## Bay Port Fish Co. turns 100

In 1895, when W.J. Orr and William H. Wallace joined forces with Saginaw's George B. Morley and Albert Harvey to pool \$50,000 and organized the Bay Port Fish Company, little did they know the business would still be going strong 100 years later.

If those four founders were still alive, they would have to give plenty of credit to present owners Forrest and Tod Williams and their partner Dennis Root.

In a time when many "old-fashioned" businesses are floundering, the Bay Port Fish Company is healthy and flourishing — and the key to their success may well come from the owner's diversified ideas.

"Basically, the fishing business hasn't changed much over the past 100 years," says Forrest Williams. "We still harvest fish from the lakes and ship to the same buyers."

However, one look at the Osprey — a sleek, new boat lying at dockage near the company's fish house — tells you the present owners are busy keeping up with the modern technology neces-

sary to stay competitive in the '90s.

According to Williams, the biggest difference with today's company is the type of fish they sell, and the method of processing them.

"When we bought the company in 1977," Tod Williams says, "they were catching a lot more rough fish. Today, we're big into whitefish."

**Reason for the switch** has much to do with the DNR's 1987 decision to close the fishing area two miles outside the islands from June 1 to Sept. 1 each year.

"That's basically where all the rough fish are," says Forrest, "So, taking advice from our buyers and the DNR, we decided to go after whitefish."

Williams also indicates they do a lot more processing now than they did years ago.

"They used to catch the fish, pack them in ice and ship them off to New York," Williams recalls. "Now we fillet white buffalo, mullet, and whitefish before they are shipped."

"The modern day consumer no longer likes to deal with a whole fish, so we give them fillets."

If you walk through the Bay Port Fish Company you will usually see several workers busy cleaning and fillet-

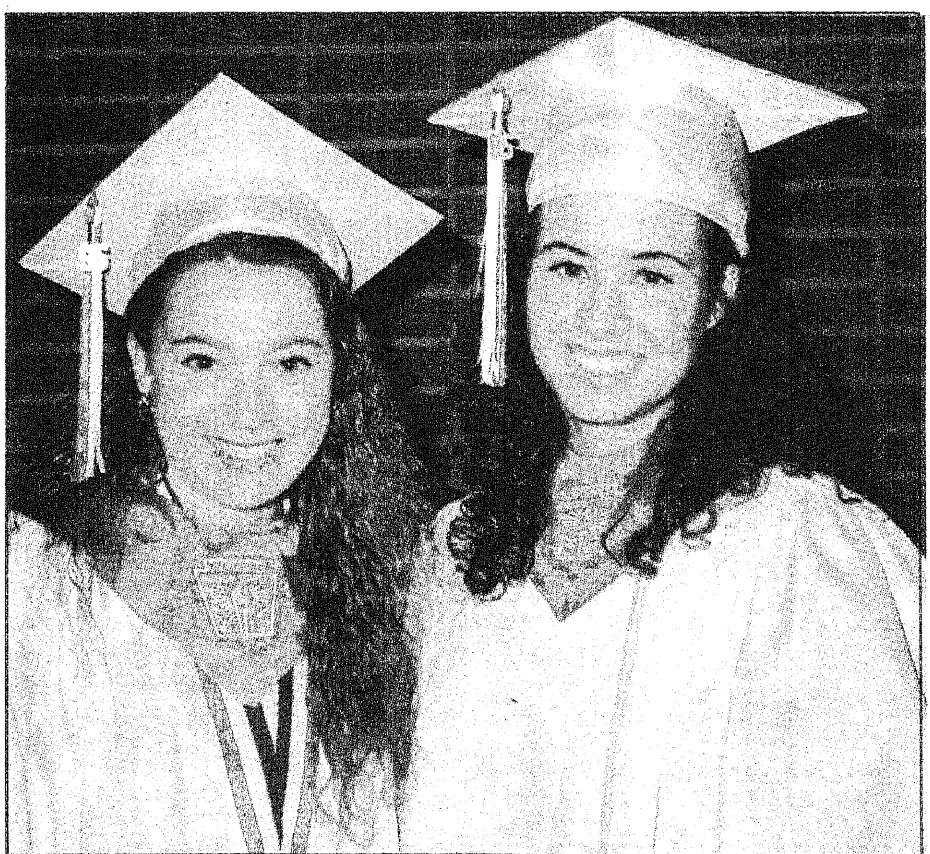
ing fish. It is one of the few places where this practice is still carried on.

