From the Twenty Fourth Regt. CAMP NEAR CHARLESTON, Md., Oct. 18th, 1862.

Massachusetts Passes.—Our regiment has been under marching orders with two days cooked rations on hand for the past week, and are only waiting the signal to strike tents. A reconnaissance was started in force today before day, and at last accounts our were in possession of Charlestown, miles from Harper's Ferry, and the hottest of season, and it is expected that we shall soon be in the valley of the Shenandoah. NEW YORK, Oct. 28th.—The Herald's Ferry correspondent of the Philadelphia Press, under date of the 27th, says: "News received here to-day from Pleasanton's advance confirms the report, that the rebels are retreating rapidly up the valley. Winchester was evacuated to-day; it was thought that Sharpsburg would be held with any large force. The entire rebel army of Northern Virginia is said to have been divided into two bodies under Jackson and Longstreet. Jackson's column is moving directly to Staunton where it is said winter quarters for a large force have been indicated. Longstreet moves to Gordonsville."

It is thought Gen. Burnside moved to-day and is now on his way to Sharpsburg, meeting no enemy but his army have brought in a considerable number of stragglers. Our forces will occupy Winchester during the present week. It is believed Gen. Burnside will come up with a guard of Longstreet, and that a battle will ensue. Gen. Sigoum's corps have been sent to support him. The entire army of the Potomac will cross the river as soon as transportation for supplies can be secured. ASTORIA, Oct. 23rd.—By direction of the President the States of Tennessee, east of the Tennessee river, and parts of northern Alabama may be taken possession of by the United States troops, will constitute the Department of the Cumberland, to be under command of Gen. Rosecrans. The troops Gen. Grant will constitute the army corps, and those assigned to Rosecrans will constitute the 14th corps.

INDIANVILLE, Oct. 26th.—Col. Edward Cook, Act. Brig. Gen. with 500 cavalry and a few infantry, was sent to capture the rebel camp of Morgan's cavalry at Point Lookout. Hill, killing four or five, taking several prisoners and 300 wagons, partly loaded. The remainder of the rebel camp towards Mt. Vernon. Col. McCook had four horses shot under him. At Richmond our forces captured 2000 and wounded rebels, whom they killed. All reports of disaffection of the rebels by Gen. McCook or Rosecrans, or their having been arrested, are absolutely false.

CAIRO, Oct. 26th.—Lieut. George S. Sick, of the 20th Ohio, just from Bolivar and Jackson, says that it was reported at Jackson, on what seemed good authority, that Price had crossed the river with 50,000 men, and was marching in the direction of Bolivar. Gen. Pillow is also reported in the neighborhood with 20,000 men, his report is considered probably of high military authority.

ONTARIO, Oct. 26th.—A special from Memphis to the Tribune says that the Union Telegraph extra of the 4th contains the evacuation of Galveston, Texas. It says that the Federal commander notified the people that four days should be allowed for women and children to leave the city. Last evening of the day troops commenced evacuating the city. Much confusion prevailed. The city occupied by Federal.

On the 5th, the Granada Appeal of the 20th says, Van Duren and Lovell still at Holly Springs. Oct. 29.—A request made to-day to have the bodies of 2 Union soldiers buried near Sheperdstown, was denied. It is known of Lee or Stuart was obtained, which occupied about an hour. This news that the leading rebel Generals are not far off, and that the rebel army is not yet retreated up the Shenandoah valley.

The rebels sent their sick and wounded to Staunton, evidently anticipating the movement of the army of the Potomac.

It is believed that no large body of the enemy has crossed to the east of the Blue Ridge.

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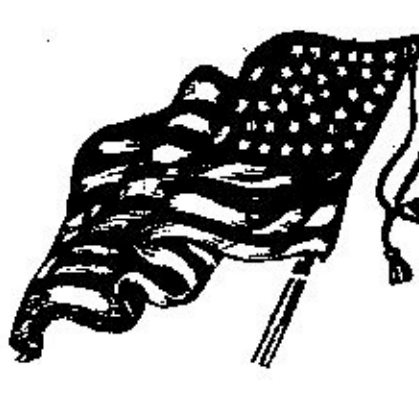
