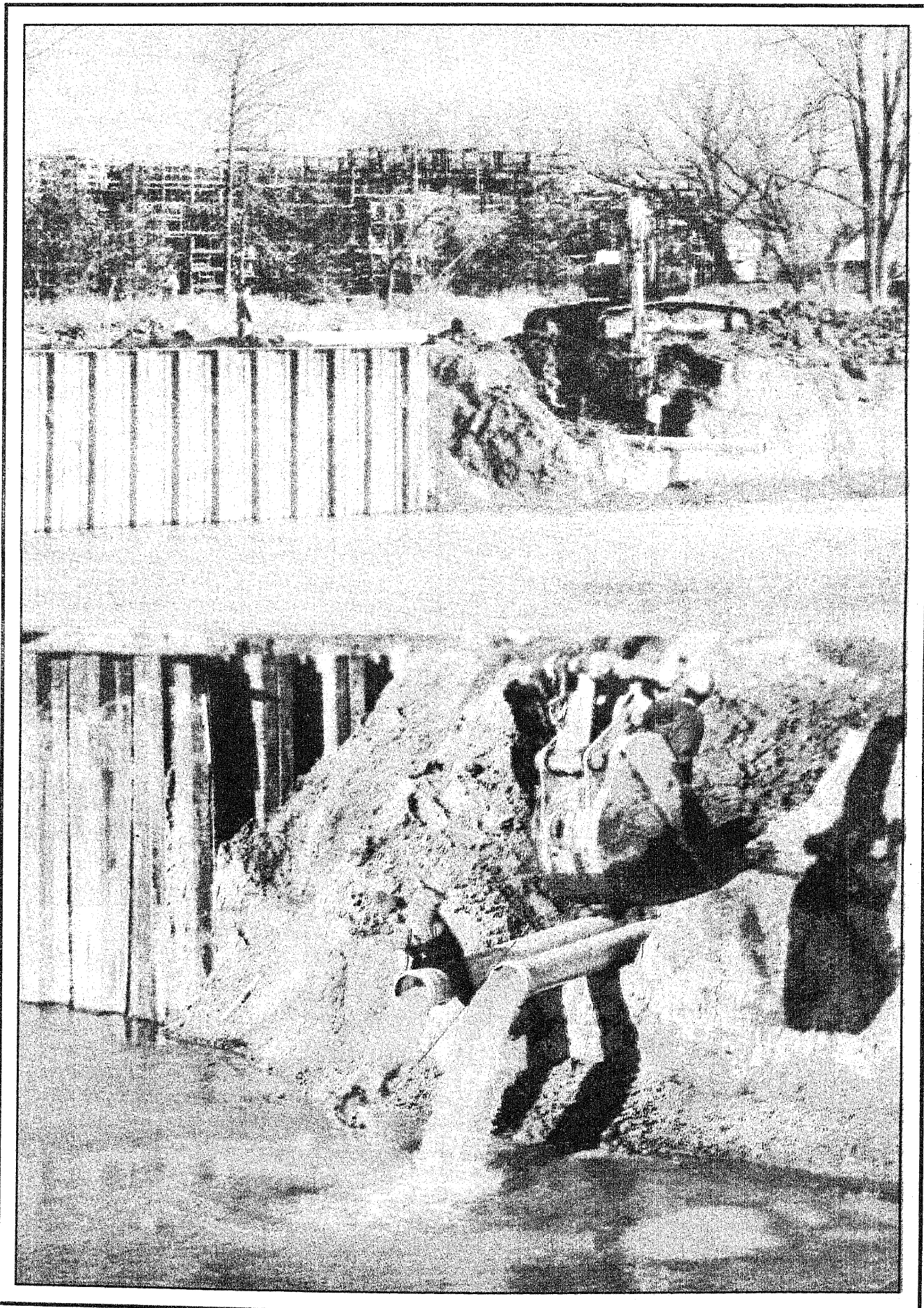

### 'Safe farming' help axed

The Huron - Tuscola - Sanilac County "Farming Safely in the Thumb" program has been discontinued, as of Nov. 17. Funded by a state Labor Department grant for the past five years, the program is no longer eligible for such funds — and was unsuccessful in obtaining funding from elsewhere.

