R. Brent Woodward was the 1995 recipient of the Liberty Bell Award from the Huron County Bar Association. Sgt. Woodward, safety education director for the Huron County Sheriff's Department, received the award last Tuesday at a luncheon held in his honor by the Bar Association.

Woodward has been employed for 30 years with the Sheriff's Department, where he began promoting safety programs in 1973 by doing a presentation on boating safety to students in schools throughout the county. He has been working exclusively on promoting safety since 1983.

In 1980, Woodward and his wife Penny, who live south of Elkton, created Safe-

tyville in the basement of their home. The Safetyville project is a scaled-down version of an entire community used to teach safety issues to children in kindergarten and first grade.

In 1990, he again worked with his wife to create another safety program called K.A.D.—Kids Against Drugs.

Woodward is involved in promoting the Bicycle Safety Program presented each year and "Do You Drink & Drive" program for 10th graders.

During the summer, he handles parade security. In his off-time, he enjoys spending time with his family, lifting weights and performing magic tricks.

The Woodwards have two children, Amy Maurer and Marc Woodward.

USA hires new Supt. Richard Ramsey

After five long months of hard work, the USA School Board of Education can breathe a sigh of relief.

Last Friday, after a day-long tour of the school district and an extensive meeting with members of the USA Board of Education, Davison High Principal Richard Ramsey signed a three-year contract to become the second Superintendent of the Unionville-Sebewaing School District.

"We are very excited," says USA Board President Raymond Bauer. "Mr. Ramsey is an excellent find."

While Ramsey does not

have experience as a superintendent, he is no stranger to the many problems associated with public school administration.

On June 30, he will complete his ninth year as principal at Davison. During his tenure, he has been in charge of more than 1,500 students, a staff of more than 80 teachers and support staff plus six administrators.

Prior to his position at Davison, Ramsey was the chief line administrator at New Lothrop High School, a district similar in size to USA. Ramsey, his wife Lynn and their children Teresa and

in the Thumb. "My biggest task," Ramsey says, referring to succeeding USA's William Dodge, "is to fill the void left by a guy who's a legend."

Dodge retired this January after spending 31 years at the helm of the USA School District, and as superintendent of the former Sebewaing School District.

"USA has an exciting Board of Education," Ramsey says, "And I am looking forward to rolling up my sleeves and getting to work."

Ramsey will begin his three year contract on July 1st, with a salary of \$68,000.

Computers connect Caseville to the world!

Sometime this summer, computers in the Caseville Public Schools will not only be capable of talking to each other, but to other computers on the Internet.

All 44 computers will be linked together with hardware from Holcomb's, of Cleveland, the eastern Michigan Apple Corp. representative, Randy Maurer of Bad Axe will do the installation, said Supt. James Stahl. The Caseville Board of Education approved the \$14,000 cost of the hardware and installation last week.

In other business, the Caseville Board:
Accepted a bid of \$3,940 from Arnold Sales of Bay City for a new Castex electric carpet extractor with attachments.
Approved a summer reading program for K-6 students. The six-week program will emphasize a phonics program for grades K-2, and a reading decoding program for grades 1-6 along with parent tutoring.
Adopted the 1995-96 school calendar, consisting of 183 student days and 189 teacher days. The first day of school will be Tuesday, Aug. 29.

Set Monday, June 19 at 7:15 p.m. as the date for a review of the general fund budget as well as other school fund budgets. The meeting will be in the school library.

Corrections, amplifications

In last week's Newsweekly, it was correctly reported the USA School Board passed a resolution to allow out-of-district students to ride USA buses to parochial schools in the district at no cost.

However, a special board meeting held the following Thursday rescinded the resolution and the practice of charging transportation cost for out-of-district students who attend parochial schools will remain in force. Parents of those students are now being billed by the USA Business Office.

Caseville votes 'no' twice

Voters in Caseville Township rejected a one-mill tax increase for three years last Tuesday which would have allowed the Caseville Township Fire Department to move into larger quarters.

