## THE TICKET

The period of another election is close at hand. The names of candidates for office are finally all before us, and it is worth our while to consider what will be the principles on which their part in the administration of the Government will be performed, their personal character, and what are their claims to the confidence of the public.

To this country, as well as in most others throughout the State, we waited until the last moment before making party nominations. We had hoped that in this time of national distress, all men might come up together, and shoulder to shoulder move in one solid irresistible column to the support of the Government and the President.

The Republican party has no need of appealing to prejudice or passion, and is not conscious of a name. These hopes were nurtured in vain; instead of such an organization, we have simply an opposition party. Instead of an uprising of the people, we have an uprising of Political Demagogues and wire pullers, soldered together with disappointed candidates for office from both parties. An opposition which must be transitory because not founded on any principle which reaches below the shifting sands of party politics. A party which dare not pledge itself to the unequalled support of the President, for fear that the traitorous element in it will dismember its misshapen body.

Started by a few leaders of defiant party, with a general capacity for misdirection and nobody to misdirect, it will draw into its ranks a few well meaning persons whose easy circumstances, have made them easy. With such an organization, only powerful for harm, loyal and true men, Republicans or Democrats, can have nothing in common, and believing this to be true, the Republican party unanimously concluded to nominate a ticket, the candidates on which are openly and unqualifiedly pledged to the support of the President and Government in every effort to put down this unholy rebellion. The ticket at the head of this paper is therefore presented to the electors of this county for their support.

The re-nomination of Governor Blair is one against which no real objection can be urged. His executive ability, promptness of action, and honesty of purpose our history for the past two years has fully disclosed. Under his directions our quota of troops has been raised as soon as any, and our regiments have been better equipped and with less expense to the people, than those of any other State. Even his enemies admit his honesty and integrity to be above suspicion, and in times like these we cannot afford to experiment in government.

Charles S. May of Kalamazoo, candidate for Lieut. Governor, and Albert Williams of Iowa, for Attorney General, are both men of good standing,

and undoubted loyalty, and lawyers of ability and repute in their profession. Emil Anneke, candidate for Auditor General, is a German, a man of more than ordinary education and ability. He has been for some years connected with the auditor's office, as deputy, and otherwise, and his intimate acquaintance with its duties renders him peculiarly fitted for the position.

The other candidates on the State Ticket, are those who now fill the respective places, and their integrity as men and qualifications as officers are well and widely known, and are not disputed. John F. Driggs, candidate for Representative in Congress from the 6th district, is at present Registrar of the Land Office at East Saginaw. He is a straight forward, honest man, one of the people's men to be believed in. One of the pin-necks of northern Michigan. He is not only willing, but able to take care of its growing interests. He has represented his district in the State Legislature with credit to himself, and to the satisfaction of his constituents. A man as true to his country as he is, will never prove false to his friends.

John R. Gallo way of Livingston, candidate for Senator in the 26th district, was elected two years ago to that office, and his action has given his constituents no reason to regret their choice. He is a legislator of ability, and will represent the district faithfully.

For candidates for the State Legislature, the nomination of S. Titus Parsons of Cornua, First District, and Charles P. Parkill of Bennington, Second District, could not have been better. There is no uncertainty about their present position, and no suspicion as to their past history.

The candidates upon the County Ticket are all well known to the citizens of the county and all of them the present incumbents of the respective offices for which they are nominated, except the candidates for Sheriff and Prosecuting Attorney. Mr. George C. Holmes, is an old citizen of the county, who in all the walks of life, has been eminently capable and upright, and he has as Clerk discharged the duties of the office to the entire satisfaction of the people. Mr. Lyman and Mr. Converse have by their service and well known abilities, liberality and public spirit commended themselves to the support of all who want prompt and efficient officers. Mr. Ackly, candidate for Sheriff, is a resident of St. Lawrence, a successful farmer, prompt and energetic in business, a highly respectable citizen, and every way a thorough man. He is eminently qualified to discharge the important duties of the office, and although he has never acted in an official capacity he has on several occasions, in aiding the law officers, displayed unusual ability and tact in the arrest of criminals. He is a man of whom every citizen will be proud as the high Sheriff of the county. James Garrison and George L. Hitchcock, the nominees for Coroners, are men of worth and business capacity, and by their location in different parts of the county will be able to respond promptly to the calls of their office. Mr. Nason is a young man of scientific attainments, and will take in performing the duties of Surveyor with accuracy and fidelity. Such is the ticket that is presented to the people, and which we believe they will support.