### Tony Grant new USA High/Middle School Principal

The USA Board of Education released plans to reorganize their administrative team at a special June 1 Board meeting.

With the movement of USA Middle School students to the new complex on Wildner Road next fall, Board officials decided to create a High/Middle School Principal position which would employ one administrator to oversee the entire secondary complex.

"We decided that this was the best way to go," says Board President Ray Bauer. "We did not see the need to have three administrators at the site."

**The plan calls for** transferring current Middle School Principal Tony Grant into the job of Secondary Principal, which will include jurisdiction over both the High School and Middle School at the new site.

Grant has been with the USA School District for 26 years. During that time he has served as a teacher in the Middle School, coached in various sports, been the district's Athletic Director, and most recently has handled the post of Middle School Principal.

The move will reduce the total number of administrators in the USA District to three. Richard Ramsey will serve as the Superintendent, Matthew Airgood the Elementary Principal in Unionville, and Grant as the new Secondary Principal.

Former High School Principal David Blossom was laid off in the action, as the administrator with the least seniority, and will not return to his former post. —By DUANE GUENTHER

### Pigeon voters okay shift

Pigeon voters said "yes" to a millage shift last week, allowing the Village Council to pay off its debt on the water tower.

Village Clerk Janet Heckman said only 58 voters came to the polls, with 47 yes votes and 11 no.

Pigeon residents were already paying for the tower, with the millage folded into the village's operating fund budget. The

## Bay Port Fish Co. observes 100th year of 'flopping fresh fish'

"There are 27 commercial licenses on Saginaw Bay," Williams says, "and, we're probably the only one who still processes and ships fish."

While the company owns or leases four licenses themselves, they act as fish jobbers for another license in Bay Port and six more in Sebawaing.

"Most commercial fishermen today are one-man, one-boat operations," Williams says, "some deal with trap nets, but many just set lines for catfish."

While the Bay Port Fish Company fishes for many species of fish, their major attention is centered on whitefish.

"There are lots more whitefish in the lakes now," Williams says, "they're a native fish who like the cleaner water the Bay now has to offer."

"We had a boat built just to handle the whitefish," Tod Williams added.

The boat he refers to is the Osprey, designed by Fred Brown of Bay Port and Tod

Williams and built by the Weldall Welding and Engineering Co. of Elkton — for the express purpose of catching whitefish.

The 52-foot boat presently tends 10 nets which are located more than 20 miles from the home port, but its 20-mph cruising speed eats up that distance easily.

"With this kind of boat," Tod says, "you can head out,

lift the nets and be back at the docks before the bad weather hits."

But catching different types of fish isn't the Company's only diversification.

They have subcontracted with the DNR to help teach Michigan Indians how to fish with trap nets. They also have worked with Consumer Power Co. in both Bay City and at the Ludington Pump

Storage Pond helping them to set nets which keep fish out of the turbines.

Their latest venture is with "perch farming," where they are working in Grand Haven, in conjunction with Michigan State University

and the DNR, to do research on better ways to raise perch commercially.

Amid all of these changes, the Williams brothers and Root have maintained two ideals: one is to cooperate with the DNR, and the other

is to promote Bay Port and the fresh fish industry to people throughout Michigan and the United States.

One look at their business operations quickly tells you they are doing one heck of a job...