Huron County Health Department's Ag Safety Specialist Geraldine Smith says the program has been very successful. In the past five years, more than 500 students completed the Tractor Safety and Machinery Courses, many earning a Certificate of Training allowing them to work for a farmer other than a parent.

"Of the 600 enrollees for Farm Safety Camps, many were repeat campers. One student remarked, 'Every year I learn something, even when I hear the same speaker two years in a row,'" Smith says.

**Other programs** included "First-on-the-Scene" Workshops, Farm Women and Family Seminars, Classroom presentations, On-Site Safety Training Programs for Farm Workers and On-Farm Hazard Surveys. A quarterly newsletter was mailed to 6,500 farm families and employees and weekly news releases to 45 Michigan publications.

When asked about the discontinuation of "Farming Safely in the Thumb," Smith said, "Efforts are being made to establish a state-wide Farm Safety Program. Hopefully these efforts will be successful. I believe the only way we will be successful in dramatically reducing farm-related injuries and fatalities is an on-going, full-time farm safety education program."

### New U.S. flags will fly throughout Sebewaing

Sebewaing Village Council last week okayed a plan from the Sebewaing American Legion Post #293 and Sebewaing VFW Post #4115 to provide U.S. Flags to the village, to hang on lamp posts in Sebewaing's business district.

Dan Zuzga approached Council about the plan. The organizations pledged to replace flags as they deteriorate. Village workers will hang and maintain the flags.

**Sebewaing Police will have** a new patrol car, after Council approved the bid of \$18,250 from All-American Ford of Saginaw for the new vehicle.

Under old business, Sebewaing Council heard a report on the recently demolished Esterline Building. The site has been graded and seeded and all pending issues have been addressed. Council approved paying \$34,893 to Mead Contracting for the demolition.

In other business, Sebewaing Council:

- Discussed continued concerns over the width of Davis Street near the new marina. Council directed the DPW to complete an accurate measurement of the street, indicating that the surface must be 18' wide.

- In an additional DPW report, used equipment will soon be advertised for sale by the department. They no longer have use for a grader, a tar kettle and a mower deck.

- Council also approved changing of some street names in the marina area. The two streets will now be officially named North Pitcher Street and West Pitcher Street.

- DPW Chief Larry Hahn is still on medical leave. Workers in the DPW have been filling in well, Council learned. Tim Dutcher will continue to work in the Parks & Recreation Department until Dec. 1.

- A request for a new sign in front of the Thumb Auto Wash was approved, to be located across M-25 from Mutual Savings Bank. The new business should be opening soon.

- Council had a discussion on the ownership of the 1936 LaFrance Fire Engine. Mayor Wineman indicated he would discuss the matter with the village attorney.

- Council also approved paying the monthly bills of \$284,251.

- Harbor Commission approved the fifth payment for the marina, totaling \$217,847.

"This year we expect to peel 150 to 160 bushels of apples to make 3,000 pies," said BT YFC Director Ken Smeader. Most of the ingredients were donated, which keeps the cost of making pies down and increases the revenue generated.

Great Lakes Sugar Beet Growers Association and Michigan Sugar Company donated 1,200 pounds of sugar this year.

Pigeon Rotary members work with YFC volunteers, through every aspect of the fundraiser — from peeling the apples to delivering the pies. Smeader, who is also a member of Pigeon Rotary, coordinates the effort.

# Bay Port State Bank contributes first

# TRIAD to help protect seniors

A \$200 donation from Bay Port State Bank is kicking off a local effort to raise operating money for one of the Huron County Sheriff's Department newest programs, TRIAD.

TRIAD was formed in April of this year to meet the needs and concerns of Huron County senior citizens. A national program established by the National Sheriff's Association, TRIAD is a triangle with three points.

At the top are seniors and at the bottom are local police departments and Sheriff Michael Cage working together to meet the needs of area seniors.

TRIAD was originally funded through the county in order to get started, and is now looking for funds to stand on its own.

"If a local senior citizen needs a smoke detector at home and has no ability to purchase or install one, we want to make sure and help that individual," according to Sgt. R. Brent Woodward, who is serving as TRIAD Coordinator.

A concern such as this may or may not directly be a police matter, but the purpose of TRIAD is to direct that person to a police agency or another agency or individual that can be of help.

"So many times seniors are hesitant to contact law enforcement agencies to help them with problems they are facing," says Sgt. Woodward.

