A new musical instrument has been exhibited before the British Association of science. In appearance it is described as resembling a common harmonium, with the exception of a peculiar kind of a keyboard, which is represented as a perfect triumph in respect to simplicity, and at once a mathematical and musical demonstration. This keyboard is one-half broader than usual, and has alternate rows of white and black notes, running across it, from left to right. In addition to these, there is also a row of buttons, one in the corner of each black note—so that there are on the keyboard, within easy finger reach, three separate sets of digits, in continuous rows, viz., the white, the black, and the round. The order of succession for the notes in each scale is always the same, and thus the progressive fingering is precisely alike for every key.

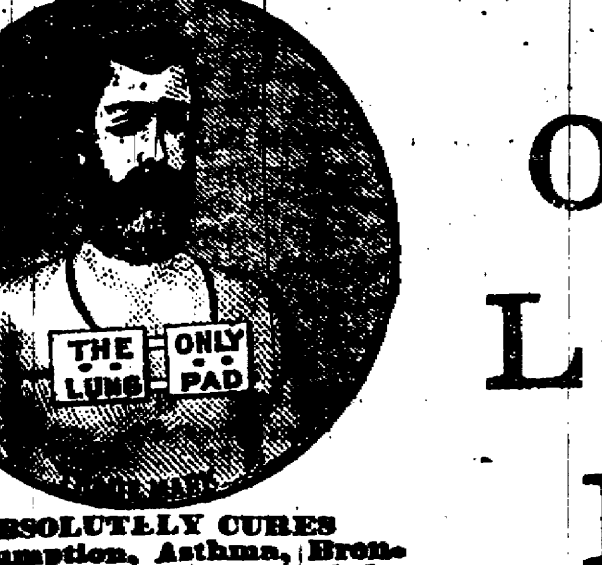

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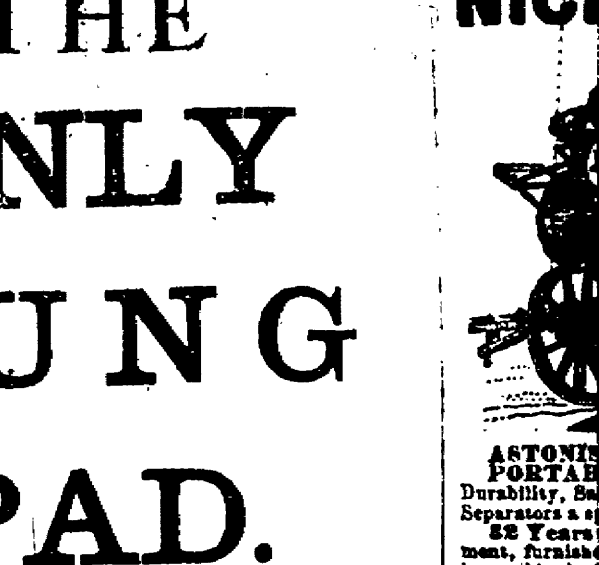
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
