Who are Entitled to Pensions The question is often asked, "was are entitled to draw pensions?" act of Congress passed July 1861, made liberal provisions to disabled or invalid soldiers who have served in the army of the Union since the 4th of M orch 1861. and also to all widows and children (under 16 years of age), as well as med en and dependent sisters of soldiers killed is battle, or who shall die of wounds received or disease contracted while in the service, and in the line of duty. provisions, as a whole, are much more liberal than the old pension laws for the Revolution, or the war of 1812. amount of pensions allowed to relatives in some of the death of officers of soldiers -while in the service or to the men themselves in cases of total disability, are fixed as follows:

The pirate Nashville was entirely destroyed by the Monitor Montauk, on the Ogeeche river, on the let inst. It is reported, by the rebels, at the time to have had on board 950 bales of cutton.

A foreging party sent from the Army of the Potomac into Lancaster county returned on the 7th. They captured two important rebel mails, 10,000 bushels of corn, 50 horses and mules and a numbers of prison ra.

On the 9th a body of rebels entered Fairfax Va., and captured the Provost Marshall, patrols, borses, etc., together with Gen. Stoughton and a number of men from his command.

Under date of March 10th, from Memphis, ther is a report of a battle, on the Yazoo river, and that 7000 prisoners and eight transports have been captured. No particulars are given.

NASHULLE, March 6. There was fighting all day yesterday etween Van Dorn's Confederate and a Federal faire of three regiments of infantry, abilit 500 cavalry, and one battery, at Springville, thirteen miles South of Franklin.

Colonel Coburn's three regiments of numery were cut to pieces and coptured by the n-bel forces. They fought desperately, but their amunition became exhansted, and the Federals, overnowered by superior numbers, were either kill at Wednesday the 11th. or captured.