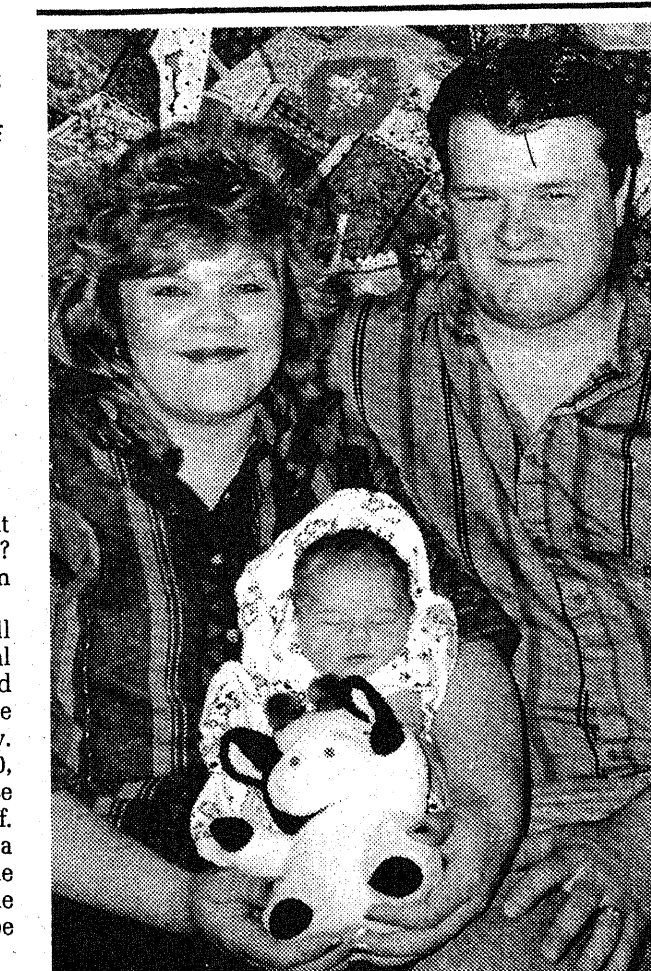

## Sebawaing hears Marina woes; seeks tear-down bids

Council members listened to their first complaint concerning the new Sebawaing Marina at the June 5 Sebawaing Village Council meeting.

A resident, who lives adjacent to where the marina will be built complained about the proposed width of Pitcher Street and whether or not it would be resurfaced before Davis Street is removed. Marina plans call for the removal of the south portion of Davis Street to make way for the basin.

The resident questioned if the 24-foot width was actually legal according to state law and asked to see the law granting such dimensions.

President David Wineman said the questions would be answered as soon as data was collected.

Council also passed a resolution to seek bids for the demolition of the Esterline Building. Since the Sebawaing Historical Society apparently did not meet the criteria of the latest show-cause hearing, Council members are proceeding with the demolition order.

Another request to village officials came from a property owner adjacent to the Main Village Park. The owner, who sent someone to speak in their behalf, has offered to sell some of the property to possibly enlarge the existing park. The matter was turned over to the Park Committee for further study.

In other business, Sebawaing Village Council: ■ agreed to hold a Truth in Taxation hearing this year, with date to be announced.

■ accepted with regrets the resignation of trustee Rod Tietz. Council agreed to appoint a new person to replace him, and will advertise for the vacancy, in the term lasting until March, 1996;

■ accepted donations of \$300 from the Sebawaing Sparkettes and \$200 from the St. Peter's Lutheran Church of Bach's AAL group for treescape in the new Muellerwise Park. — By DUANE GUENTHER

■ **Affection can be expressed in many ways.** He always seemed to have room in his lap for at least two children and a dog near by nuzzling for a bit of that affection too.

■ **Loving God is important, too.** Learn from His Word and try to follow instructions found there. If everyone would pattern life on the directives of Christ there would be an unbelievable peace in this world.

## Recollections Of By-Gone Days

### DEAR EDITOR:

Just west of Pigeon on M-142, there are two big white barns and some smaller buildings. A lot of people don't know what those buildings are.

One was a seed house where they cleaned beet seed. A lot of people don't know that back after World War I, some people saved sugar beet seed and there was a mill and a scales in there where they bagged seed.

In those days, one beet seed would have about four or five beets come up from one seed. It wasn't very heavy and it took a big bag to hold 100 lbs. of seed.

I worked for the Michigan Sugar Co. one summer on the farm and I helped bag some of that seed. When they didn't raise any more seed around here, they farmed the land which was pretty good farm land.

They also had the farm where Ray Gnagay lives. They raised corn and beans and did general farming. Each farm had a boss and two hired men.

We always had the barns full of hay and a lot of grain so they feed steers on both farms and pastured cattle on the river flats. They'd get some steers shipped in from the west and feed up the feed.

When I worked there, they came a carload of steers in. They got on a Saturday night and they landed in the big stock yard that was where the Co-op Elevator fertilizer plant is now.

Back in those days, everybody went up town on Saturday night. Everybody dressed up his Sunday clothes and got up town early so they could get a good place to park on the Main Street.

They didn't park alongside of the street like they do now. They parked sideways (on

an angle) and the town was full of people. They walked up and down the street and if you wanted to see somebody, you just stood still and soon they'd come walking by.

Well, the night the cattle came in, the town was full and we hired men told our boss that we could take some hay to the yard and chase the cattle home on Monday. But he wouldn't listen to us and decided to chase them home that night.

There were six of us and they started them out of the yard. One man went out in front with a lantern and the rest of us walked beside them.