The measure was defeated by an overwhelming margin, with 313 no votes versus 102 yes votes.

If approved, it would have allowed the Fire Department to purchase the former Brighton Metals building on M-25 to remodel for use as its base. Fire Department officials say the department suffers from a lack of storage space for its trucks and equipment.

Township Supervisor Joseph Cilc said he believed that voters felt the Brighton Metals building was too old for such a use. He said Township officials will try to come up with an alternative.

"We were trying to keep costs down by buying this building and remodeling it," Cilc said. "We thought it was the best deal for the dollar. But now we'll revitalize the committee and try

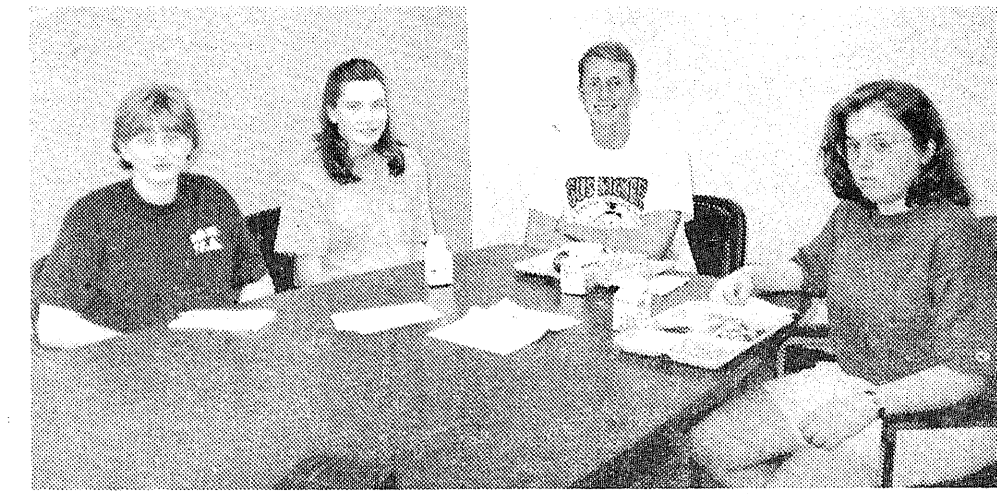
USA High's Baccalaureate is June 2

2-week demolition reprieve for Esterline Building

Sebewaing Village Council listened last Monday, as members of the Sebewaing Historical Society outlined reasons the Esterline Building should not be razed.

The Society presented eight major points citing the Esterline Building was a historic building, a landmark, had solid walls, solid footings, foundations and mortar, outside cracks on the front of the building were normal, and finally that the building was not in danger of falling down, during the May 15 regular Council meeting.

They also said the building was being considered as a Historic Site, and — while agreeing it needs attention — they were attempting to secure grants to do the restoration work needed. The Society wants to use the building for a work place, housing offices, storage and a museum.

After discussion, which included several options proposed by Village Attorney Richard Trowhill, Council members granted the Society a 14-day stay of the demolition order. To have the order rescinded, the Historical Society has until 5:30 p.m. on May 31 to present proper plans for the building's improvement.

Approved the hiring of four summer workers for the streets and recreation departments.
Approved Sam Lupp for the re-painting of park signs at a cost of no more than \$600.

Ted Leipprandt is ready to retire... once more...

Back in 1987, Ted Leipprandt retired from his position as manager of the Cooperative Elevator Co. in Pigeon, a post he'd held for 13 years. Three months later, he was back at a desk at the Co-op—

this time as a bean merchandiser. He led the way in helping the company strike out on its own in marketing beans, visiting canners and packagers in the U.S., the United Kingdom and the Czech Republic. Now, eight years after he "retired" the first time, Leipprandt has retired again from the Co-op, ready to spend more time in his beloved apple orchards.



TED LEIPPRANDT OF PIGEON will be spending more time in his apple orchards now that he's retired for the second time from the Cooperative Elevator Co.

