "yes" to casinos now, after four previous "no" votes? Because that new Windsor casino across the Detroit River in Canada is sucking \$390 million from Michigan. A study says 80% of Casino Windsor's 19,000 average daily visitors are from the Detroit Area. Detroit leaders don't like seeing all that cash go elsewhere... so "Hello, casinos!"

It's not all that unusual. As folks who enjoy gambling already know, amazing Indian-run sites in Mount Pleasant, Sault St. Marie and St. Ignace already exist in our state, among others. That's closer than Las Vegas or Atlantic City — and is a casino REALLY that much different from wagering in the state-approved Michigan State Lottery? Probably not.

Plans are being rabidly discussed right now for Flint, Port Huron Township and even on the former Boblo Island. If you (literally) play your cards right, you could be less than one hour from a nearby gambling center in the next year or so.

Gambling's massiveness is amazing in our country. Americans bet a record \$394 billion at casinos, racetracks, sports books, lotteries, riverboats and cruise ships in 1993. That's up 17.1% from 1992.

Three-quarters of that \$394 billion total — \$297 billion — came from casino table games and slot machines. So that's where companies see big growth in "under-served" areas such as this.

We're actually not against gambling, since you can't stop it anyway. We ARE opposed to pie-in-the-sky dreamers who promise big economic growth and great jobs when casinos come calling. That just hasn't happened, nationally.

Do we really need one more vice, even though it's government-run? And yet, how could we stop it, even if we wanted to? It's a lose-lose choice...

### Officer answers Sebewaing 'breaks in bars' questions

I would like to respond to the person, or persons, who are desperate for an answer to "Why the police department personnel take breaks at the bars." Why not? There's nothing legally, morally, or ethically wrong with it!

The Michigan Liquor Control Commission encourages and expects local law enforcement to frequently enter licensed establishments to ensure that State liquor laws are being complied with. There is no specific time frame to perform this part of their duty.

The amount of time spent there "socializing" is actually better interpreted as "public relations," which for the most part has a positive result.

For some reason, no one seems to know who you are. Why is that? If you have a problem with "the bars," a "bar owner," or a particular "officer," then simply lodge your legitimate complaint with the Sebewaing Village Council at a regular scheduled meeting and it will be addressed. If not, what is your problem? The bars in this com-

munity are owned and operated by respected people who have clean and respectable establishments. They also serve good food, soft drinks, and have a friendly atmosphere. Proof of this lies in the fact that very few documented complaints are generated from these establishments.

Each Sebewaing Police Officer works a shift of 10 hours or more. Your emergency needs are met 24 hours a day by fire, police and ambulance personnel. Many of these people take breaks at "The Bar."

These on-duty personnel are in constant communication with Huron Central Dispatch, either by radio, telephone, or pager system.

All of these people are dedicated and trained to provide a service to this community. Why should it matter to you where they take a break? It certainly won't affect response time or the service you receive.

If this doesn't satisfy you, possibly it may shed some light on this issue, where other readers have formed an opinion by your constant challenge with no explanation.

## Thank you, Sen. Jim Barcia!

Everyone in the U.S. — and especially in the Thumb — who has ever hunted, or shot targets, or let fly an arrow, or walked the outdoors, watched bird migrations, carved a plumb line, carved a fish or waterfowl decoy, or enjoyed any portion of the great outdoors, owes a huge "Thank You" to our Fifth District Congressman, Jim Barcia.

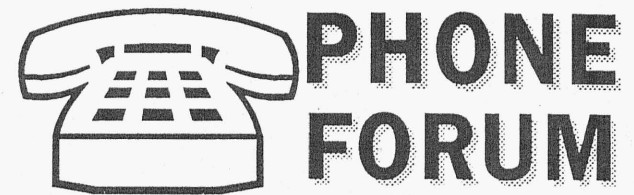
What convinced Rep. Barcia and Mrs. Barcia is that Washington, D.C., which has the strongest (and most) gun control laws of any municipality in the country at the same time has the highest homicide rate of any city in the world.

To expect criminals to turn in their weapons simply because a law states they should, is naive, the Congressman declared. "Don't expect criminals to turn in their tools just because a law was changed," he pointed out.

Declaring that "the crime problem is a people-problem," Jim Barcia stated that taking guns from law-abiding, sound, solid Americans makes no sense whatever. It would strip these good citizens of any defense they have against crime, while making it easier for those robbers and killers who do not turn in their guns. The criminals would revel if they knew for certain that their victims are without any means of defending themselves.

So, thank you, Congressman Jim Barcia. Hang in there! You are for us, so we are for you, too.