There were a lot of cars moving around and the cattle spooked. I was one one side and I used to could run pretty fast and I ran all the way ahead of the cattle and manage to turn them into the yard. And the other guys kept them from going down the railroad.

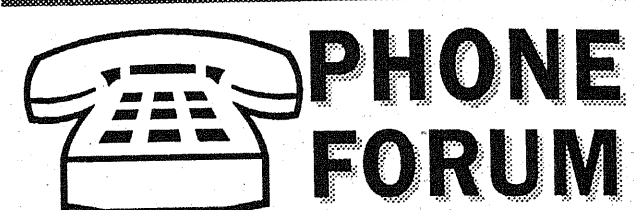
Luckily, we got them all in but one steer got away on us and the next few days, we couldn't get close to him. So we checked an old cow out and the steer came to the cow and we called the cow and she came up to the barn and the steer followed her, and she went right in the barn.

We shut the door and the steer went over to the manger and really tore around. But he soon quieted down. I worked all summer on that farm and the boss did a lot of things that were quite dumb.

The Bible says you should obey them that have the rule over you. Well, I was a hired man from the time I was 15 years old till I was 30 and I could write a book on some of the things that I had to do. But if the boss told me to do it, I did it (even if it was pretty dumb!)

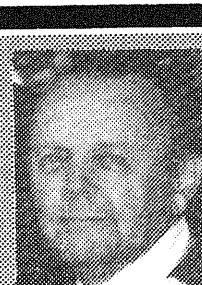

■ **It's TUESDAY, JUNE 13,** the 164th day of the year and this night we'll see the Full Moon... How often do you think about the earth substance, clay? Well, from today through SATURDAY, JUNE 17, it's National Clay Week, and Dennison, OH, celebrates with a festival as "Clay Center of the World." It would be interesting to visit there and see how they stage their festival — and what they do... Actor Richard Thomas is 44 today...

■ **It's JUNE 14,** officially known as Flag Day in the USA, marking the 218th anniversary of the Continental Congress resolution which declared that the flag of the 13 United States "shall be 13 stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be 13 stars, white on a blue field." At 7 pm today, across the country is the official time for the "Pause for the Pledge" of Allegiance, as a way for all citizens to share a patriotic moment... The German psychiatrist, Alois Alzheimer, was born JUNE 14, 1864. He first described a disease in a medical journal, and it was named for him... Burl Ives, singer, would be 86 today, but he died about a month ago...

■ **Remember studying the date JUNE 15, 1215,** when King John sealed the first charter of English liberties, known as the Magna Carta? It happened 780 years ago today. Four original copies survive... The first fatal aviation crash in history occurred on JUNE 15, 1786, when two French astronauts, attempting to cross the English Channel in a balloon, fell to the ground when it caught fire... Waylon Jennings, singer who made "Amanda" and "Luckenbach, Texas" famous, is 58 today...

■ **In Anama, IA,** it's the Der Schmitzer Festival, JUNE 16-18, with most events pointing to woodcraft, with emphasis on carving skills of the area... In Tabor SD, Czech heritage is shown and preserved in JUNE 16-17 Czech Days, with Czech dress, foods, dancing, music and entertainment... There's a big round barn east and north of Gagetown, and there's a Round Barn Festival at Rochester, IN, and many round barns, tours, crafts and even a Round Barn Museum. Dates are JUNE 16-18... Washington Post newspaper executive Katharine Graham is 78 today and novelist Joyce Carol Oates is 57...

■ **We're nearing the longest day of the year,** so Nome, AK, celebrates its Midnight Sun Festival SATURDAY-SUNDAY, JUNE 17-18, during the more-than-22-hours-of-direct-sunlight. There will be Eskimo dances and lots of food... On JUNE 17 the Republic of Iceland celebrates its independence day... Martin Bormann, one of Hitler's main staffers, was born JUNE 17, 1900. 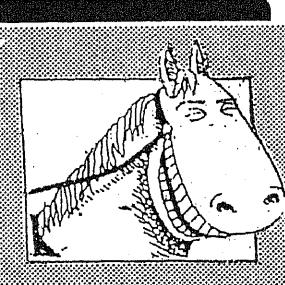

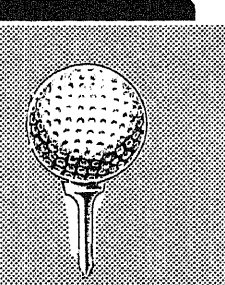

# Scenic Golf & Country Club celebrates 50th 'birthday'

When "Doc" Clabuesch and Joe Maust Sr. hit the links as the first golfers to play around of golf at Scenic Golf and Country Club on July 4, 1947, little did they know their friendly golfing rivalry would continue through the club's Golden Anniversary Year.