## TRY, MICHIGAN

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 19.—The Democratic State ticket is elected by from 5,000 to 8,000 majority. The Democrats elect five Congressmen and the Union party four. The result in the 10th and 11th Districts is uncertain. Both parties claim them. The Democrats elect a majority in both branches of the Legislature, which will secure the election of a Democratic Senator to fill the vacancy occasioned by the expulsion of Wright.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 19.—Ohio election returns from 66 counties, give a Democratic majority of 18,000, a Democratic gain of 58,000. The Democratic majority in the State will be about 12,000. The Congressional delegates stand 14 Democrats and 6 Union.

## From the Twenty-fourth Regt. CAMP NEAR SPANISHBURG, VA. Oct. 11th, 1862.

MISSISSIPPI EUROPEAN PICTURE.—Our mails for the last ten days have just come up with us, and I find papers of the 27th ult. and 5th inst. I send me your first number, I wish that more than all others. The Press is very well printed, and from the number of advertisements, I judge that it will be well supported, I send you an order from Lloyd, N. Y. Use it to the best advantage, if you can make a contract with him.

The Twenty-fourth broke camp at Fort Baker, (camp Shearer) Sept. 30th, and proceeded by railroad to Frederick City Md., via Valley House. Left camp "Clark" at 4 p. m. on the 1st inst., passing through Frederick City, and the cheering smiles and waving hands of thousands of beautiful women. We passed the battle fields of South Mountain and Antietam, where and blood and carnage, and the dying friends, the Michigan regiments have again covered themselves with glory, and added to their already glorious fame. I have looked upon the graves of some of them who are now sleeping their last sleep in a strange and distant land from that of their nativity. Far from the native homes, rebellion has hurled them into untimely graves, and all the horrors that statesmen can tell of, have come upon us from the mists of ambition and fanaticism. The people suffer and the nation lies aghast in the agonies of disunion because of bad men and mercenary rulers. Oh, how will peace be welcomed, when she again spreads her wings over us.

The country through which we have passed is very rich and beautiful by nature, but fertile fields once bearing abundant harvests are now trodden under foot by armed battalions. All they are worn and haggard like the street. Camps are scattered all over the hills and fields around us for miles, and Mars leans heavily upon his bloody spear. We are encamped one mile west of Sharpsburg, within three hundred yards of the Potomac, the other shore of which is rebel territory. This affords us excellent opportunities for bathing and washing. The first, fourth and sixteenth Regiments are encamped near us, as also Berdan's 1st Regiment of U. S. Sharp Shooters, in which are the Michigan Companies. We are in Gibbons's Brigade, Hooker's 1st Army Corps, and hope soon to receive orders to march against the enemy. May our rulers grant that this terrible struggle come to an end by the close of the year. But alas, there is little hope. I ask by the Detroit papers, that recruits for the Michigan regiments come in at an average of about a dozen per day, when they ought to come in by hundreds. Who is responsible?

Politicians and people of Michigan who are just now moving heaven and earth to elect your favorite party candidates, how long before you intend to close this war? Are you still so blind and selfish as to believe it is to be ended by any means but by the ballot and the bayonet? Why not then, pour forth such an army as will overwhelm the rebel forces at once. You have lived long enough and deceived yourselves and as with the idea that rebels cannot match us—that they will not fight. They can and do fight—fight like devils incarnate—fight as well as men ever fought, and they do not mean to give up—they will not give up till they are conquered and crushed by physical force. The sooner the North understands it the better. We must have more men. Whoever says we have enough already, is simply himself deceived or a wilful liar—there is no rarer word, and he is a private citizen, constable, or governor, so far as he does not give his whole time and energy to the prosecution of this war upon principles, with men, and bullets, and steel—such a man is a murderer before God and man, and as such, the blood of soldiers needlessly slain, will cry out against him for vengeance. Send forward recruits and press our conquering arms to the very centre of rebellion.