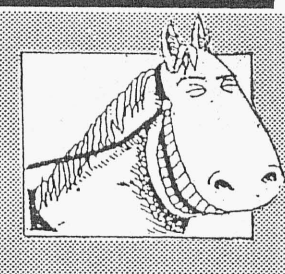

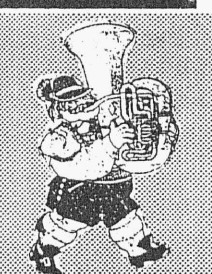
I think our lives are like these pictures. An ever-moving reality mixed with images that all seem to form something that is real but we can't hang onto.

## Caseville chipping charges

Village workers in Caseville no longer will be providing chipping services for property owners who abuse the service. Presently, property owners can set out branches that fall after a storm and village workers will chip them at no charge.

But some owners of vacant lots were misusing the service by clearing their property of large brush and expecting the village to take care of it. Now that the Village Council amended its recycling ordinance, that won't happen again.

Village Treasurer Shelley Stirrett said property owners will be charged by the number of man-hours and the type of equipment used to get rid of that brush from vacant lots. That charge could be as much as \$40 an hour, she said.

The recycling ordinance was also changed to read that the village won't be picking up grass clippings, because of problems finding someone to dispose of the clippings.

In other business, Caseville Council: ■ Appointed Arliss Kraft to fill the vacant seat left by Ray Jordan's resignation from Council. Kraft had narrowly lost his bid for re-election in March. His term will expire in March 1996.

■ Set Monday, Sept. 12 at 7 p.m. for a public hearing on amending an ordinance governing the number of Zoning Board members. Currently, there are six members of the board, but council members want to reduce that number to five, with two alternates. The board has had trouble getting a quorum at the meetings.

■ Rejected bids received on two parcels of property owned by the village. Village Manager Gary Kuckel is to list those properties with a local real estate office. — By AMY HEIDEN

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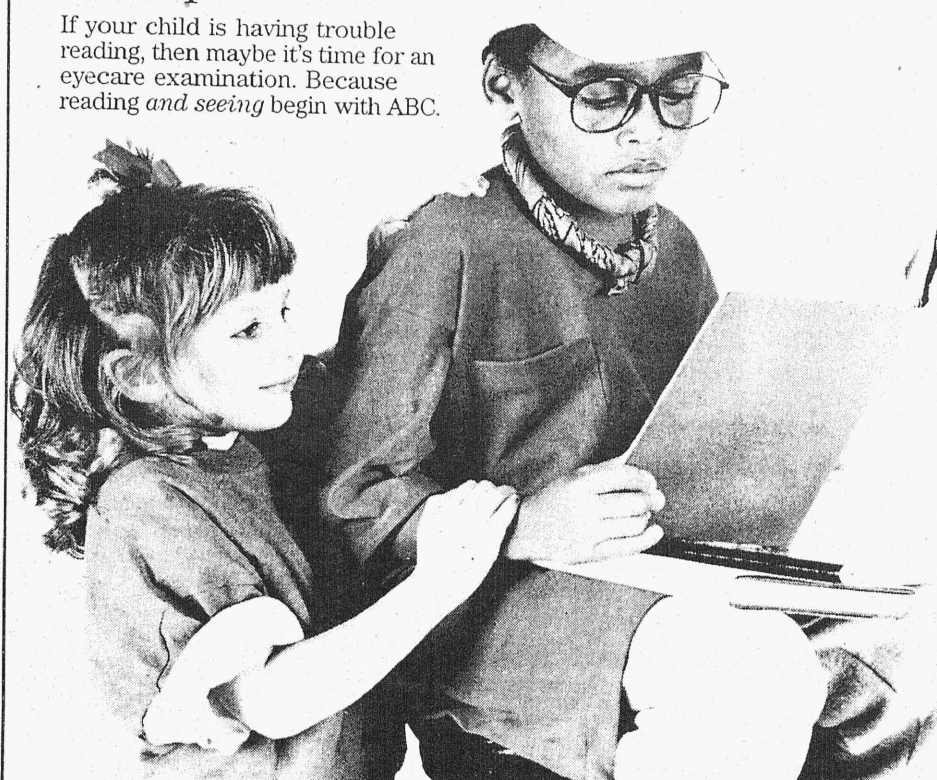

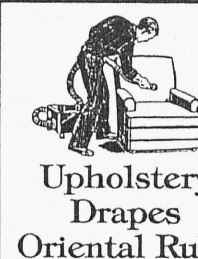

There are two types of camp cooks:

The first are those who forgo any fun associated with hunting, fishing or camping trips in order to slave over a hot fire all day in their efforts to produce mouth-watering meals.