Almost 50 years later, they're still two of the club's most avid golfers, with Joe Maust Sr. at age 87 playing over 200 games of golf in the past year.

And now they have a big reason to continue their rivalry — Scenic Golf & Country Club of Pigeon is officially celebrating its 50th Anniversary this coming weekend, Thursday through Sunday, June 15-18.

**Lots of special events** are planned, from golf tournaments to fish fries and barbecues to drawings. While the activities are geared for the over 235 members of this semi-private course, guests of members are cordially invited and of course, Scenic is also happy to welcome new members, according to 50th

Anniversary Chairman Mike LePage.

LePage and his committee — Wes Dast, Nelson and Eunice Binder, Dody Yahn, Bill Repke, Bill McIlhargie, Pete Dutcher, Kent Shetler and John Kohr, Jr. — have been planning this weekend celebration for months.

**HOW IT STARTED:** Before the year 1945, golf was unknown to Western Huron County residents, except for a few enthusiasts who made the trek to either Caro or Verona Hills a few times a year.

The organization of a local golf club was the idea of several Pigeon area men, including Floyd Richmond, Ernest Clabuesch, Harry Leslie and Fr. A.P. Hafner, who sought out an 80-acre parcel of pasture land from the late Alfred Morse and purchased it for \$3800.00.

On Nov. 26, 1945, these four gentlemen met at the Pigeon State Bank and together with Leo Bliss, who later became the corporation's first secretary, held the first meeting of the corporation and the fol-

lowing officers were elected: President Harry Leslie, Vice President Floyd Richmond, Secretary Leo Bliss, Treasurer Ernest Clabuesch and Director Fr. Hafner.

**The group was** presented with the task of selling \$50,000 worth of securities in a golf club to the public, 90% of whom had never held a golf club in their hands.

But their work met with tremendous success.

Every member except for two of the Pigeon Rotary Club subscribed for stock and became members. Then meetings were held in Sebawaing, Caseville and Elkton, where

much interest was shown and several members acquired.

Fr. Hafner, Clabuesch and Leslie spent considerable time soliciting on Sand Point, with Claude Schneible, Charles Barth, John Baker, Eric Wieneke, Dr. Domzalski, Fred Gentsch, Arthur Jackson and a Mr. Cox subscribing for \$9,000 worth of stock. Then the ball really began to roll.

Fr. Hafner obtained the services of golf architect Dave Millar to draw plans for the perspective course and the building of the fairways began on Feb. 9, 1946 with Art

Kohl of Bay Port contracted to remove the trees, blast out stumps, establish grades and prepare the land for seeding. Sturm and Eichler were given the job of tiling the property.

When Millar died very unexpectedly in July, the whole engineering of the course fell back to the officers and Fr. Hafner came to the rescue by spending many days and weeks of his own time constructing the course.

Over 47,000 ft. of lumber was sold off the property, about 200 cords of wood was salvaged and sold — and 11,000 sticks of dynamite were needed to blow out the stumps, some 40 inches in diameter.

When Fr. Hafner was called to another parish and had to leave Pigeon, Harry Leslie obtained the services of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Sherwood. He served as pro and greens keeper and immediately took charge of the finishing of the greens and the fairway and the construction of the watering system. Mrs. Sherwood later worked in the pro shop for many years.

In the spring of 1948, Sherwood and his helpers put the finishing touches on the fairways and greens, cleaned up the rough and re-seeded. Leslie promoted an advertising idea where benches and chairs were furnished by

businessmen, who promoted their stores on them and the new golf shop was completed.

Then the clubhouse building committee, consisting of F.H. McKay, John Baker, Ezra Wood, Art List, Dr. C.A. Scheurer and R.H. Leslie, began to function and worked for two years in making the clubhouse a reality.

Scenic Golf & Country Club opened for business on May 15, 1948. According to historical reports, "although not in the best condition, the public acceptance of the course was grand, and the officers and members felt their efforts had brought to the final degree of completion the finest community project ever attempted in Western Huron County."

The course continued to improve, as did the patronage. The dedication of the clubhouse took place on July 31, 1949 with a buffet luncheon and Fr. Hafner returned for a dedicatory address, in which he dedicated the completed course and clubhouse to a future program of youth development, good sportsmanship, conduct and honesty of purpose. These ideals still hold true today, and Scenic Golf & Country Club is proud of the strides it has made in the past half-century.