"The contacts we have had since April are so rewarding. Seniors at least know we are trying to help."

**Concerns of area seniors** may range from theft and burglary to suspicious telephone solicitations, loud neighborhood parties, barking dogs or other nuisances. In one particular case, according to Sgt. Woodward, an elderly person was having trouble with plumbing and needed some assistance to get the job done.

"With just a few phone calls, we were able to provide help," says Woodward. "If it's a concern to an area

senior, TRIAD is available to help."

**Huron County has** formed a S.A.L.T. Council (Seniors and Law Enforcement Together) to represent all communities in Huron County. Included on this board are community representatives who serve as liaisons between seniors in their community and TRIAD.

"Sometimes people are more comfortable calling their peers than they are police agencies," explains Sgt. Woodward.

## Caseville water plant tour day is Thursday, Dec. 14

Caseville Village invites the public to an open house and plant tour at its Water Treatment Plant on Thursday, Dec. 14, beginning at 10:30 a.m.

## Pigeon's Art Woelke has photographed 'em all

# He knows every house in town!

Art Woelke knows the outside of every home in Pigeon like the back of his hand.

That's because he has compiled an outside photo of each home and business in Pigeon for "A Profile of Pigeon, MI: A Visual Essay," a unique collection of over 600 photos depicting Pigeon as it looks in the 1990s.

"I started this idea in 1991, and although it has taken me four years to complete it, I gathered names of people who resided in each home in 1991 so that this pictorial view of Pigeon would serve as a historical record for the future," says Woelke.

The collection is housed in two large photo albums, and are available for viewing by the public at the Pigeon District Library, although they will be permanently stored at the Pigeon Historical Depot Museum when it re-opens next year.

The homes are arranged by house number and street and the streets are listed alphabetically.

Underneath the photo is the name of the occupant in 1991, and Woelke admits to being surprised at the number of residences that have changed hands since that time.

"Some houses have had

four or five different families since 1991," he says.

One of the interesting tid-

bits of Pigeon history that Woelke learned while doing the project is that the old

Arlington Hotel, which used to sit where JuDen's building is now located downtown, has been preserved in two homes that still stand today, located at 140 Ruppert St. and 124 Ruppert St.

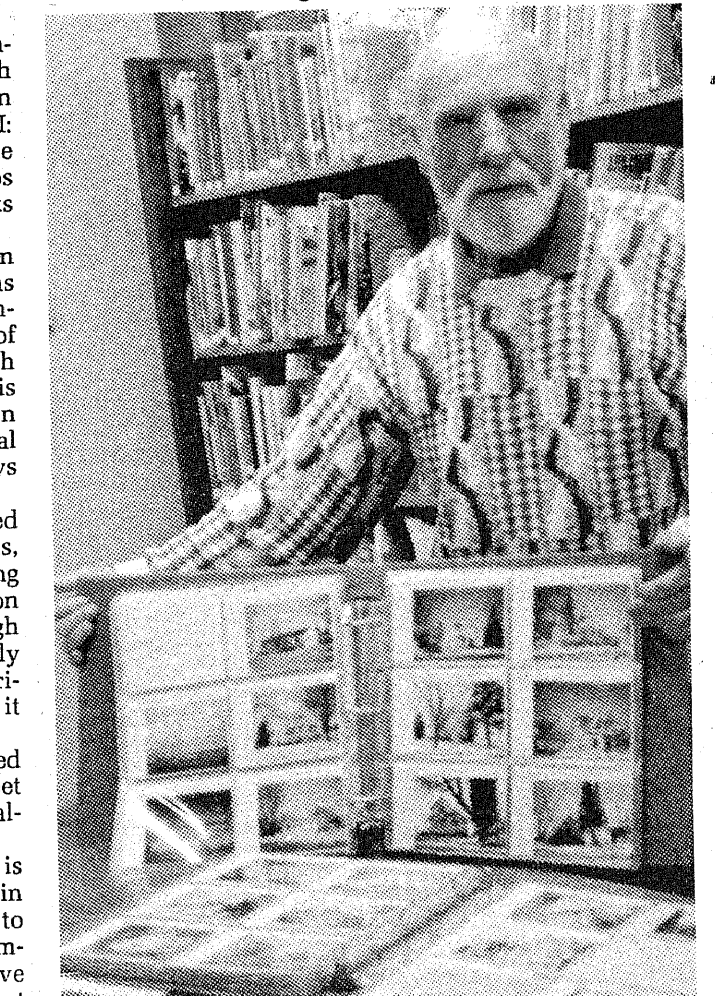
The Arlington Hotel was actually cut into three parts and the third one was located at 7166 Hartley St., but has since been torn down.