## Indian Troubles in Minnesota.

New York, Oct. 18.—A letter from Ford Sept. 16, says the whaling ship Eschscholtz, which was captured by the 14th (from off Florida, having come there for protection. She reports that on 8th and 9th inst., a rebel steamer had burned seven whalers and the schooner Sunlight.

PLEASANT VALLEY, Oct. 17.—The rebel Gen. Stuart is at Bowser, on the bank of Stephen S. Dandridge, four miles east from Winchester. Gen. Longstreet is ten miles above Winchester. Stuart's Jackson is at Hunter Hill with his forces.

New York, Oct. 19th.—A special to the Herald from Washington says that 150 of Stuart's Cavalry have been captured, and it is expected that more will be. Six were sent Friday night in Gen. Rickett's camp, wearing Federal uniforms.

A large number of the rebels captured at Sharpsburg, refuse to take the parole but took the oath of allegiance and have gone North.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 20th.—The Washington Republican of today says a message which came from Gen. Sigel's headquarters at Annapolis, Calverton, Cal. Va., reports that there is the greatest consideration, in consequence of an apprehended negro revolt.

Seventeen negroes, most of them from had been hung, except of North in newspapers having been based on them, containing President Lincoln's proclamation to liberate the slaves.

The Times has a dispatch giving an account of a gentleman from Culpeper County, Va., of the hanging of seven men, charged with organizing an insurrection. The conspiracy is supposed to extend through out several counties. The inhabitants of the counties where the insurrection exists, threaten to resist the conscription act on the plea of self-defense to protect themselves against the negroes. Two-thirds of the slaves in Virginia have already heard of President Lincoln's Proclamation, and know that they are free, and he thinks should the rebels make any attempt to resist position, another "Nat Turner" rebellion would occur in Eastern and Central Virginia.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 20.—The Washington Star of this evening has information that it is believed the rebels are entering Winchester.

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Gen. Price is said to be gathering a large number of troops at Holly Springs, with a view of attacking some point on the Middle and Ohio rivers.

There is a rumor here, apparently not well authenticated, that an attack had been made on the Federal troops at Island No. 10. There has been no boat from Memphis for three days. Trouble is feared on the river.

A report is in circulation here to-night that the rebels attacked and captured Island No. 10. The report is not traceable to reliable sources.

PORTLAND, Oct. 10, 7 p. m.—After capturing our pickets, John Morgan dashed on Lexington yesterday morning at the head of fifteen hundred men.

Before reaching Lexington, our force fought him gallantly, killing and wounding several. Our loss was six killed and 125 prisoners. The prisoners were immediately paroled. The balance of our force, 250 cavalry, made their escape from the city.

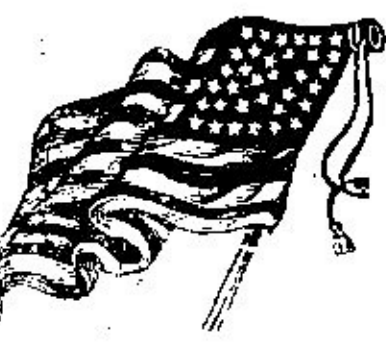
To-day, when between Versailles and Frankfort, he was suddenly met by 2,500 of Danville's cavalry, who, after a short fight, routed him, scattering his force.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 14.—The Indian troubles are subsiding. All is quiet in the Upper Mississippi, and the refugees are returning to their homes. The 600 Indians who delivered themselves to Gen. Sibley are being tried, and will be executed. The captives they took with them relate many tales of their horrible deeds. A most pitiable case is that of a young lady being ravished to death. They left none of the women undetected.