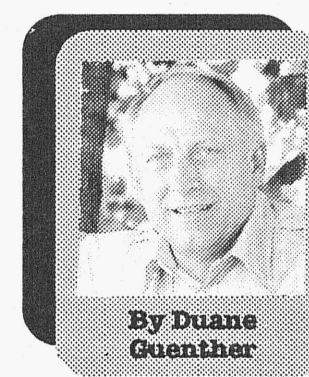
These are true martyrs who never last long at their job unless heaped with plenty of mealtime kudos to keep them going.

The other type of camp cook is one, who through long experience, develops shortcuts, time-savers and nifty recipes which enable him/her to produce great meals with little or no effort so they can partake in all the other camp activities.

This type also welcomes kudos, but gets most of their satisfaction from knowing they have turned a sometimes thankless job into a pleasant endeavor.

I pride myself in being one of these. However, if it were not for the versatility of my dutch oven, I may well drop my name from the ranks.

A few weeks ago I was put to the test when my family

gathers for a summer camping trip. Since all three of my children are teachers, one would think that getting together during the summer would be an easy thing to do, and it probably would be, had my daughter not married a resort manager.

So this year, in order to make everyone one happy, we found a cute little campground near the resort where my son-in-law works. That way, we could do those "vacationing things" during the day while Matt was working, and at night, meet in the campground for meals.

With this sort of plan in mind, Sweetwife and I tracked our brains for ideas of "dutch

oven meals" which would be nutritious, appetizing and substantial enough to feed 11 hungry people.

For those of you who are not familiar with a dutch oven, here is a brief description:

A dutch oven is nothing more than a cast iron pot with a lid. But there are many poor and inexpensive copies which, although they may look alike, are definitely not the true item.

A true dutch oven will have a flat bottom, slightly sloping sides and three short legs. It also has a convex lid with an upright rim and a small handle cast in the middle

with a wire bail.

The versatility of the dutch oven comes from the fact that you can boil, brown, fry, stew, simmer or bake a variety of foods quickly or slowly whatever your needs demand.

And cleaning a properly prepared dutch oven is as simple as wiping it out with a paper towel.

Although the lid can be turned upside down and used as a cast iron frying pan, or the pot as a normal kettle, the really neat thing about a dutch oven is its ability to slow cook a full meal with little or no attention.

Sounds too good to be true — but it isn't.

One of the meals we prepared during our camping trip was a roast beef dinner.

Since we were in a private campground and had to use a fire ring for cooking, we decided to use charcoal briquettes rather than a hardwood fire.

Two dozen briquettes were started on one side of the ring and a small hardwood fire on the other side. While the charcoal was getting ready, I browned a four-lb. beef roast over the hardwood flames.

After searing it on both sides, I set the oven off the flames and added chunked potatoes, carrots, sliced celery, a couple of bay leaves and a pint of water.

By this time, the charcoal briquettes were getting nice and gray and I placed eight under the oven and 16 on the lid.

Sweetwife had gleaned the exact number from an old Girl Scout manual she used during her "Brownie Days."

The reason you have so few under the oven is that's where the food is lying. I banked the coals with a few pieces of green wood and we joined the gang exploring the nearby sand dunes.

Three hours later, when we returned to the campsite, the aroma of roast beef filled the air.

Brushing the ashes from the lid and carefully lifting it off revealed a perfect roast beef dinner with all the trimmings.

A lot of work? Naw... Worth it to own a dutch oven? You bet...

Did I tell you about the cherry-peach cobbler we fixed the next night? Let me know if you're interested...