Woelke's research also turned up the fact that a dozen or so houses actually moved to Pigeon from Berne, including one of them located at 7046 Michigan Avenue, the home of James and Pearl Malloy.

Another little-known fact about residential life in Pigeon is that there is actually one street located at the end of Nitz St., between Buerker's farm and the Village of Pigeon, known as West St. and it houses only one residence — that of Michael Graf.

Most people don't know that the street — or the house, for that matter — even exists.

Woelke, who retired as Administrator of the Huron County Medical Care Facility eight years ago, hopes that these photographs will tell the residents of Pigeon, 50 or 100 years from now, who the people of Pigeon were and what their town looked like, way back in 1991.

## Why do the best always retire?

Back in 1978, perennial Presidential hopeful Al Landon's daughter did something Landon himself had ever only hoped for: she won her first of three U.S. Senate terms.

Now, Nancy Landon Kassebaum has announced she's stepping down, saying: "I believe the time has come for me to leave the Senate and pursue other challenges, including the challenge of being a grandmother."

Even though she's never directly represented us here in Mid-Michigan, we'll all feel her loss. As one of a shrinking number of Republican moderates in Congress, this U.S. Senator is at the peak of her influence and power. She was the Senate's only woman when first elected in 1978, and now even her Kansas Democratic opponents say, "The only thing more popular than Nancy is wheat."

While other senators constantly seek campaign donations, Kassebaum has not, for the past five years. While politics grow meaner, the 63-year-old senator sticks to the old virtues of graciousness and civility. There's literally no one in the U.S. Senate like her.

Kassebaum became the first woman to chair a major subcommittee this past January. The next possible chair "woman" is years away. But now Kassebaum is leaving.

She has become the 10th senator — and second Republican — to announce retirement this year. Kassebaum may be the most powerful woman in America. After all, her Kansas approval rating is a huge 82% — and growing. Usually, incumbents fall in popularity as we all get to know them better.

She says she misses the "old days" when politicians spent more time making laws. Today, "It's become so much more of a place where everyone's raising money all the time," she said in a recent interview.

U.S. Sen. Nancy Kassebaum is the exact type of person who has made our government the best on earth — but her decision to step down is a signal to us all. It means the "best" people indeed have limits, and sometimes choose to "step down" instead of further "stepping into" non-stop political messes.

If we're not served by the best, who is left to govern? For those of us who want term limits, we must remember we lose the good with the bad. Nancy Kassebaum has been among the best, but soon she'll be gone.

Let's hope Kansas voters are smart enough to replace her with someone as knowledgeable, good, kind, smart and hard-working — if that's possible — or we're all headed for more of the same, or worse...



As a naturally curious, competitive person, I have entered a couple of those arenas myself and have run the gamut from miserable failure to first prize winner. But I have learned that success and achievement are not always marked with blue ribbons and trophies. It is the little triumphs - the meeting of day-to-day challenges - which are sometimes the most rewarding victories.

It is nearly two years since I brought home my "problem child." I have always been stuck on horses and never outgrew them as was predicted. But at an age when I should have been shopping for a nice, plump, draft-style nag, two years ago I went out and brought home a huge, fiery, opinionated, sometimes selfish, mean-spirited filly. (Yes, we are alot alike.)

Originally I thought she was just the perfect size for me... a big, smart horse with lots of potential. But it could very well be that - deep inside - I was having a "horsey" mid-life crisis of sorts. I wanted to know if I could still go out and buy a big, hard-to-handle young critter and bend it to my will, as I used to do with ease.

So for nearly two years now I have been reading and riding and practicing and employing techniques and tips from experts and friends. For two summers I have been falling off and crying and picking myself up and getting back on.

Day after day I swallow my fear. Day after day I call on the forces of luck and love. Day after day I push the obvious questions from my mind... "What if she hurts me? What if she kills me? What if she never gets any better... what if?"