An additional nine holes was constructed and ready for play on June 14, 1971.

Seven years ago, a second cart barn was constructed and in 1989, a Pro Shop was added.

Improvements during this Anniversary year have included much refurbishing - a new roof, complete paint job and the addition of a "half-way house" — installed this past weekend — for golfers, to use for refreshment during their golf game.

# Caseville School students participating in GLOBE project

Science, biology, botany and math aren't just a boring recitation of facts in the classroom anymore. Not for Caseville Public School students.

The facts the students learn those facts have real meaning, as they gather data for the Global Learning and Observations to Benefit the Environment (GLOBE) program.

The program is a network of schools, representing every U.S. state and a number of countries worldwide, that collect environmental information and feed it into a com-

puter. That computer is connected by Worldwide Web to the Internet and from there, scientists use the information to better understand the changing nature of air, land and water systems.

**Project coordinator** Linda Lenar, who also teaches math, physics, chemistry and physical science at Caseville, says the GLOBE program reaches into every classroom in the school.

"The program fits right into our curriculum," Lenar says. "It ties every class and subject together, and teaches the kids that the environment has importance to them and their community."

"It's important for our area and not just something they study in class."

**Every class** has a particular test to do. A first-grade class test water for acidity, while a high school class will trek to the woods to identify foliage shown on a satellite

map of the area. All that information is entered on the computer and is available on the worldwide

Internet for scientists to use. Because the instruments the students use are calibrated and the information has been gathered using strict procedures, scientists can be assured that the data collected is meaningful, Lenar said.

The GLOBE project is jointly funded by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, the National Science Foundation, the Environmental Protection Agency and Caseville Public Schools.

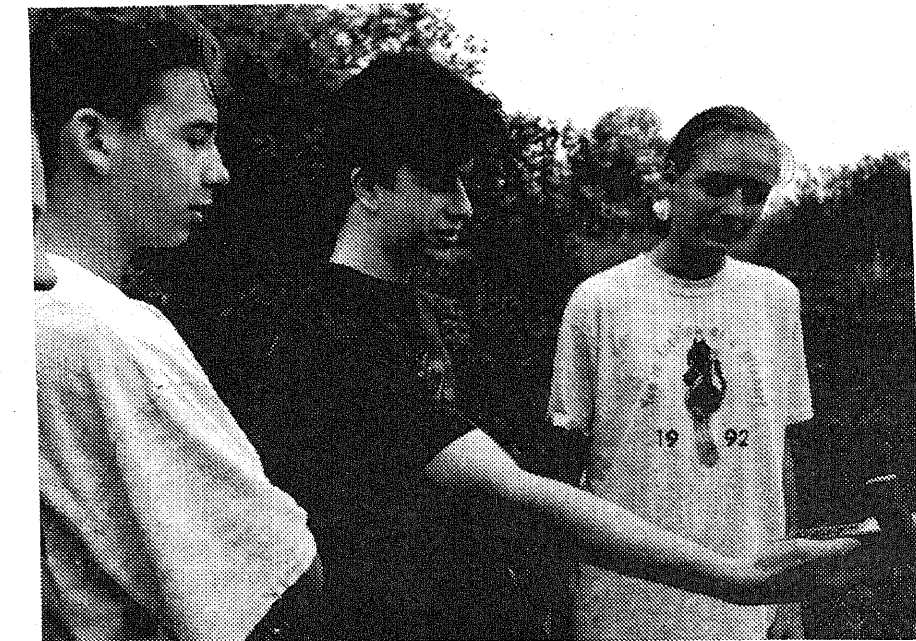

solidated Farm Service Agency (CFS), formerly the ASCS) reviewed information on total program payments to Michigan farmers for the past nine years.

"The 1985 and 1990 Farm Bills have effectively reduced farm program payments in Michigan by as much as 50%, down from more than \$350 million in 1986 to less than \$165 million in 1994, said Jim Byrum, State Executive Director of the CFS. "Farmers have already experienced substantial cuts, and these numbers are in real dollars, without inflation considered."

Payments are made to farmers in three basic areas: conservation, price support and disaster.

Conservation payments are made under two primary programs. A cost share program encourages farmers to install conservation practices on their land such as windbreaks, waterways to reduce soil erosion, manure storage facilities to reduce runoff and various tree planting programs.

