# Wildlife proposal for Charities

By WALT RUMMEL

No one knows for sure how many years Big Charity and Little Charity Islands have been lying out there at the confluence of Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron.

It is known that French explorer Jean Nicolet recorded their location in 1629 and called them The Charities as a "thank you" for the charity of God, in placing them as a haven for early explorers and

The islands have been privately owned for many years, so there is little official written evaluation of the two pieces of land about halfway between northwestern Huron County and southeastern

Areñac County. Early in 1994 officials at Shiawassee National Wildlife Refuge proposed that the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service acquire the two islands and include them into the

That would be a giant step to protect and improve the Saginaw Bay/Lake Huron wildlife potential.

Doug Spencer, manager of Shiawassee Refuge, filed a draft in late 1993 to acquire the islands. In July he presented a written preliminary project proposal to the assistant regional director of USFWS, Region 3, Fort Snelling, MN.

That proposal is under study at the Fort Snelling Region 3 headquarters, where Stan Jackowicz heads the real estate office of USFWS.

In late August, Spencer and Shiawassee Refuge Biological Technician David Peters visited Big Charity, along with property owners, legislative representatives, US-FWS staffmembers and members of Nature Conservancy and Audubon Society.

They were met by Robert Wiltse of AuGres, owner of Big Charity, who has begun developing the 222-acre is-

Spencer declared himself as extremely pleased with what they found:

For one thing, they located an active Bald Eagle nest;
There are Pitcher's Thistle

Plants, protected by the Endangered Species Law; \* He was impressed by the potential for Piping Plover return;

Big Charity is "unique" be-

cause it has lots of mature trees, many Red Pines, and other old trees that show the island is stable and has been in this condition for many years;

There is lots of native American history, with many examples of early Indian life with artifacts;

Spencer noted that the development that has taken place construction of channel and boat slips by Wiltse-is not in a critical

He concluded that Wiltse has done a "good job" to keep Big Charity in its earlier pristine condition.

"What you see on these islands is what was once seen along many miles of Michigan shores," Spencer explained, "before development began."

Little Charity Island is known to have rookeries for many colonial birds-Herons, Terns, Gulls, Egrets and Cor-

Spencer was particularly pleased that an active Bald Eagle nest was sighted. In January he reported that the big birds had nested on Big Charity until the 1950s. Then, as Eagle populations de-creased, the Charity Eagle families also disappeared. Now, as they are again increasing, he said it is reasonable to assume that Eagle nesting may be established again.

"Now, this soon, it has happened and that Bald Eagle family already established itself," he concluded.

The endangered Piping Plovers were longtime historical nesters on Big Charity beaches, so there is a longterm potential that the nowscarce little Plovers would again re-occupy those beaches.

Wiltse offers ferry service from Caseville and Au Gres to the island May to October, and is trying to develop group color tours or bird migration watching to the island in October. He has details, by calling 1-800-933-9442.

# 4 ballot proposals Nov. 8

Four statewide proposals will be on the General Election ballot on Tuesday, Nov. 8. Here's how wording will appear: PROPOSAL A — A proposal to convene a constitutional convention for the purpose of drafting a general revision of the State Constitution. (Proposal required under Article XIII, Section 3 of the Michigan State

Constitution).

PROPOSAL B — A proposed constitutional amendment to limit Proposed constitutional amendment to limit security. criminal appeals. (Proposal provided under Senate Joint Resolution D—adopted by the State Legislature and filed with the Secretary of State on Feb. 15, 1994).

PROPOSAL C — A referendum on Public Act 143 of 1993 — an amendment to Michigan's auto insurance laws. (Proposal provided by referendum petition).

PROPOSAL D -- Á proposed constitutional amendment to establish a Michigan State Parks Endowment Fund. (Proposal provided under Senate Joint Resolution E — adopted by the State Legislature and filed with the Secretary of State on May 11, 1994.)

Tuscola County Extension Agriculture Agent Dennis Stein has resigned to accept a new position.



# Caro Airport gets \$30,000

Caro Municipal Airport is one of 13 Michigan airports to share \$9.4 million in funds granted by the state Aeronautics Commission. Tuscola County's only airport will receive \$30,000 for an environmental assessment with \$27,000 in federal funds, \$1,500 in state and \$1,500 in matching local

The assessment is needed in upgrading the airport located west on town on M-81. The Airport Authority recently approved building a 13-bay T-hanger on the southwest portion of the field. Anticipated cost is \$200,000.

Long range plans include a runway extension, construction of a parallel taxiway, construction of a new crosswind runway, a new terminal to include aircraft parking a tie-down area and new lighting.



# Loss of factory is sad indeed

Last week's announced closing of a longtime Western Thumb factory is devastating to the whole region, as well as to the 85 people who earned their livelihood there. But, could Pigeon Manufacturing have been saved? Could it have somehow been sold, or turned over to a different owner or group who may have been able to make it profitable?

Of course, we'll never know now. Owner Anthony Barclae plans to close the company within the next six to nine months, and has sold the building plus some of the stamping presses to next-door neighbor Huron Casting, Inc. Thanks to that booming operation, the former Pigeon Manufacturing building will likely be hustling for many years.

About one-third of the current PMC workers are eligible to take retirement, and likely will do so. It's a good sign now that nearly all other local factories — elsewhere in Pigeon, plus Sebewaing, Elkton, Bad Axe and other towns — are hiring and adding shifts. It's unfortunate Pigeon Manufacturing wasn't able to do that.

Owner Barclae hinted that one of the reasons he chose to close the plant was that Pigeon's Village Council and Planning Commission turned down PMC's request to rezone an adjacent parcel to industrial, thwarting his plans to bring in a \$7 million package of work. He would have used the land to store tooling and dies, and the emphasis would have been on "quick-change"

We wonder now if the neighbors who opposed the rezoning — and were victorious — are happy with the final outcome. Would they have opposed the rezoning if they had known PMC was so close to closing, without it?

Yet we find more fault with Barclae's failure to explain his plans fully. Never was a worry — or threat — expressed that PMC needed the rezoning to stay open. The neighbors had valid complaints, based on past experience, and were only trying to protect their own personal property.

But whoever was more at fault, one factory will

no longer offer jobs, benefits and tax base to this area. We all lose, because the pay scales found at PMC aren't easily added. The town needed this factory more than the factory apparently needed the town, at this time, we're sad to say...