But somehow, she has gotten better... and I have gotten better. I have become more brave and less tolerant. She has become more compliant and less angry. I have finally begun to trust her... and she has finally begun to respect me.

Well, let me tell you, there is no more euphorically rewarding triumph than bridging the expansive gap between horse and human. It gives one hope that we can one day bridge the gap between members of our own species.

Every day I overcome huge, scary goblins, stare down panic and chaos and make olympic calibre attempts at happiness and success. Yet, when it is all over and my boots hit the dirt, no pretty young woman in a tiara is waiting to hand me a trophy. When the horses are fed and put to bed, no distinguished gentleman is standing nearby to put a gold medal 'round my neck.

But these "awardless" trials and triumphs are what give life its meaning... we need not wait for the accolades of others, or the awards of sanctioned competitions to reach over our own shoulders to give ourselves a pat. And though I have no trophies or ribbons to show for it... today - I declare myself "Grand Champion" over my own fear and doubt.

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# State telephone policy overhaul coming Jan. 1

By MARK RUMMEL

Major legislation to overhaul Michigan's telephone law will likely take effect early in 1996 — and local telephone users will see some changes after that time.

That's the word from Pigeon Telephone Company President Edwin Eichler, who says many more changes are ahead for telephone service in our state.

The Michigan House and Senate both overwhelmingly approved the complex telecommunications bill, the Senate by a 35-1 vote and the House by a 79-18 margin. Gov. Engler is expected to sign it.

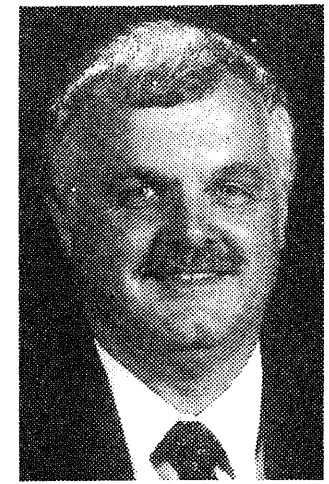
The bill should increase competition and consumer choices in telephone service, and the legislation will replace the current telecommunications act which was written four years ago, to expire Dec. 31.

"We'll be seeing many more changes in coming weeks, months and years," Eichler says, and adds, "Pigeon Telephone Company is ready for the upgrades and growing consumer needs."

One result of the new bill is expected to be creation of a choice of local phone service for home and business users, who now are limited to

Ameritech or CTE or one local service.

Another is a 25% discount

for low-income senior citizens, plus phone companies can raise some rates without Michigan Public Service Commission approval — as long as those increases are less than the Consumer Price Index.

Eichler is also President of the Michigan Exchange Carriers Association, a business association of companies which handles distribution of long distance revenues.

He says Michigan residents will soon be able to use the "888" toll-free exchange, being offered after the "800" toll-free number system is almost fully used. "888" be in use by March 1, 1996.

Michigan will get at least two more area codes by 1997, among the first without a "1" or "0" as the center digit. The maximum number of 160 such exchanges (such as our 517 or 906 areas in Michi-

gan) have been depleted. The exploding need for phones, modems, fax machines and other uses is causing the shortage, Eichler says.

"Pigeon Telephone is already preparing to add these services without interruption as soon as they are available," Eichler says.

He says voice mail service should be available to Pigeon Telephone customers within three months, and adds an Internet node access is being considered here, too.

Meat that's speedy to fix and lower in fat is not too good to be true. Many of the naturally lean cuts of meat and poultry are quick-cooking — you just have to know what to look for:

- Turkey tenderloin is the leanest turkey cut.
- Pork chops that are boneless, trimmed, and thinly sliced (1/2 - 1/4 inch thick) from the center loin are one of the leanest available pork cuts.
- Boneless, skinless chicken breasts have the lowest fat on the chicken.
- Round tip steak cut into 1/8-inch slices (sometimes called sandwich steak) is among the leanest beef cuts. "Select" is the leanest grade of beef with less fat than either "choice" beef or "prime" beef.

How to quick-cook these lean cuts:

Broil, grill or pan fry (using a non-stick skillet coated with vegetable cooking spray). Or cut into strips to stir-fry. To avoid dry meat, be careful not to overcook it.