"I feel fortunate that I've been able to do something that was worthwhile and necessary. I've had a real commitment to cooperatives because it's such a necessary part of agriculture."

"And I've appreciated the opportunity to work at Cooperative Elevator Co. It's certainly grown in the 35 years I've been here."

Since Leipprandt began working at the Co-op in 1959, the Cooperative has expanded from having 350,000 bushels of storage then to over 11 million bushels of storage capacity today.

Assets in 1959 totaled about \$950,000, while today the Co-op boasts \$35 million in assets.

While retiring from one job, Leipprandt has expanded his other job—that of apple producer.

In 1960, he began planting apple trees on his property on Filion Road, then began a nursery business. The nursery was sold in 1980 and even more apple trees were planted.

His last day on the job will be May 31, when Mike Janowicz will take over the bean merchandising position.

"Life goes on and I'm ready to do something different," Leipprandt says, with his familiar smile.

In 1994, he and his wife Peggie remodeled their former nursery building for processing, marketing and storing apples and Peggie's dried flowers. The "Apple Haus" was a popular stop on last fall's Homes Tour.

But apples won't take all of Leipprandt's time. He's actively involved in Rotary International, having served as president of the Pigeon Club and as a past district governor.

He also will continue on the Board of Directors of Detroit Edison, the 4-H Foundation, and Eastern Michigan Farm Credit.

The Leipprandts through the years have actively supported Rotary's student exchange programs and they have continued to correspond with a couple of their former exchange visitors. And this summer, they plan to take a trip to Europe to visit three of those students, one of which they hosted in 1959.

An open house in honor of Leipprandt's retirement is planned for Sunday, June 4 from 2 to 5 p.m. at the Pigeon District Library.

Actually, property owners in Pigeon are already paying for the tower, with the millage folded into the village's operating fund budget, says Village Clerk Janet Heckman.

In 1985, when the tower was built, it was financed through Public Act 185, which didn't require a public vote. The village pays the Huron County Department of Public Works for the tower.

Now, village officials want to take the water tower millage out of the general operating millage.

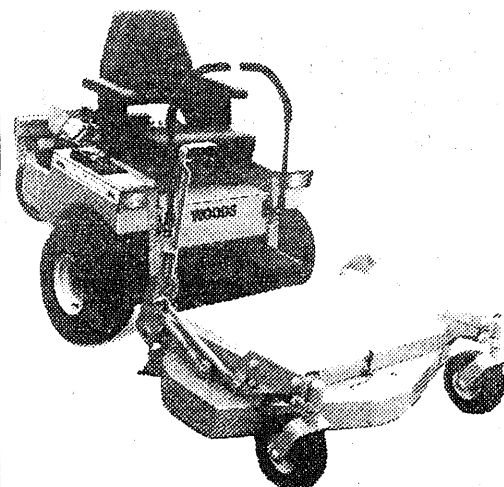
"This is actually a tax shift and a bit of a tax reduction," Heckman said. "It's anticipated that council will levy 14 mills on the July 1 tax statements, which is a little less than the current millage rate."

Voters would see a drop of .3245 mills, she added.

If voters approve the measure, the tower would be paid off over a seven-year period.

