The Tax Stamps. The National Tax Low passes by the last session of Congress compels the use of tax stamps upon at bank cheeks, drafts, notes, articles of agreement, telegraphic messages mortgage honde; insurance poi icles express packages, &c. This being an entirely new feature to the present generation, there is considerable anxiety on the part of the people to know the exact character of the stamps and how they are to be used. Most of the stamps are about the size of the common STREET'S BLOCK, CITT OF OWOMO. poetage stamps, got up in an artistic manner, with a head in the centra-denomination in figures on each corner, the words "internal revenue" on the top, and the kind of document that it is to be used upon on the bottom-such as "bank. checks."" contracts," " telegraph," &c. The insurance stamps are more elongated, with the figures denoting their denomination immedistely over and under the head, instead of the corners of the stamp. They are all of different colors, and are to be affixed to the document in the same manner as the postage stamp to a letter, and will present a nest appearence and be rather; ornamental. Their manufacture has been pushed forward with activity, and it will not be long before these stamps will be as familiar to the business community as are the postage stamps at present.

This latter arrangment affords a good opportunity for ex. amining the fruit during the winter.

OUR RECEIPT FOR CURING MEAT. -To one gallon of water, take 11 lbs. of salt, 1:lb. of sugar; 1 oz. of saltpeter, tog. of potesh. In this ratio the pickle is to be increased to any quantity desired. "Dust over the floor of the bin with slected impacted then put in six or seven inches deep of potatoes, and and dust with lime as before. Put in six or seven inches deep of pota; what the times demand, and are toes, and dost with lime as outere, repeating the operation till all are stowed away in that way. One bushel of lime is sufficient for forty bushels of potatoes, though more will not bush them. The lime rather improves the flavor than other