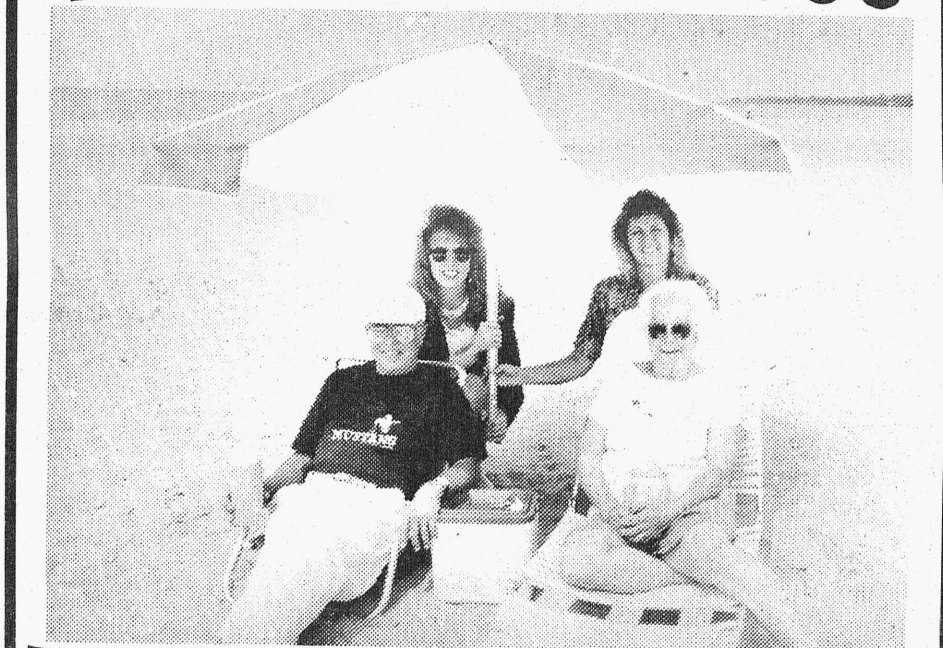

## What choice for Sebewaing trash collection?

The question of trash disposal is an ever-present one and is growing in importance with each passing year.

It's an oft-asked question for Sebewaing Council members, and now the Council would like to know how residents wish to deal with the question.

Trash collections are made regularly in the village, but changes are afoot—such as the new law which forbids any lawn grass or leaves to be picked up by trash firms that dump into landfills.

During this spring and summer, Tresa Boesch has been the village's supervisor of the recycling station, which she will continue until she leaves for school in September. The

station is open Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon. Sebewaing residents are being asked these two questions, in monthly billings, to be turned in by Aug. 15:

"1. Do you want to see the Village of Sebewaing incorporate curbside recycling in the weekly garbage pickup to its customers, or

"2. Do you want the Village of Sebewaing to discontinue its recycling program until the Federal Government makes recycling mandatory?"

To give residents more information on the questions, John Pitcher, council member chairman of the trash committee, adds these com-

ments:

"Case City, Elkton and Bad Axe have curbside recycling. Caseville has its own recycling plant and truck and is doing well.

"Each year manufacturers are making more recyclables. "Everyone who uses the recycling center in Sebewaing Saturday mornings between 9-12, likes what is being done there.

Questionnaires they answered show that a great percentage would like to add to the recycling center, would pay for recycling (\$2-\$2.75 per month for curbside recycling) and appreciates the interest that the village is putting into recycling.

"Curbside recycling could include: Green, brown and clear glass bottles, steel or tin cans, most #2 HDPE plastics, laundry, detergent containers, milk and water jugs, newspapers, cardboard and yard waste.

"There are several recycling companies in the business, so we can get what's best for us now, for the long run ahead of us, because now is the time for best pricing.

"The recycling company that would service us would also train us in the recycling aspect, such as using bins, setting curb times and handling trash."

"We're asking all residents to tell us which direction they want the council to take," Pitcher says.

"This is an important question, and it will be with us for many years."

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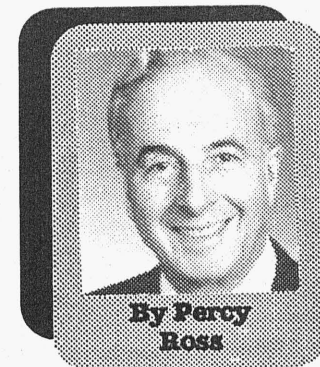
## The higher the education, the harder they fall...

Oh, we're lucky. The bank always pays them and charges us \$10 for each one we write.

We do limit our bad checks to three per pay period. One to the grocery store, the second one to buy things like soap, toothpaste and diapers, and the third one only if one of the kids really, really need something.

Our system is failing us. We have less and less money every two weeks. I bet you wonder why I'm not working?

Well, everyone I know calls this a lame excuse, but I quit my job (I was making \$4.50 an hour) to stay home with my kids. My oldest child was doing poor in school. Not that he wasn't trying, he just needed extra help.

He's brought his grades up considerably and he's very proud of himself. Percy, we're at least \$10,000 in debt. With \$100 we could buy groceries

for two weeks. But, we would be forever grateful for just a bag of extra large diapers.— Mrs. J. B., Mitchell, SD

DEAR MRS. B.:

The very best I can offer you is some temporary assistance. I can understand your inability to work outside the home at this time, however, that shouldn't preclude you from being able to make money at home.

Have you considered offering daycare to other working families with children?

I know it isn't easy but you're going to have to improve your financial picture from within. In the meantime, my check is in the mail to help you over the next month.