Safety First - After handling raw meats or poultry, scrub all utensils and cutting boards thoroughly with hot soapy water. Store meat and poultry in your refrigerator's meat drawer or the coldest part of your refrigerator. To freeze meats or poultry, repackage in heavy duty plastic wrap or freezer wrap.

On our way home that Sunday evening, my son confessed that purchasing a large camping tent the year before was one of the best decisions he had ever made.

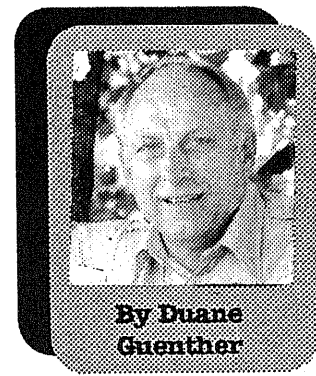

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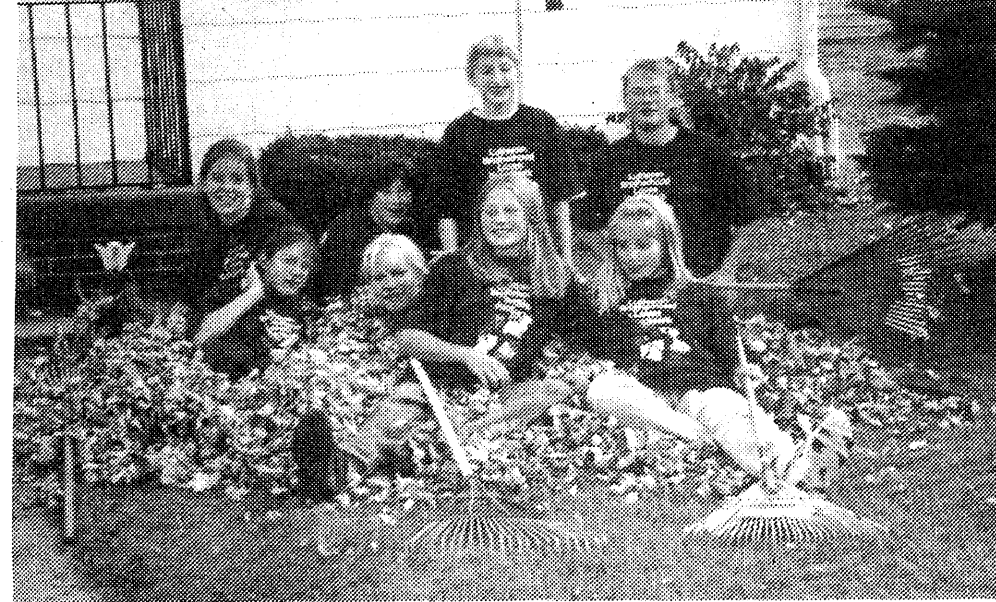

# Graham Dast featured in SVSU story

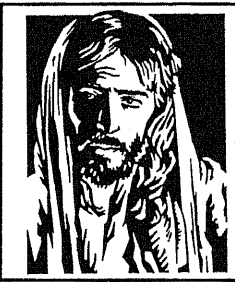
A Sebawaing student at Saginaw Valley State University was featured on the front page of the University newspaper, "Students Speak Up," last week.

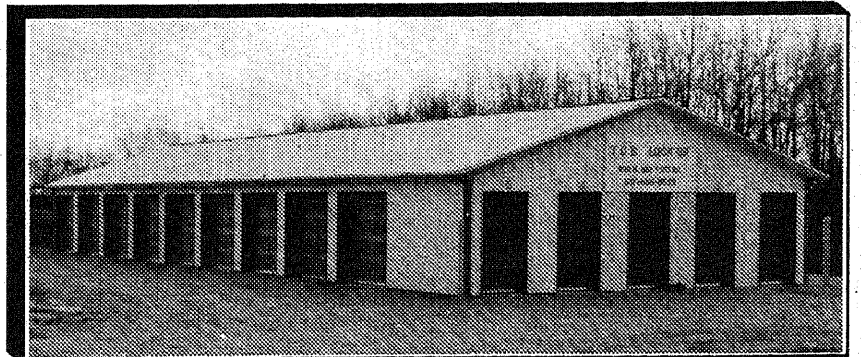