HARRISBURG, Oct. 19th.—Fifteen Union Congressmen, including Bailey, in the 15th District, are no doubt elected. The Senate ticket is still doubtful. The chances favor the Democracy. The House will probably stand 46 Union and 54 Democrats. The Senate, 20 Union and 13 Democrats.

A special to the N. Y. Herald, dated Cincinnati, 22d, says: "Gen. Humphrey H. Marshall's rebel force is retreating from Mount Sterling, towards East Tennessee. His army numbers about 3,000 men. We have a force in pursuit, but as all Marshall's men are mounted, he will find it easy to escape. "Gen. Bragg's rebel army is moving through Cumberland Gap. Gen. Buell has been pursued, and is trying with his main force at Crab Orchard. In another week no rebel force will be in Kentucky.

Something new for you

Why do not some of our rich farmers turn their attention to the raising of Hops? It is the great crop of portions of New York, and the culture is a decidedly profitable one. Much soil and climate are generally good; no doubt, for the growth of hops, and so long as small beer, strong beer, lager beer, ale, porter, etc. are favorite drinks of the people hops will bring remunerating prices. We have come across some hop intelligences in the Rochester Democrat which we propose to give a brief summary of for the education of such as grow wheat, corn, grass, and potatoes mainly, year after year.

Oswego county, New York, is the centre of the hop interests in that State, and beats the continent in the hop line. At least 10,000 acres are devoted to hop vines, yielding about 1,000 pounds to the acre, at least in the average of 6,000 tons. This, at the low price of \$200 per ton, amounts to the sum of \$1,200,000. Hops are now worth about \$300 per ton. In addition to the immense hop fields of Oswego county, there is a large growth in adjacent districts, and so important has the trade and interest become that a "Hop Journal" is published monthly at \$5 a year.

One of the chief hop growers of Oswego county is Mr. J. R. Young, of Springfield. He commenced hop growing fourteen years ago, and from four acres has increased his field to twenty. This, with one exception, is the largest hop yard in the United States. He employs six men, constant plowing and hoeing being necessary to keep down the weeds. The cost of a crop of hops to the grower is at least seven cents per pound, and the average price of hops for forty years has been sixteen cents per pound, during which period they have ranged from four to fifty cents.

Hops are grown from runners nipped off in the Spring from old stocks, and sold at rates varying from fifty cents to six dollars per bushel. They require two years for development, are put about seven feet apart, and the first year the field can be put in corn. Hop poles are the chief expense, and trouble; two vines climb, a pole, and 1,400 poles set a single acre. Over twenty millions of hop poles pointed upward this season in Oswego county alone, worth \$15 per hundred delivered at the hop yard. Eacking is another item, more than 3,000 bales being used in Oswego county alone, worth \$15 per hundred delivered at the hop yard. A cheap substitute for hop poles has recently been introduced and patented. Iron wires are stretched across the field from the top of tall posts, and these wires support twine runners from every hop root. The vines climb the finest twine, and the saving over poles is at least sixty per cent. The twine is on a reel, and the hop bunches hang free to the air and fill out better than on the old plan of perpendicular poles. Some three miles and a half of twine are used to the acre. Such are some of the facts about Hop growing in the Empire State.

The Cleveland Plaindealer states that there are now over five hundred acres of vineyards on Kelly's Island, over two hundred of which are bearing. In 1861 there were 126 acres in bearing. From this area, the product was in value, for fruit cuttings sold, and wine, \$53,305, being \$121 per acre. One man will do the labor for five acres. Each acre, when in full bearing, yields about three tons of fruit. A gallon of wine is produced from eleven pounds of fruit.

To-Relieve Strains—A correspondent of the Rural Register writes that Journalist Mr. John Barnes of Baltimore removed a troublesome stump from near his house in the following manner: "Last fall, with an inch auger, he bored a hole in the centre of the stump, ten inches deep, and into it put about half a pound of Oil of Vitrol, and corked the hole up tight. This spring the whole stump and roots, extending through all their ramifications, were so rotten that they were easily eradicated."