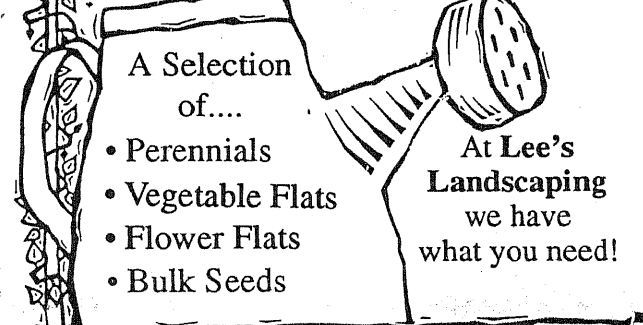

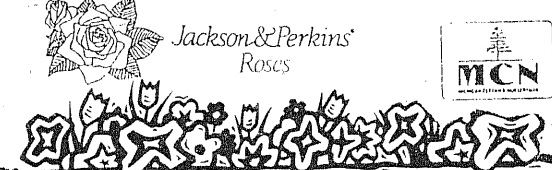

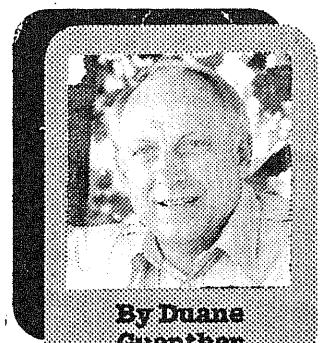

The three-dollar bargain

The day was perfect. In the midst of the first warming trend of the spring, the temperature had peaked near 70 degrees and a soft, warm southwest wind pushed marshmallow clouds across the azure sky. It was a fine day to be outdoors, and although there were hundreds of chores to be finished back home, I did not feel guilty about sneaking away for a round of golf. After a fairly decent start, I now stood on the third hole faced with a monumental decision. The par three, one of the prettiest of the entire course, is the kind that can reach up and grab you.

Today, it was playing 170 yards right into the teeth of a sudden freshening breeze, and with the pin tucked into the right front corner of the undulating green it would be all carry over the yawning pond lying from tee to green.

Absent-mindedly, I reached in my pocket and teed up the brand new Titleist that moments before had cost me \$3 at the club's pro shop. It was one of those long distance balls used by the pros, sporting a Balata cover expounded to produce a few more yards on every hit.

Poised over the ball, a fleeting thought crossed my mind. "Pick up the ball," it said, "and replace it with one which has seen a little more service."

Before I could answer myself, the muscle memory of my body took over and the five iron began its backward arc. It stopped momentarily at the top, parallel to the ground, and then rushed at the ball catching it flush and producing that satisfying metallic "click."

The ball jumped from the club's face and made a bee-line for the green, dead on the pin. At the top of its flight,

hesitated slightly and then pushed gently by the wind, it drifted to the right and made a , not so satisfying, plunk when it hit the water.

In one brief moment the transfer of \$3 had gone from me, to the pro, to the drink. I could have gotten the same results trying to skip 12 quarters across the pond and probably had more fun.

The lost ball could have ruined my day, after all, it had just cost me \$3, but, like so many other sportsmen, I accepted it as part of the game. Similar, perhaps, to shooting a handful of shotgun shells, losing a broadhead which skimmed over the shoulders of a whitetail, or breaking off a Hot 'n Tothung up on a snag.

Then why has such a cry arose across our state when the DNR proposed a \$3 in-

crease in our hunting and fishing licenses?

On May 23, the DNR will hold a public hearing in our area on a proposed plan to increase the cost of hunting and fishing licenses. These recommendations are being presented to address the deficit in the Game and Fish Protection Fund.

The Fund supports the Fisheries, Wildlife and Law Enforcement Divisions of the DNR and is expected to have a \$5.6 million deficit in the 95-96 fiscal year.

The Fund is comprised of revenues from game and fish license fees, interest and earnings from the Game and Fish Trust Fund, settlement fees, federal indirect earnings, and reimbursement for liquidated damages.

But, more importantly, the Fund is the one source which

daily affects each and every hunters and fisherman in the State of Michigan.

While you may not agree with the proposed hike in fishing and hunting licenses (small game and fishing will go from \$10.35 to \$13) you can't deny you get a lot for your money.

Stop and think of the hours you spend on the water or afield in pursuit of fish and game and then compare it with a round of golf (\$20 for four hours), or a movie (\$5.75 for two hours) and you soon will see it is an excellent value.

If you still think the license fees should not be increased why not show up at the public hearing and voice your concern.

It will be at the Bay City Holiday Inn on May 23 at 7 p.m.