The second major area is the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). This very popular program pays landowners to leave their land idle, but allow wildlife habitat to grow, whether it is grass or trees.

Many wildlife advocates claim that CRP is responsible for substantial increases in many wildlife populations, including pheasants and other game birds.

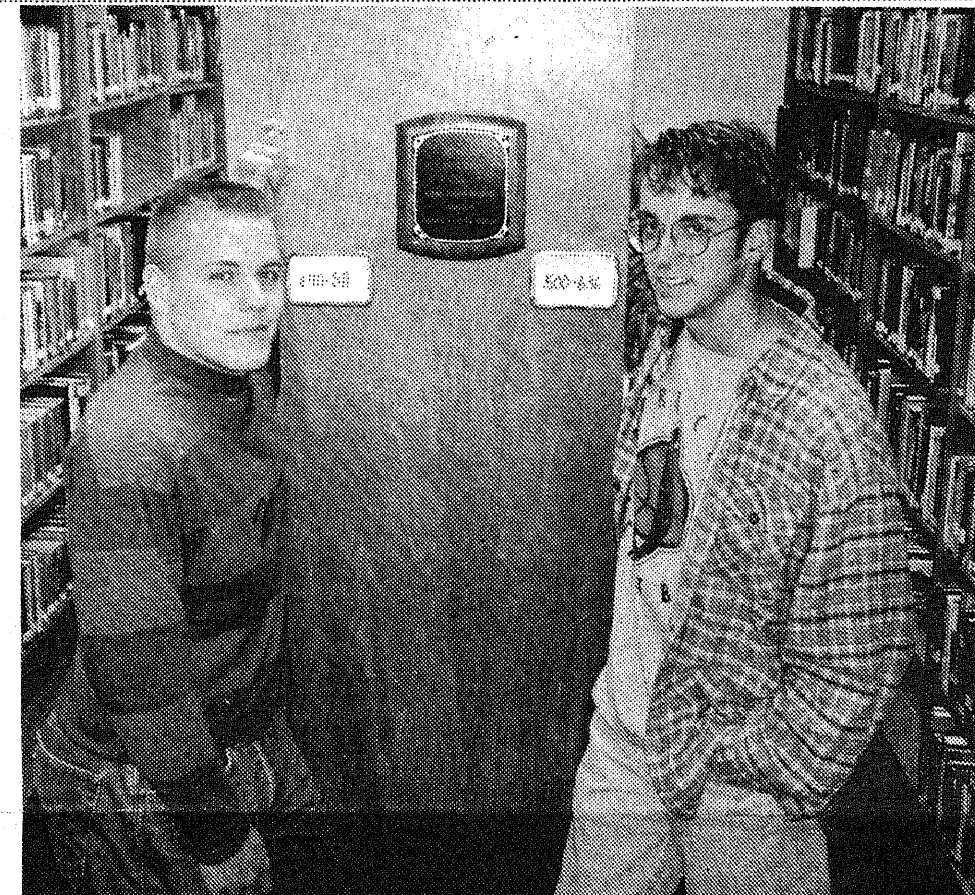
All in all, the trip was an overwhelming success and everyone returned safely. I'm looking forward to the challenges of next years trip.

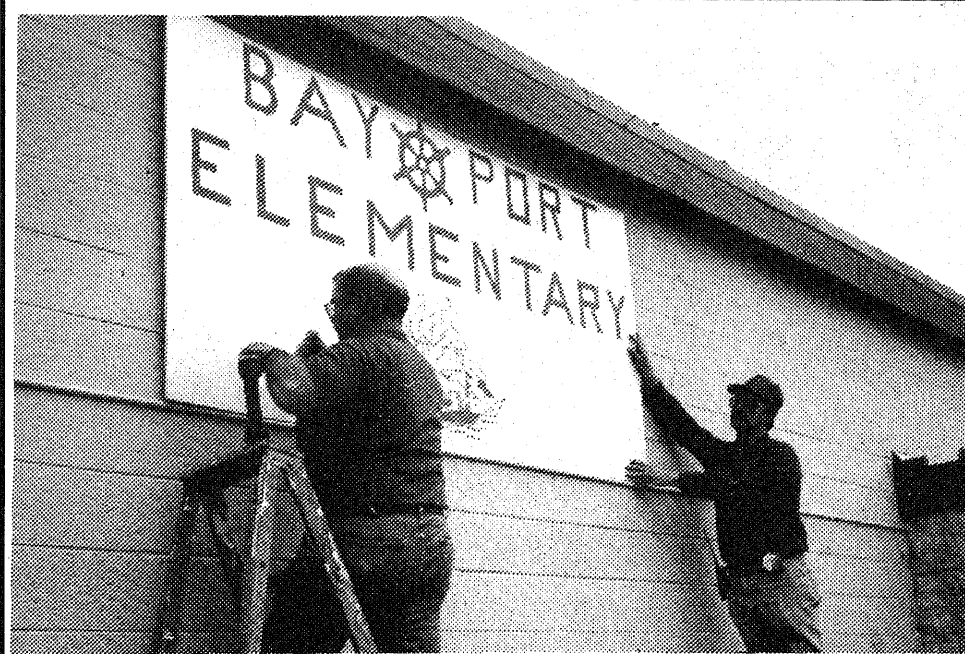

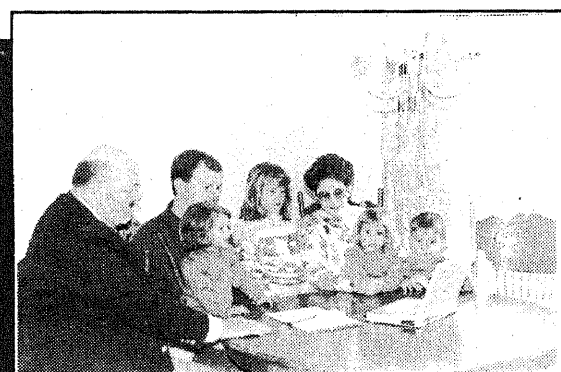
models to stimulate interest, enthusiasm, and involvement in the sciences.

## Around the Elementary Centers

### ELEMENTARY COUNSELOR'S CORNER

Students have been staying busy with some established and new activities during VIP time. I have been pleased with the enthusiasm towards some of the newer things we have done.

Here is an update!

**Kindergarten** - For the better part of the semester the students have been learning about many things that will help them feel better about themselves and others. Through stories, games and pair work, we have discussed and learned the importance of being able to agree with others, cooperate with others and think about problems in order to make good decisions. Students have done well with their group work.

**1st grade** - These students have been doing a variety of activities including some fun inference worksheets, an identity shield which asked them to think about some of their interests and most recently some role modeling work on the importance of listening.

**2nd & 3rd grades** - Students continue work in their "appreciating myself" packets which asks them to explore and discover qualities about themselves. It is aimed at heightening self-esteem through awareness about themselves. They have also seemed to enjoy stories called "furious fables about animals who don't know quite how to handle some difficulties and end up doing unproductive things. By the end of the story, they learn a lesson and solve their problem. The goal here is to have the students acquire some of the knowledge and use it. When the story is done, we split into teams to answer questions concerning the story. This checks for understanding and the students have been doing

better on each consecutive story. If you have a 2nd or 3rd grader I encourage you to ask them about Bushy the squirrel and his problem. I'm sure a few of the students will have remembered the theme of the story.

**4th & 5th grades** - We have been wrapping up the year by doing some work on the benefits of not jumping to conclusions. We discussed the importance of gathering information before making a decision about something.

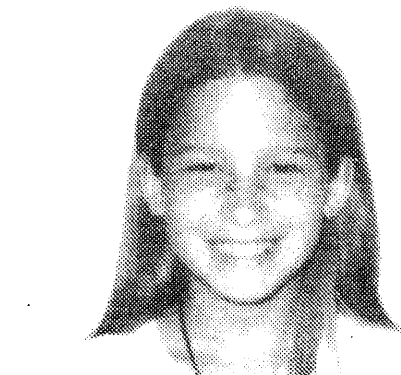
Another activity we did was one on the importance of timing. By this I mean, doing or saying the proper thing at the appropriate moment. We discussed and used examples of bad timing and discussed the effects of those actions. We also examined the benefits of good timing. We

learned that being aware and paying attention to what goes on around you, when paired with good thinking, can help us say or do appropriate things at the appropriate times.

Our final activities involve watching videos, in which, there is a main character with a problem. The characters are students and their problem situation is portrayed in a school or home setting. The videos we are watching this year involve students who are having difficulties with 1.) confidence, 2.) handling teasing. We watch part of the video, stop the tape, and discuss what we have seen and heard. The next step is to brainstorm ideas which will lead to resolution of the problem. We start the tape up and watch the resolution. A high percentage of the time, the students come up with the resolution portrayed on the video.

**From time to time**, please ask your children to share with you what they have done in VIP class.
